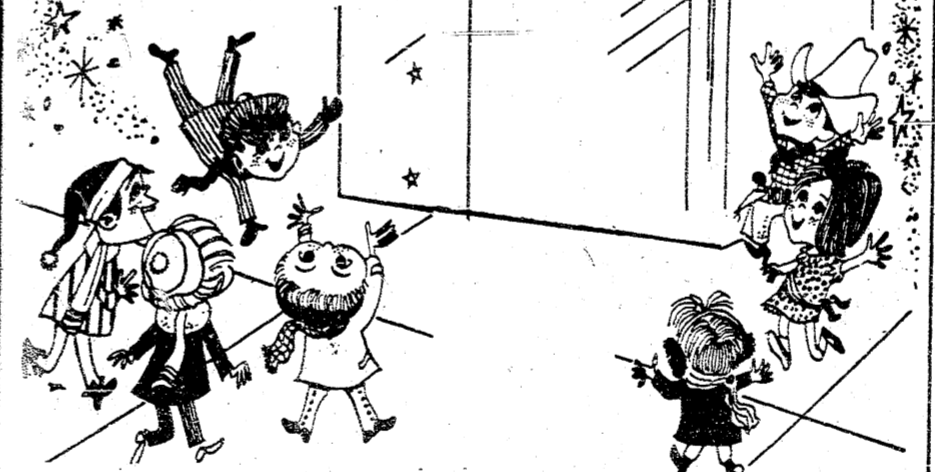

To the Editor:
We, the ECOLOGY CLUB, would first of all like to thank Double A Products for all the help they have given us, from giving us free barrels to crush our glass in, to helping us transport it.
While we now collect approximately 4000 lbs. of glass per month, we would still like to enlarge our service to the community in the area of glass recycling. We have the opportunity to purchase a 20 ton bin, but we don't have the necessary \$850.
The bin, if purchased, would be open for the public to bring in their glass at certain prescribed times. We have been given permission to place

the bin behind the barn in back of the high school parking lot. We see the bin as a partial answer to the glass problem. Another answer would be having our stores sell only returnable bottles.
Meanwhile, transporting our monthly pick-ups is becoming more difficult as we gather larger quantities of glass. We have limited access to trucks and are seeking your participation by asking for a heavy duty truck capable of carrying two to three tons of glass to Charlotte. fifty years earlier she had been a neighbor near the farm, and so she sent help and the woman was found alone on the floor with a broken hip.
Son Leonard had a similar experience when he received a call from a stuttering man at Pleasant Lake. Having trouble getting information he kept repeating that he must have the name and address and was told "Stop your damn questions and send the fire truck," then hung up. However, once again Chick knew the voice and was able to give the right address.
At one time, with a fire in progress, the Ann Arbor Department received a call from this area with only the name of the street given, and to further complicate matters, Saline, Milan and Manchester all had to answer because without an address each had to search a part of the district to find the fire.
Receiving a call from Ann Arbor one day that a woman had just remembered she shut and locked her door and left dinner on the stove cooking, the time involved in trying to get a key was too great, so Chick simply went out and tossed a stone through the window, climbed in and turned off the stove.
To be ninety years old on the 20th of February, Grandma Kirk was born in 1882 in the Irish Hills. Daughter of the original settlers, she married Ferdinand Kirk in 1906 and moved to Grossman Rd. in Manchester Twp., living on what is now the Marvin Kirk farm. Six children were born of them, Sr. Jean Mildred, Sr. Vincent Marie, Robert, Marvin, Mildred, and Leonard.
In 1946 Ferdinand died and Grandma moved to town where she has since made her home. "Grandma" to the whole town, this reporter had to ask her name, never having heard it before.
Just a tiny mite, but with a straight back and firm will, sharp and alert, Grandma can still be seen working in the store and sometimes walking to Church. The best of our Pioneer heritage stands firm and solid, steady and dependable. Merry Christmas Grandma from everyone of us.

