Mrs. Irvin Gill, Campaign Chairman, also worked closely with the Budget Committee to set this goal: Manchester Student Council - \$200, Manchester Recreation - \$4,000, Pleasant Lake

Recreation - \$50, Manchester Family Service - \$200, Mom's Organization - \$75, American Red Cross - \$4,000, Cystic Fibrosis - \$200, Salvation Army - \$950, Huron Valley Child Guidance Clinic - \$100, Michigan United Fund - \$2,993, Portage Trails Council (Boy Scouts) - \$1,200, Child & Family Service of Washtenaw County - \$400, Catholic Social Services - \$500, Washtenaw Association for Retarded Children - \$200, and Huron Valley Girl Scout Council - \$800. Total 1971-72 budget is \$15,868.

## St. Mary's Church To Celebrate 100th Anniversary Sunday, Sept. 26

On Sunday, September 26, 1971, St. Mary's of Manchester will celebrate their One Hundredth anniversary with a Mass at 4 o'clock p.m., and an outdoor program and dinner in the church hall. Visiting on that day and concelebrating the Mass with fourteen priests will be the Most Reverend Alexander M. Saleski, Bishop of Lansing.

It was in 1870 that St. Mary's of Manchester was established as a Mission with the first Pastor, Fr. Edward Van Lauwe coming from Clinton to serve the residents of this area. Later that year the first Catholic Church was built in Manchester. Located on the corner of Macomb and Wagner Streets, the white frame building is now gone but the Rectory remains, and is today the Baptist Chapel.

It was in 1839 that the first Catholic Church in Washtenaw County is recorded in Freedom Township. A log cabin on Schneider Road was the Sunday scene of a gathering of horse and buggy as well as those who walked.

In 1858, on Bethel Church Road, was built a small brick church named St. Francis with a white plaster facing, and sometime later the brick rectory was built nearby. The church was torn down in the 1930's but the rectory still stands and is a private home. From St. Francis the traveling priest's came to Manchester and were welcomed into the homes in the village, often celebrating Mass in the living room with the neighbors invited.

Fr. Peter Termes was the first Resident Pastor when St. Mary's was named a Parish in 1890, accepting Clinton as a Mission. The two parishes were to serve each other for many years.

The years went by and in 1909 Fr. Edwin Fisher, from Clinton, was assigned to St. Mary's. Having been instrumental in having the Village of Clinton set aside a memorial park on U.S. 12, Fr. Fisher now began his building program. Field stone churches were built in Tecumseh, Brooklyn, and Manchester, with the stone gathered on the farms and surrounding

hills carried by stone boat, pulled by working farm horses. Each parishioner, farmer and villager alike, young men and their fathers, contributed to the building of these churches.

Hard work, however, is only part of the story of the early days of St. Mary's for there was a good deal of enjoyment in earlier years. It was Fr. John Eppenbrock who, in the 1920's, organized a theater group called the St. Mary's Players. In a spirit of Early Ecumenism, the rehearsals took place in the Emanuel Church Hall and performances were given at the "Old Opera House" in the top floor of the present American Legion Building. The performances were apparently fraught with the possibility of immediate disaster, as well as containing the components of overflowing joy. This group is recent enough in memory to be available for interviews, and we talked to a few of them. Zita and Duke Bersuder of Bridgewater, Ed Kirk, Margaret Fielder, Marie Schneider, Ed Galloway, Agnes Kent, to name just a partial list for there are no records and memories do not always prove reliable. One item we can report from our own observation, being the reaction of our citizens when questioned about the years they participated in the 'acting profession'. The invariable reply was either a chuckle or a hoot of laughter before a response, which leads one to wish to have been a mouse backstage in those happy young days.

In 1954 Father William R. Schneider became Pastor. Under his leadership the rectory was improved and the church hall made into an inviting and useful gathering place. It was in his third year that the Knights of Columbus were organized for this area. In 1957 Lehman Wahl, then District Deputy, saw the charter formed. Mr. William Kramer became the first Grand Knight of the Father Fisher Council. The Knights have always loyally backed parish and civic endeavors.

The present pastor of St. Mary's is Father Raymond R. Schlinkert. Coming to this parish after serving in the city, suburban and rural parishes, Fr.

Schlinkert says "I consider it a distinct privilege to be the pastor of this parish. To be in such a place with such parishioners is to be rewarded in a special manner. May God bless us, Priest and people!"

Everyone in the community is invited to participate in the celebration, however, those wishing to have dinner in the Church hall must make reservations.
