Union Savings to Build Branch at Pleasant Lake

The "Little Red Schoolhouse, since '67 a landmark on the Pleasant Lake scene will soon be gone.

Residents of the area, accustomed to the sight of the small red brick building at the corner of Pleasant Lake and Center Roads will lose one of the best buildings in the area.

The earliest records of the schoolhouse site, describe a log cabin in which classes were held as early as 1837.

The present brick building, in use more than seventy years originally and three teaching terms a year. Fall, winter, and Spring.

The boys in a country school often absent a good deal in the spring and fall, for work on the home farm. Unhappily, therefore, that the winter term usually had the fullest attendance.

In addition to this, the chores of building fires, carrying wood, as well as the sheer difficulty of getting to work through snow drifts, made it necessary to hire a man teacher for this period. For this winter term the gentleman would receive \$150.00, the fall and spring terms, which were suitable for women to teach, \$140.00 per term.

The lady schoolmarm, of the one room school was a traveling teacher. Usually a week at a time she would board with families of the nearby. This was often a pleasure because the good farm cooking, and family atmosphere helped her feel "at home", however, she was also at the mercy of those who set a poor table or provided too little food for her room.

Operating expenses of the interesting school in 1883 give us a picture of a year's experience. The cost of a year's cleaning of the schoolhouse \$1.65, \$3.00 for rubbing black off the blackboards and a large supply of wood cost \$15.00.

Mrs. Vernon Dresselhouse was the second grade teacher at present Pleasant Lake School, taught for 12 years at the little school and well remembers such pupils as Mrs. Ruth Kuebler, Mrs. Schaeble, and Duane Beronle, who still live in this area.

The Union Savings Bank of Manchester will build a new branch bank at the site of the old schoolhouse.

Permission for the operation of the branch has been granted by the Commissioner of Banking of the Dept. of Commerce of the State of Michigan.

The new building will offer the full services of a branch bank including drive-in as well as walk-in services.

At the present time the site is undergoing engineering surveys and awaiting building permits.

According to Wm. Cray, president of Union Savings Bank of Manchester, director of the building program, the new facility will form a "Part of our new program for enlarged and better service for the people of this area".

The Little Red Brick Schoolhouse has been pronounced as unsafe. However the new building will be constructed to conform to the traditional style of architecture found in the western part of Washtenaw County, and with special emphasis being laid upon saving the beautiful large trees upon the property.

The boys include a two year old who wears size 6 shirt and size 8 pants and a 14 and 19 year old, each of whom succeeded in getting most of his clothes out of the house. Remember when a fire wipes out a home it takes underwear, towels, linen and everything.

The Brown family is familiar with misfortune and tragedy. Mrs. Brown died suddenly just before last Christmas as she sat rocking the baby before a window of the old farm house.
