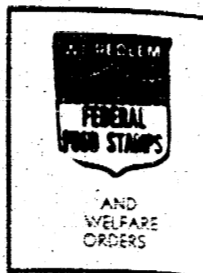

## Warning To Social Security Beneficiaries

Robert A. Kehoe, District Manager of the Social Security Office in Ann Arbor, has issued a warning to all beneficiaries, especially those over 65, that a pair of confidence men have been operating in the Ann Arbor-Ypsilanti area. At least two instances have been reported where the pair of men presented themselves at the door and identified themselves as Federal employees representing Medicare. They told their victims that they had reviewed their files and that their Medicare coverage would lapse unless they paid amounts ranging from \$30 to \$100 on the spot.

Kehoe emphasized that it is highly unlikely that Medicare premiums would ever have to be collected in person in this manner. Furthermore, any Social Security Administration employee who does call at your home carries clear identification, bearing his photograph, and he or she will be very willing to present it.

If any other area residents have been called on by these confidence artists, or if anyone representing Medicare does call at your door, please report it to the Social Security Office promptly, and they will refer it to the proper investigating authority. The office servicing this area is located at 220 E. Huron St., Ann Arbor -- Telephone 769-7100.

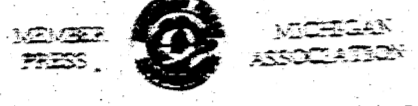

### EMERGENCY MESSAGES

Travelers in Michigan or those persons out of touch in camp or elsewhere can be informed of emergency messages they may get through a cooperating system arranged by the State Police with the Michigan Association of Broadcasters.  
All they need to do is to have their radio turned on between 10 noon and 1 p.m. If there is an emergency at home, the affected persons will be told to call the nearest State Police post for the contents of the message.

Col. John P. Plante, State Police director, said the plan, initiated several years ago, has been updated and includes new stations covering virtually the entire state. Plante said, "We've revised the program words and we're anxious to make the service known to the public." Plante also has been given the plan in other states for the benefit of Michigan-bound travelers.

The plan embodies a format of messages to other stations to fully cover the area where the affected person is believed to be.

Broadcast time cannot be simultaneous throughout the state because of the program requirements of each station but it will be sometime during the noon hour.

Emergency messages of extreme urgency, however, generally are broadcast at any time. In addition, no mes-

# COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

June 21, 1971

Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by President Little at 7:05. Trustees present: Mahony, Scully, Reinhart, Fitzgerald, absent: Benedict and Walton. The minutes of the June 7 regular meeting were read. Moved by Fitzgerald, supported by Scully to approve the minutes as read. All yeas, carried.

Mr. Ray Gonyer was present to discuss the ditch in front of his home which has not been reworked to satisfaction after Michigan Bell Telephone completed work in that area. Fitzgerald advised Council that Mr. DeForge had been contacted two weeks previously about the matter. He promised that the place in question would be graded and sodded by Michigan Bell, but that it must be scheduled. Enter Walton 7:15. Fitzgerald agreed to contact DeForge again the next day to see when the work is scheduled. He will inform Mr. Gonyer of that date.

Police Chief Beckler related the problems encountered over the weekend with non-residents. He advised Council that Rollie had agreed to talk to the youths involved about the littering, giving them another chance. Scully reported that he had been contacted about a street light at the end of Washington St. by John Reilly. Mrs. Isa Schaffer was concerned about sand washing down from the runway and into basements. The sand was coming up the floor drain. Scully asked the Public Works Committee to look into the matter.

Mahony read a letter sent to the Equalization & Property Description Dept. authorizing printing of the tax bills. If the county floor equalization illegal we will stand reprinting costs. The problem should be resolved by June 30. He then reviewed the financial report for May.

The Insurance Committee is working on a listing of the policies now held by the Village. Reinhart requested permission to put a septic tank on property owned on Adrian Street. Council must submit the request in writing to the County Health Dept. since sewer service is unavailable. Moved by Fitzgerald, supported by Walton that such request be submitted by the clerk. Yeas: Walton, Fitzgerald, Scully, Mahony; abstained: Reinhart. Motion carried. Council was advised that Jay Lantz's request to close a road on his property is unnecessary since the area in question was never dedicated or lined as a road. Therefore Mr. Lantz's deposit for the procedure should be returned.

Fitzgerald informed the Council of the Public Works activities. Bruce is to meet with Herb about using the East Arbor St. well with the East Main St. well, as well as ascertaining what equipment is needed. Herb agreed to have the circuitry completed for the system by next council meeting. The digger system has been cleaned over a period of three days. The Village is in need of another drying bed. There is some painting to be done yet on the Furnace St. Bridge. Patching work is complete. There will be a meeting with the four townships concerning a need of an additional \$4000 to maintain a system at the dump. John Althorse offered to adapt the Rambler engine, which the Village has, as a personal project. The pump pump, at the treatment plant, is out and being repaired. A mower is being adapted to do the roadside areas, and should be ready on June 22. Plans for the next two weeks include cleaning catch basins and installing posts and chairs at Car Park. Ayling-Cunningham is to call June 22 about finishing Dunson St. property.

