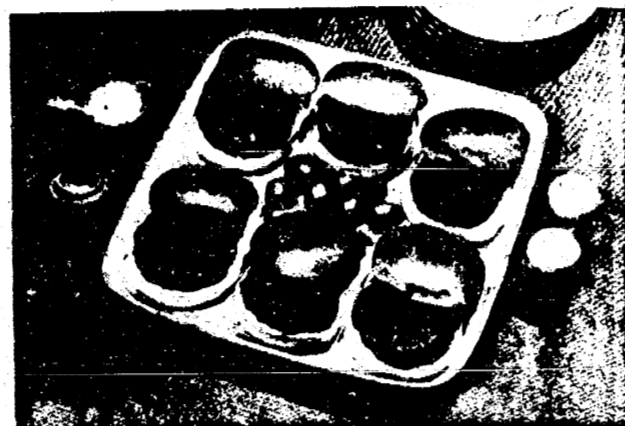

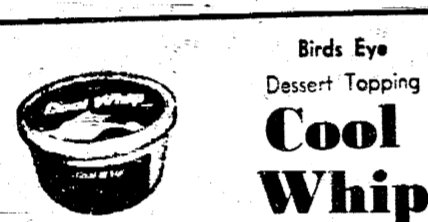

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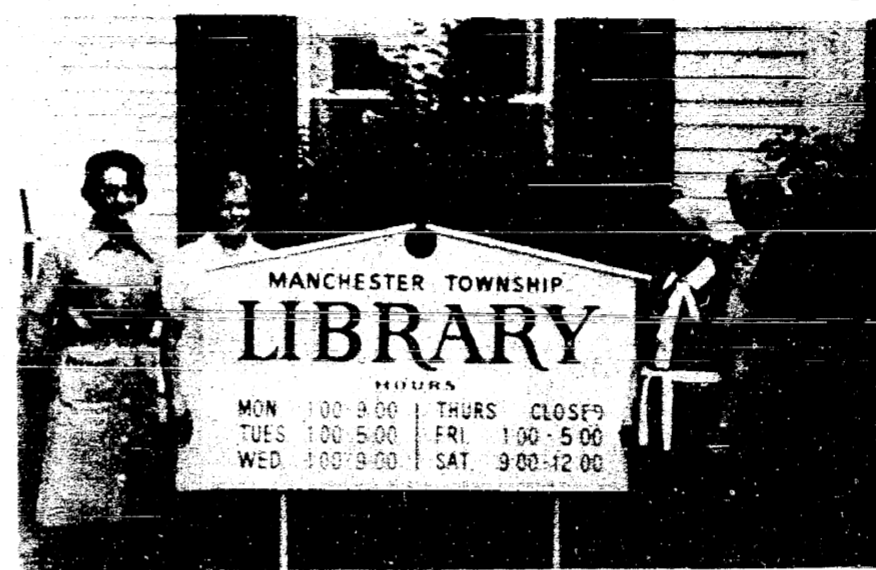

Voters Approve Operational Cost

School District Voters approved the continuation of the 11.5 mill operational levy at the annual school election held on Monday, June 14, 1971. A total of 534 ballots were cast in the election which in addition to granting the millage also seated the four incumbent board members. There was no opposition to the four incumbents. The successful passage of the operational millage will allow the school district to maintain its present program.

The millage was approved 327 to 202 with five spoiled ballots. Elected to their former seats on the Board of Education were Luther C. Klager, Bd. President, Don Walter, Eugene Bentschneider and Reno Feldkamp, Board Trustees.

The Board of Education issued the following statement: "The Manchester Board of Education is extremely grateful to the school community for its support of the operational millage. This millage was absolutely vital to the continuation of the present school program. We want to express our sincere appreciation to everyone who took the time to vote. We especially want to thank those who expressed their confidence in the Board of Education and their satisfaction with the school program by voting affirmatively for this necessary millage. We will continue to champion the quality educational programs the community has expressed a desire for."

