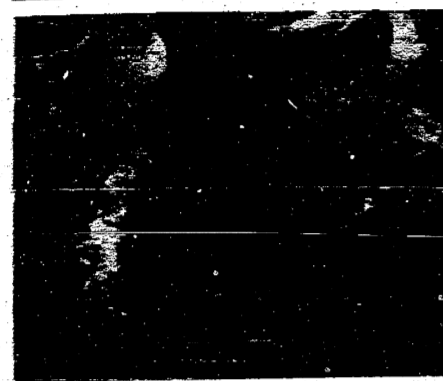

**Explorer's Have Fantastic Trip**

Explorer Scout Post 404 had a very successful canoe trip to Region 7 Canoe Base in the Northern part of Wisconsin. Two voyagers, Don Brown and Scott Gormely, preceded the trip on 6-20-71 by one week to learn the route, making and breaking of camp in learning canoeing safety. Six boys: Jim Baker, Greg Berke, Delruss Wolff, Tim Ahrens, Mark Difenderfer, and Dave Roberts; and two leaders: Ted Roberts and Russ Wolff, followed on 6-24-71.

We arrived at the canoe base on Friday, 6-25-71, at 2:00 p.m. The next two days consisted of canoe safety training. This training consisted of everyone proving their swimming ability; in addition, everyone had to take a canoe out on the lake, tip it over, right the canoe, and bring it back to shore. This is a requirement of everyone who takes the trip.

On Saturday afternoon we were taken to Crab Lake, approximately 35 miles from the canoe base. At this point we started to paddle our way back to the base through various lakes, creeks, and several portages where the boys were required to carry their canoes, gear, plus food supplies for a five-day trip in a semi-wilderness area. The boys got to swimming several times in the waterfalls and in the lakes.

Only one time during the five days did we actually talk to anyone outside of our group, and that was at the Marina where the boys filled up on milk and ice cream.

During this time we had two rain storms, which is normal for our trip. During these rain storms our camp was set up; consequently, our clothes did not get too wet.

The boys did conservation projects on several of the camp sites. They took turns in cooking, dish washing, and various other necessary chores (these chores were assigned to them daily). Some boys went fishing, with poor results. They did catch some bull frogs; not enough for a meal, but we did have some.

We didn't tip over any canoes or lose any gear. At one time, on one of the lakes, we used the canoes as sail boats. The boys used their panchos as sails. We had a field day for the next two or three miles which didn't require paddling.

We got to see many beaver dams, and actually saw one beaver. We also saw an American Eagle, which is a very rare bird.

We were in 12 different lakes, 3 different rivers, and traveled approximately 50 miles. All of the boys that were able to take the trip, I am sure, had an experience that they will never forget. It is too bad that all of the explorers were not able to take the trip.

### Know Your Michigan Law

As of April 1, 1971, a prospective buyer of a used motor vehicle may find the odometer of the vehicle set at zero.

Act 104 of the Public Acts of 1970 makes it a misdemeanor for any person to alter the mileage registered on the odometer of a motor vehicle offered for sale or lease other than by setting it at zero, or to offer for sale or lease any vehicle with knowledge that the mileage registered on the odometer thereof has been altered without disclosing the fact to the prospective purchaser other than by setting it at zero, or to modify the odometer by tampering or by the elimination, substitution or addition of components designed to increase, delete or prevent the registering of mileage. However, it is not a violation to delete or change odometer mileage registered in the course of pre-delivery testing by a manufacturer prior to the delivery of the motor vehicle to the dealer.

A dealer is protected under this act if he possesses an affidavit from the immediate prior owner of the motor vehicle attesting to the fact that the odometer has not been set back, and stating the exact mileage at the time the dealer purchased the motor vehicle. This affidavit shall be supplied by the dealer to any prospective buyer on request. Giving a false affidavit under the provisions of this Act is a misdemeanor.

