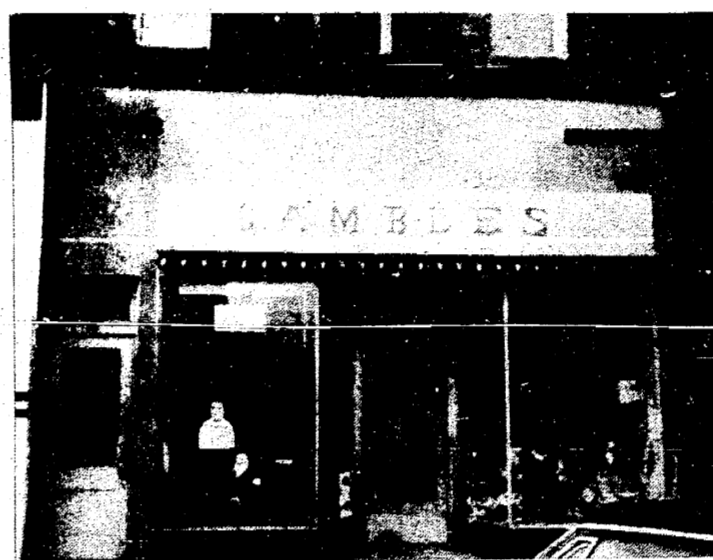

Buying into the business with silent partner "Chink" Roller, the Gills have added many new and modern-day features for home, farm and personal use over the past six years. Gambles carries a wide selection of hardware, custom paint with over 2,000 colors available "and even some in between" and mixed special paint colors for several of the newly decorated Main Street store-fronts. They carry a wide variety of sporting equipment plus hunting and fishing licenses, kitchen and household items, bicycles and wagons for the junior members of the family, and in the basement a large selection of furniture and wallpaper. "And," Donna Gill added, "if we haven't got it, we can order it." A recent addition is the car and home 8-track stereo tape center.

Although he is not actually selling TV sets any longer, Irv Gill still maintains the sets he sold from his one-time radio and TV center, located at the back of the Gambles store. Gill, operating his business from his home since 1968, to the present jewelry store location in the fall of 1962 and two years later to the present location, also carries component parts for the do-it-yourself stereo and TV set builders.

In addition to the Gambles store and TV repair center, the Gills own and

**90 FT. PINE DECORATED FOR CHRISTMAS**

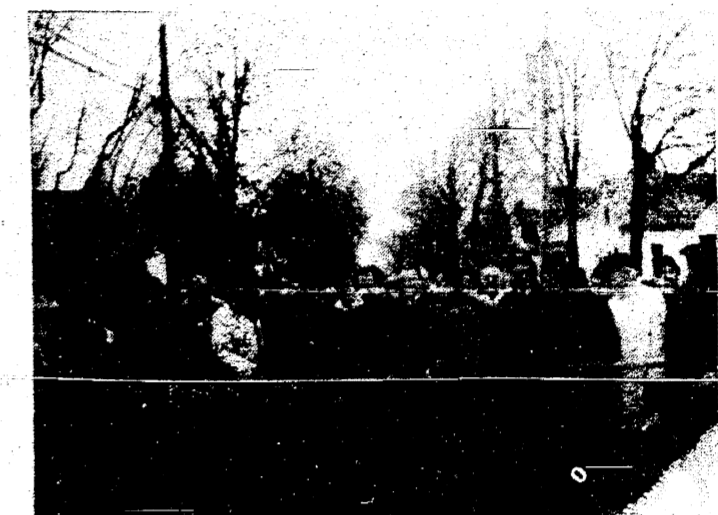

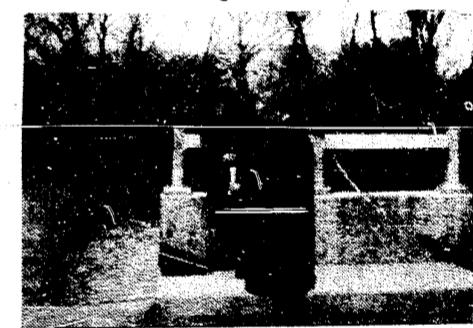

### LIBRARY NEWS

Inside the Third Reich - Memoirs by Albert Speer. Speer was the only defendant at the Nuremberg trials to admit his share of guilt in the crimes of the Third Reich. Sentenced to twenty years imprisonment, he wrote the first draft while his recollection of events was still fresh. After his release in 1966 he organized the vast manuscript into its present form. Having been Hitler's personal architect and later Minister of Armaments for wartime Germany, Speer truly gives us a look 'inside.' Portraits of Hitler, Goebbels, Goering, Himmler and Bormann emerge as well as a new look at Eva Braun. Probably one of the most important books of the year and recommended reading for all those interested in the possible development of a technological society.

Bucher - My Story. Here at last, the man who stood at the center of one of the most incredible events in the history of the U.S. Navy tells the story of the capture of the Pueblo and her crew by the North Koreans. Told with rare honesty and candor, it is a revealing portrait of a man whose quiet courage sustained him and his crew through an ordeal few naval officers before him had had to face. Commander Bucher served in the submarine service before taking command of the Pueblo. He was an orphan who grew up in a succession of foster homes until he was admitted to Father Flanagan's Boys Town. Upon graduation he enlisted in the Navy and later received a degree from the University of Nebraska. He and his family now live in Monterey, California. Recommended.

