"Be Prepared" is the world famous Boy Scout motto. Anton Schlosser of Manchester knows now the full meaning of that phrase. Caught in a three day typhoon at the foot of Mt. Fuji, in Japan early in August, he experienced an adventure few scouts have realized.
Having decided a full year ago that he would like to attend the 13th World Jamboree of the Boy Scouts, to be held at the Foot of Mr. Fuji in the Fuji-Hakone-Izu National Park, from August 2 thru August 10, he began to make his plans and to save the money needed. With some help from the Manchester Optimist and the American Legion, he set forth on Saturday, July 31 by Plane from Metropolitan Airport, Detroit.
Arriving at Tokyo International Airport, after losing 14 hours crossing the international dateline, he found it was Sunday, proceeded by bus to the Campground, where 20,000 Scouts from a total of 86 countries, including 7800 from the United States were gathered.

scouts and on the other African. Finding the theme of this Jamboree was "For Understanding", the slogan certainly seemed apt, for the World Jamboree is held once every 4 years - similar to the Olympics, since 1920.

With the opening scheduled for Monday evening the scouts had the day off, on Tuesday nearly the entire day was spent getting acquainted by a clever game. Each boy was given a letter in a color and had to find enough friends to form the motto "Be Prepared". On Wednesday a stage show was planned but one half hour before show time the typhoon struck with rain and winds blowing 100 miles per hour. Rained and blew all night and morning found scores of tents blown down and the campground awash, the volcanic soil was especially difficult to travel upon and all low ground was under water. The boys stayed in tents till afternoon when the Japanese Army arrived to help stake the tents down. Meanwhile the rations were cut in half because the trucks could not get in with more supplies.

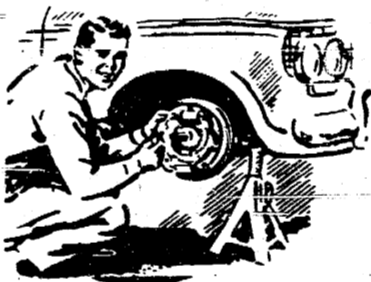

Fruit Salad With Maple Pretzels

| 5 lettuce leaves | 10 maraschino cherries, each cut into 4 wedges |
| 5 pineapple slices | 6 scallions, trimmed |
| 2 cups (1 pound) cottage cheese | 2 cups blended maple syrup |
| 1/4 cup slivered almonds | 15 pretzels |

Use a long, oval platter. Place lettuce leaves at one end. Place a pineapple slice on each lettuce leaf. Fill pineapple centers with cottage cheese. Top cheese with almonds. Place cherry wedges on pineapple slice into cheese to look like the petals of a flower. Place 5 scallions at bottom of pineapple slices for the stems of flowers. Tie stems together with the remaining scallion. Chill until ready to serve.

Boil maple syrup about 15 minutes or until a small amount dropped into water forms a hard ball. Dip pretzels quickly into syrup and place on wax paper to dry at room temperature. Allow pretzels to drain well before placing on wax paper. Serve with salad. Serves 5.

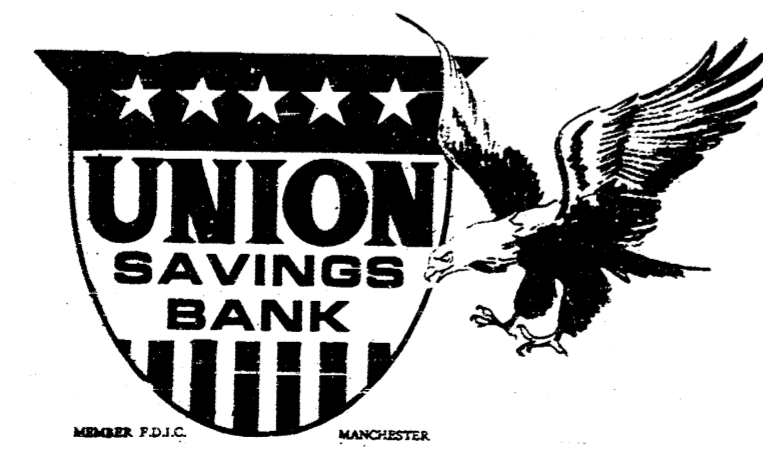
Unemployment simply means there are more people willing to work than there are jobs for them.

Some time ago it was stated by the Commerce Department of our national Government that it took an average investment of \$7,500 by an employer before a job could be created. \$7,500 that had to come from somewhere.

Now, let's say that you were going to build a factory and employ ten people right here in this community. According to government statistics, of \$7,500 per person employed, you would need a minimum of \$75,000 just to go into business to say nothing of sufficient working capital to stay in business.

This money, the \$75,000 plus the working capital, would come from only one source, probably. A bank, this bank. And where would we get the \$75,000 and the working capital this new community employer would need?

You see what we mean when we say, "You help yourself and your community when you are a depositor of your local bank".
