





As she suggested my wife and I have checked the reading assignments given our daughters who are in the ninth and tenth grades. We have also checked with the school administration, and have received the book lists used in the literature courses

Unfortunately, Mrs. Janofski did not cite titles and authors in her letter, nor have we read every book on the lists furnished. We would, however, be quite pleased if our daughters would make the effort to read every book on these lists.

The authors are all recognized for their contributions to literature and none have been charged with anything like smut peddling, etc. Some of the books are very factual and tell it like it is, without any attempt to excite or arouse the more basic instincts.

We have learned that the literature courses are elective and the student can reject any book he or his family may find offensive. The books on the lists are approved for secondary school use by the American Library Association the National Association of Independent Schools, the Library Journal, The Saturday Review, and the National Council of Teacher's of English.

It is most refreshing to see the curriculum expand in our school system, giving our children more opportunity to develop their interests and capabilities. Maybe space can be made in the next issue of the school report card to publish the book lists and authors, as well as a listing of required and elective high school courses.



Blow molding machine systems, imarily used for the production of lastic containers are presently being roduced in Saline, however the rise usage for milk containers especially arrants an expansion in this area of operations.

The Uniloy system of plastic container manufacturing has been a leader in the country in this field. The leave industry presently packaging appoximately 12% of its milk in these containers. Previously paper or glass, hich have been used for many years leing the only products thought usable for milk. 

School Closings

Once again for the sake of review and for the benefit of new people in the school community we will describe the procedure for alerting the citizens to school closings because of extreme weather conditions. In the event of severe inclement weather (snow and ice) listen WOIA Ann Arbor, Saline (6:00 a.m.), and WHFB Ann Arbor (8:00 a.m.) for announcements. School officials will check road and weather conditions prior to 5:00 a.m. and will call in the school closing announcement prior to the six-fifteen news hour (WIR, Detroit). In certain instance (conditions existing) and permitting), announcements will be forthcoming the night before on the 10:00 p.m. and 11:00 p.m. news broadcast. In the event that weather conditions necessitate the closing of school during the school day while pupils are at school, the radio stations will be alerted and will broadcast dismissal times. This will alert the parents to the fact that students will be taken home. In the event that extreme and/ or adverse weather conditions occur after the children have been delivered to their respective schools and these conditions necessitate the closing of school, the closing will take place as soon as the bus drivers return to the school and the parents have been alerted via the radio stations. In the event that the schools are closed for severe weather conditions, all regularly scheduled athletic events, extra curricular activities, and activities involving the use of the school occuring on that day will be automatically cancelled.
