The Manchester Public Schools will open September 7, 1971 with a full day of school. Bus routes will be essentially the same as they were last year with necessary changes being made the second week of school.

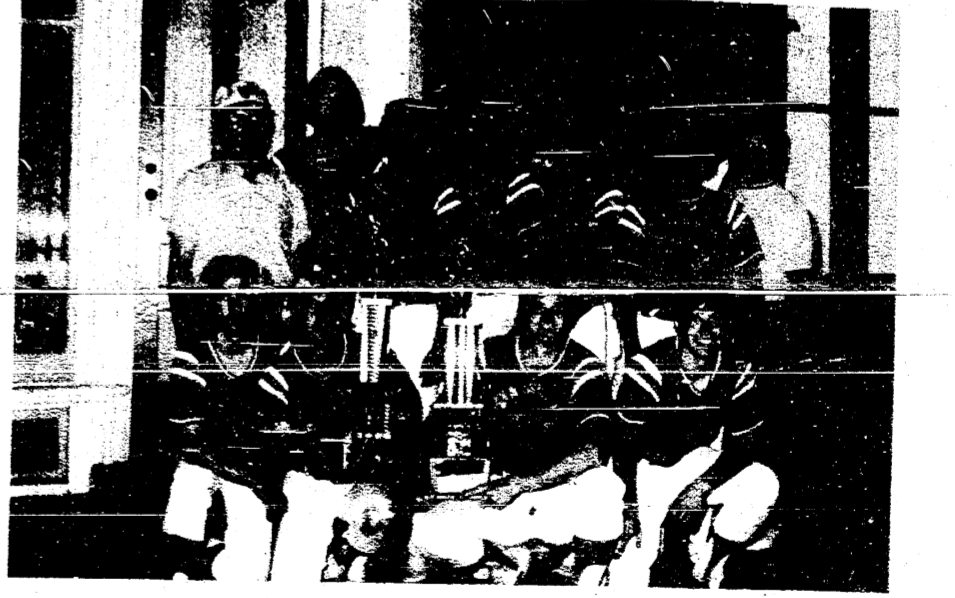
