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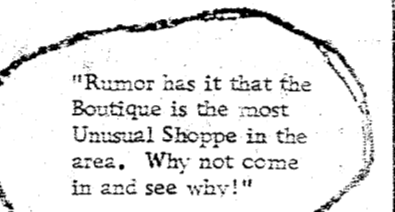

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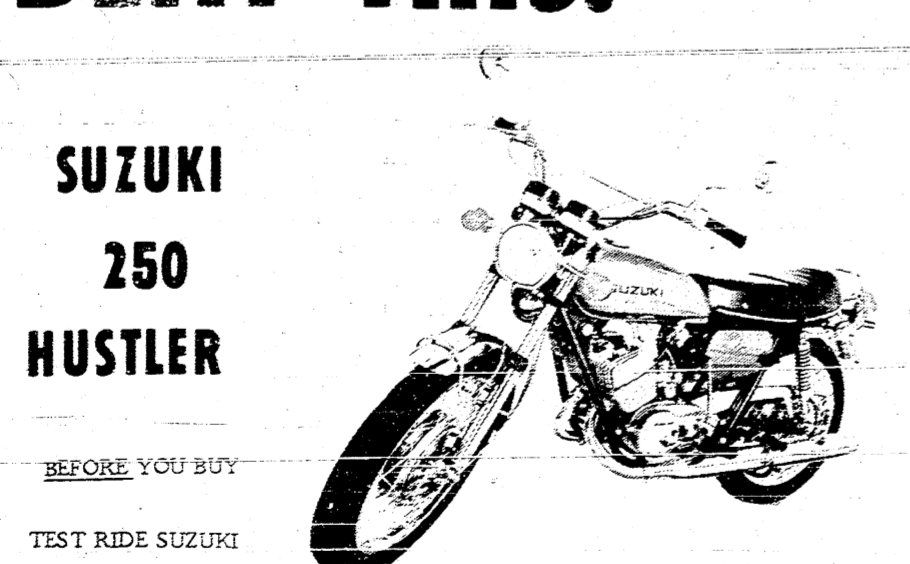

### Community Chest Plans for the Year

The Manchester Community Chest Board met on April 21 at the F. M. Reck Memorial Library to begin plans for the year.

Standing committees were named for 1971 by President Mrs. James Baker. Heading the Budget Committee will be Robert J. Koss, who will also represent the Board at the Washtenaw County Red Cross Budget meetings.

Mr. Clarence Fielder will serve as Board representative to the Manchester Recreation Committee. Mrs. William Schaffer will handle the Drive Kits for the Fall campaign and Louis Vogel will head the Nominating committee.

Mrs. Robert Little and Mrs. Franklin M. Reck will represent our community at the Michigan United Fund Budget Conference in Lansing on May 19 and 20.

Budget allocations were voted to be paid in full to American Red Cross and Michigan United Fund.

It was decided that Manchester will use new pledge cards for the 1971 campaign, incorporating the "red box and red line" theme as suggested by United Way of America.

This new concept will tie into all 'lm and TV publicity throughout the nation during the 1971 Fall campaign.

Four agencies who participate in the Chest budget will be called before the Board for hearing on May 18. Cystic Fibrosis, The Salvation Army, Huron Valley Girl Scout Council and Portage Trail Councils will outline their activities in the Manchester area and explain their budgets.

The Budget Committee will review all agency budget requests for 1972 at their first meeting on June 23.

### FOUR TO BE ELECTED TO THE BOARD OF EDUCATION JUNE 14, 1971

Two four year terms and two three year terms will be filled at the annual school board election on June 14, 1971.

Three members presently serving on the Board of Education were appointed to serve until June 30, 1971. These members are Donald Walter, Eugene Bentschneider and Reno Feldkamp.

Mr. Walter was appointed to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Laurin F. Leeson whose term would have expired on June of 1971. Mr. Luther C. Klager, Board President, is another member whose term is expiring this June.

Mr. Bentschneider and Mr. Feldkamp were appointed to fill the vacancies created by the resignations of Clarence Fielder and Allen Alber whose terms would have expired June of 1971.

School law requires that board appointees shall hold office until the next succeeding annual school board election at which time the electors of the district fill the vacancies for the remainder of the unexpired term.

