APRIL 18 - 24, 1971

Governor Milliken has proclaimed April 18-24, 1971, as Arbor Week in Michigan.

"More than half of Michigan's land area is classified as commercial forest land and our state and its people are blessed with an abundance of forests.

"These forests have been the basis for great industries throughout our history and help make Michigan one of the most beautiful of all states.

"Aside from the harvest of wood, fruits and beauty, Michigan's more than 90 species of trees serve a vital function in today's increasingly polluted world as they help combat air pollution by removing carbon dioxide from the air and give off oxygen.

"Because Michigan's more populated areas are those most in need of trees, it is to the advantage of many of us that this natural asset be enlarged and that preservation, conservation and restoration of trees be considered a major step in continuing the benefits of this heritage.

"Various programs seeking to cope with the environmental crisis facing people throughout this state and nation are to be encouraged.

"Therefore, I, William G. Milliken, Governor of the State of Michigan, do hereby proclaim April 18 - 24, 1971, as ARBOR WEEK in Michigan, and urge the planting of trees during this week with proper ceremonies so that they will be a constant reminder of a priceless gift we must preserve for this and future generations."

WOODS & WATER

Balmy spring days with temperatures in the high 70's, bring about the thought of fishing. To the avid fisherman a quiet afternoon at the lake or stream is sheer pleasure, but we always hear about the big one that got away. With the opening of most seasons within the next six weeks

many fellows have started to check their gear and prepare for the onslaught of summer.

A quick check tells us that on April 24th, on designated trout lakes species of Brook, Brown, Rainbow and Lake Trout, Splake, Coby, Chinook and Kakanee Sal-

mon; Bluegill, Sunfish, Crappie, Rock Bass, Warmouth Bass, White fish, Perch, Catfish, Menominee, and all other fish. On Trout streams and designated Trout Lakes this season runs from April 24 through September 30. On non-trout streams, inland lakes, Great Lakes, Lake St. Clair, Detroit, St. Mary's and St. Clair Rivers the same list of fish may be taken at any time.

Fishing licenses are required of all persons who have passed their 17th birthday to fish in all inland waters, the Great Lakes and connecting waters. Resident annual license is \$3.00 and permits a man and his wife to fish for all kinds of fish except trout, splake, and salmon. A trout stamp runs \$2.10 and must be attached to the license. Special Resident license, for persons over 65, is \$50 and permits a man and his wife to take all kinds of fish including trout, splake, and salmon. Licenses for residents and non-residents can be

obtained locally. Trout stamps can also be obtained locally.

For more or less obvious reasons, same methods, devices and practices of taking fish must be prohibited. These don't's are quoted from the Rules for Fishing in Michigan:

You may not:
 Snag fish. Exception: Salmon snagging is legal with hook and line.

Use a hook, single or multiple points, more than 3/8 inch between point of the hook and shank on any trout stream except from June 1 through Labor Day. Exception: You may use a hook not larger than 3/4 inch from point of hook to shank, August 1 through February 15 of each year, to fish for salmon.

Take fish with firearms, explosives, toxic substances, or by any other methods not specifically listed as lawful.

Pass a spear, bow and arrow, or other device for impaling fish on waters where spearing is prohibited.

Use nets or seines within 100 feet of any dam.

Place a net or seine in any race, river or stream to obstruct the free passage of fish.

Import line game fish or reliable eggs of game fish except under permit from the Department of Natural Resources.

Take fish for the sole purpose of removing the eggs.

Deposit fish offal in any waters of the state.

All of this activity will be held at Our Redeemer Lutheran Church, Union and Westwood, Dearborn, Michigan where Rev. Arthur H. Spink is pastor. Mr. Richard Feusse is the chairman of this convention with Mr. Cecil Curtis as the host Lutheran Laymen's League Representative.

MICHIGAN DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

Michigan Farmers, benefiting from last year's high corn prices that resulted from blight problems in heavy corn-producing states, indicate they will increase corn planting by 12 percent in 1971.

That's the forecast from Crop Reporting Service, a federal-state cooperative affiliate of the Michigan Department of Agriculture.

"Crop planting estimates are based on results of a survey of farmers conducted in late February and early March," B. Dale Ball, director of the Michigan Agriculture Department, explained. "Accurate estimates aid farmers and processors in planning for market conditions."

Michigan farmers expect to plant 2,003,000 acres of corn, an increase of over 200,000 acres from 1970, the survey shows. Soybean plantings are expected to total 620,000 acres, up 15 percent from last year.

Projected plantings of barley total 29,000 acres, up 4,000 acres from 1970. Winter wheat acreage was 590,000 acres, about one percent higher than a year ago.

Other planting forecasts include: oats, 426,000 acres, a drop of 14 percent

from 1970; hay, 1,411,000 acres, one percent less than in 1970; and dry edible beans, 635,000 acres, sugar beets, 90,000 acres, and potatoes, 39,800 acres, all down three percent this year.

TIPS ON DEALING WITH CORN BLIGHT

As the 1971 growing season approaches a large question mark remains concerning the Southern corn leaf blight according to Nick Smith, Chairman, Michigan State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Weather-blight studies, he stated, suggest that where weather conditions are favorable for corn growth, conditions will also be favorable for blight development. A recent weather and crop bulletin published by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, he added, indicates a strong potential for blight in 1971.