At the regular June meeting of the Manchester Board of Education the Bd. appointed Mr. Jack Raffaelli, local Middle School teacher, to the position of Elementary Principal of the Luther C. Mr. Raffaelli, who will be starting his ninth year in the Manchester System, is a graduate of Western Michigan University. 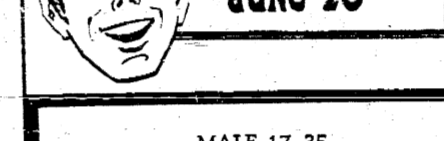
PRIZE WINNING AMATEUR FILMS TO BE SCREENED IN MANCHESTER

Recreation Begins Monday June 21

The dates for the Manchester summer recreation program have been established. The program will begin on Monday, June 21, with activities at both the Junior and senior playgrounds and end Friday afternoon, August 6. This year's seven week program will be highlighted by such activities as roller skating, organized basketball for boys going into the sixth, seventh, and eighth grades, volley ball, baseball, field trips, and swimming at Wampplers Lake. These are just a few of the things which will be offered to our youngsters this year.

Junior playground will be held at the Nellie Ackerson School this year and will be open to those children who will be five by December 1, 1971, and to those who have finished the third grade. The hours will be from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. Monday through Friday. There will be no afternoon playground for this group. Jr. playground will be supervised by Mrs. Kristin Schick who teaches third grade at the Klager School. Assisting Mrs. Schick will be Susan Westfall and Mary Simmons. All children participating in the program should assemble on the small playground adjacent to the Nellie Ackerson School. Parents involved in picking up their children should do so at 11:30.

All youngsters who have finished the fourth grade to those who will not be sixteen before August 1, 1971 are welcomed to attend senior playground.

Senior playground activities will run from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. Monday through Friday and from 1:00 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. Tuesday and Thursday at the Athletic Field.

In order to get even more youngsters involved in the recreation program the Recreation Department has added roller skating to its list of activities. Arrangements have been made with the Skateadium in Adrian to rent their facilities on Wednesday afternoon from 1:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. All youngsters who have finished third grade and will not be sixteen years old before August 1, 1971, are invited to participate. Youngsters from the Pleasant Lake area will be picked up by the same bus that picks them up for swimming. It will have the same route and time schedule that it has on Mondays and Fridays. All participants will be required to return a permission slip signed by their parents. These slips will be available the first day of recreation. The total cost for each youngster will be \$1.35 (1.00 for admission and 35¢ for skate rental). This amount will be paid each time one goes to the Skateadium. The first roller skating date has been set for Wednesday, June 30.

The pick-up time is 12:15 p.m. and the drop-off time is 3:15 p.m. The bus will pick up anyone along the route between Pleasant Lake and Manchester. All youngsters riding the Pleasant Lake bus will be required to go with the beginning swimmers group at 12:30 p.m. This does not mean that advanced swimmers from the Pleasant Lake area will have to swim with the beginning swimmers. They will be allowed to swim in the deeper water.

