Two Washtenaw County Co-eds Attend National 4-H Congress

Can a left-handed girl win success in food canning? Can a single girl win a husband-calling contest? The answer is yes in both cases. Despite a southpaw approach, Vicki Eisele, 18, of Manchester, won top Michigan honors in the 4-H food preservation program. And JoAnn McCalla, 18, of Ann Arbor, though not yet married, won her contest and also the state 4-H swine program. Both Washtenaw County girls were in Michigan's delegation to

Miss McCalla, who entered Eastern Michigan University this fall, is one of five children in the William McCalla family. Miss Eisele, one of two children of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Eisele, is a freshman at the University of Michigan and planning a math or science career.

She recalls that when she first undertook the food preservation program, she needed her mother's help in handling the blancher, preserving kettles and canner "because nothing seemed to be in the right place" for her left-handed bent. But she learned how to can and freeze left-handed and the results were every bit as good as right-handed preserves.

and exhibited 72 market hogs, six carcass animals and 137 breeding animals.

It was at last year's state fair that she entered the husband-calling contest on a bet and won it by calling her uncle, Morgan.

The 4-H programs are supervised by the Cooperative Extension Service which judges records of members. The awards program is arranged by the National 4-H Service Committee.

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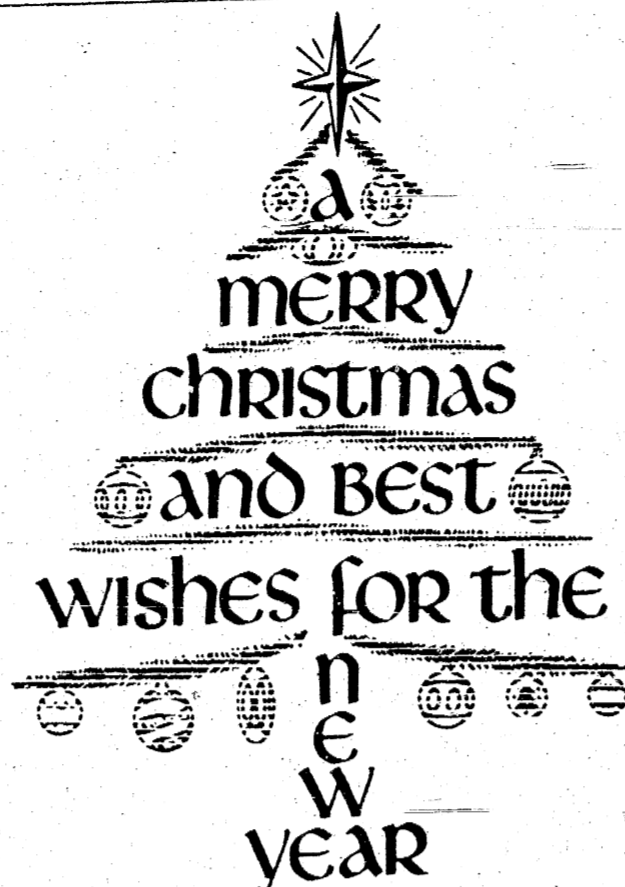
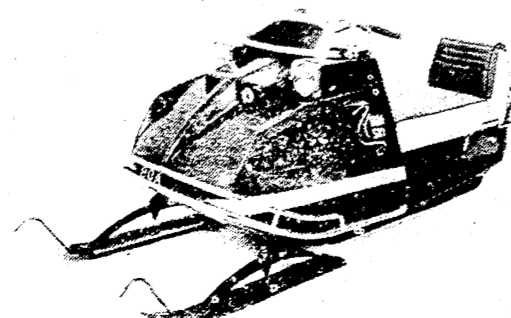


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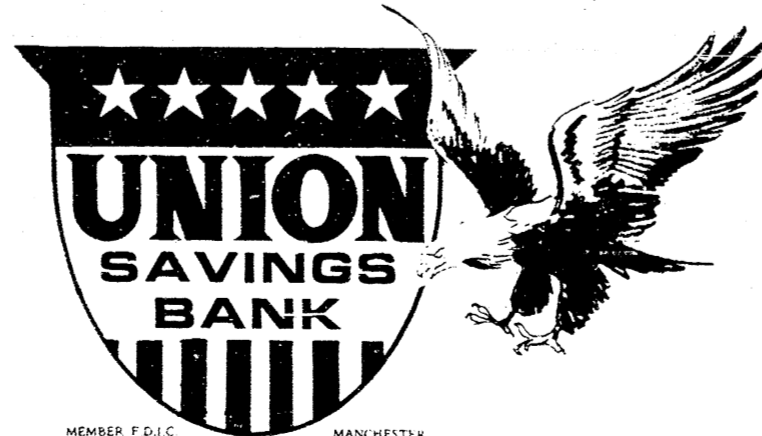

