SCHOOL BOARD MINUTES

November 9, 1970

The meeting was called to order at 8:00 p.m. by President Klager. Present: L. C. Klager, President; Carl Pedersen, Secretary; Clarence Fielder, Treasurer; Trustees Andrew Luckhardt, Louis Vogel, Donald Walter, and Allen Alber; Superintendent Robert Swartz; Elementary School Principal Birdella Flood; Middle School Principal Theodore Tapping, Jr. Visitors included Mr. John Christensen, KMM Associates; Mr. Bruce Barton, Paul V. Engstrom and Company, Certified Public Accountants; Mr. Clarence Knickerbocker, Band Boosters; Mr. Donald Wheeler, President PTO, Mr. Reno Feldkamp and Eugene Bentschneider were also in attendance.

Mr. Knickerbocker was introduced as the newly elected president of the Band Boosters. He expressed hope for more interest in the Band by the entire community. He explained a candy selling project being planned by the Boosters to start Nov. 21. The objectives are to purchase uniforms, purchase band instruments, scholarships and other projects. Mr. Knickerbocker excused himself and departed.

Mr. Wheeler, President PTO, expressed concern about the crossing guards at the Main Street and M-52 intersection and the entrance into the Luther Klager Elementary School. There was discussion about the possibility of a traffic signal at Main and M-52 and the installation of new sidewalks along the east side of M-52 leading to the Klager School.

Mr. Jack Christensen from KMM Associates, Architects for the Middle School renovation, gave a progress report indicating all work except roofing was progressing on schedule. He explained steps being taken to increase speed on the roofing and he was hopeful that progress would accelerate. Also discussed was carpeting for hallways. A motion was made by Fielder and supported by Vogel that carpeting for hallways be authorized. Carried unanimously.

Mr. Bruce Barton from Paul V. Engstrom & Co., Certified Public Accountants reviewed the annual audit (June 30, 1970) explaining in detail procedures relating to school accounting. He also went over each account, explaining them and answering questions. After completing the Annual Audit, Mr. Barton reviewed the monthly audit (October, 1970), again explaining it in detail and answering questions. It was moved by Fielder and supported by Vogel that the annual audit be approved. Carried.

It was moved by Alber and supported by Vogel that the monthly audit be accepted for filing. Carried.

It was moved by Luckhardt and seconded by Vogel that the minutes of the previous meeting be approved. Carried.

Monthly bills were reviewed and several items were reviewed and explained. It was moved by Fielder that the bills be paid. Carried. Total \$8,094.14. Middle School - R. T. Mitchell Construction Co. Application No. 2 \$8,550.00; Dunbar-Barton, Inc. Application No. 2 \$4,338.00; Total \$12,888.00. It was moved by Pedersen and seconded by Luckhardt that these bills be paid. Carried.

Mr. Swartz reviewed the request from United Methodist Church for sharing the cost of water service relating to their proposed new building and the anticipated school athletic field on the Luther Klager site. Mr. Swartz had explored this with the architects from both Kingscott & KMM Associates and explained the general feeling that it was more feasible not to enter into the sharing because of costs, availability of funds, and possible future involvements. It was moved by Vogel and supported by Walter that the School Board not enter into cost sharing. Carried.

Mr. Klager discussed the PTO meeting at Pleasant Lake and particularly the panel discussion on discipline.

The Crossing Guard at Main Street and M-52 was again brought up. There were related instances of ineffectiveness and congested traffic. Possible solutions were discussed and it is to be further explored by the PTO and the Superintendent.

Mr. Klager read letters from Clarence Fielder and Allen Alber, both asking that their resignations be accepted due to their having been elected as General Election, Nov. 3, 1970 as Township Supervisor for Manchester and Sharon Townships respectively. It was moved by Vogel and seconded by Walter that the resignations be accepted because of the conflict of interest and that deep appreciation be expressed to Mr. Fielder and Mr. Alber for their services to the School District. Carried unanimously.

It was moved by Vogel and supported by Pedersen that the proposed School Board members Reno Feldkamp and Eugene Bentschneider be appointed to fill the vacancies caused by the resignation of Allan Alber and Clarence Fielder. Carried unanimously. Mr. Feldkamp and Mr. Bentschneider were sworn in by Superintendent Swartz.