Therefore, the two terms expiring in 1971 will be filled until June 30, 1975 and the two terms expiring in 1974 will be filled until June 30, 1974.

Persons wishing to run for board of education seats may pick up nominating petitions in the office of the Superintendent of Schools between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. They must designate the terms they are seeking and indicate the year on their petitions.

With warmer weather on its way the fly fishermen are getting ready for their annual trek to fresh waters. The thought of fresh fish from the chilly waters makes your mouth water. To you avid fly fishermen we would like to drop a few tips on line, flies, etc.

If you have trouble paking a leader through the eye of a small fly, get a needle sharper at the dime store. It has a sharply pointed loop of wire that passes through the eye of even a size 18 hook.

When a leader refuses to turn over smoothly at the end of a cast, it usually indicates that the leader needs more body and stiffness in the upper end. Instead of tapering the leader uniformly from butt to tip, taper the upper two-thirds (the heavy end) gradually and use shorter lengths of finer material down to the end.

Paraffin-base dry fly floatant (paraffin dissolved in carbon tet) can also be used as a protective coating to protect metal from rust. It dries fast and leaves a thin film of wax that seals out moisture.

Sometimes a fly line will float better if it is merely cleaned, instead of dressed with floatant. The dressing can collect dirt or surface curry, which may sink the line. Modern top-water lines float almost indefinitely without dressing. If you do dress your line, wipe off surplus.

Cutting a few feet off the end of a tapered fly line sometimes makes it cast better, especially if it is a little too light for the rod. Level and double-tapered fly lines will give longer service if they are reversed at the beginning or end of each fishing season so both ends are used. This cannot be done with weight-

forward lines.

An easy way to insert "No-Knot" metal eyelets in the end of a fly line: Lay the line inside a thick book, snug against the binding, with the end flush to the edge. The closed book holds the line straight and stiff while you force the pins into the core.

Braided Darcon line is ideal for use as backing on a fly reel because it has little stretch and does not rot. Next best is braided Nylon. Monofilament is not recommended because it is so elastic and comes off the reel in tight, springy coils.

Your best buy in a fly reel is one for which you can get spare spools, so you can change quickly from a floating to a sinking line or to one that is heavier or lighter. You save the cost of extra reels, too.

## Blood Bank Is For Everyone

Albert Herman of 5624 Sharon Hollow Road didn't know that he was a member of the Manchester Area Red Cross Blood Bank. When his late wife, Emma, was given transfusions last December, he paid for the blood along with his soaring hospital bills.

Two weeks later Mr. Herman learned of his mistake; blood was released to the hospital for Mrs. Herman by the club and the hospital refunded the \$60.00 to Mr. Herman which he had paid for the two pints of blood.

Mr. Herman knows now what the Manchester Blood Bank has been trying to get across to everyone in the area for the past twenty years: if you've lived in the Manchester School District all your life, two months or only two days...if it's your legal residence...you are a member of the Manchester Blood Club and eligible to draw blood, free of charge, when your family needs it.

With the population growth in the area and the need for more blood for

surgery, the Blood Club is putting into motion an extensive campaign to assure increased donations of blood to our bank. Income must provide for outgo; and since 1951 the Manchester Area Blood Club is stocked primarily by Manchester area donors.

The next blood clinic is scheduled from 12 to 6 on Monday, June 7 at Manchester United Methodist Church.

Blood is processed and stored by a professional staff in the Red Cross Bloodmobile. All other work at the clinic is done by local volunteers.

A massive drive to inform more people and bring in more donors is headed by Mrs. Franklin Reck, Red Cross branch chairman and Mrs. Roland Grossman, Mrs. Willard Uphaus will be chairman-of-the-day for the clinic June 7. Canteen chairman is Mrs. Ray Kerr.

Mrs. Charles King and Mrs. Harold Osbourne are members of the planning committee.

In the course of the drive all industries, school, businesses, churches and organizations will be contacted with details of the new (to this area) "20 per cent plan", under which relatives living elsewhere can also be covered by their Manchester area families, if 20 per cent of the members

of the group are donors during the year.

For members of participating groups blood needs for the year will be met for all group members, their spouses, children under 18, children over 18 who are unable to donate, parents and parents-in-law, brothers and sisters of single members, and retirees and their spouses.

