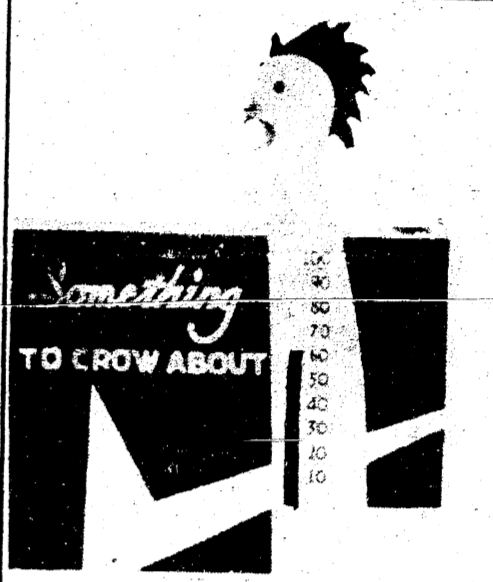

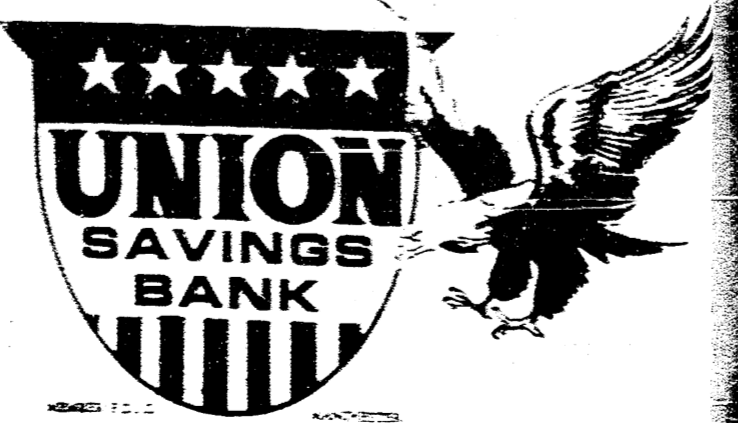
LADIES ARBITERS OF MANCHESTER

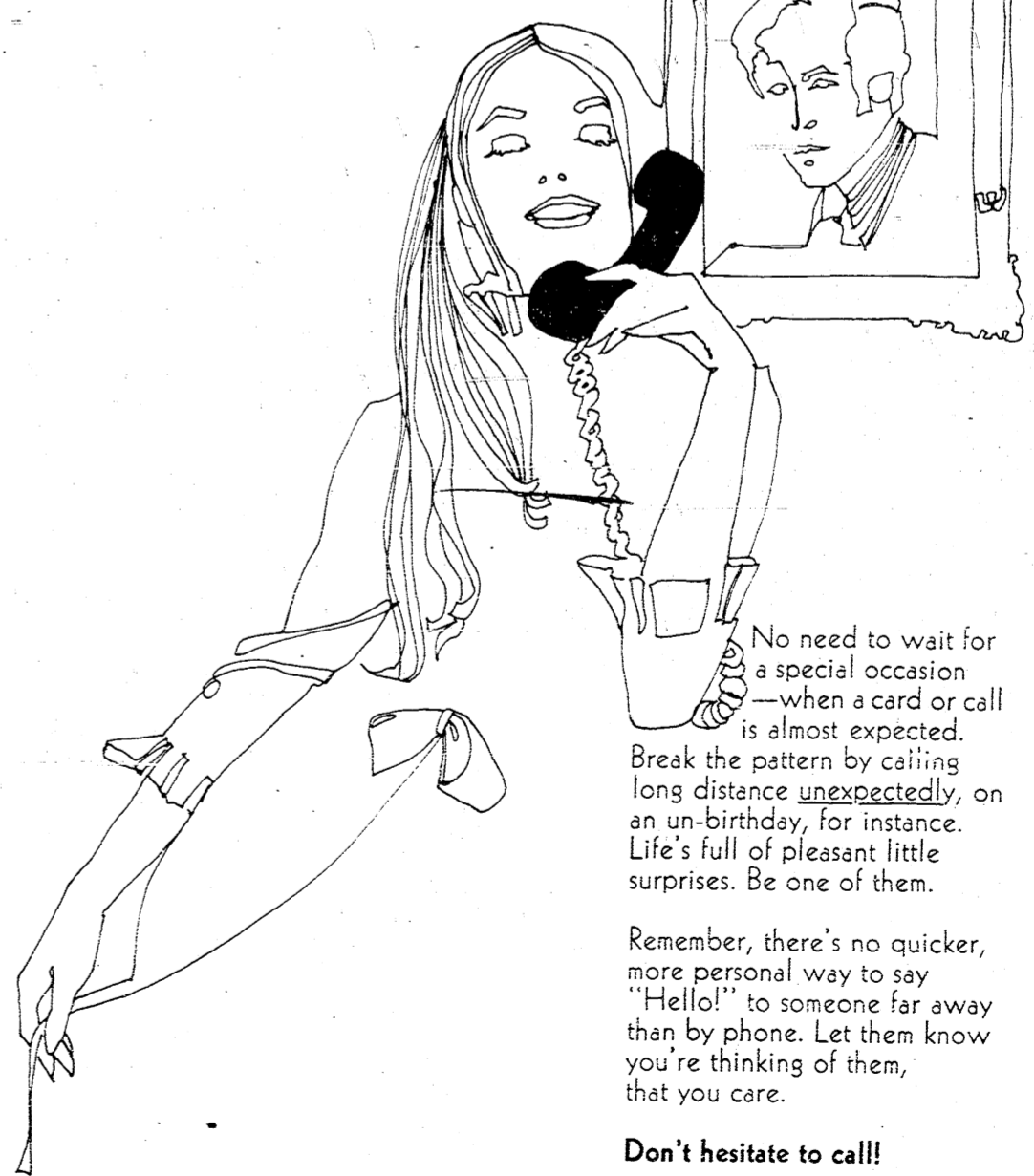

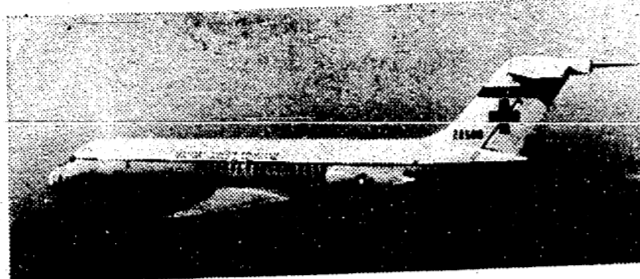

Torrey addition. All yeas, carried. Reinhart was instructed to advise Koernke's that they should have a receipt or cancelled check to prove payment of an alleged tap-in fee on Division Street.

Scully reported that no radio is now available from the Sheriff's Dept. to enable the Village to equip the old police car. However, a 60 watt used radio is available from Comtronics for \$350. Further inquiries will be made. It was proposed that the Public Works Committee and Health and Safety Committee draw up some plans to better utilize their joint facilities. Scully discussed the last Chamber of Commerce meeting which he had attended as a representative of Council. A possible change in lighting on Main Street as well as the Main Street bridge were discussed. An answer expressing the Chamber's opinion of the presented lighting program was requested.

Benedict advised Council that the polls at Kirk Park were finally in.

