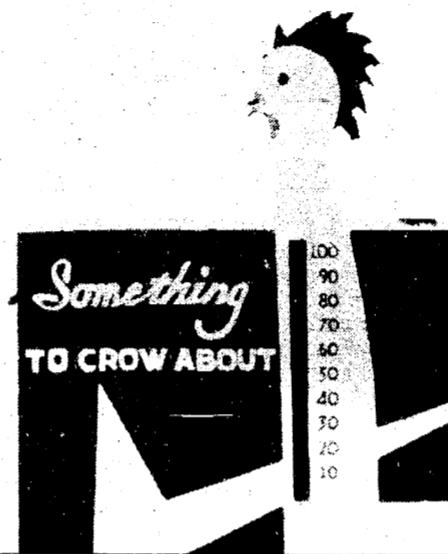

BOATING SAFETY CLASSES

Lt. David B. Severance and Dep. John W. Kostyo will be offering a class in boating safety beginning December 2, 1971. The class will be held at the Washtenaw County Service Center located at 4133 Washtenaw Rd. Ann Arbor. The three, two hour sessions are scheduled for December 2, 9, and 16th at 7:00 p.m. Children from 11 to 16 years of age are encouraged take the class if they are interested in boating.

Upon successfully completing the course, a boating safety certificate will be awarded. The certificate will enable children of this age group to operate a boat, of over six horsepower, by themselves. Included in the free course will be lessons in boating safety, emergency first aid, navigation and State marine laws. The covers of the new telephone books feature a color reproduction of an oil painting, "Jolliet and Marquette." This is another in the series of historical paintings done by Robert Thom under a commission from Michigan Bell.

Louis Jolliet, the explorer, and Father Jacques Marquette, the Jesuit missionary to the Indians, left St. Ignace May 17, 1673, on a search for a waterway to the Pacific.

Accompanied by their voyageurs, the party traveled by way of lakes and rivers until it reached the Mississippi. When they entered the great river, Jolliet and Marquette were elated to have found at last the stream which they had so long hoped to see.

Then the travelers, floating down the Mississippi, eventually reached the mouth of the Arkansas River, they became convinced the river emptied into the Gulf of Mexico.

Ill health plagued Father Marquette on the return trip. He died, only 38 years old, before reaching his beloved mission at St. Ignace.

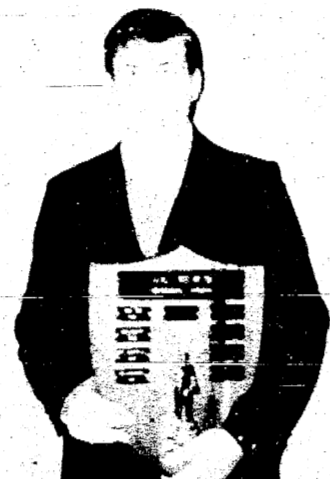

VILLAGE PLANNING COMMISSION MINUTES
 June 10, 1971

The regular meeting of the Village Planning Commission was held at the Council Chambers, with Members present Koebbe, Kirk, Krauss, Walton, and Little.

The meeting was called to order at 7:50 p.m., by Chairman Koebbe. Also present were Mr. Sang Nam and Mr. Robert Kline of the Washtenaw County Planners. Mr. Kline is a new member of the staff of the Washtenaw County Metropolitan Planning Commission, on a part time basis. Mr. Jay Lantis was present as a guest.

Mr. Nam and Mr. Kline demonstrated various charts and maps and discussed several local features which are being considered in our planning, such as:

The most traveled access to the village, by about 30%, is via M-52 and Austin Road;

Some of our most outstanding natural features are the large number of trees, and that we are located in the Raisin River Basin;

Two Elementary Schools, the Middle School, and the High School.

The need for an M-52 by-pass to avoid the bad intersection at Main and Ann Arbor Streets and Riverside Drive, and the potential of utilizing the former Penn Central right-of-way for this purpose.