If this plan is worked out pledge cards will be sent out through all participating organizations. Interested organizations may contact Mrs. Crossman or Mrs. Reck. Industrial donors who give on company time are automatically credited to their company's quota. Another member of the family may give to help make the quota for a church or club, for instance.

A goal of 150 pints is contemplated for the coming clinic. But, said Mrs. Reck, "It wouldn't do a bit of harm if we went over that!"

**FORBIDDEN CAVERNS**

Mark, Heidi, and Shawn Dresh of 220 Beaufort Street, Manchester, recently visited Forbidden Caverns, near the Great Smoky Mountains, to view the many natural formations in the cave.

Forbidden Caverns, a short drive from Gatlinburg and Sevierville, Tenn., was opened in 1967 after two years of excavating and construction work. In the initial season, over 52,000 visitors saw the caverns.


The attraction features some of the most spectacular formations in America, all illuminated by an extensive theatri-

cal lighting system. Stereophonic sound presentations in the grottoes recreate the days when the pre-Cherokee, Woodlawn Indians inhabited the cave and surrounding valley. Indian legend refers to the caverns as, "The place that is forbidden... hollow mountain of two streams..."

Some of the main points of interest are: "Eternal Falls," a crystal-clear stream that winds through the caverns; "The Grotto of the Dead," with reflection pools and stereo sound; "Council Chamber of the Elders," where Indian artifacts have been found; "Grotto of the Evil Spirits," where huge stalagmites stand in a semi-circle around a small lake; and "The Wall of Onyx," a gigantic formation of solid cave onyx.

An extensive Indian and gun museum has been added and an ancient grist mill with its water wheel has been restored near the cave.

