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As we told you last week, the procedure to follow for disposal of highway-killed deer would be reviewed in this column. From the Michigan Department of Natural Resources these points are offered.

1. Highway-killed deer may be given only to the driver of the car which struck the animal.

2. Only a conservation officer can issue a permit to possess the dead deer. A police officer, checking the accident, may allow the driver to take the deer on application for highway-killed deer. He sends the application to the conservation officer who issues the actual permit.

3. Possession of any highway-killed deer, without an application or the permit, is unlawful and an arrest can result. Picking up a car killed deer and taking it home before calling a conservation officer is illegal.

4. Deer killed by cars may be kept only for 30 days. The person killing the deer may not give any of it away.

5. Non-residents who kill a deer with their car are not eligible to keep the animal unless they can show they will be staying in Michigan for 30 days.

Conservation officers are not allowed to give immature or spotted fawns to motorists who may have killed them. These are usually turned over to DNR researchers for experimental purposes.

For those who may be thinking that killing a deer with a car is an easy way to get free meat, it bears reconsidering. The average highway-killed deer seldom yields more than 50 pounds of meat. Damage to the vehicle averages \$200 or more. At \$4 or more per pound, this is scarcely a bargain even if there was no other inconvenience involved.

Mrs. Boulter said that, unfortunately, there are several children around the area not receiving this specialized training and gave some examples of children who when treated early enough have entered public school by the third or fourth grade. She stressed that the earlier a child is helped the better the child progresses.

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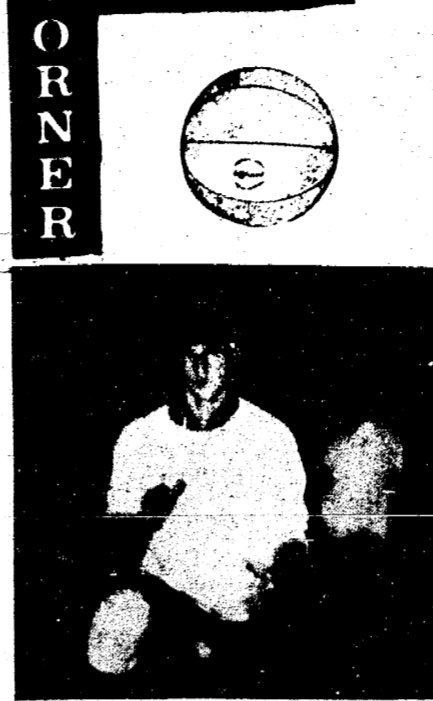

COUNCIL MINUTES November 16, 1970

Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by President Little at 7:10. Trustees present were Curley, Fitzgerald, Mahony, Reinhart, Scully and Walton. The minutes of the Nov. 2, 1970 meeting were read and corrected. Moved by Scully, supported by Mahony to accept the minutes. All years, carried. The minutes from the Nov. 10, 1970 special meeting were read and corrected. Moved by Reinhart, supported by Scully to accept the minutes. All years, carried.

Dave Little asked the Council to decide on a date and time for a special joint meeting with the Village Planning Commission. Nov. 19, 1970 at 7:30 was set with the Council to convene after the Planning Commission adjourns.

Don Limpert questioned the Council members on their views of a T.V. bank. He felt the forthcoming joint meeting on Nov. 19 should be known to all within the area of the bank. Moved by Fitzgerald, seconded by Scully to send a letter to all property owners within the block bounded by Adrian, Duncan, Clinton and Main Streets notifying them of the meeting. There was then a discussion of the development possibilities of the area.

Mr. Krauss notified Council that the Chamber of Commerce plans to provide quarters for Santa on Main Street in the vicinity of Keith's Barber Shop and the Main Street bridge approximately Dec. 15. Moved by Mahony, supported by Reinhart to approve this plan for a subsidiary of the North Pole workshop. All years, carried. Barricades will be erected to insure the safety of all visitors.

Jerry Randall requested sewer and water permits for the Methodist Church. Moved by Mahony, supported by Scully to issue sewer and water tap-in permits to the Methodist Church; to extend the mains north on Ann Arbor Street, that portion parallel with Ann Arbor Street to revert to the village after construction, with all construction costs including water meter to be born by the Methodist Church excluding the costs associated with the installation of a fire hydrant, and that portion perpendicular to Ann Arbor St. to be owned and maintained by the Church; to waive the materials requirement and fees for tap-in. All years, carried.