SNOWMOBILE RACE THIS SUNDAY, JANUARY 3

The 3rd Annual Jaycee Snowmobile Race, scheduled for next Sunday, January 3, 1971, may just be the biggest race yet due to the snow and wide-spread publicity over the past two years on the excellent track and the fast growing interest in snowmobile competitive racing. The race will again be held at the Manchester Speedway with registration to begin at 9 a.m. and continue until 11:30 with the race set for 12 noon sharp, Bob Rhees said.

Tickets for the event will be available at the gate only, he pointed out, and general admission is \$1.50 per person with children under 12 to be admitted free when accompanied by an adult. "Last year we had approximately 1,270 paid attendance and 147 snowmobile entries. This year we expect to double on everything," he said. "We hope to be better equipped for parking this year, the food concessions will be in full swing and there will be warming pits located throughout the area. I can only add . . . get there early."

There will be trophies for all first, second and third place event winners and the purse will be made up of the entry fee which, Rhees pointed out, "should be considerable because we are expecting as many as 250 machines this year." Machine entry fee is \$10.00 per entry per rider. He stressed that only racing

machines will be qualified to enter the races under MISA-sanctioned rules and will include 292 cc to the big 800 machines. "We expect to see speeds up to 90 mph on those big machines, too," he added. Race classifications will include stock, modified and powder puff races.

In addition to the winner's purse and trophies a drawing is also planned with a side of beef and "a bushel and a peck of joy" the prizes for three lucky ticket holders. Tickets, at a \$1.00 donation, are available from any Manchester Jaycee.

Questions prior to the race can be answered by any club member or call Bob Rhees at 428-8572. In the event of problems the day of the race, contact trouble-shooters Ron Mann, Gary Brokaw, Larry Hazen or Denny Hamilton, Rhees pointed out. "We expect a large turn-out of our club members to cover various job areas," he continued and pointed out that none of the Jaycees are eligible to enter the race. Racing teams are expected from Jackson, Lansing, Detroit, Ann Arbor and the general southeastern Michigan area with the hope that many Manchester snowmobile enthusiasts will support this Jaycee project as well.

A portion of the snowmobile profits has already been designated toward the new Little League Park, the most recent Chicken Broil-sponsored project, the Jaycees announced. The 3rd Annual Jaycee Snowmobile Race - Sunday, January 3 at 12 noon is a day the entire family will enjoy. Mark your calendar and plan to attend!

AN AMERICAN, JUST THINKING

Would this enemy, who has used propaganda as his most powerful weapon suddenly risk becoming the world's villain? If we were only aiding economically how would they justify their armed presence? If we kept our present withdrawal plan only spent that time rebuilding the communities the war destroyed, would the world look down on us? It would take real courage to do this, but isn't that the courage the world needs? The courage that would unite our nation. The courage needed to stop a few communist leaders from deciding a future course for our nation by keeping us involved in a no-win war? Is it impossible for Americans to change from past world policy and chart a new world course toward peace? Go soft on Communism? Not a chance, but we aren't defeating Communists in this war, we're helping destroy innocent people and their homes and crops while we lose our world prestige. The leaders in Hanoi are counting on our continued involvement because we can't win, only withdraw, and because they need the war to disguise the failure of their system of government. For us to pull out under pressure and leave the country half destroyed and still fighting, is not my idea of world leadership. If we continue our present withdrawal plan, we will silence a few war critics, but I think we will be signing the death warrant of every small country near Communist China. We will yield to world pressure and set the pattern for takeover of other small countries. It looks like a hopeless situation, with no way for us to win. But maybe, just maybe, if we stopped shooting and used world opinion to force the other side to do the same, we could create the greatest victory this country has ever had.

THE GOVERNOR IS PLEASED

No government -- federal, state or local -- will ever likely attain the level of efficiency that U. S. taxpayers would like or that politicians constantly promise. But, Governor Tom McCall of Oregon has put into effect an idea that he felt might reduce the cost of state government to Oregon taxpayers and, at the same time, improve its performance.

"Last year," as described in Nation's Business, "He invited 20 Oregon companies each to donate the services of one executive for one year. All readily responded. The 20 executives were assembled under a new 'Management '70s Task Force' and immediately set out to see if proven private industry techniques would work as effectively in government. Now... the results of that challenge are being assessed. Preliminary indications are that these 20 men have succeeded in slashing state expenses from \$25 million to \$30 million over the next two years."

