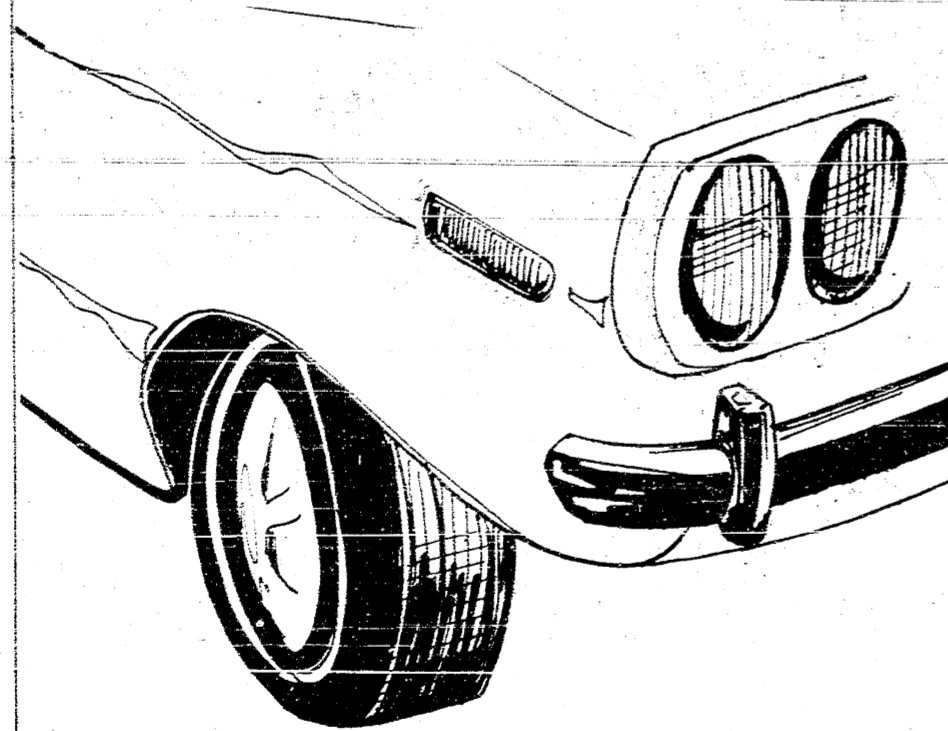

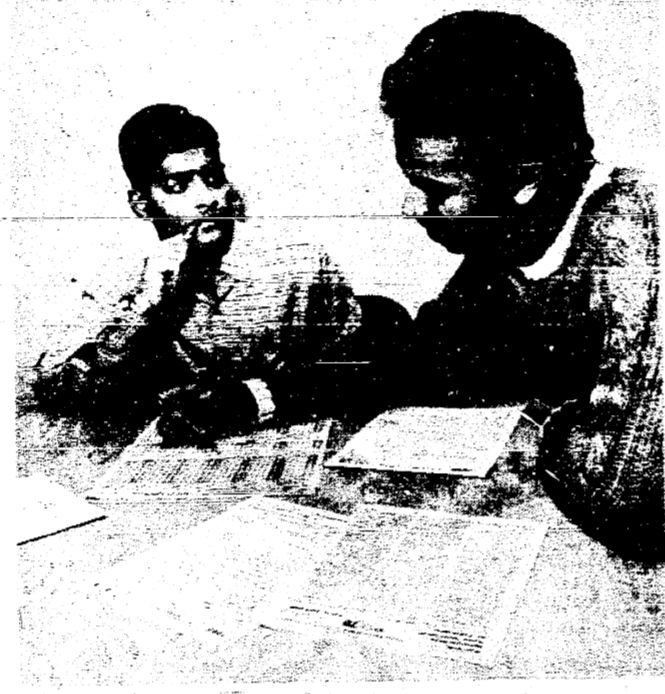

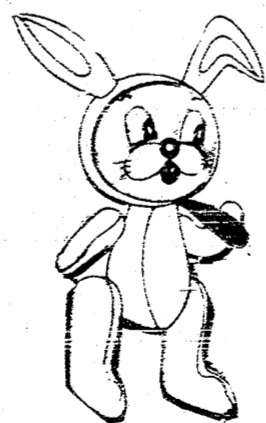

**Rhubarb Pie Harbinger of Spring**

Whether you make it in late winter from the first rhubarb in markets or from fruit harvested later from your own patch, rhubarb pie is always a welcome herald of spring. This recipe uses orange juice and rind to add subtle overtones of flavor and fragrance to the tartness of the rhubarb.

