## Methodist W.S.C.S. Smorgasbord Wed.

In 1965 the Esther Circle of the W.S.C.S. of the Methodist Church in Manchester served the first Salad Smorgasbord luncheon.

Mrs. Ethel Kerr and Mrs. Mary Walton, having attended a similar affair in another town presented the idea here and that first year eighty people were served at individual tables, in the Fellowship Hall. Thirty-five salads were prepared and served that year.

The luncheon idea proved to be so popular that three years later the entire womens group took part. All members of the church now make donations of salads.

There are a number of changes in the last few years. More than 225 people attend and are offered a choice of 140 salads.

Some few of these are made at the church, such as the Hot German Potato Salad, and the 15 dozen deviled eggs, and the 65 pounds of Chicken Salad.

Each year for this day the Cold Potato Salad is made by Mrs. Leonora Chavey.

Along with eight to ten different meat salads there are also specially made small Hard Rolls, at least thirty dozen.

A lovely centerpiece of watermelon or pineapple with at least ten fruits is a feature.

Always served on the last Wednesday of April, there is a first serving at 11:30 A.M. for which a reservation is necessary. Another complete serving at 1 o'clock, without reservations. This has become a necessity to provide space for the business men to enjoy the good food.

## Methodist Break Ground for Church



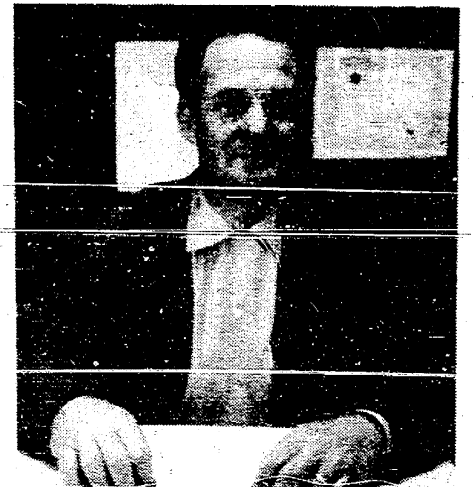

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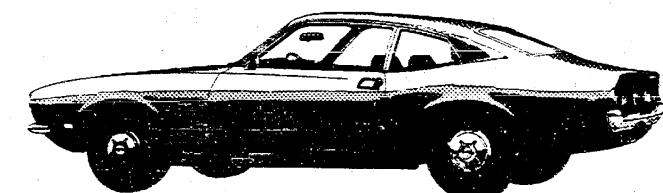

It is fun to note, that during the World Series, the MOMS are out ranked by baseball. So this year they were sent 30 watermelons which were divided into 120 pieces and they enjoyed watermelon with their baseball.

At Christmas time, with the help of cookies donated by Manchester ladies, we packed 75 boxes for these same men. Each box contained the home made cookies, candy canes, hard candies, home made candies, gum, oranges, apples, bananas, etc. And for each man in Ward 83 only, a billfold. One man was heard to remark "Ain't this something? It's been a long time since I've seen one of these." Each billfold contained a Canteen Book which they can use to purchase articles at their Canteen.

For Christmas the MOMS also packed 36 shut-in-boxes for Manchester residents.

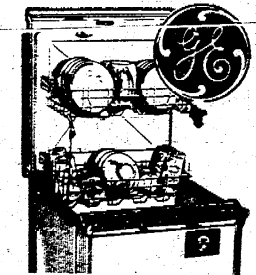

## Co-op Nursery Open House

The Manchester Co-Op Nursery will have an open-house Wednesday, May 5, from 9 to 11 a.m., in the Emanuel Church. Adults are invited who might be interested in the functioning of this pre-school experience.

In 1963, with Mrs. Lois Kuntz providing interest and motivation, the Manchester Co-op Nursery was organized with Mrs. Barbara Bohler, the present teacher, reports that she now has 30 children. These of course are divided, for there are two sessions-Tuesday and Thursday from 9 to 11 and Wednesday and Friday from 9 to 11, with tuition costing \$1.00 per month.

Mrs. Bohler, a teacher with a warm enthusiastic personality, feels that this is the "first step from the home into outside world" and should therefore be accomplished with great care, attention to the child's personality, and of course a great deal of fun. The children are not expected to learn in the precise sense that a later schoolroom situation demands, but are exposed to a variety of experiences which will hopefully broaden their capacity for coping with external situations when the time comes to separate from the family group in a larger way.

Last week the entire group took a train trip from Ann Arbor to Jackson, and this week they will visit a Horse Farm. To ease the transition from home to school, Mrs. Bohler is assisted by two mothers each morning. In addition, the mothers are invited to serve on various committees as well. Fathers are not excluded for they often help with maintenance and have even helped to teach.

Licensed by the Michigan Department of Social Services and being represented in the Huron Valley Council, which includes 30-35 Nursery Schools, and on a state level which includes 10,000 families involved in pre-school learning, the scope of the undertaking is large and complex.

The local officers at the present time are Sandy Bunney, treasurer, Delores Gebhart, vice chairman, and Mrs. Arlene Mains serving as chairman as well as representative to the Huron Valley Council.

The school last year established scholarships in the name of Amy Haessler, and the Schill family, and at present has 3 scholarship children. For information regarding registration, call Mrs. Arlene Mains 428-8283.

The Manchester Community Chest Board met on April 21 at the F. M. Reck Memorial Library to begin plans for the year.

Standing committees were named for 1971 by President Mrs. James Baker. Heading the Budget Committee will be Robert J. Koss, who will also represent the Board at the Washtenaw County Red Cross Budget meetings. Mr. Clarence Fielder will serve as Board representative to the Manchester Recreation Committee. Mrs. William Schaffer will handle the Drive Kits for the Fall campaign and Louis Vogel will head the Nominating committee.

Mrs. Robert Little and Mrs. Franklin M. Reck will represent our community at the Michigan United Fund Budget Conference in Lansing on May 19 and 20.

Budget allocations were voted to be paid in full to American Red Cross and Michigan United Fund.

## FOUR TO BE ELECTED TO THE BOARD OF EDUCATION JUNE 14, 1971

Two four year terms and two three year terms will be filled at the annual school board election on June 14, 1971.

Three members presently serving on the Board of Education were appointed to serve until June 30, 1971. These members are Donald Walter, Eugene Bentschneider and Reno Feldkamp.

Mr. Walter was appointed to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Laurin F. Leeson whose term would have expired on June of 1971. Mr. Luther C. Klager, Board President, is another member whose term is expiring this June.

Mr. Bentschneider and Mr. Feldkamp were appointed to fill the vacancies created by the resignations of Clarence Fielder and Allen Alber whose terms would have expired June of 1971.

School law requires that board appointees shall hold office until the next succeeding annual school board election at which time the electors of the district fill the vacancies for the remainder of the unexpired term. Therefore, the two terms expiring in 1971 will be filled until June 30, 1975 and the two terms expiring in 1974 will be filled until June 30, 1974.

Persons wishing to run for board of education seats may pick up nominating petitions in the office of the Superintendent of Schools between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. They must designate the terms they are seeking and indicate the year on their petitions.

NOMINATING PETITIONS MUST BE TURNED IN TO THE OFFICE OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS NO LATER THAN 4:00 P.M., MONDAY, MAY 17, 1971.
