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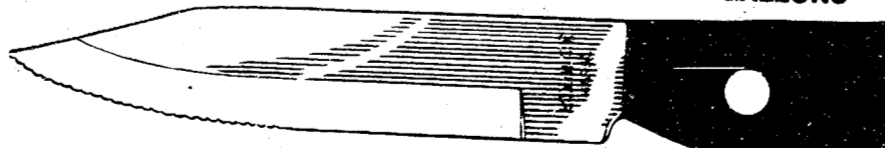

An actual border crossing is also shown in the film which helps portray Underground Evangelism's wide-scale Bible-smuggling ministry. Narrator is Pastor Stephen Bankov, a young man who recently escaped from behind the Curtain with his wife and two children.

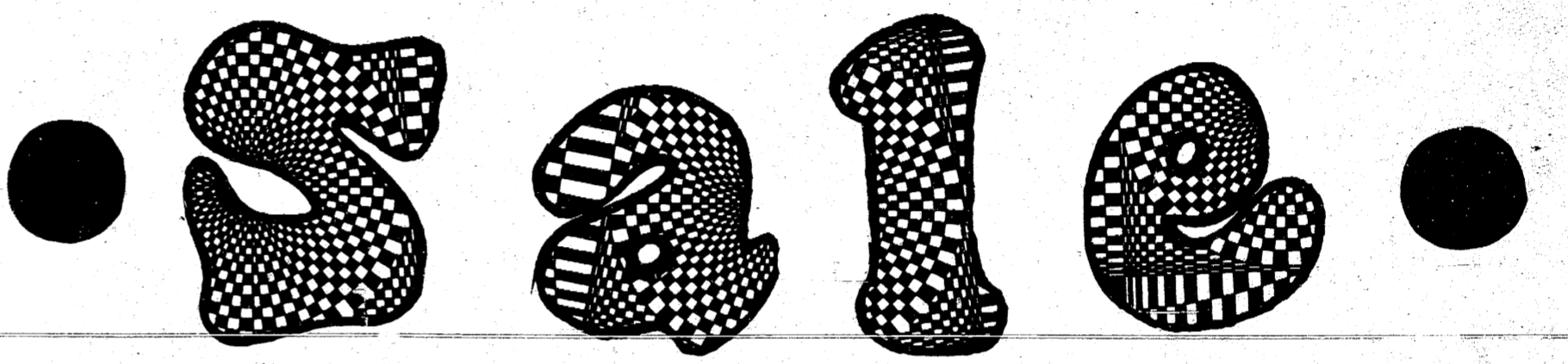

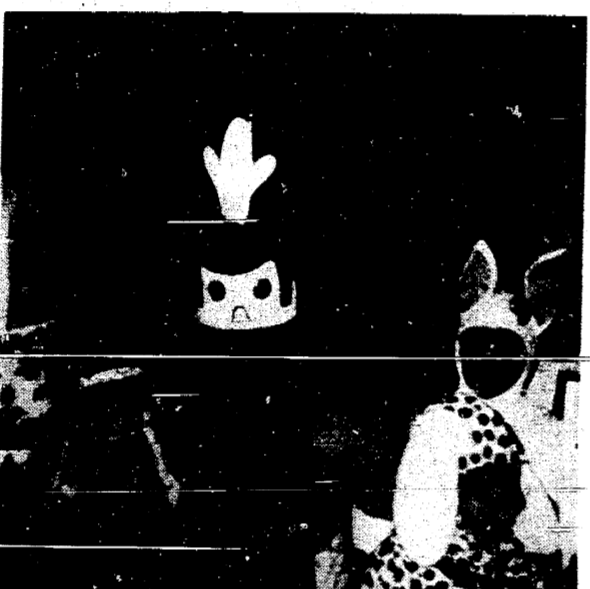

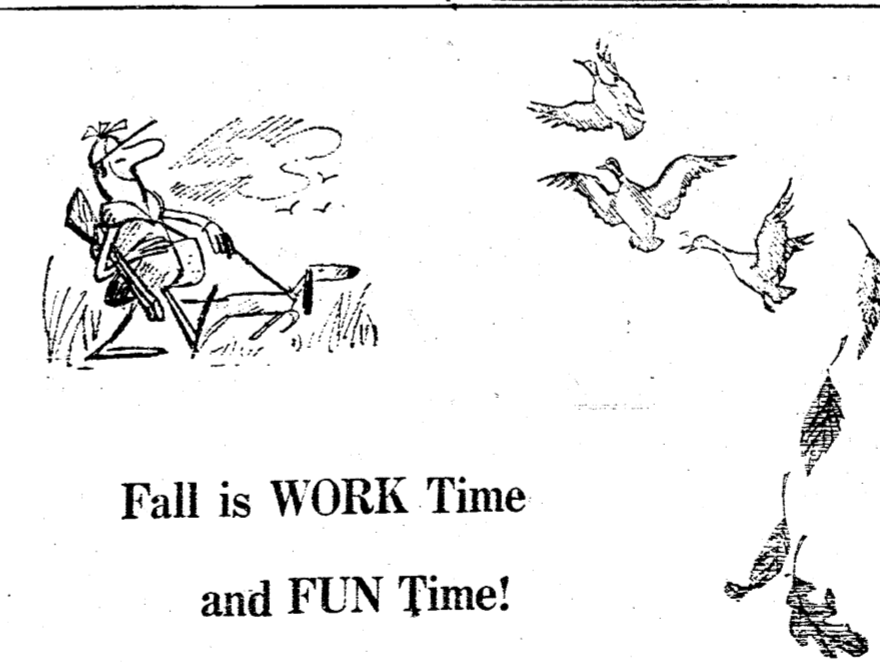

ORDINANCE NO. 4 MANCHESTER TOWNSHIP TRAFFIC CODE

AN ORDINANCE TO ADOPT BY REFERENCE THE UNIFORM TRAFFIC CODE FOR MICHIGAN CITIES, TOWNSHIPS AND VILLAGES.

The Township of Manchester Ordains:

Section 1. CODE ADOPTED

The Uniform Traffic Code for cities, townships, and villages promulgated by the Commissioner of State Police on February 14, 1958 and published in Supplement No. 13, and as amended both on February 14, 1961 and published