It was moved by Pedersen and supported by Luckhardt that Trustee Vogel be appointed Treasurer for the School District to replace Mr. Fielder who resigned. Carried unanimously.

Mr. Klager brought up the up-coming teachers party. The most appropriate date is Dec. 19. Mr. Walter is to check on the availability of the K of C Hall for dinner. The committees are Refreshments Swartz, Bentschneider, Pedersen; Decorations - Chairman Elvira Vogel, Walter, Feldkamp and Luckhardt. Similar arrangement to previous years activities was recommended.

Mr. Klager indicated new committee designations bringing committees up to date with new board members. The representative to Planning Commission was not decided.

Mr. Swartz brought up invoice from the State Highway Department for inspection of work involving the State Highway (M-52) when Klager Elementary School was constructed. This is a new, but apparently mandatory, procedure. It was moved by Luckhardt and supported by Vogel that \$499.90 be approved for payment to avoid withholding of funds by the State of Michigan. Carried.

Mrs. Flood extended an invitation to the Fall Fun Festival.

The meeting adjourned at 10:35 p.m. by President Klager.

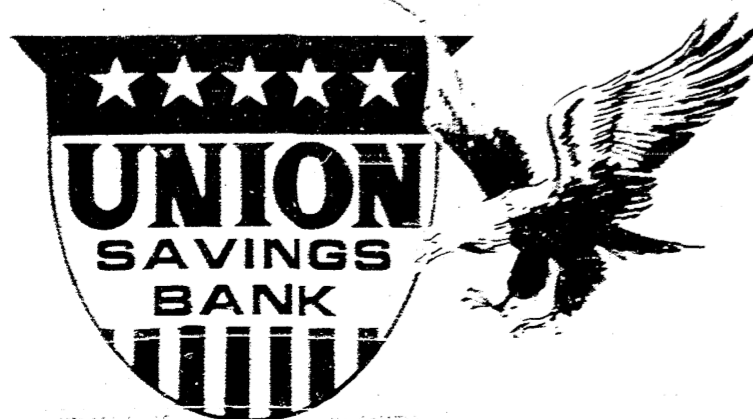

ROOSTER AND OUR LAWS

Section 215 Signal required. The privileges granted as an authorized emergency vehicle in sections 215 and 217 of this ordinance are applicable only when the driver of the vehicle in motion sounds an audible signal by bell, siren or exhaust whistle as may be reasonably necessary, and when the vehicle is equipped with at least 12 lights and displaying a flashing, oscillating or rotating red or blue light visible under normal atmospheric conditions from a distance of 500 feet to the front of such vehicle. Only authorized emergency vehicles operated as police vehicles which are publicly owned or maintained or in operation, owned or operated by a public body, or in the course of an employment, business or other activity are authorized to operate as emergency vehicles.

I know the fans and myself are proud to say we are the Flying Dutchmen from Manchester.

