

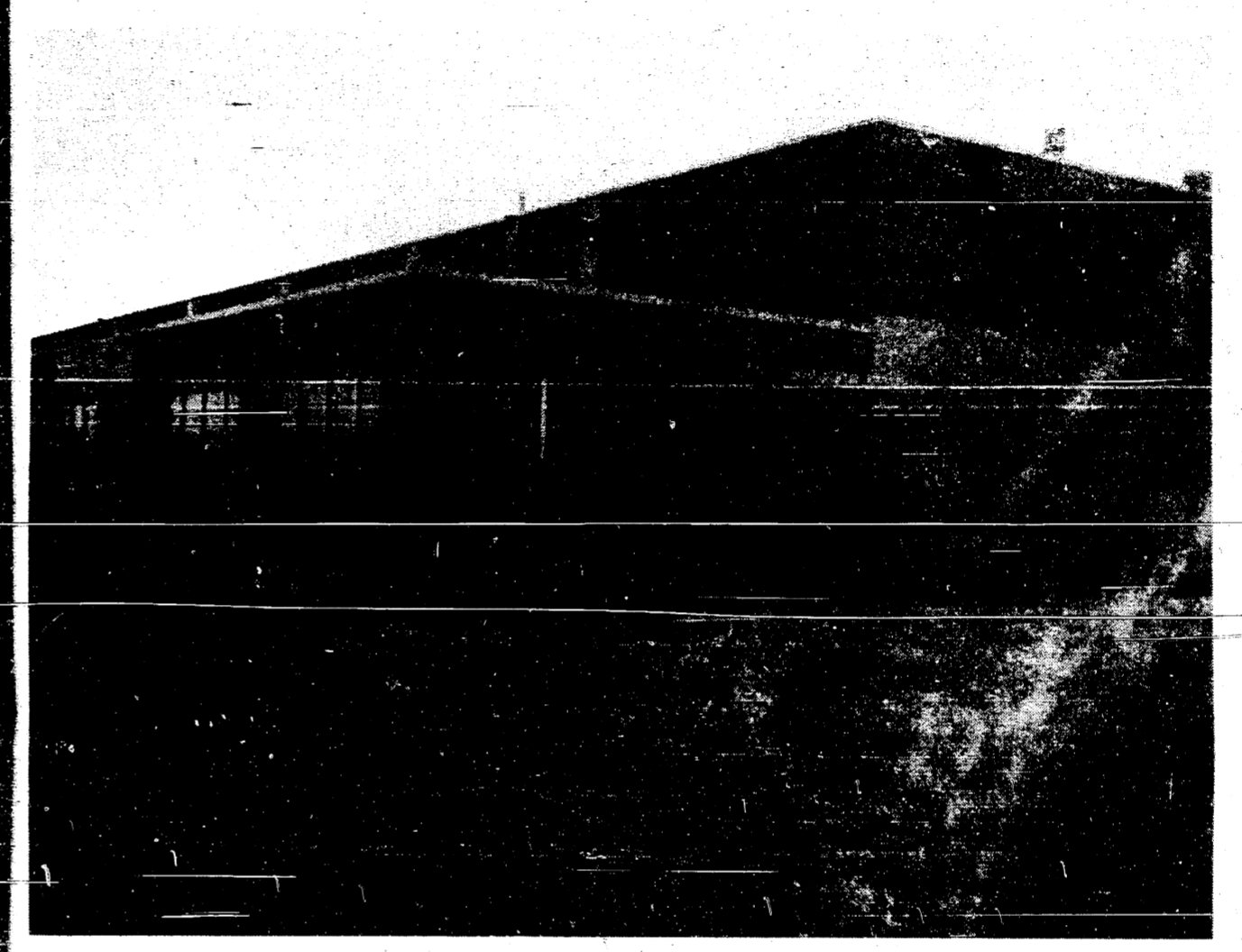

Uniloy Division of Hoover Ball To Be Operational In December



The Uniloy Division of Hoover Ball and Bearing Co. is expected to be operational in December of this year. Equipped to manufacture blow molding systems, the machine assembly as well as the Electric Control plants used on the machines will be produced at the Manchester plant.

Blow molding machine systems, primarily used for the production of plastic containers are presently being produced in Saline, however the rise in usage for milk containers especially warrants an expansion in this area of operations.