in Supplement No. 25, and on February 26, 1968 and published in Supplement No. 54, to the 1954 Michigan Administrative Code, in accordance with Public Act 62 of 1956, State of Michigan, is hereby adopted by reference as in this ordinance modified.

Section 2. REFERENCES IN CODE

References in the Uniform Traffic Code for Michigan Cities, Townships and Villages to "governmental Unit" shall mean the Township of Manchester, Washtenaw County, Michigan.

Section 3. NOTICE TO BE PUBLISHED

The Manchester Township Clerk shall publish this ordinance in the manner required by law and shall at the same time publish a supplementary notice setting forth the purpose of the said Uniform Traffic Code and of the fact that complete copies of the Code are available at the office of the Clerk for inspection by and distribution to the public at all times.

Section 4. WHEN EFFECTIVE.

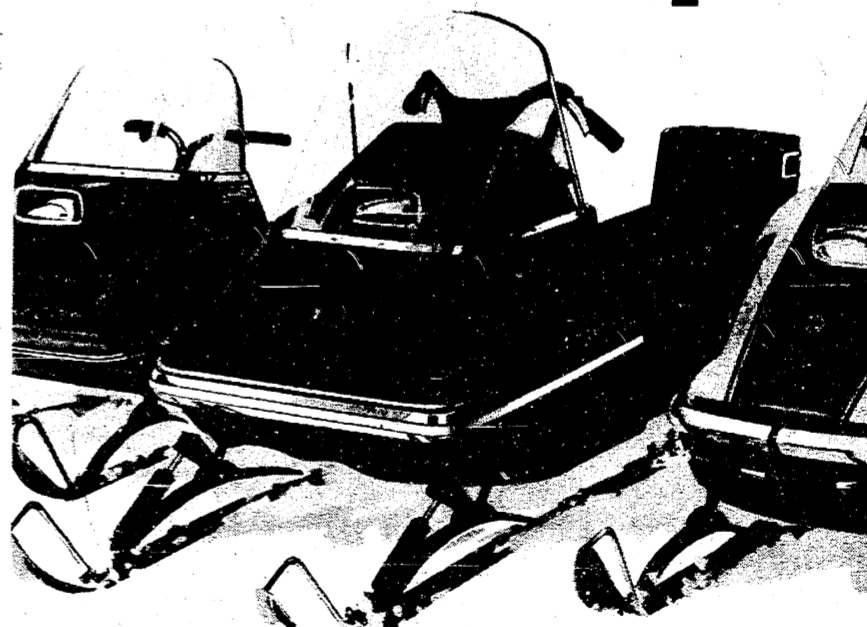