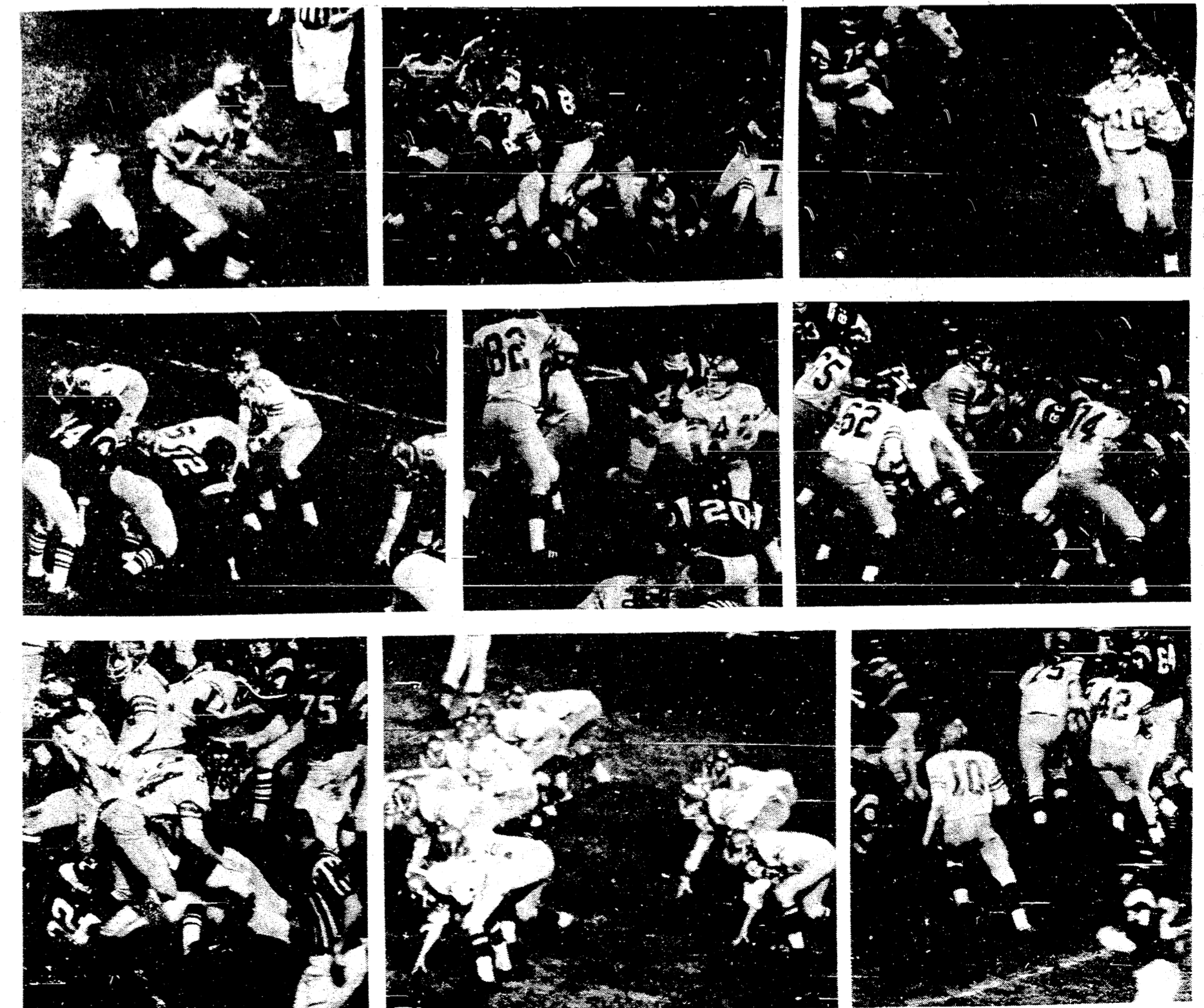

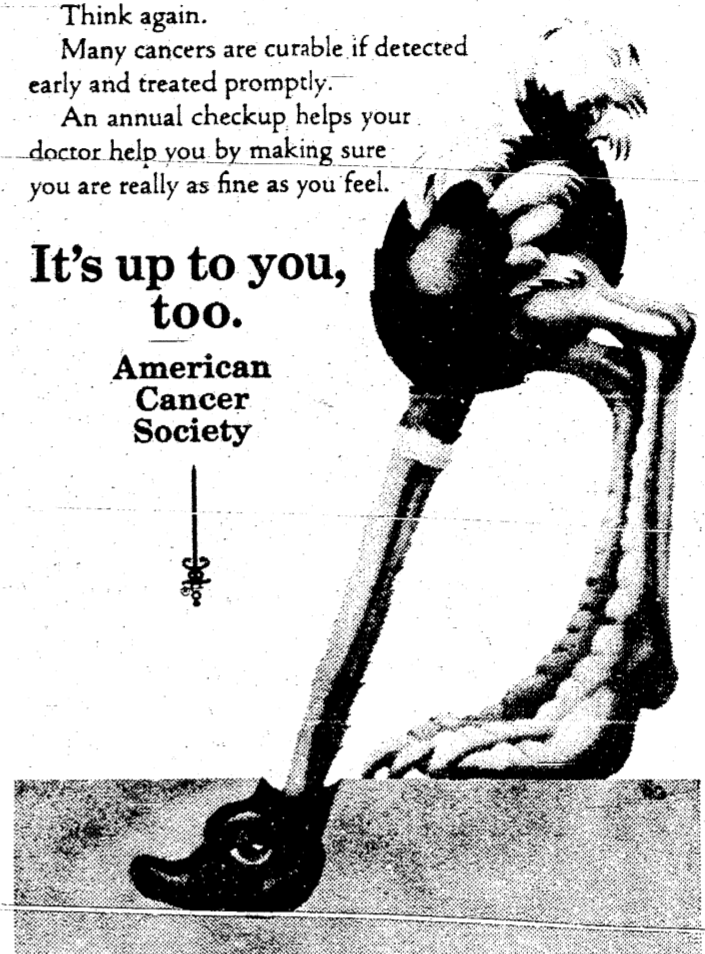

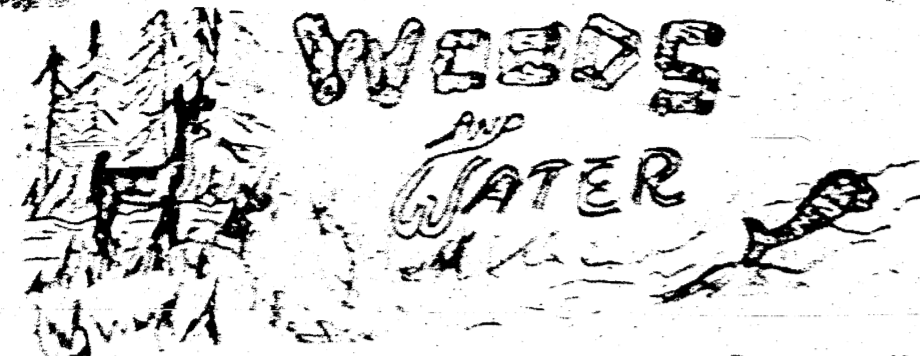

What a beautiful day for the opening of the Michigan deer season. With an accumulation of an inch or so of snow Saturday it gave the hunters enough snow for tracking and the air was crisp with a bit of sunshine. Ideal! Many hunters were in and around Manchester for the opening day and we talked to a few who were successful. Jack Raiffel bagged a beautiful 10 points and field dressed at 214 pounds. A whopper. Roger Kasper brought down a 8 point and Vern Everdale a 4 point. Monday morning Clere Arnold brought down a fine 8 point white tail. Hunters reported seeing many deer, but were not close enough for a shot. We understand some of the fellows who made the trip North, came back without even seeing a deer.

On Nov. 25 trapping season opens in Zone 3, which includes this area, for muskrat, mink and raccoon. The season runs through January 31, 1971. On the first day of the season, you may begin to set or stake your traps at 8 a.m. No trap other than a steel trap may be used for

trapping wild animals. Traps in use on a person's possession whenever you are a field hunter must have a metal tag attached with your name and address. Within 5 days after the close of a trapping season, the kind and number of traps you have must be reported to a conservation officer at an office of the Department of Natural Resources. After making this report, you may, under permit, lease the traps for recreational purposes rather than the great business it used to be years ago.

Rabbits season opened on Oct. 20 and continues until March 1. Usually hunters prefer some snow on the ground before going after the cottontail. By using a 22 rifle rather than a shot gun you can make more of a sport out of rabbit hunting. A bounding hare or bounding cottontail is a tricky target to nail with a single bit of lead, and can survive several fusillades of frantic rifle fire. It is a skill of experience and practice to hit a springing rabbit with an open-sighted 22. The trick is to delay the shot until the rifle is tracking the target and to follow through after the shot just as you would if you should with a shotgun. Before too long rabbits will start to tumble ears over powderpuff

without benefit of aiming or taking a sight picture. We will include more about rabbit hunting in future articles.

Dear hunters, remember to tag your deer after you have brought it down and are sure it is dead. One hunter reported he lost his deer to the Conservation Officer because he had failed to comply with the rule. Next weekend will be another heavy hunting weekend, be sure of what you are shooting at before you pull that trigger. There are many many hunters in the woods and this is no loose season on men. Tell them you read it in Woods and Water.

