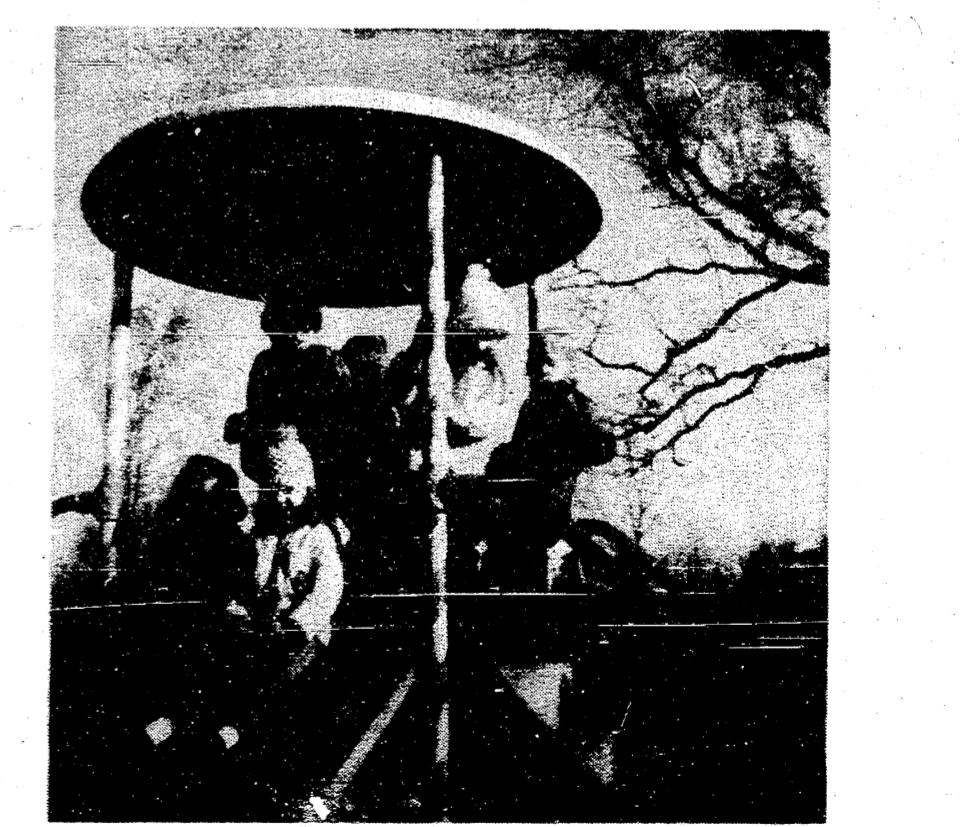
office, on the committee for the Junior-Senior Reception and a member of the Varsity Choir.

FAMILY SERVICE ASSIST YULE DRIVE

Manchester Family Service will again assist the Washtenaw County Christmas Bureau to help bring the joy of Christmas to those who are beset by misfortune. Joining in this appeal are the various churches in Manchester area, many clubs and organizations, Washtenaw County Sheriff's Department and individuals.

Referrals of families and individuals in need at Christmas can be made to the Salvation Army which is the clearing house for referrals in the County. Public Schools, the Michigan Department of Social Services, public health nurses, Child and Family Care Services, Catholic Social services and others make such referrals. Any family in need and not known to any of these sources may apply in person at the Salvation Army, 220 E. Washington Street, Ann Arbor, on Mondays through Friday from 9 a. m. to noon and 1:30 to 4 p. m. Applications cannot be taken by phone. If possible, applications should be made before the 10th of December.

The Christmas Bureau then places the Manchester School District names with the local Family Service agency which finances and distributes the food orders and attempts to make the season happier for the families.

The FHA will hold their "Scavenger Hunt" on Monday night, December 6, when they will call at homes troug-

out the area to collect canned goods and non-perishable foods to be used in the grocery boxes that go with the food orders to the families being remembered.

Last year Manchester Family Service assisted 34 families at Christmas time. 137 individuals were numbered in these families 72 of them were children under 12 years of age; 21 were Senior Citizens; 89 children received new toys from the Washtenaw County Sheriff's and Ann Arbor Police Departments "Pig Bowl Game" proceeds.

Food orders totaling \$313.00 were distributed according to the Salvation Army standards (orders ranging from \$5 to \$25 depending on the number of members in the family). Clothing and clothing orders were given in special cases. Furniture was also donated and distributed where the need was located. Individually dressed dolls were furnished by local seamstresses for many boxes. Anyone wishing to have a doll to dress for this purpose (to be ready by December 17th) may contact Mrs. Franklin Reck at 428-8852.