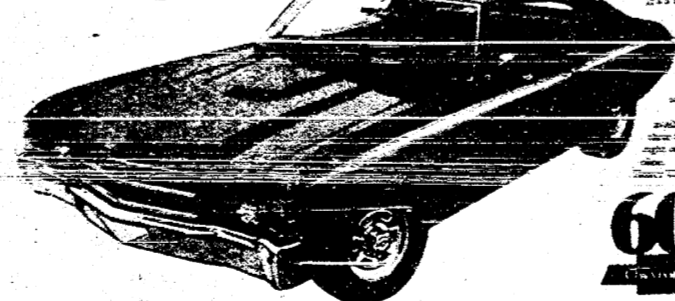

A letter has been written to Mr. Langdon regarding Riverside Drive, stating that curb does exist and estimating the amount regarding Riverside Drive. Gravel purchased from the village was used to fill the area which was washing out. Bruce was requested to measure for a street light on Washington Street. Bob McLeavy presented plans for the Main St. Bridge which were subsequently discussed.

Paul Alber posed a few questions regarding the bridge railing. Mr. McLeavy agreed to draw up the material necessary for advertising. Bids will be opened at 7 p.m. August 16 in the Village Hall. All bids will be firm for 45 days. Moved by Mahony, supported by Fitzgerald that we advertise for construction bids as noted, All yeas, carried.

The following preamble and resolution were offered by Councilman Mahony and supported by Councilman Scully.

WHEREAS, the Village Council of the Village of Manchester does hereby determine that it is necessary to undertake the following major street improvements in the City:

Street Name	Terminal	Proposed Construction
Main Street	Manchester	Remove completely the existing superstructure. Construct new prestressed, 21" x 36" Box Beam Deck, new concrete sidewalks, new Bridge Railing MD5H R 13 and Bituminous Wearing Surface.

WHEREAS, the Village's share of the cost of said major street improvements is estimated to be Eighty Six Thousand Four Hundred (\$86,400.00) Dollars; and

WHEREAS, to finance part of the cost of said major street improvements, the Village Council deems it necessary at this time to borrow the sum of Forty Thousand (\$40,000.00) Dollars, and issue bonds therefor as authorized by the provisions of Act 175, Public Acts of Michigan, 1952, as amended; and

WHEREAS, said major street improvements are in accordance with the purposes enumerated in Act 51, Public Acts of Michigan, 1951; and

WHEREAS, the revenues received by the Village of Manchester from the Motor Vehicle Highway Fund pursuant to Act 51, Public Acts of Michigan, 1951, as amended, in the year preceding this contemplated borrowing are more than sufficient to comply with all the requirements specified in Section 4 of Act 175, Public Acts of Michigan, 1952, as amended;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

1. The plans and estimates of the cost of the major street improvements, as briefly set forth in the preamble hereto, are hereby approved and adopted.

2. The period of usefulness of said major street improvements is estimated to be not less than fifteen (15) years.

3. The Village Council of the Village of Manchester hereby determines to borrow the sum of Forty Thousand (\$40,000.00) Dollars and issue bonds of the Village therefor pursuant to the provisions of Act 175, Public Acts of Michigan, 1952, as amended, for the purpose of providing funds to pay part of the cost of the major street improvements, as set forth in the preamble hereto, the balance to be paid from funds on hand.

4. Said bonds shall be designated MOTOR VEHICLE HIGHWAY FUND BONDS (1971 SERIES), and shall consist of eight (8) bonds of the denomination of \$5,000.00 each, numbered consecutively in street order of maturity from 1 to 8, inclusive, dated as of October 1, 1971, and payable serially as follows:

\$5,000.00 October 1st of each of the years from 1972 to 1979, inclusive. Said bonds shall bear interest at a rate or rates not exceeding the maximum rate permitted by law, payable on April 1, 1972, and semi-annually thereafter on October 1st and April 1st of each year.

