Townhouse Complex Started

D. E. Limpert Construction

Ground was broken and foundations poured last week for the first unit of Millpond Village, the townhouse complex constructed by the D. E. Limpert Construction Company.

To be erected near the site of the Manchester burial ground, the tripartite unit of 5 townhouses will be built in an Alpine Bavarian style with brick, stone timbers and rough barnwood.

The first of a projected 4-6 units, the completion date is set for October 1, 1971. Further units will be constructed as the units are filled and the demand requires.

Situated on a high peninsula on a point in the Raisin River and comprising slightly more than seven acres, part of which is flood land, the site is secluded with a view on one side of the river and the other a park, the location lends itself to a self contained little 'village'.

The approximate center of the location, which was many years ago a burial ground, never having been dedicated as a cemetery, will be set aside and restored as a park in tribute to the early pioneers of Manchester.

Some few headstones are still in evidence and they will remain within this park.

The old foot path, winding along the edge of the river, and familiar to generations of children in this area, and which encircles a good part of the property will remain, and all property below this path will also be used as a river edge park.

The outside facilities will include parking, allowing space for 2 cars per unit, and will feature Gas lights. Complete outside maintenance will be furnished.

In residence in Manchester township since 1963 the Limperts were in a sense 'coming home' when they settled here, for five generations ago the Limperts settled in Freedom township, on the old Kaibach farm and were early members of the oldest Lutheran Church in Michigan, the Scio Lutheran Church. Several members of the family are buried in the Scio Church cemetery. Later generations removed to Ann Arbor, then Detroit, and finally, full circle, back to Manchester.

A Civil War buff, and interested in preservation of our early American surroundings, the Limperts saw in the Village of Manchester, a lovely, well preserved town with the potential of growth while retaining the character of a small town.

Having purchased and restored several properties in the downtown section, the example has very probably established a trend for within the past year when the Village Council and the Chamber of Commerce have officially adopted the 'turn of the century' theme. Striking examples of the use of imagination combined with use of colors have been offered in the painting of the Mill by Willard Mann and the store front painting on Main Street last year.

A member of the township zoning board since 1967 and presently chairman of the planning commission, Mr. Limpert is a Carpenter by trade, and has been a General Contractor since 1955, specializing in restoration of commercial and industrial buildings all over the U.S.

Having recently purchased a home in Savannah, Georgia, in which they will spend some of the winter months, the Limperts will however, keep Manchester as their permanent home.

ful piece of church property, but the church was too small and the grounds unkept.

"If you help me make the necessary improvements, together we'll build the finest rural church and eventually have an outdoor Way of the Cross. Tourists began to come into the lake area, and it wasn't long before the little stone church built by Irish immigrants was too small for the large summer congregations. On the feast of St. Joseph, March 19, 1925, we started to enlarge the church.

"I'm happy God has given me time enough to see the fruition of all plans. Thousands of devout souls from all over the world find here at the shrine peace of soul sadly wanting in this world of ours," he reflected.

Without the help of an architect, the priest drew plans for enlarging the church. The original one built by Irish pioneers was preserved. A new transept and sanctuary were added making a cruciform church in Spanish mission style with red tile roof. At the right of the main altar stands a Lourdes grotto of field stone like the exterior.

Money was scarce. Parishioners and assistant priests helped. Fr. Joseph Wuest, a Holy Ghost priest laid stones for many stations.

The 3,303 foot road to Calvary is authentically correct. Msgr. Pfeffer studied and visited many parts of the world gathering information and selecting materials for the stations.

At the first station there is the balcony where Pilate stood surrounded by courtiers and then the lower level where He was taunted by Roman soldiers. Then Antonio's Tower (second station) through a replica of the street of Jerusalem (fourth, fifth and sixth).

Tenth through thirteen stations are symbols depicting suffering of Jesus. At the eleventh station rose quartz and semi precious stones from the Black Hills of South Dakota were used for the altar.

The Crucifixion Group for the twelfth station was imported from Pia-trassanti, Italy and is cararra marble. Red stones from the Ozark around Joplin, Mo. are used for the Bleeding Heart of Mary in the thirteenth station. The entire station was built by priests.