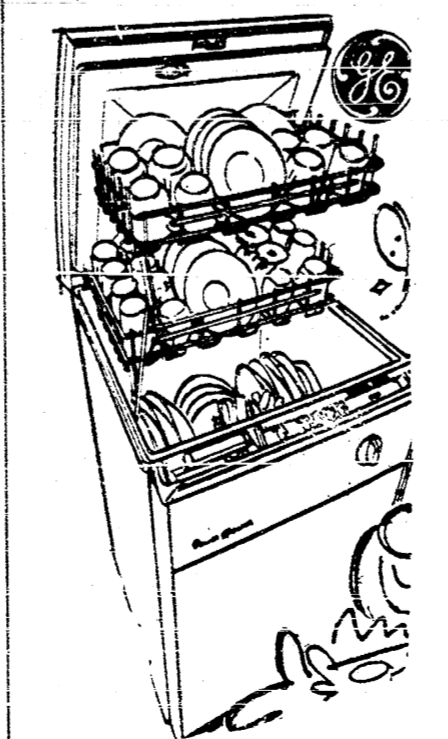

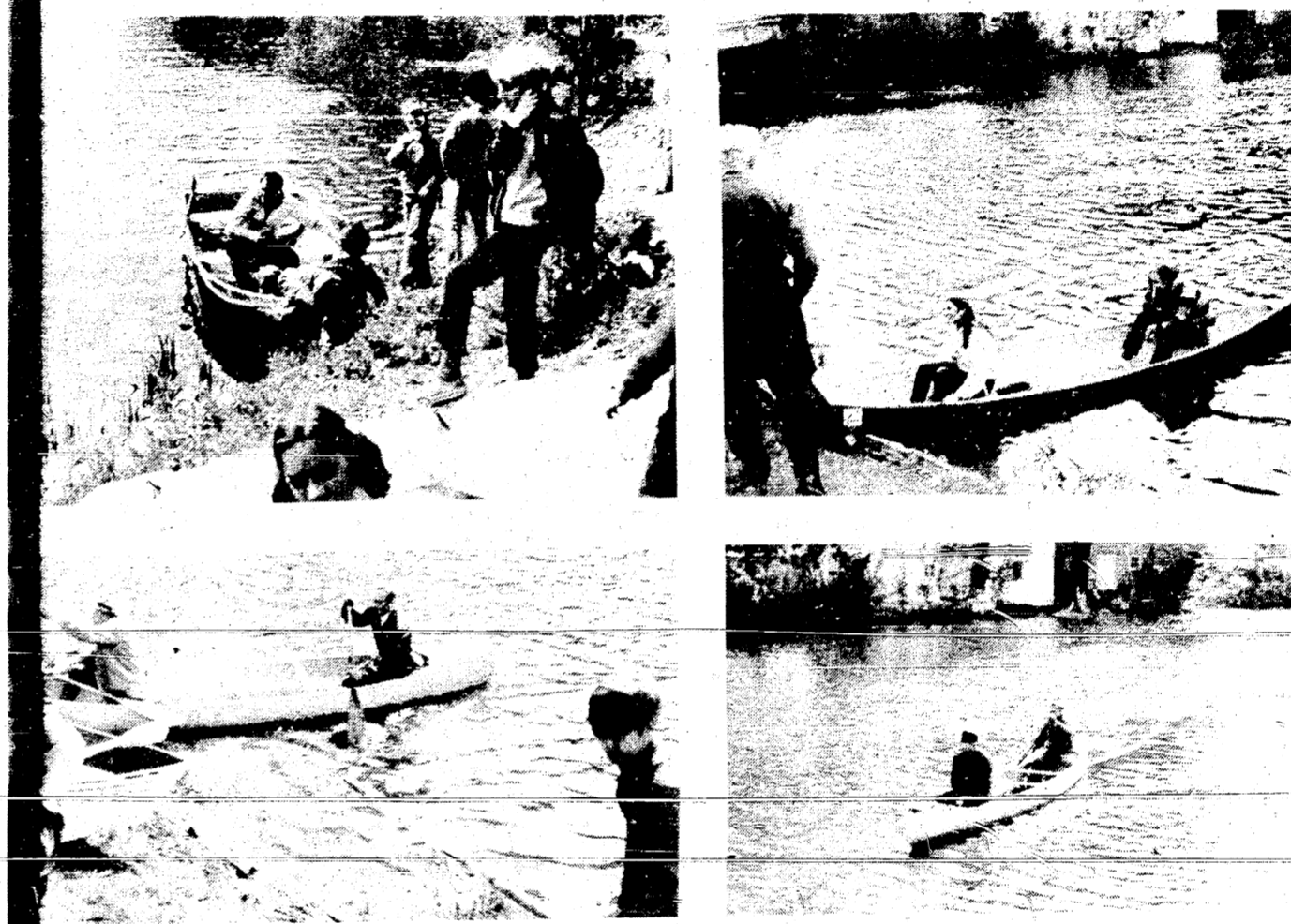

**Annual K of C Mother's Day Dinner Sunday**

In 1957, the first Roast Beef dinner was presented by the Manchester Knights of Columbus. This was only two months after the Father Fisher Council was organized. With the date set for the 2nd Sunday after Easter, there were about 250 people served that year.

One year a large snowstorm convinced the men that a later date would be more suitable, so Mother's Day it has been since.

A truly male project, the only help the wives give is in pie baking, some women providing as many as 8 pies. The rest of the project is under the supervision of Lehman Wahl.

Mr. Wahl does the purchasing of supplies and cooking of the meat, each project slightly staggering in scope. For the serving of seven hundred people 450 lbs. of meat are used, and 400 lbs. of potatoes (all fresh mashed, no instant, with plenty of real butter and milk). Four lugs of cabbage for cole slaw, 25-30 lbs. of butter for the French bread, and 6 cases of the large cans of green beans. These as well as relishes including pickled beets, carrots, celery and pickles. Coffee, tea and milk for drinks and of course those 145 home baked pies for dessert.

The cooking of the roast beef is done by Lehman in 15 roasters and 2 restaurant size ovens which keeps him busy watching and checking for all of them heat differently, and his personal boast is that the beef shall be so tender that Grandmother or the littlest child shall be able to chew it.

Right hand men to the cook in the kitchen and responsible for lining up dishwashing help are Bob Funches, Allan and Elwin Benedict and Al Simmons, while the dining room and waiters are recruited and organized by William Schwab and Duane Buerle. Advertising is done by Clarence Fielder and L. V. Kirk, while Joe Schwab and Ed Kirk handle the tickets.

Each year with more experience, the men find simpler and time saving steps, and although the men keep in practice all year by serving banquets for various occasions, this is the one time every member is put to work. There are also carry out dinners available.

If roast beef, mashed potatoes, with brown gravy, green beans and homemade pie sounds good to you, please remember Mother's Day 12 to 3 p.m. Price \$2.25 for adults, children 12 and under \$1.00 and pre-school children free.