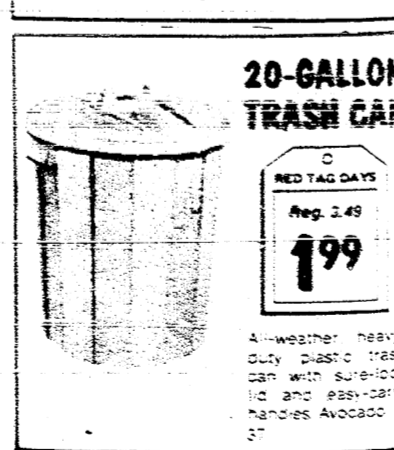

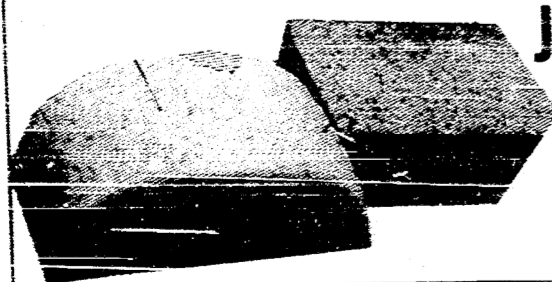

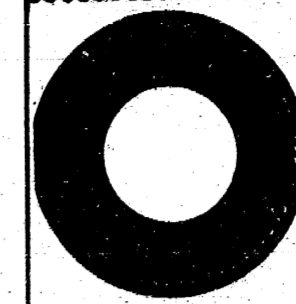

1971 FARM PAYMENTS RELEASED

Preliminary payments are now being released to Michigan farmers who participated in the 1971 wheat and feed grain programs. On July 1 over \$7,000,000 in payments for almost 16 million dollars had been processed.

The concept of the new set-aside program was devised to assist American farmers in producing for expanded foreign and domestic markets. On the rest of their land farmers in the program can shift their production without acreage restrictions according to market needs.

Questions and Answers

Q. My husband and I are both retired and getting monthly social security benefits on our own records. We just started working part time and will each earn nearly \$1,000 this year. Is it true that we will lose some social security benefits because our combined earnings are almost \$2,000?

A. No, it isn't. You and your husband can each earn up to \$1,880 in a calendar year without losing any social security benefits.

Q. I am 66 and still work full time as a teacher. However, since I do not teach during the summer months of July and August, can I apply for monthly social security benefits for these 2 months?

A. Yes. Benefits can be paid for any month in which you do not earn over \$140.

Q. I plan to retire next year at 65. The only proof of age I have is a baptismal certificate written in Norwegian. Can I use it as proof of age when I apply for social security retirement benefits?

A. Yes. Translators at the Social Security Administration will translate the certificate, make a certified copy of it, and then return the original certificate to you.

Q. I collect monthly social security benefits as a widow. I have my own social security number, but I have never worked outside the home. Will my family be able to get a payment from social security to help pay my burial expenses when I die?

A. No. Your family would not receive a lump-sum death payment if you have never worked under social security.

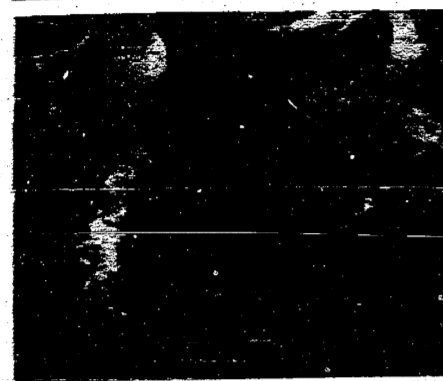

The boys did conservation projects on several of the camp sites. They took turns in cooking, dish washing, and various other necessary chores (these chores were assigned to them daily). Some boys went fishing, with poor results. They did catch some bull frogs; not enough for a meal, but we did have some.

We didn't tip over any canoes or lose any gear. At one time, on one of the lakes, we used the canoes as sail boats. The boys used their panchos as sails. We had a field day for the next two or three miles which didn't require paddling.

We got to see many beaver dams, and actually saw one beaver. We also saw an American Eagle, which is a very rare bird.

We were in 12 different lakes, 3 different rivers, and traveled approximately 50 miles. All of the boys that were able to take the trip, I am sure, had an experience that they will never forget. It is too bad that all of the explorers were not able to take the trip.