TOWNSHIP SUPERVISOR RETIRES AFTER 20 YEARS

Clayton Parr, Manchester Township Supervisor, recently retired from public office after 20 years of service to the community. A position Parr held since 1950 when he was appointed to fill a vacancy left by Charlie Waltz, Parr was subsequently elected the following April, 1951 and the years to follow at every second-year election. "But now I'm ready to just enjoy myself," he said. Prior to his supervisor's post, Parr was a Justice of the Peace in the area for over 10 years.

Township Supervisor, a job that brought "something interesting" and a continuous responsibility at all hours of the day, Parr pointed out that until last year, the Township Supervisors were a vital part of the Washtenaw County governmental body. Commissioners are now elected to make up the Washtenaw County Board of Commissioners, thus the Township Supervisors are concerned only with their 36-square mile township problems, he explained with this recent change the biggest change in the post retirement. "I really enjoyed working on the County Board though," he added, "because we were directly involved in our county government. We felt a small part of our county achievements." He added that during his years on the County Board, the new county building, jail and juvenile home were only a few of the assets to the county that he helped in some way to achieve. "We only did a small part but still the Township Supervisors were a part of that achievement."

Current duties of the Township Supervisors are to assess property values for taxation purposes, act as Chairman of the Township Board, follow up building permits, which he stressed are issued at the County Building and which are important in determining the state of that dwelling for the yearly tax purposes, and "generally handle a hundred-and-one problems" that arise throughout the township. A resident might call to find out about drainage for a possible building site, a dog has mauled a flock of sheep or working with the village council on any number of projects, he pointed out. "We get a little bit of everything whether we can handle the problem or suggest the right individual to call."

Tax assessment is the major responsibility however. A state manual plus the building permits are major guidelines for tax evaluation, he explained. One topic arose involving home improvement and Parr explained that painting or putting a new roof on a home does not increase the tax. The State does specify however, that a building addition or "change of cover" such as aluminum siding on a previously wood-sided home for instance, would increase the property tax. Property assessment is taken between January 1 and March 1 and as Mr. Parr pointed out, the condition of a new home for example, is taken in that time regardless of whether or not it is scheduled for completion within that same year. If the house is 40% complete by March 1, that is how the tax is based for that particular year. When it's completed the tax is re-evaluated.

He went on to explain that before the recent changes the village prepared their own tax evaluation but now the village and township roll must be exact duplicates so the full responsibility of the tax roll is now a part of the Township Supervisor's job. He continued to say that the village council and township board have always worked harmoniously and have achieved many assets for the community.

Parr compared the first tax roll he prepared and the 1970 roll. In 1951 the equalized value of Manchester Township was \$3,013,680 to the 1970 figure of \$12,183,150. The total tax levy in 1951 was \$64,443.06 to \$454,893.50 in 1970.

There are 20 townships in the county and out of the 20 supervisors, six will retire and three were defeated at the polls. This great change-over is somewhat unusual Parr said, thus these supervisors and their wives were honored at a dinner at Leutheuser's Restaurant, in Saline recently.

In addition to Mr. Parr's retirement, Malcolm Billings, a township board trustee for 18 years, will also be leaving a post he said he's held "long enough." "I've enjoyed working on the board and with the other members. But I guess 18 years is long enough for anyone," Mr. Billings said. He too was originally appointed to fill a vacancy in 1952. Billings was defeated at the polls by Lyle Widmayer who resumed the duties of trustee at noon on Friday, November 20.

Clarence Fielder was recently elected as Township Supervisor and also began his official position last Friday. Mr. Fielder, well-known in the community, is affiliated with Manchester Tool & Die and Manchester Stamping, a member of the Optimist Club, St. Mary's and the K of C, has served over eight years on the Board of Education and until his recent resignation due to his supervisor's position was treasurer of the Board, was previously on the Review Board of Manchester Township and is active in many community projects.

Lyle Widmayer, General Manager of Tom Marshall, Inc., is assistant chief of the Manchester Township Fire Department, charter member of the Manchester Jaycees and Optimist Club, member of the American Legion, Sportsman Club and Emanuel United Church of Christ. He also served as Village Clerk for six years. Mr. Fielder and Mr. Widmayer will undoubtedly see many changes in the town-