**CITRUS RHUBARB PIE**

1 recipe pastry for double crust pie  
 1 1/2 cups sugar      2 teaspoons grated orange or lemon rind  
 1/2 cup corn starch      1/2 cup orange juice  
 1/2 teaspoon salt      Food coloring (optional)  
 5 cups (1/2-inch pieces) rhubarb      2 tablespoons margarine

Divide pastry almost in half. Roll out larger portion and fit into 9 inch pie pan. Trim 1/2-inch beyond outer rim. Roll out remaining pastry to 1/2-inch thickness. Cut into 3/4-inch wide strips. Mix sugar, corn starch and salt. Add rhubarb, rind and juice. Toss until well mixed. Tint pink, if desired. Turn into pastry shell. Dot with margarine. Moisten edge of pastry in pan. Seal to edge. Turn edge of pastry in and over ends of strips. Flute to form high rim. If desired, brush pastry with milk and sprinkle with sugar. Bake in 400 degree F. (hot) oven 50 to 60 minutes or until filling has bubbles that do not break. Makes 6 servings.

## TREES AND SHRUBS STILL AVAILABLE Give Blood Good Friday

Stephen Bristle, of Manchester, announces that the Washtenaw County Soil Conservation District is still accepting orders for evergreen trees and shrubs for the spring planting season. The Soil Conservation District still has the following species available: Blue Spruce, White Spruce, White Pine, Red Pine, Scotch Pine, Autumn Olive and Multiflora Rose. The distribution of trees and wildlife shrubs has become an annual event for the Washtenaw County SCD. The seedlings are made available to landowners in the interest of promoting conservation plantings. Last year, over 206,000 trees and shrubs were provided to 400 landowners and organizations. According to Bristle, tree planting has a number of environmental benefits. Trees can be planted for erosion control, wind-breaks, reforestation, Christmas trees and natural beauty. Wildlife shrubs provide food for songbirds and other wild animals in the form of berries. For those who would like to do some planting but do not have the time, there are several groups interested in doing both machine and hand planting. In addition, the Washtenaw County Soil Conservation District has several machine tree planters available that can be used for a very nominal fee. The deadline for ordering tree and shrub planting stock is April 15. ## Washings Increase 71 Budgets

Elect and appointed Sharon Town- officials were given pay increases \$17,000 budget was adopted for year. The supervisor's pay was raised from \$600 to \$2,400, the clerk's salary was raised \$400 to \$1,500, and the treasurer received a \$500 increase, to \$1,000. Board of Review members were paid a pay raise from \$20 a day, to \$25 a day. The Zoning Board Zoning Appeals Board will receive \$0 per meeting.

Manchester 1971-72 proposed budget for Manchester Township was hiked from \$400 to \$43,013.50. The supervisor, treasurer and clerk received salary increases of \$200 more each year. Volunteer firemen will now receive \$1.00 per hour for fire runs. Before, they were \$0.50. The road improvement fund budget increased from \$2,496 to \$4,000. Increased was the proposed township library fund budget from \$4,236 to \$4,800.

Freedom Township residents approved a \$500 budget for this year, the same amount that was allocated last year. Residents also voted to pay for chlorides on all township roads. Township meetings will be held quarterly beginning in April.

DGEWATER The 1971 - 72 proposed budget of Dgewater Township of \$19,566 was adopted during the annual township meeting. This figure represents a 10 percent increase over last year's budget. The budget hike is attributed to an increase from \$4,200 to \$5,000 for salaries for township roads and for general expenses. Salaries for township officials were unchanged.

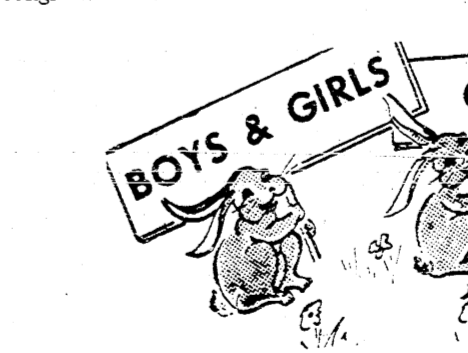
