### PTO GETTING ORGANIZED

Last spring several area women suggested that Manchester reorganize a parent-teacher group. They spoke to school officials, checked into the state organization and set up a "test meeting." The response was good with over sixty interested parents and teachers attending this informal meeting. From this meeting came a Steering Committee to officially reorganize the Manchester Parent-Teacher Organization. The committee consisted of Glen Lehr, Tom Schill, Charles Dettling, Jan Proffrock, Evie Seeger, Birdella Flood, Sue Achtenberg, Lynn England, Pat Spencer and Dacia Daniels.

It was decided not to break the Manchester PTO into three groups (Klager, Middle and High School) but rather the programs and the organization be geared as one body to these three age groups. Following this idea the committee nominated two parents and two teachers from each of the three schools to establish a Board of Advisors. Nominations will also be accepted from the floor at the first PTO meeting as well as the selection of a slate of officers. The committee suggested the following names to be brought before the September PTO meeting. For PTO Officers: President, Glen Lehr and Don Wheeler; Vice-President, Jan Proffrock and Lois Kuntz; Secretary, Sue Achtenberg and Sandy Downey; Treasurer, Tom Schill and Paul Boehler; for the Board of Advisors from Klager School, Mary Blossom and Betty Cresswell (teachers), June Wellman and Maria Lehr (parents); from the Middle School, Jack Raffaelli and Dacia Daniels (teachers), Jean Smith and Charles Dettling (parents); and from the High School, Cal Poppink and Ted Gulliver (teachers), Mary Munson and L. V. Kirk (parents). The President of the Pleasant Lake PTO will automatically be on the Board of Advisors. It was further suggested that the first officers and advisory board hold office from September, 1970 to January, 1972 (which would be just over one year) so that the organization would run on a January to December basis.

The meetings are to be kept short and within a reasonable time limit with a suggested 30-minute business meeting and 30 minutes for a guest speaker followed by an hour of discussion and social contact between parents and teachers. "The purpose of the PTO is both social and supporting," it was pointed out, "with the social to mean a chance for parents to meet teachers and the supporting to mean that we as a PTO would help the school board in projects and they could help us."

At this first meeting also will be a guest speaker and one who has created a great deal of controversy recently, Dick Songer, organizer and promoter of the Goose Lake Rock Festival will be the first speaker of the Manchester PTO.

The first meeting of the Manchester PTO will be most important for both parents and teachers. The future of Manchester's PTO depends on the support and attendance of these parents and teachers of the Manchester School District and the Steering Committee urges at least one if not both parents of school-age children to attend this initial meeting to adopt the PTO rules, elect officers and voice an opinion in this important organization. ### SCHOOL NEWS

The Manchester Public Schools will open for the 1970-71 school year on Tuesday, Sept. 8, 1970 with a full day session. Bus routes will remain the same as last year for the first few days and if changes are necessary these will occur starting the second week of school.

Textbooks and materials will be furnished this year free of charge. However, some materials may be in short supply for the first few weeks due to the inability of supply houses to furnish these items in adequate number. Normally these houses do not stock crayons, notebook fillers and other small items that are normally purchased by the student from other sources.

The school district will furnish textbooks, paper, pencils and those items necessary for class use. There will be no fees charged for locks, towels, or special class areas such as art, science, home-making or industrial arts. However, materials used in industrial arts projects for personal use will be purchased by the students. The school district will not furnish any items used in connection with extracurricular activities such as football shoes, basketball shoes, etc.

While school districts are required under the new Supreme Court ruling to furnish textbooks and materials, the school districts may also charge for damages or loss of school property when such property has been provided to students without charge.

School officials may determine the quality and quantity of school supplies such as textbooks, paper and pencils that are reasonable for the use of pupils, and determine the length of time such materials shall be provided. Likewise, pupils may voluntarily bring their own supplies for any curricular subject.

Kindergarten students will attend classes as of the following schedule:

Nellie Ackerson Building: Afternoon - All kindergarten youngsters living in the village south of Main Street.

Luther C. Klager Elementary: Morning - All rural kindergarten youngsters in Manchester and Bridgewater Townships

Luther C. Klager Elementary: Afternoon - All village youngsters living north of Main Street and Sharon Township youngsters, except those who have been notified that they will be attending the Pleasant Lake morning session.

Pleasant Lake Elementary: Morning - All Pleasant Lake area youngsters plus those from Sharon Township who have been notified.

### "OPEN LETTER TO MAN" IS AN IDEA WHOSE TIME HAS COME

In this era of preoccupation with sex and nudity under the guise of freedom of expression, a simple letter written to man about the image of womanhood is creating a lot of interest throughout the country. Some radio personalities such as Los Angeles' famous Dick Wittinghill have read it repeatedly on their radio programs. Newspapers and magazines, both religious and secular, are reprinting it. And private citizens are copying it for distribution to their friends.

This is what "Open Letter to Man" says:

"I am a Woman. "I am your wife, your sweetheart, your mother, your daughter, your sister....your friend. I NEED YOUR HELP...." I was created to give to the world GENTLENESS, SERENITY, BEAUTY, LOVE, AND UNDERSTANDING. I am finding it increasingly difficult to fulfill my purpose. "Many people in advertising, motion pictures, television and radio have ignored my inner qualities and have repeatedly used me ONLY as a symbol of SEX. "This humiliates me; it destroys my dignity; it prevents me from being what YOU want me to be an example of-"Beauty, Inspiration and love-"Love for my children, love for my husband, love of my God and country. "I need your help to restore me to my true position...to ALLOW me to fulfill the PURPOSE FOR WHICH I WAS CREATED. "I know you will find a way."

This letter was written about ten years ago by songwriter Sy Miller and his wife, the former actress, Jill Jackson. But it wasn't until "Open Letter to Man" was discovered shortly over a year ago by the Rev. Francis J. Caffrey of the Maryknoll Fathers that it received widespread circulation.

Father Caffrey was so impressed with the letter that he got the Millers' permission to reproduce it. From that humble grass roots beginning, "Open Letter to Man" has developed its own quiet underground movement protesting the degradation of women as mere sex objects. Many prominent businessmen and entertainment personalities have assisted Father Caffrey in his efforts to help restore woman's proper image of love, beauty and dignity in our contemporary society.

R. D. Funk, Managing Editor of the Santa Monica (California) Evening Outlook was among the first to tell the story of the Millers', Father Caffrey and "Open Letter to Man" in his column. Since then the "Open Letter" has been reproduced and circulated widely in the U.S., in some foreign countries and is on its way to expanding its message of common decency throughout the world.

"Open Letter to Man" is a simple, powerful message challenging today's animalistic, sex-oriented image of womanhood. It's difficult today for a girl or young woman to believe anyone really

cares about morality, femininity and virtue in our society. But the challenge is simply stated for all to meet, "I know you will find a way."

Registration for classes in Basic Education is scheduled for Sept. 21, 1970, from 7:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m., in room 211 at the Jones Building, 401 North Division, Ann Arbor, Michigan. Persons interested in returning to school are encouraged to enroll at this time, although enrollment is open throughout the year.

Classes will meet twice a week on Monday and Wednesday evenings, beginning September 23, 1970, from 7:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m., in room 307 at the Jones Building. Additional classes may be held if there is sufficient demand.

Instruction will be provided in the basic skills of reading, writing, and arithmetic with emphasis on everyday, practical problems such as learning to read newspapers, to read street signs, to read menus, to make grocery lists, to budget income, to write letters, to fill out applications forms, and to answer classified ads.