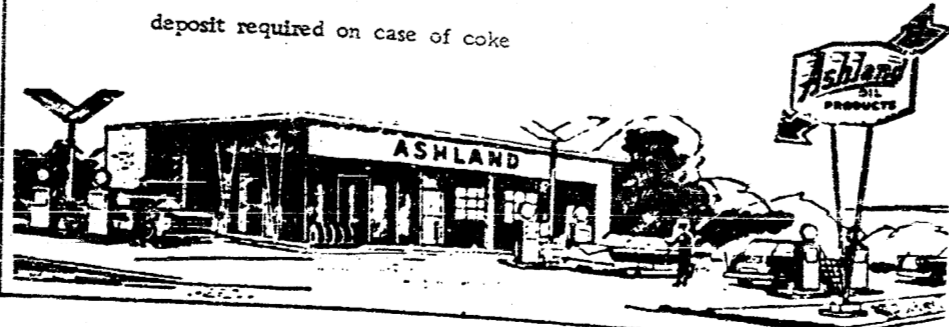

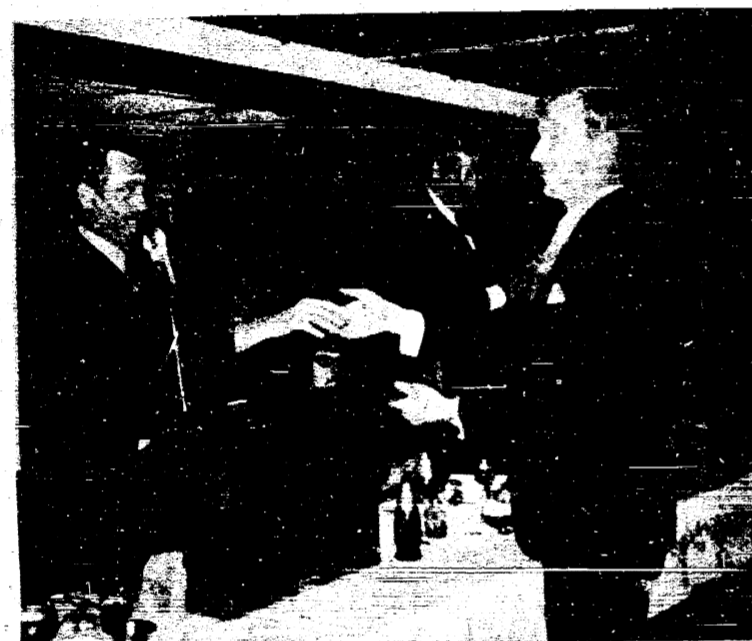

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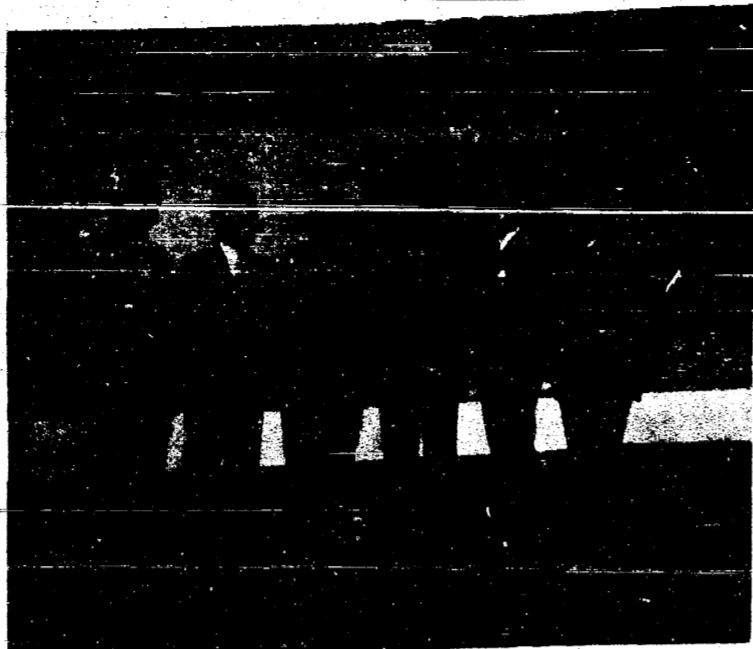

Walt Schaible Local Businessman Succumbs



Mr. Walter W. Schaible, lifetime resident of Manchester, died June 20th at the age of 63 at Herrick Memorial Hospital, Tecumseh.

Born March 20, 1904, son of Fred and Ida Ulm Schaible, he attended school in Manchester, and remained in business here for the rest of his life.

Accepting a job in the Wuerthner Bros. clothing store, he later purchased the business although retaining the old name for some years.

It was during these younger years that Walt became known as a fine musician. Playing the trumpet, he developed his ability, playing in surrounding towns, including the Hayes Hotel in Jackson.

Succeeding generations of young men were employed by Mr. Schaible, and the generosity and dignity with which they were treated will remain as vivid personal memories for them.

He is survived by his wife Vera Wursler Schaible, a daughter, Mrs. Joyce Fasoli of Southfield and three grandchildren as well as a brother, Milton, of Ottawa, Illinois.

Burial was at the Catholic Cemetery of Manchester.