The Public Works and Police Department would like a lavatory installed in their facilities on N. Macomb. It would cost approximately \$1200 to run a sewer to the building. Moved by Walton, supported by Fitzgerald to install the lavatory if financially possible. All years, carried.

The temporary loss of Paul Ernst's services to the Public Works Dept. was discussed with the decision made that his salary would be continued through his current illness.

The Duncan Street bridge railing is due the middle of the week. Ribbon cutting is tentatively scheduled for Nov. 28 at 9:00 a.m.

In the work done by Ayling-Cunningham on Duncan and Division Streets there are several places which need to be re-done. Ayling-Cunningham has agreed to do this as soon as we have 2 to 3 dry days.

Reinhart met with the Agricultural Stabilization Committee. Their objective is to help develop the future park site.

Gravel will be used to level off the section of roadway next to Double A Publications sometime this week.

Mr. Koebbe requested, a storage cabinet in the Council room for the Planning Commission. Moved by Mahony, supported by Fitzgerald to authorize the DPW to purchase a cabinet with the price left to Bruce Daniel's discretion. All years, carried.

In correspondence from the State Highway Dept. the Council was informed that the Traffic Division will make a study on the speed around the Luther Klager Elementary School. The State Highway Dept. will also further study the edge of the road work on Ann Arbor Street.

A bid was read for tree removal and trim work by Mr. C. C. Hartman. The bid of \$2,020 includes \$1865 for the removal of 39 dead trees and \$155 for trimming. Moved by Curley, supported by Scully to award the job to Mr. C. C. Hartman. All years, carried. Herb asked that Bruce obtain a proof of insurance from Mr. Hartman.

Two salt bids were received. Morton Salt Co. \$12.70 per ton in 32T loads - price effective until April 30, 1971 and International Salt Co. \$12.70 per ton F.O.B. Manchester - price effective until March 31, 1971. Moved by Reinhart, supported by Curley to award the job to International Salt Co. All years, carried.

Moved by Reinhart, supported by Walton to approve the agreement for planning services of the Washtenaw County Metropolitan Planning Commission. All years, carried.

Tirth advising the Council of his position on the new sidewalk in front of his home. His complaint was discussed. Bruce Daniels informed the Council that the contractor is to come out and taper it with asphalt. The possibility of a joint village-township board meeting was presented. Topics for discussion tentatively listed in the event such a meeting is achieved were (1) police protection, (2) annexation, (3) dump facilities, (4) joint office facilities and (5) tax assessment. Moved by Fitzgerald, supported by Curley that Dave Little arrange the proposed meeting at a time convenient to both groups.

Moved by Curley, supported by Scully that the meeting be adjourned. All years, carried. Meeting adjourned at 10 p.m.

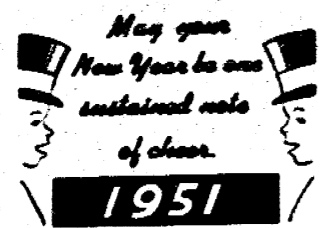

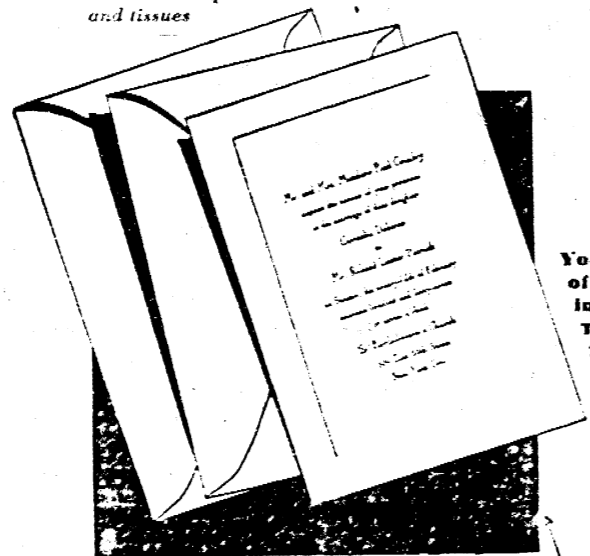
