Warning To Social Security Beneficiaries

Robert A. Kehoe, District Manager of the Social Security Office in Ann Arbor, has issued a warning to all beneficiaries, especially those over 65, that a pair of confidence men have been operating in the Ann Arbor-Ypsilanti area. At least two instances have been reported where the pair of men presented themselves at the door and identified themselves as Federal employees representing Medicare. They told their victims that they had reviewed their files and that their Medicare coverage would lapse unless they paid amounts ranging from \$30 to \$100 on the spot.

Kehoe emphasized that it is highly unlikely that Medicare premiums would ever have to be collected in person in this manner. Furthermore, any Social Security Administration employee who does call at your home carries clear identification, bearing his photograph, and he or she will be very willing to present it.

If any other area residents have been called on by these confidence artists, or if anyone representing Medicare does call at your door, please report it to the Social Security Office promptly, and they will refer it to the proper investigating authority.
