WHEREAS, Venereal Disease (Syphilis and Gonorrhea) is hitting hardest among teen-agers and young adults, and

WHEREAS, V.D., if untreated, can eventually cause crippling, blindness, sterility, or even death, and

WHEREAS, the stigma of V.D. in the past, has prevented adequate treatment.

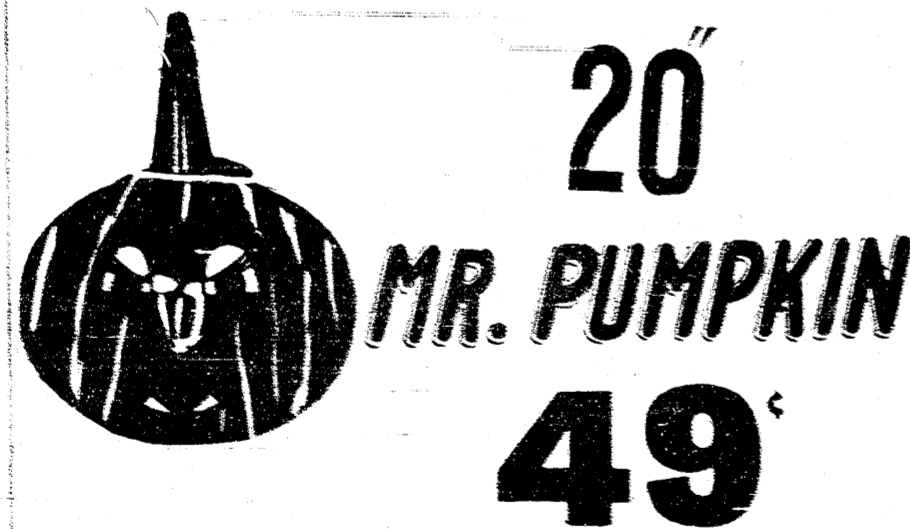

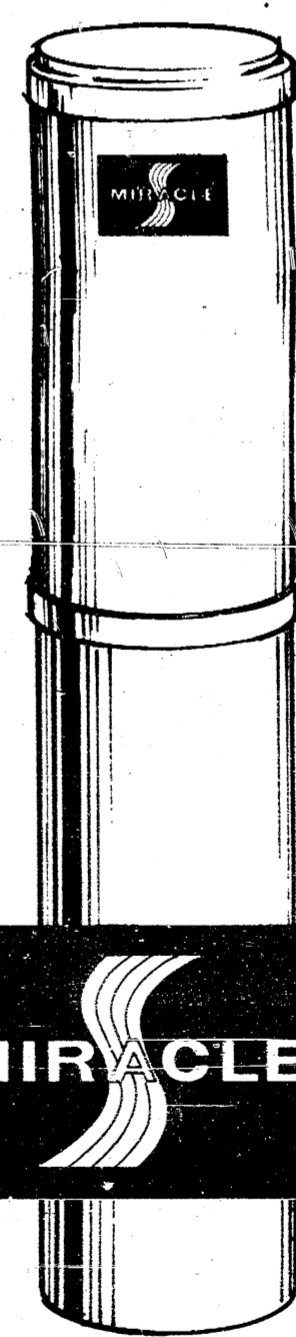

Theresa "Terry" McCarville, a 7 year old Clarenceville High School senior, will serve as chairman for Michigan's 1971 Christmas Seal Campaign. Miss McCarville was officially appointed by John R. Pettibone, Lansing, president of the Michigan Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association, state Christmas Seal Association, at their annual meeting in East Lansing on October 21.

Terry, as she likes to be called,

is the youngest of ten children of Mr. and Mrs. Edward McCarville of 19446 Weyher, Livonia. Her experience with tuberculosis came when she was eight years old. She spent four months in Maybury Sanatorium, Northville, and another year as an outpatient of Herman Keifer Hospital, Detroit, on a program of preventive medicine.

Prior to her appointment she reigned as Cinderella of the Christmas Seal fundraising Cinderella Ball in Detroit.

As Michigan's 1971 Christmas Seal Campaign Chairman, Terry will travel across the state helping to kick off the many community campaigns which begin in early November. She will encourage viewers, listeners, and readers of the mass media to use the traditional Christmas Seals, with the familiar double-barred cross, on all their holiday mail and Christmas packages, and to give generously to help support the work of the many Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Associations in Michigan. Christmas Seals support programs of tuberculin skin testing, smoking education programs in schools, smoking withdrawal clinics, breathing exercise programs for persons with respiratory ailments, cleaner air activities, professional education seminars, and many other important programs.

During her tour of Michigan Ter-

ry will also visit county TB hospitals to encourage children and adults in their personal fight to overcome TB.