Both principal and interest shall be payable at a bank or trust company qualified to act as paying agent to be designated by the original purchaser of the bonds.

Bonds of this issue shall not be subject to redemption prior to maturity.

5. For the purposes of providing moneys to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds herein authorized, and in accordance with the provisions of Act 175, Public Acts of Michigan, 1952, as amended, there is hereby made an irrevocable

appropriation of the amount necessary to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds herein authorized from the moneys to be derived from State-collected taxes levied on the Village of Manchester for major street purposes, pursuant to law, and the Treasurer of the Village of Manchester is hereby directed, during each year that any of the principal of and interest on the indebtedness herein authorized remains outstanding and unpaid, to set aside in a separate depository account, the designated 1971 MOTOR VEHICLE HIGHWAY FUND BOND DEBT RETIREMENT FUND, sufficient moneys from revenues received during each such year from the Motor Vehicle Highway Fund pursuant to law to pay the principal of and interest on the installment of such indebtedness next maturing.

6. Pursuant to the authorization of Act 175, Public Acts of Michigan, 1952, amended, and as additional security for the prompt payment of the principal and interest on the bonds herein authorized, there is hereby irrevocably pledged the full faith and credit of the Village of Manchester and in the event of deficiency funds primarily pledged to the payment thereof, the Village covenants and agrees to levy taxes necessary to provide such deficiency, which taxes are not subject to limitation as to rate or amount.

7. Said bonds shall be signed by the Mayor and countersigned by the Village Clerk and the corporate seal of the Village shall be affixed thereto, and the interest coupons annexed to said bonds shall bear the facsimile signature of the Village Treasurer. Said bonds when executed shall be delivered to the Treasurer and delivered by him to the purchaser thereof on payment of the purchase price, in accordance with the bid therefor, when accepted.

8. Said bonds and the attached coupons shall be in substantially the following form:

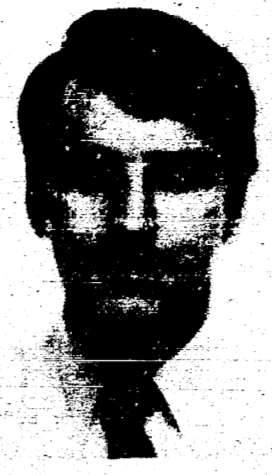

- Filling:**
- One 21-oz. can cherry pie filling
  - 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
  - 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
  - 1/4 teaspoon almond extract
- Glaze:**
- 1/4 teaspoon grated lemon peel
  - 2 teaspoons lemon juice
  - 1/4 cup sifted confectioners sugar

**Crust:**  
One 10-oz. pkg. Flako Pie Crust Mix  
4 tablespoons cold water  
Heat oven to hot (400° F.). For filling, empty cherry pie filling into a medium-sized bowl. Gently stir in cinnamon, nutmeg and almond extract.

For crust, empty contents of package into bowl. Sprinkle cold water by tablespoons over mix; stir lightly with fork until just dampened. (If necessary, add another tablespoon water.) Form into ball. 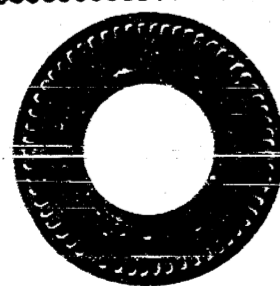

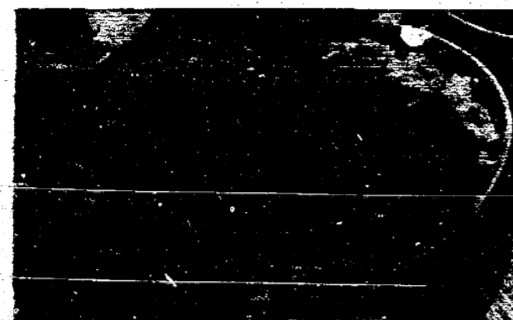