VILLAGE PLANNING COMMISSION
November 11, 1971

The regular meeting of the Village Planning Commission was held at the Council chambers, with members present: Koebbe, Leeson, Krauss, Walton, Kirk, Little, and Widmayer.

Also in attendance were Mr. Sang Nam, from the Washtenaw County Metropolitan Planning Commission, and Mr. Bruce Daniels, Supt. of Public Works.

The meeting was called to order at 7:45 p. m. by Chairman Koebbe. Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

With reference to the subject of a new shopping center, proposed by Mr. Jay Lantis, previously considered at the September meeting, and at that time referred to the professional planners for their recommendation, Mr. Nam presented in writing a complete analysis of the situation as it prevails in Manchester, comments on the proposed shopping area, and a four point recommendation that only a supermarket (grocery store) be permitted on the site, holding the remaining commercial uses until the economic analysis indicates need; that the remainder of the site be zoned back to other district for future control; and finally that the village should retain the "turn of the century motif."

(Enter Widmayer, 8:05.) Following a discussion of the ramifications and advisability of the above report, it was moved by Krauss that we

accept the recommendations of the planners in regard to the Lantis proposal. Motion supported by Widmayer; all yeas; approved. The recommendations will be reported to Council.

Maps and layouts were next shown by Mr. Nam, illustrating the planning progress for the Central Business District, including existing and proposed parking lots.

Next reported were the revised Land Use and Zoning Plan (maps), and a detailed categorical analysis of space allocation for eventual zoning areas, along with an updated Community Facilities Plan: (schools, parks, public and quasi-public functions, and open spaces). Also, a chart of Estimates of Ultimate Population by Sections in the three "neighborhoods" comprising the village.

Mr. Nam then explained and discussed a chart showing theoretical standards for shopping center requirements with an analysis of our projected needs through year 1990, as compared to existing facilities.

Finally, the planners have prepared a review of existing village facilities per office spaces, Council chambers, District Court, fire station, etc., and recommendations for a possible future complex on the west side of Adrian Street, south of and adjacent to the Central Business District.

There ensued a short discussion of the need for a designated area for mobile homes, in regard to both community planning and for legal reasons. Mr. Nam will study the possibilities

with the planners and bring in some suggestions.

The Secretary read a letter from Mr. Gale Koebbe, addressed to the Village President, stating his resignation as a member of Chairman of the Village Planning Commission, effective at the

close of this meeting, November 11, 1971.

Adjournment was moved by Little, seconded by Widmayer.

The meeting was declared adjourned at 9:45 p. m.

BANANA NUT BREAD

1 stick of oleo
1 cup granulate sugar
2 eggs
2 cups flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon soda
Cream oleo and sugar. Add 1 egg at a time, beating after each egg. Add flour, salt and soda. Mix. Add 1 teaspoon vanilla. 3 or 4 mashed bananas, 1/2 cup chopped nuts. Bake at 325° for 55 minutes. Makes 1 large or 2 small loaves.

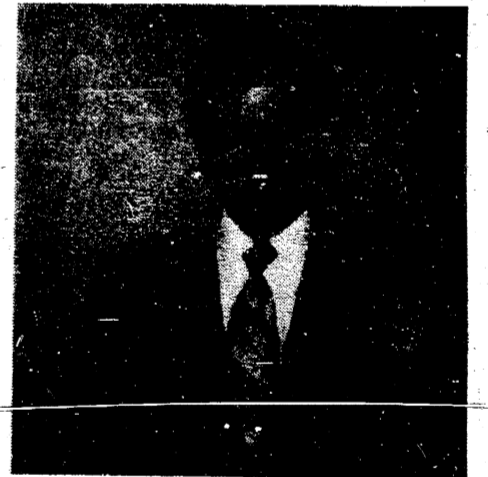
The evening ended with punch and Christmas cookies for all.