Visitors from far and near have contributed stones from their areas to help make this an ecumenical project. Other outdoor Ways of the Cross rely chiefly on large statuary or beautiful paintings on copper. This is a natural setting portraying Mt. Calvary's Hill on the hillside overlooking Iron Lake.

Pilgrims have brought stones from all over the world to form the tomb and to emphasize that Jesus died for the "whole" human race. People of all faiths visit this spot. In the stone collection is a meteor found near Hudson.

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COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

May 18, 1971

Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by Councilman Mahony at 7:45. Trustees present were Mahony, Scully, Reinhart, Fitzgerald and Benedict; absent were President Little, Trustee Walton, and Clerk Mary Wheeler. Enter Pres. Little at 8:00 and Trustee Walton at 8:05. Minutes of the May 3 meeting were read. Moved by Fitzgerald, supported by Scully to approve minutes. All yeas, carried.

Mr. Bob McLavry of G.L. McLavry & Sons Inc. gave a very detailed and complete report of the condition of our Main Street bridge and what it would cost to replace the same. He said the piers and underneath structure appeared to be in pretty good shape, but the decking would all have to be removed. He presented the council with a detailed estimate to replace the bridge, the approximate cost being \$80,000. The time required to complete the job was from 2-3 months from actual starting date. The railing for this bridge was discussed at great length with the thought of giving it an historical look. A railing can be adapted later to meet State specifications. Moved by Mahony, supported by Fitzgerald to have McLavry & Sons proceed to completion with the engineering of the bridge plans, so when it is time to put it out for bids the work will be done. All yeas, carried.

Don Limpert presented preliminary drawings for a 6 unit apartment building to be constructed at the end of Washington Street. He needed the approval of Council in order to start footings immediately so Consumers would grant him a gas permit. Moved by Scully, supported by Reinhart to approve a temporary permit so that Mr. Limpert might start construction. All yeas, carried.

Mahony gave the proposed budget for 1972; 13 mills are levied on village property owners and distributed as follows: 4.9 mills General Fund, 4.2 mills General Highway Fund, 1.5 mills Bridge Bond Interest & Redemption Fund and 2.4 mills Sewage Plant Bond Interest & Redemption Fund.

The Finance Committee reported that our water and sewer rates have not been adequate to cover operating expenses, and the Water and Sewer Dept. now owes the General Fund in excess of \$7,000. Higher costs as a result of inflation, replacement of sewage pumping equipment, and a complete rebuild of the sewage filter were cited as the reasons. To return to a sound financial basis the following rate structure was recommended:

WATER CHARGES

- A) Consumption charge per (1) 1,000 (M) gallons (gal.) per quarter (3 months): First 8,000 gal. @ \$1.20/M; next 2,000 gal. @ \$1.00/M; next 2,000 gal. @ \$0.80/M; next 2,000 gal. @ \$0.60/M; next 6,000 gal. @ \$0.40/M; next 80,000 gal. @ \$0.24/M; next 900,000 gal. @ \$0.22/M; next 2,000,000 gal. @ \$0.20/M; all over 3,000,000 gal. @ \$0.18/M.
- B) Minimum charge \$9.60 per quarter
- C) Premises without a meter shall be charged \$9.60 per quarter while connected to the system with the shut-off valve turned on.

SEWER CHARGES

- A) A quarterly sewage disposal charge of 50% of the water charge or \$9.00, whichever is greater, for the same premises for the same period of time, shall be made against all connected premises.
- Minimum charge \$9.00 per quarter.
- B) Premises without a meter or premises not connected to the water system shall be charged \$9.00 per quarter while connected to the sewage disposal system.

Moved by Mahony, supported by Reinhart that the recommended rate structure be adopted to take effect with the billings for the third quarter use. All yeas, carried.

To date Kirk Park has cost the Village nothing as all bills have been taken care of by donations from different civic organizations. Vouchers were presented for payment.

VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER ORDINANCE NO. 90

An ordinance to amend ordinance Number 76, as amended entitled: And improvements to the water supply and sewage disposal system of the village of Manchester and for the combined operation of the water supply system, and the sewage disposal system of the Village as a single system; to provide for the issuance of self-liquidating revenue bonds to pay the cost of said improvements under the provisions of Act 94, Public Acts of Michigan, 1933, as amended; providing for the fixing, collection, segregation and disposition of the revenues of said combined water supply and sewage disposal system and payment of said bonds out of the revenues thereof; and the Village of Manchester ordains:

Section 1. Section 10, of Ordinance No. 76, as amended by Ordinance No. 82 is further amended by deleting therefrom and substituting the following therefor:

Section 10. The rates to be charged for water and sewer service furnished by the system shall be those presently in effect in the village until June 30, 1971 as established by Ordinance No. 76 as amended by Ordinance No. 82 of the Village, and commencing July 1, 1971 shall be as follows:

WATER CHARGES

(A) Consumption charge per 1,000 (M) gallons (gal.) per quarter (3 months); First 5,000 gal. @ \$1.20/M; next 2,000 gal. @ \$1.00/M; next 2,000 gal. @ \$.80/M; next 2,000 gal. @ \$.60/M; next 6,000 gal. @ \$.40/M; next 80,000 gal. @ \$.24/M; next 900,000 gal. @ \$.22/M; next 2,000,000 @ \$.20/M; all over 3,000,000 gal. @ \$.18/M. Minimum charge \$9.60 per quarter.

SEWER CHARGES

(A) A quarterly sewage disposal charge of 50% of the water charges or \$9.60 whichever is greater, for the same premises for the same period of time, shall be made against all connected premises. Minimum charge \$9.00 per quarter. (B) Premises without a water meter or premises not connected to the water system shall be charged \$9.00 per quarter while connected to the sewage disposal system.

PARTIAL QUARTERLY USE

When service is furnished for only a portion of the quarter, the foregoing water and sewage disposal charges will be prorated on a monthly basis. Ser-

vice for 16 days within a month will be charged as a full month, service for less than 16 days will accumulate with the consumption in the following quarter.

MULTIPLE USE CONNECTIONS

At least one water meter shall be installed in all connected premises where multiple family, multiple commercial, or combinations of family and commercial use exist. The foregoing charges apply without alteration. Separate water meters with lock-off valves may be installed for each family or commercial unit at the property owner's request. The foregoing charges are then applied to each meter installed on said premises for both water and sewage disposal.

PREMISES OUTSIDE VILLAGE LIMITS

Water and/or sewage disposal service may only be provided to premises outside the village limits at double the foregoing charges.

SERVICE TURN ON AND TURN OFF

A fee of \$5.00 is charged for turning on water service once it has been turned off, except when turn off is required for repair and maintenance of the water lines. There is no charge for making final meter readings, not actually turned off.

VERIFICATION OF METER ACCURACY

Meters will be checked for accuracy upon request and if necessary, repaired, or replaced as required at no charge. A service fee, after the first 30 minutes, at current village labor rates, plus any sub-contract costs will be charged when the meter is found not to be defective.

WATER SPRINKLER SYSTEMS

A quarterly fee of \$15.00 shall be charged for each fire protection sprinkler tap in.

DAMAGE TO VILLAGE METERS

Meters which become damaged due to freezing, misuse, or negligence will be repaired at the property owner's expense.

BILLING

Billing for water and sewer charges shall be made quarterly and bills shall be sent to consumers quarterly and shall become due and payable thirty (30) days after the date of such bill. For all bills not paid when due, a penalty of ten (10%) per cent of the amount of such bill shall be added.

SPECIAL RATES

For such consumers which the Council may determine to be special cases and for large consumers of water who do not use the sanitary sewer system for all of their waste water, the Village Council may establish by resolution special rates.