Smith noted that a collection of working materials on the blight and tips for dealing with corn blight in 1971 have been published in a booklet entitled "Corn Blight Factors in 1971". It would be wise, Smith stated, for every corn farmer in Michigan to review the contents of this booklet. A free copy of this booklet is available by writing to the Corn Blight Information Center, USDA, Washington, DC 20250.

Factors, Smith stated, for a grower to consider when attempting to predict probable occurrence of blight in 1971 include determination of the degree of resistance or susceptibility as reflected by the hybrid seed to be planted, as well as the site of the field. Lowlands and river bottoms are more conducive to blight infections. Other factors include: Was there blight in the field in 1970? Also, date of planting (because some areas of early planted corn in 1970 escaped severe damage). Smith also mentioned other factors, such as rate of planting, weed and grass control, air pollution, stagnant air masses and cloudiness which tend to prevent drying out of corn plants following rain and dew. Presence of potent fungicides would also be a factor; however, Smith added, costs of spraying large field corn acreage might be prohibitive.

Every source of information should be utilized by farmers, Smith added, to help them make proper decisions on their 1971 corn crop. Smith noted that a Corn Blight Information Center has been established in the U.S. Department of Agriculture at Washington, DC, and information is channeled down to the County Extension offices periodically, so that farmers will have a ready source of the latest information on the corn blight situation.

Smith also mentioned the fact that a sale of CCC steel bins at the Elsie Binsite, Elsie, Michigan, has been planned for 12:30 p.m., Monday, April 26, 1971. 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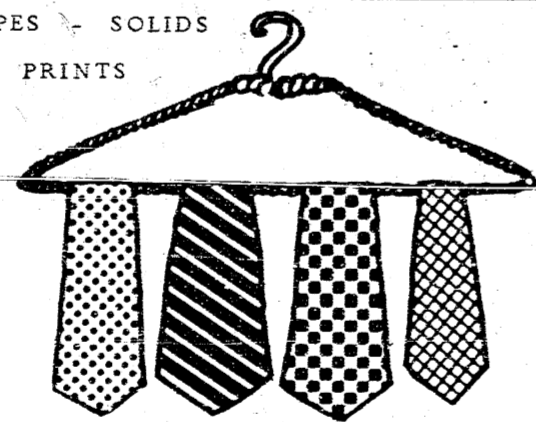


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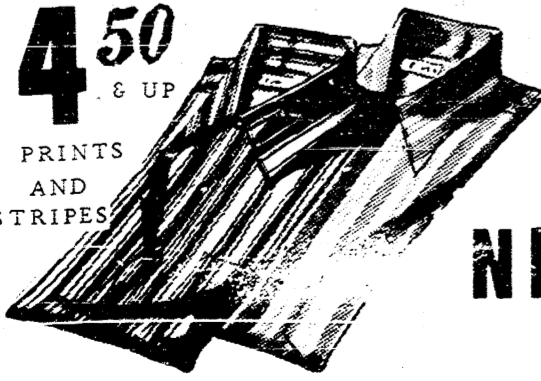

3. Measure sugar and margarine into mixer bowl; beat until light and fluffy. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add dry ingredients alternately with bran flakes mixture; mix only until batter is smooth. Stir in cottage cheese and pineapple. Spread evenly in slightly greased 9 x 9 x 2-inch baking pan.

4. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) about 50 minutes or until wooden pick inserted in center of cake comes out clean. Combine ingredients for topping and spread over hot cake. Broil about 3 minutes or until topping is lightly browned. Serve warm.

SOIL: "THINKING MAN'S FILTER"

The soil can be a "thinking man's filter" to prevent pollution -- if it isn't overloaded with potential pollutants, contends a Michigan State University soil scientist.

"Soil can absorb liquids, filter solids and absorb gases," reports A. Earl Erickson. "And soil microorganisms can transform and decompose most natural materials."

"But there are limits to what the soil can handle. You'll probably cause pollution if you put on more than 49 tons per year of natural organic matter or 150 to 200 pounds per year of nitrogen."

"You could put on anywhere from 200 to 4,000 pounds of phosphorus, depending on soil type."

Erickson says farmers who test their soils know when they are reaching these limits, so they avoid using too much fertilizer.

"Proper fertilization contributes little to the loss of nutrients in drainage waters," says Erickson. "In most instances, less than 10 pounds of nitrate are lost per acre per year -- a quantity equal to that added through rainfall. In experiments, phosphorus lost was less than one-tenth of a pound per acre per year."

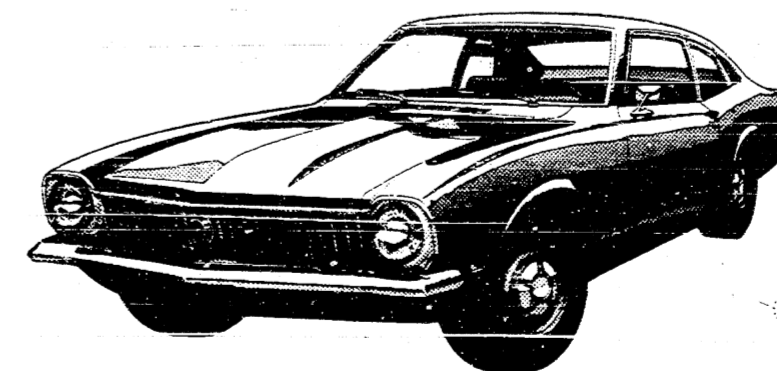