The Governor is pleased with the contribution of the businessmen to the cause of greater governmental efficiency. Oregon taxpayers have a right to be pleased too. It would have cost, according to the Governor, at least \$500,000 to hire the talent distributed by the businessmen. The state got it free and saved millions of dollars to boot.

PRIVATE ENTERPRISE AND A FREE PRESS

Political and economic liberty live or die together. Stated another way, free enterprise and ownership of property by private citizens is inseparable from representative self-government. A free press depends upon the advertising support of private enterprise. Under the U. S. constitutional form of government, the law is the guardian of both persons and property.

An example of what happens to political liberty when property rights are trampled upon by the state is being starkly demonstrated in Chile, a country that is now rapidly falling under totalitarian Marxist rule. Industry is being nationalized -- taken over by government. And foreign investors are becoming wary of putting their money anywhere in Latin America. If private enterprise dies in Chile, so does liberty. The press will soon be nothing more than a sounding board of dictatorship. As U. S. News and World Report states, nationalization of industry is automatically removing political opposition as advertising is cut off and newspapers go into bankruptcy.

The experience of Chile should show why, as a matter of principle, U. S. citizens should support the institution of private enterprise whether it be the local corner grocery store or a basic industry. Where private enterprise -- and a free press -- are destroyed, elections become meaningless rituals, and oppression becomes a way of life.

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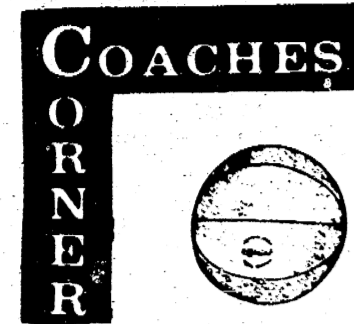

VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER ORDINANCE NO. 87

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NUMBER 61, entitled "An Ordinance to regulate the ownership and control of dogs within limits of the Village of Manchester."

The Village of Manchester Ordains:

Section 1. That Ordinance Number 61 be and the same hereby is amended by the addition thereto of a new section known as Section 13, reading as follows:

Section 13. KENNELS. No person shall own or operate any dog kennel in the Village of Manchester without having first secured a license therefor pursuant to the Dog Law of the State of Michigan Act 339 of Public Acts for Michigan for 1919. For the purposes of this ordinance a kennel shall be construed as an establishment wherein or whereon any person keeps three (3) or more dogs, six months old or older, regardless of whether any remuneration is received therefor. No such kennel shall be operated in any district within the Village specified as a residential district under the terms of the Zoning Ordinance, and no such kennel shall be operated in any district within the Village, except under the terms of said Zoning Ordinance.

Section 2. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Ordinance shall be in effect from and after twenty (20) days from legal publication.

VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER ORDINANCE NO. 88

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NUMBER 63, "AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE ERECTION, CONSTRUCTION, ENLARGEMENT, ALTERATION, REPAIR, MOVING, REMOVAL, DEMOLITION, CONVERSION, USE AND OCCUPANCY, HEIGHT AND AREA AND MAINTENANCE OF ALL BUILDINGS AND/OR STRUCTURES AND THEIR APPURTENANCES AND SERVICE EQUIPMENT IN THE VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER, MICHIGAN: PROVIDING AN OFFICE FOR THE BUILDING OFFICIAL; DEFINING THE SCOPE OF AUTHORITY OF THE BUILDING OFFICIAL; PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION THEREOF."

The Village of Manchester Ordains:

Section 1. Section 3, Subsection E of Ordinance Number 63 is deleted therefrom and the following substituted therefor:

"Section 3-E SCHEDULE OF INSPECTIONS. All construction work shall be inspected before covering, including footings, backfilling against foundation, sewers, plumbing, rough framing, electrical wiring, heating units before operating equipment, final inspections before occupancy and in all other instances where required by the Building Official. In any event a final inspection of all construction work for which a permit has been issued under this Ordinance shall be made by the Building Official and by the Village Assessor or the Assessor for the Township of Manchester, Washtenaw County, Michigan. When such work is ready the holder of the permit shall so notify the Village Clerk and secure approval before continuing. Failure to do so shall constitute a violation and shall be subject to the penalties of Section 3-C."

Section 2 - WHEN EFFECTIVE. This Ordinance shall be in effect from and after twenty (20) days from legal publication thereof.
