Funds should be available this month and construction contracts signed. Materials can then be ordered and work started soon, according to Wendell Reinhart, Public Works Chairman.

GIRL SCOUT COOKIE SALE CHAIRMAN CHOSEN

Mrs. James Kensler, 309 Territorial Rd., has been appointed Girl Scout Cookie Sale Chairman for Manchester, according to Mrs. Jack Hagopian, Plymouth, Cookie Sale Chairman for the entire Huron Valley Girl Scout Council.

According to Mrs. Kensler, the council covers such a large area that many volunteers are needed to make the sale run smoothly. Girl Scouts in Washtenaw, Livingston, western Wayne and northern Monroe counties comprise the council. They will take orders for cookies from Feb. 20 thru March 7 and deliver the cookies to the customers from April 13 thru 25.

This year the sale is especially important to the Girl Scouts, according to Mrs. Kensler. They've set their council goal at 300,000 boxes of cookies, an increase of 3,000 boxes over what they sold last year. The Council profit, 21 cents per box, will be used partly to further develop Camp Linden, their year-round camp in northern Livingston County. The Scouts are conducting a public fund campaign now to help raise \$600,000 to develop the camp, but they need the profit from this year's sale to take care of some camp development costs that are not included in the \$600,000 fund goal. In addition council profits provide camperships for needy Scouts, help pay expenses of older Scouts selected for national and international opportunities, and cover some operating expenses connected with camp operation.

"Camp Linden is really important to our local Scouts," says Mrs. Kensler, "some of them will attend resident camp there in the summer and go week-end camping there with their troops."

ADVANCED FIRST AID CLASS SCHEDULED

A Red Cross Advanced First Aid class has been scheduled starting Wednesday, March 4 at 7:00 p.m. The class will meet every Wednesday for five weeks and will be conducted at the Red Cross Operations Center on Packard Road.

Red Cross Advanced First Aid certificates will be issued upon successful completion of the course.

Although the course is primarily designed for ambulance attendants, ski patrol and first aid supervisors, anyone desiring to further their first aid skills and knowledge is welcome.

Course content includes a general view of first aid plus advance work in bandaging, splinting and transportation skills.

There is no charge for the class. To enroll you need only have a current Standard card and be 15 years old. To enroll call 971-5300.

Another team participating from Manchester was Harry Sturdevant, Ken Wolf, Lauren Bertke, Dennis Steele and Larry Kouba.



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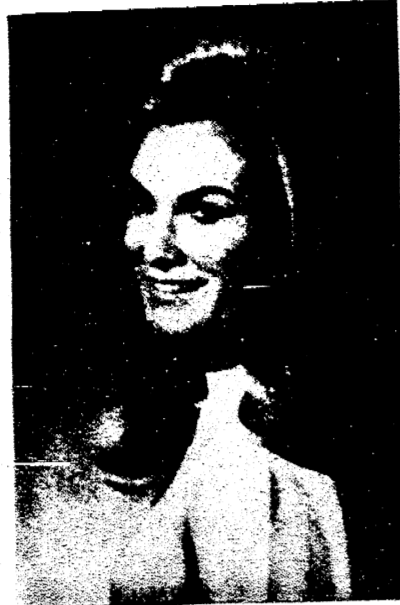

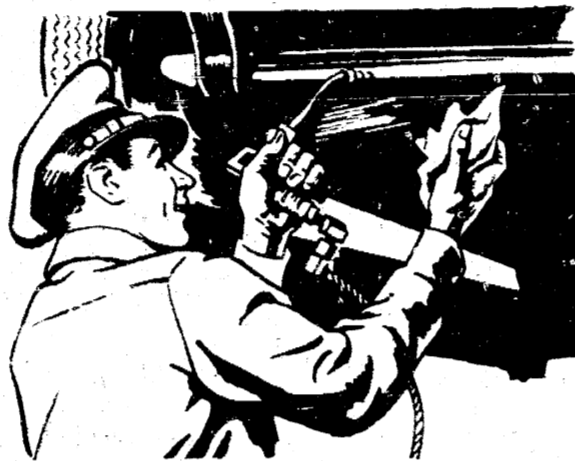
mechanic in the battalion's Company A, near Vinh Long.

Mr. Mann is a graduate of Manchester High School and is employed by Chelsea Grinding Company. He is also attending Eastern Michigan University.

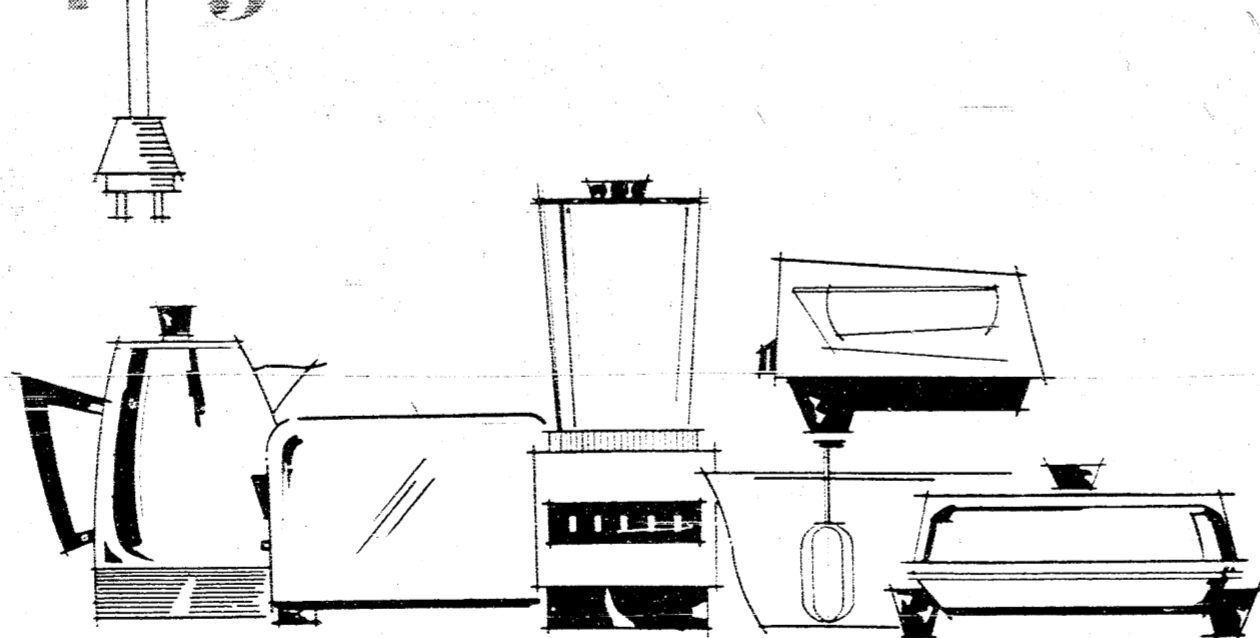