MICHIGAN FARMERS

Michigan farmers will host nearly half a million hunters this fall, as an estimated 600,000 sportsmen take to the woods and fields in search of birds, deer and other game.

B. Dale Ball, director of the Michigan Department of Agriculture, points out that "our state has almost 12 million acres of farmland, most of it is used for hunting". In addition, Michigan has about 20 million acres of woodland, and over 60 percent is privately owned, mostly by farmers.

"Hunting on private property is a privilege, not a right," Ball said. Farmers' woodlots and fields provide a valuable recreational resource. Its availability depends to a great degree on the attitude and actions of those who invade it for sport.

"Many farmers share a love of hunting, and welcome city and suburban sportsmen to their land," Ball remarked, "as long as hunters don't damage crops or livestock."

Ball urged sportsmen to "ask permission at the farmhouse before you go into the fields. You'll often be rewarded with information on where crops are planted, where livestock is pastured, and you may even learn where the best cover for game is located."

"Many farmers rely on fences to protect their livestock and crops," Ball explained. Careless hunters can cause severe damage; there have even been cases where a big buck felled by a nimirod turned out to be a dead cow.

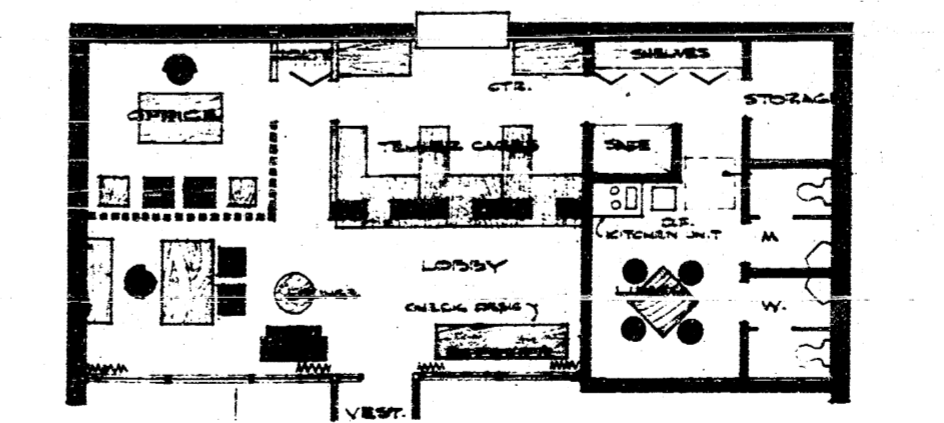
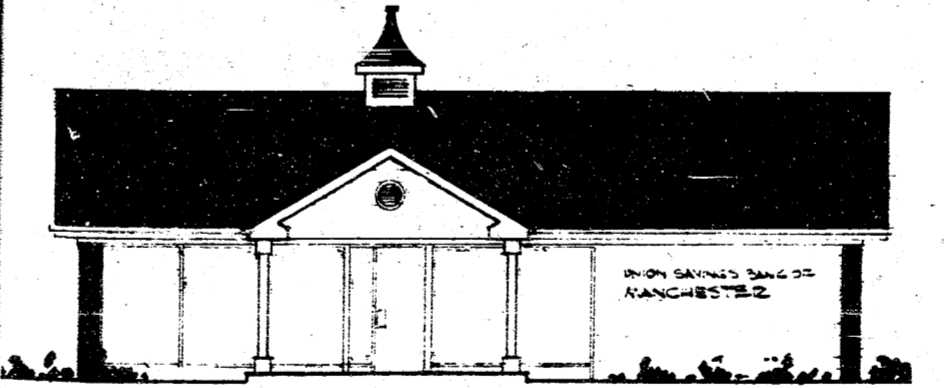

Education Week October 24-30

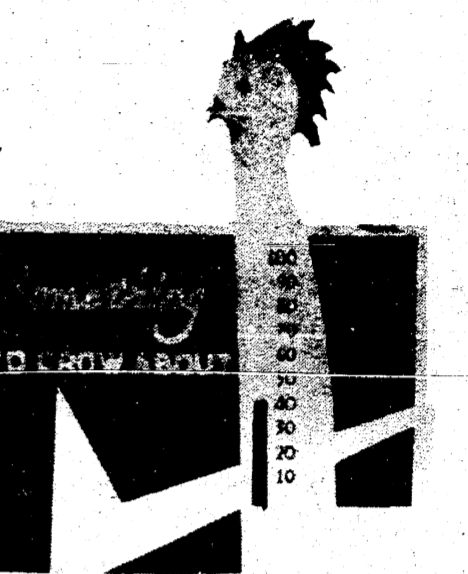