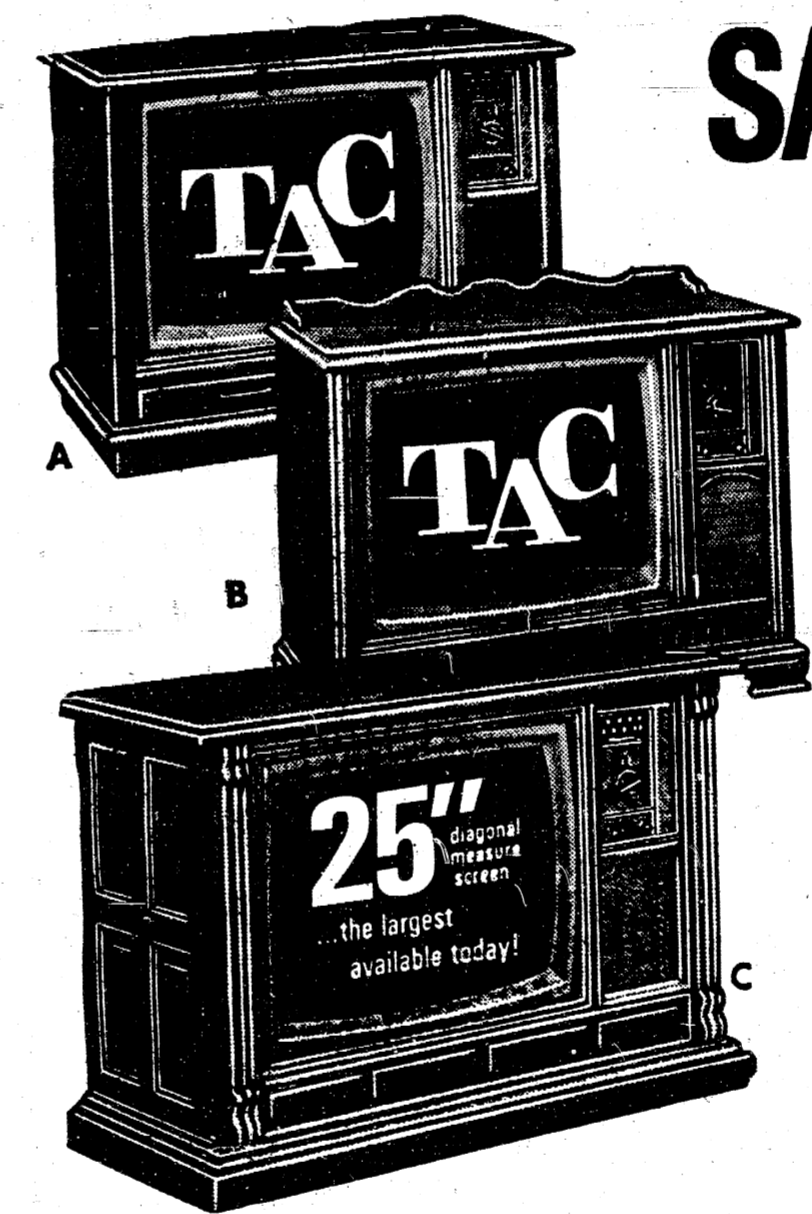