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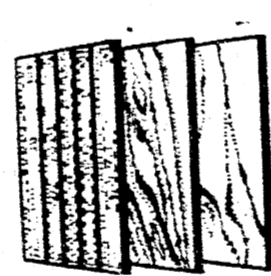

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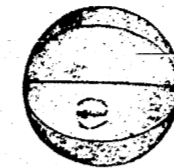

The JVs will have no soft touch coming Friday. They will go against Addison. But everyone knows upsets do happen.



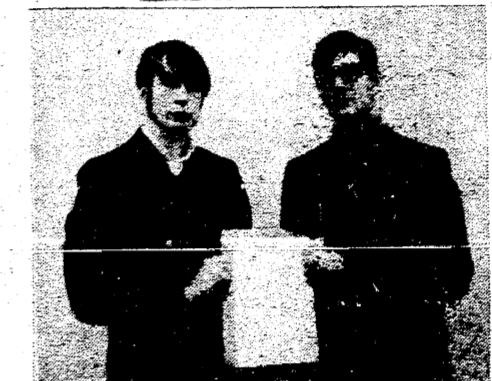

As we told you last week, the procedure to follow for disposal of highway-killed deer would be reviewed in this column. From the Michigan Department of Natural Resources these points are offered.

1. Highway-killed deer may be given only to the driver of the car which struck the animal.

2. Only a conservation officer can issue a permit to possess the dead deer. A police officer, checking the accident, may allow the driver to take the deer on application for highway-killed deer. He sends the application to the conservation officer who issues the actual permit.

3. Possession of any highway-killed deer, without an application or the permit, is unlawful and an arrest can result. Picking up a car killed deer and taking it home before calling a conservation officer is illegal.

4. Deer killed by cars may be kept only for 30 days. The person killing the deer may not give any of it away.

5. Non-residents who kill a deer with their car are not eligible to keep the animal unless they can show they will be staying in Michigan for 30 days.

Conservation officers are not allowed to give immature or spotted fawns to motorists who may have killed them. These are usually turned over to DNR researchers for experimental purposes.

For those who may be thinking that killing a deer with a car is an easy way to get free meat, it bears reconsidering. The average highway-killed deer seldom yields more than 50 pounds of meat. Damage to the vehicle averages \$200 or more. At \$4 or more per pound, this is scarcely a bargain even if there was no other inconvenience involved.

The guest speaker for the evening was Mrs. Susan Boulter, Title VI Consultant, of the Washtenaw Intermediate School District, Special Education Division, included in this district are ten local districts of Washtenaw County.

Mrs. Boulter's job under the new Title VI, government aided, program deals with multi-handicapped children ranging from birth to 19 years of age. This includes any child emotionally or physically handicapped or retarded child, who because of his disability is unable to attend public school.

The Title VI Program will start their first classes on December 15, operated by a complete staff of experienced, educated personnel selected especially for specific individual disability problems. The classes will run from about 9:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m. There will also be special counselling for parents.

Mrs. Boulter said that, unfortunately, there are several children around the area not receiving this specialized training and gave some examples of children who when treated early enough have entered public school by the third or fourth grade. She stressed that the earlier a child is helped the better the child progresses.

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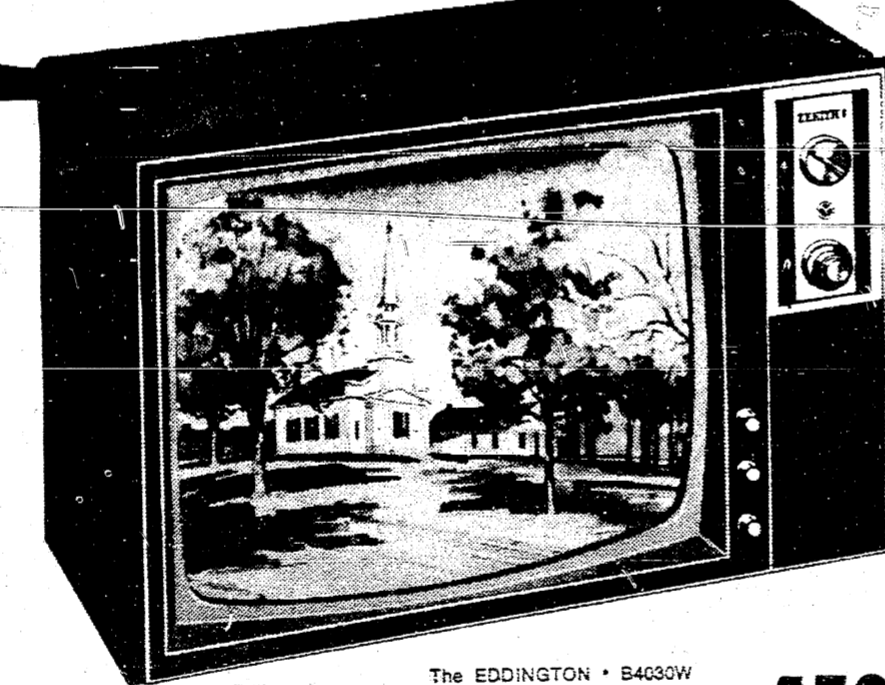