ENFORCEMENT

The charge for water or sewer services which are under the provisions of Section 21, Act 94, Public Acts of Michigan, 1933, as amended, made a lien on all premises served thereby, unless notice is given that a tenant is responsible, are hereby recognized to constitute such lien, and whenever any such charge against any piece of property shall be delinquent for six (6) months the Village official or officials in charge of the collection thereof shall certify annually, on April 1st of each year, to the tax-assessing officer of the Village, the fact of such delinquency, whereupon such charge shall be by him entered upon the next tax roll as a charge against such premises and shall be collected and the lien thereof enforced: Provided, however, where written notice on a form furnished by the Village is given that a tenant is responsible for such charges, as provided by said Section 21, no further service shall be rendered such premises until a cash deposit of not less than Thirty-Two (\$32.00) Dollars shall have been made as security for payment of such charges.

In addition to other remedies provided, the Village shall have the right to shut off and discontinue the supply of water to any premises for the non-payment of water or sewer rates when due. If such charges are not paid within sixty (60) days after the due date thereof, then water service to such premises shall be discontinued. Water services so discontinued shall not be restored until all sums then due and owing shall be paid plus turn-on charge of Eight (\$8.00) Dollars.

Section 2. This Ordinance shall take effect and be enforced immediately on and after its legal publication.

Made and passed by the Manchester Village Council at a regular meeting thereof on June 7, 1971.

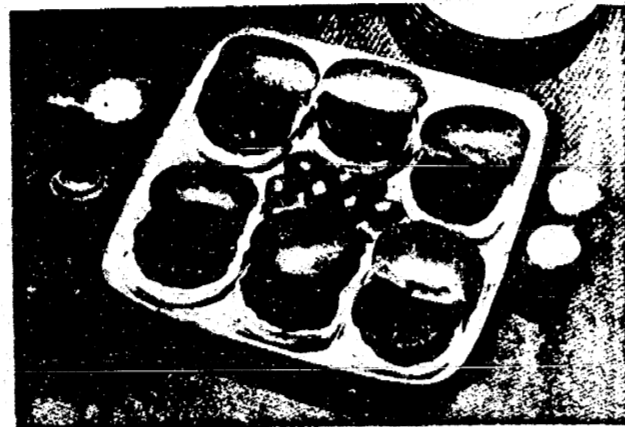

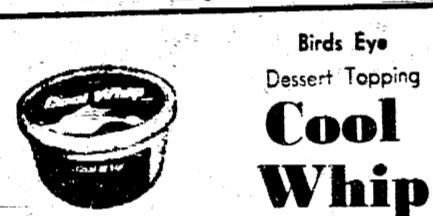

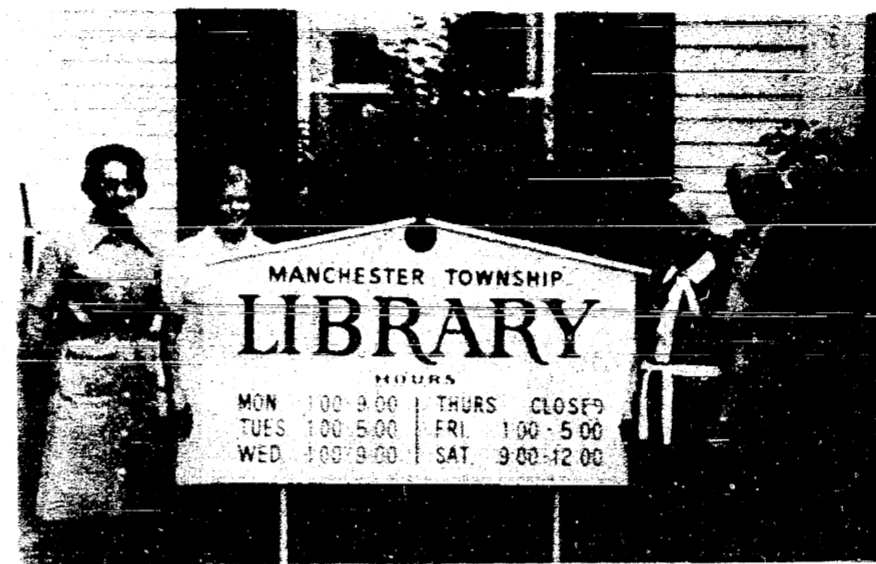
