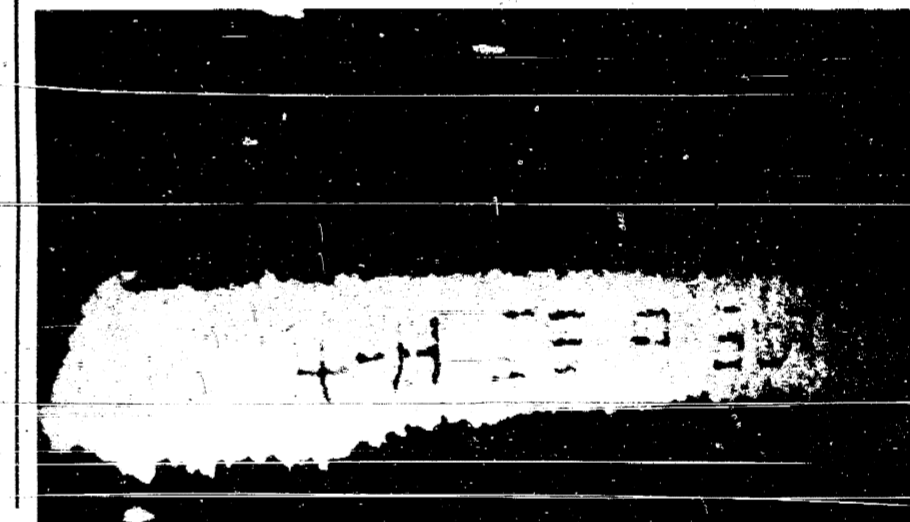
He has been stationed aboard the aircraft carrier, U.S.S. Kitty Hawk on his second tour of duty to Viet Nam and to the Philippines.

Celebrate Silver Anniversary





Dear Editor:

A headline which has only recently been removed, should be called to the attention of the people of Manchester. An elderly man, a neighbor of mine, has been subjected for some time now, to the unmerciful tearing of notes of the young people who passed by his house.

Apparently, his economic situation could not go unnoticed, but who among us could guarantee that in his circumstances, we would not possess a few necessities of our own? My neighbors would work for the least that he has had very few visitors, very little to look forward to and apparently almost as time to look back upon. The frequent visits of his close family members (who are also elderly and who live in a distant city) have provided the information that he was not always as he is now. Not all of us with our differing personalities and experiences will act as gracefully or as humanely as others.

But not all his behavior has been excessive. His current outbursts, which have for the most part developed a tolerant understanding toward him, have been that, in his own way, he appreciates our small kindness that has been done for him.

In the past two months or so, the attitude of him to the young people has reached very unpleasant proportions. Several times every day, I have seen and heard the shouting and the way in which he has acted to give some of them, I have personally been put under a great deal of stress. In all fairness, I must mention the individual who has given them their bad behavior was asked to do so.

Nevertheless, I don't believe that some of the blame must be with parents who have themselves engaged in the middle of this matter with parents who have not taught their children the difference between private acknowledgment of a situation which on the outside has had amazing elements and the public middle which I have mentioned. Most people of all, I feel, is the failure of these children to have learned a sense of compassion for someone less fortunate than themselves. "Thank you for the grace of God go to" is not such a complicated lesson to learn.

Fortunately, this situation appears to have been resolved by the recent departure of this man for a place where he will receive care. But, I personally, think that many of us have a lot to learn in regarding our treatment of him.

MANCHESTER TO FIGHT RACE BAN

The lives of two area automobile racing promoters took opposite turns this week.

To the west, it was a happy time for Louis Freeburn, owner of Butler Motor Speedway. Mr. and Mrs. Freeburn purchased South Bend Speedway at what they called "a good price".

It was a different story to the east, however, as the Manchester Township Planning Commission denied a request by Manchester Speedway to hold motorcycle, snowmobile and three quarter midget races at the track.

The owner Mr. Veryl Schill, Inc., was surprised at the action but vowed to take the decision to the courts.

The Commission's action at Manchester was triggered by a petition signed by 106 persons opposing the proposal. The petition objected to the proposal on the grounds of increased noise and heavy traffic on county roads leading to the Speedway.

The permit now held by the Speedway allows stock car racing only at the location on Schleweis Road.

"I was surprised at the number of people who signed the petition," said Mr. Schill.

"We've always tried to run a good, clean business and be a credit to the community. We've never had any trouble at the track and it hurts to think that some people are saying we're going to do something not honorable to the community."

It is also somewhat surprising that as many as 106 signatures were obtained from about 20 farm homes that could be considered neighbors along Schleweis Road and Bowers Road. Those residents would be the only ones effected.

The rejection was a hard blow to the Schills who have voluntarily cut the number of race dates from 27 a year 10 years ago to 21 this season. The track has also paid \$600 a year to the county to put chloride on the road to keep down dust. This also was voluntary.

"Some people have said we want to run seven nights a week," said Mr. Schill. "The truth is we only want permission to stage an occasional show of a different variety of racing."

"Even with a few extra shows a year, the total would still be less than the 27 a year we used to have".

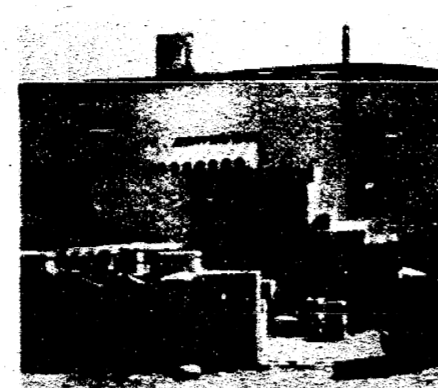

Peanut Butter Cookies

There's more than one reason for making a batch of peanut butter cookies. A big first is that nearly everyone — and especially kids — like them. But just as important, and often more so to mothers concerned about the good health of their children, is the fact that peanut butter cookies pack a wallop in nutritional goodness. Peanut butter ranks as one of the most nutritious foods that Americans eat. It is rich in needed protein, a good source of polyunsaturates, as well as B vitamins, especially niacin. In the Skippy peanut butter recipe here oats and nuts add to the protein value.

Peanut Butter Oatmeal Refrigerator Cookies

1/4 cup margarine, 1/4 cup peanut butter, 1/4 cup sugar, 1/2 cup packed brown sugar, 1 egg, beaten, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla, 1 cup quick oats, 1 cup sifted flour, 1/4 cup chopped nuts.

Mix margarine, peanut butter and sugars. Mix in egg and vanilla, then oats, flour and nuts. Shape into roll about 2 inches thick. Wrap in waxed paper; chill about 4 hours or until firm. Cut in 1/8-inch slices with sharp knife. Place on ungreased baking sheet. Bake in 350°F. (moderate oven) 8 to 10 minutes or until edges are lightly browned. Remove immediately from baking sheet and cook on wire rack. Makes about 3 dozen cookies.
