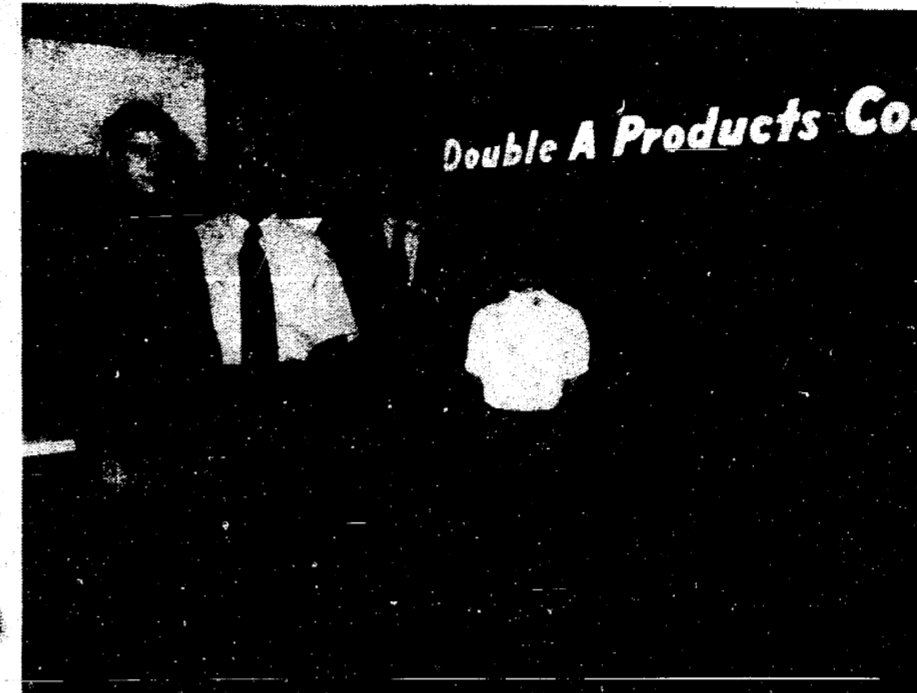

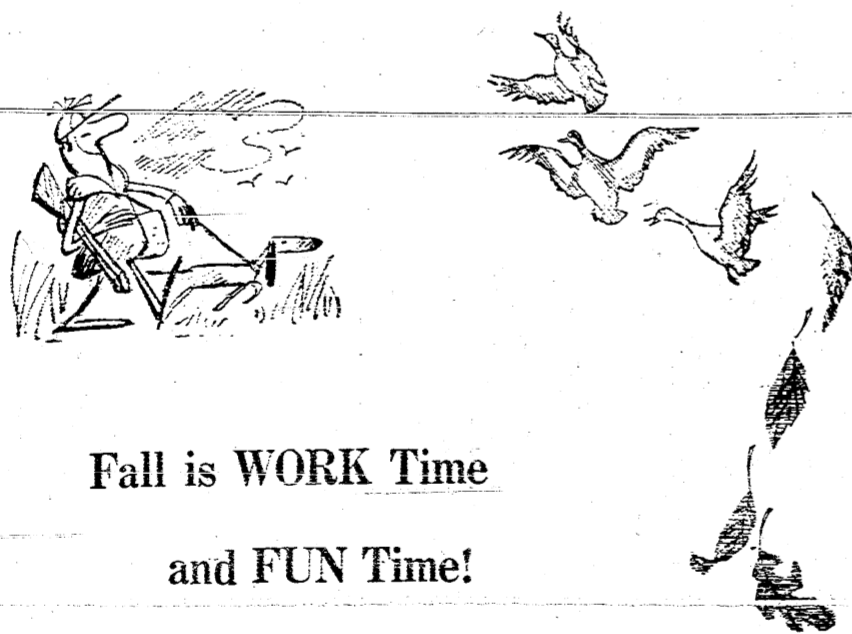

Boat Safety Classes Oct. 7

Lt. David B. Severance and Deputy John W. Kostyo will be offering a class in boating safety beginning October 7th. The classes will be held at the Washtenaw County Service Center located at 4133 Washtenaw Road, Ann Arbor. The three, two hour sessions are scheduled for October 7th, 14th, 21st, at 7:00 p.m. Children from 11 to 16 years of age are encouraged to take the class if they are interested in boating.

Upon successfully completing the course, a boating safety certificate will be awarded. The certificate will enable children of this age group to operate a boat, of over six horsepower, by themselves. Included in the free course will be lessons in boating, safety, emergency first aid, navigation and State marine laws.  Upon graduating from high school, Mr. Samonek attended Elmhurst College, Elmhurst, Illinois, for one year prior to transferring to Adrian College in Michigan, where he majors in Psychology and minors in Music. At Adrian College, Mr. Samonek is active in the Chapel Choir, (which

renders the choral music at the weekly Wednesday morning Chapel Services) and the Adrian Singers, (who have just recently returned from a three-week Concert Tour of Europe, and who engage in Concert Tour of an area of the United States each spring.) Mr. Samonek is a member of Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia of America, (a professional music fraternity); Tau Kappa Epsilon, (The largest Greek International Fraternity for men); Major Cole, (an association for pre-ministerial students); and Inier-Varsity Christian Fellowship, (a national inter-denominational student organization.)
 Next fall, after graduating from Adrian College, May 21, 1972, Mr. Samonek plans a three-year residency graduate program of theological study, preferably at the Evangelical Theological Seminary, Naperville, Illinois, a United Methodist graduate school on the western edge of metropolitan Chicago, "America's, perhaps the world's, most representative metropolis."

In this desired program, there must be included two summers of internship in the field. One summer would be spent in full-time participation in an approved parish setting and the other summer spent in full-time participation in clinical training through the Seminary's program of Clinical Pastoral Education. The classroom that summer is the room of a patient in a hospital, a ward in a mental hospital, a cell in a correctional institution, dealing with the theological and psychological implications of the clinical situation.

 All 4-H member and leaders are invited to attend. However, parents of 4-Hers and spouses of 4-H leaders are especially invited to attend the recognition event.

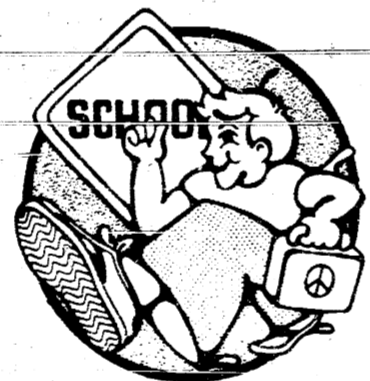