The meeting was called to order at 8:00 p.m. by Ch. Koebbe.

Reading of the Minutes of the last meeting was dispensed with.

Chairman Koebbe presented the subject of a request from Mr. Eugene Kaupp to have his property rezoned from "Industrial" to "Residential". While rezoning of this individual parcel appears to be inconsistent with the overall plan, there is reason to think that the other property owners are in agreement, but not necessarily for all of the "Industrial" and/or "Agricultural" areas which should be considered.

It was therefore decided to table any action pending conference with our professional planners, and then if a suitable change is indicated, to submit the recommendation to the Village Council for routine hearings and adoption or rejection.

There being no further business to come before this meeting, adjournment

The regular meeting of the Village Planning Commission was held at the Council Chambers, with members present Koebbe, Leeson, Little, Widmayer, and Kirk.

The meeting was called to order at 7:55 p.m., by Chairman Koebbe. Also present were Mr. Sang Nam and Mr. Robert Kline of the Washtenaw County Metropolitan Planning Commission, and as a guest, Mr. Harry Macomber.

Minutes of the meetings of June 10 and July 22 were read and approved.

Some new sketches illustrating revised land use concepts were shown, along with modified versions indicating capabilities, especially with reference to Industrial and Commercial areas.

There was considerable discussion and several suggestions made to assure that the tentative plans will conform to local needs and thinking.

Mr. Jay Lantis had submitted a plan for a shopping center in the locale of the former railway terminal. After some discussion this was referred to Mr. Nam for the professional planner's study and eventual recommendations.

Mr. Sang Nam was called upon to review their recent work on behalf of the Manchester Planning. Certain potential traffic circulation plans for approaches to town were presented, utilizing existing streets and properties, or options which might require acquisitions of property and construction of new

thoroughfares and possibly a bridge. Several other updated plans were shown and considered as they contribute to the comprehensive village plan.

Also presented were some updated sketches of the Central Business District and adjacent areas. It is indicated that future expansion of the C.B.D. will probably tend to be mainly to the south.

Mr. Kline showed and explained maps and overlays illustrating the latest concepts for the C.B.D., both general land use layouts (business, parking, public, recreational) and details of eventual arrangements, with the phases through which these might be developed.

The plans as suggested are long range, and have been conceived to not forestall shorter range and immediate needs.

It was added that they (the planners) are also looking into the legal aspects of their proposals, and will be prepared to offer ideas for solution of problems which might arise.

Mr. Little announced that there is to be a combined meeting of the Village and Township Planning Commissions, on Sept. 27, 8:00 p.m., at the Village Hall.

Adjournment was moved by Little, seconded by Widmayer.

For the first time in the history of Washtenaw County voters will have an opportunity to vote on a proposition specifically intended for moderately and severely mentally retarded and multiply handicapped school age children. On November 30th at a special county wide election a proposition will be presented to the voters which if passed will permit the building of a Mental Retardation Service Center.

A specific place of their own for the mentally retarded would be another first in the history of Washtenaw County, because these mentally retarded children have always been in someone else's buildings such as churches or vacated schools and these have never been adequate for their program and service needs.

The proposed Center will be able to serve over 200 children daily and another 200-300 children from the county can receive needed diagnostic and assessment services. The responsibility for building and directing this Center will rest with the Washtenaw Intermediate School District.

The cost of constructing, equipping and furnishing the proposed Center is \$2,700,000. A bonding program for this sum would mean a tax increase of .19 mill or 19¢ per \$1,000 assessed evaluation. The additional annual cost to a family with a home with a market value of \$25,000 and assessed at \$12,500 would be \$2.37 1/2 for only twelve years or a total of \$28,500.

The proposition on the November 30th ballot asks permission for the Washtenaw Intermediate School District to borrow the money to build a place for the moderately and severely mentally retarded children of Washtenaw County.