- Fitzgerald reviewed the DPW's activities: 1. Kirk Park has been seeded, courtesy of Manns. 2. Sewer and restroom facilities have been installed in the joint police-public works building on Macomb Street. 3. CP-1 has been applied on Duncan Street. 4. The street light on Washington Street is in, and 5. A cost estimate has been worked up on a 12" main extension for Uniloy. The possibility of purchasing a street cleaner was discussed. One is available for \$2200.00. Bruce will try the machine. A meeting with James Hansen has been set up for October 19, regarding the lease for the landfill. Moved by Fitzgerald supported by Scully to contract to have the Village Hall painted and have necessary eavestroughs installed, as well as light fixtures. All yeas, carried.

A letter of resignation was read from Mr. Gale Koebe effective November 11, 1971. He is resigning as chairman and member of the Village Planning Commission.

Moved by Scully, supported by Walton to adjourn. All yeas, carried. Meeting adjourned, 10:15. Mary Wheeler, clerk

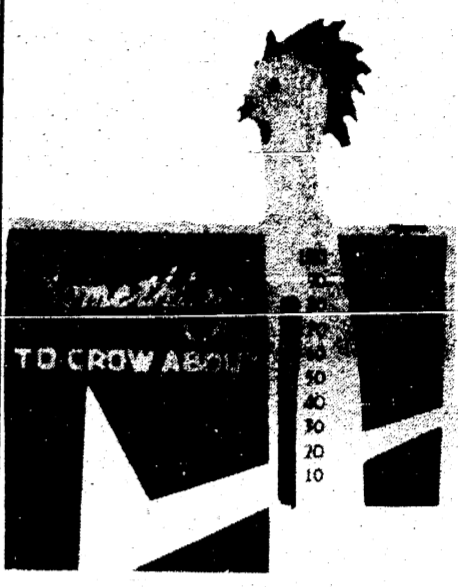
WHEREAS, the vast majority of the youth of the United States are concerned, knowledgeable and responsible citizens and