The Uniloy system of plastic container manufacturing has been a leader in the country in this field. The dairy industry presently packaging approximately 12% of its milk in these containers. Previously paper or glass, which have been used for many years being the only products thought usable for milk. Plastic containers, however have been well received by the public especially in the larger sizes.

Under the General Supervision of Mr. Nichols, General Manager of Uniloy Division, the Manchester plant is undergoing some remodeling, and although some specialized workers will be transferred here, it is also expected that there will be some local hiring done.

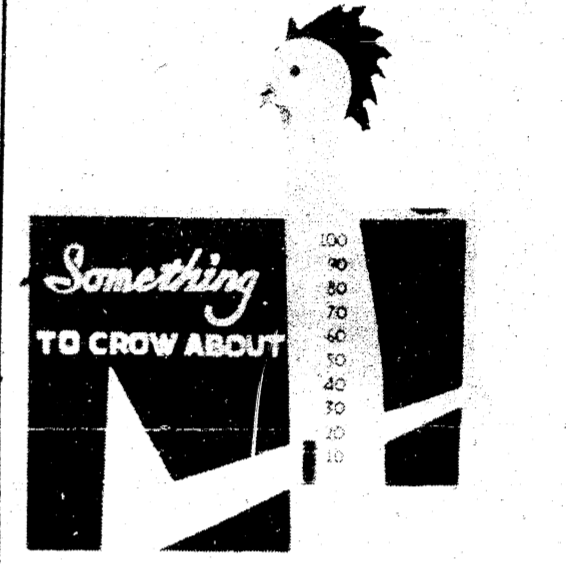

School Closings

Once again for the sake of review and for the benefit of new people in the school community we will describe the procedure for alerting the citizens to school closings because of extreme weather conditions. In the event of severe inclement weather (snow and ice) listen to radio stations WJR Detroit (6:00 a.m.), WOIA Ann Arbor, Saline (6:00 a.m.), and WHFB Ann Arbor (8:00 a.m.) for announcements. School officials will check road and weather conditions prior to 5:00 a.m. and will call in the school closing announcement prior to the six-fifteen news hour (WJR, Detroit). In certain instances (conditions existing and permitting), announcements will be forthcoming the night before on the 10:00 p.m. and 11:00 p.m. news broadcast. In the event that weather conditions necessitate the closing of school during the school day while pupils are at school, the radio stations will be alerted and will broadcast dismissal times. This will alert the parents to the fact that students will be taken home. In the event that extreme and/or adverse weather conditions occur after the children have been delivered to their respective schools and these conditions necessitate the closing of school, the closing will take place as soon as the bus drivers return to the school and the parents have been alerted via the radio stations. In the event that the schools are closed for severe weather conditions, all regularly scheduled athletic events, extra curricular activities, and activities involving the use of the school occurring on that day will be automatically cancelled.

The meeting was called to order by Supervisor Clarence Fielder. The minutes of our previous regular meeting of August 9, 1971 were read and approved.

It was moved by James Lyon and seconded by Lyle Widmayer to pay the balance due on the Workmen Compensation amounting to \$82.00. Motion carried.

Motion was carried.

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned.

MICHIGAN SHERIFFS ASSOCIATION

The President of the Michigan Sheriffs' Association, Ronald Parsons has condemned House Bill 5464 and Senate Bill 1036, as designed to undermine and destroy County Government in Michigan.

Parsons, who is Sheriff of Kent County said that the passage of these two bills, would remove control of County government from county citizens and would place control of county government in the hands of a few men who cannot be representative of all of the people.

Both House and Senate Bills will be debated at a public hearing October 13 in the Supreme Court Chambers at the State Capitol at 10:00 a. m.

Sheriff Parsons maintains that Senate Bill 1036, must be looked upon as subterfuge designed to weaken the citizens inalienable right to govern themselves and to lessen law enforcement to the point of paralysis, and said Parsons, "House Bill 5464 is a little better."

The Michigan Sheriffs' Association, which is made up of the Sheriffs in the majority of the counties of Michigan, have gone on record as unanimously being opposed to both House and Senate Bills and have proclaimed that it will do everything in its power "to defeat these two bills which are totally antithetical to good ethics, good sense and honest well organized government of the people and by the people."

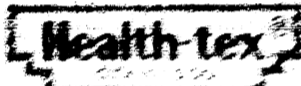