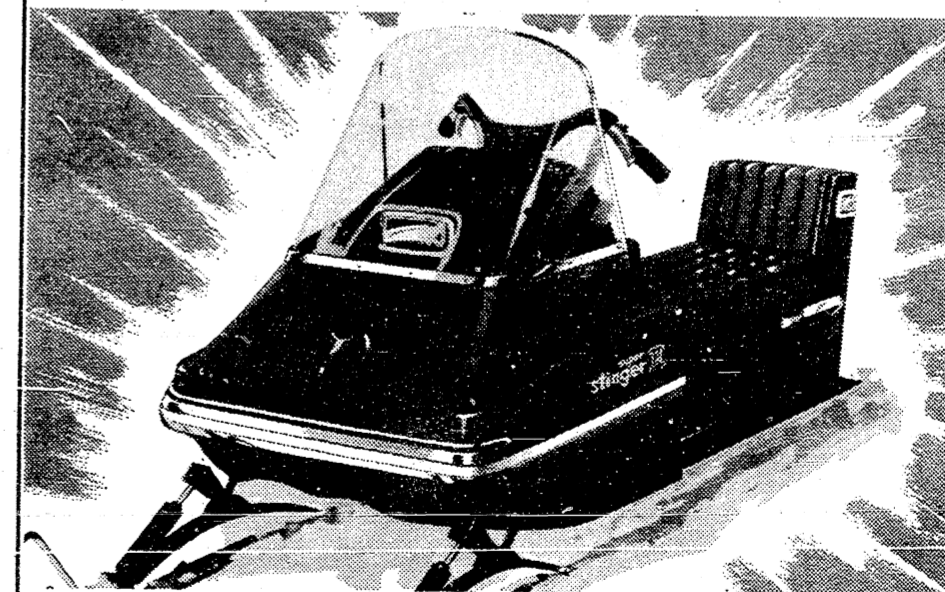

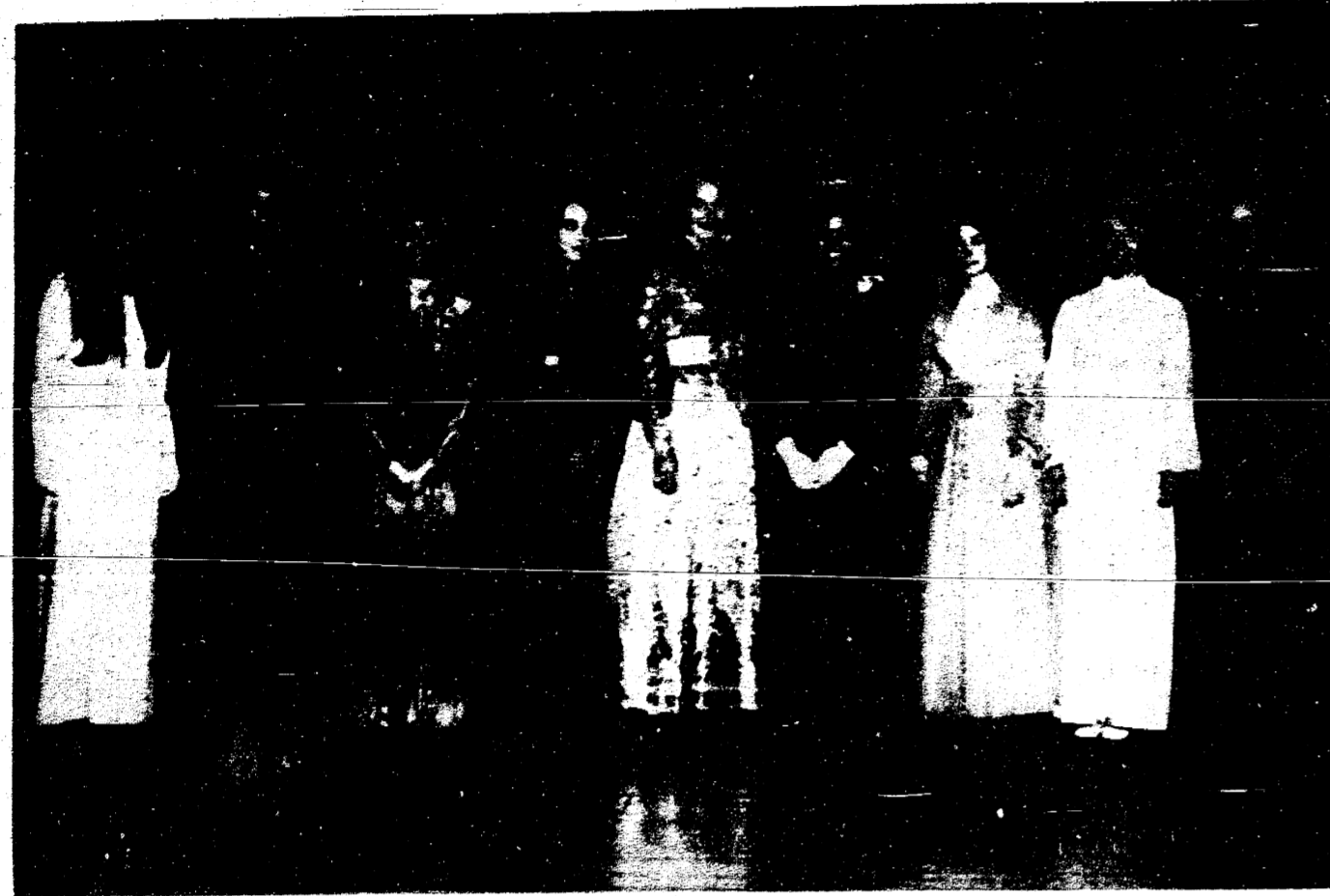
