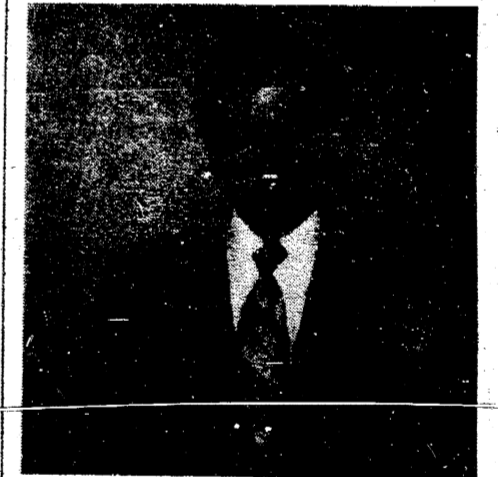
The evening ended with punch and Christmas cookies for all.

John Schaible JC Of The Month



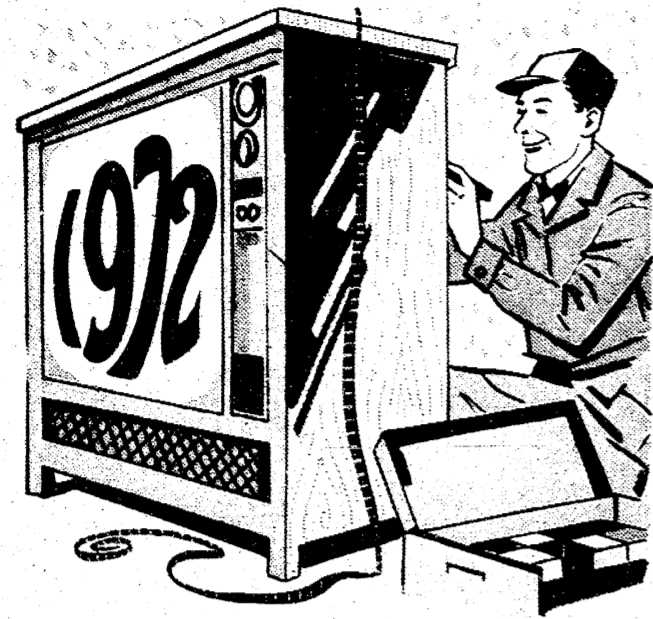

Mistletoe is one of the few live Christmas decorations that never takes root in the ground. It has a long history that dates back to the ancient Druids, and is considered to bring happiness, safety and good fortune as long as it did not touch the ground. Mistletoe hangs traditionally over doorways.

The Druids worshipped the parasitic shrub with its waxen white berries and glossy leaves. It was considered sacred—especially when growing on an oak tree—and has mystical origins and superstitions surrounding its use.

Mistletoe is generally found on apple, poplar, willow, lindens and hawthorne trees and grows from New Jersey to Florida and westward to Texas and Kansas. The English Mistletoe (*Viscum album*) is rarely found on oak trees but along the Pacific Coast.

Bells Ring Merrily—Christmas Is Here

Bells contribute to the sights as well as the sounds of the holiday season. They are a popular decoration and are used as ornaments on trees. Ringing across the ages and around the world, bells are a part of the traditions of Christmas.

Zurich, Switzerland, has long been noted for its beautiful bells. Every Christmas Eve, the Zurich bells ring out loud and clear, calling families to church.

This same tradition is repeated in thousands of other cities, where chimes and bells ring out at midnight from the steeples and spires of churches.

Be Careful About Christmas Hazards

Popular Christmas plants can have toxic effects if swallowed, and berries from mistletoe are highly poisonous. Children are treated each year as a result of swallowing toxic holiday decorations.

Hazardous man-made decorations include artificial snow sprays and fireplace colors.

Fire is another hazard during the holidays - take precautions in buying toys that are not highly flammable. Toys that are operated by alcohol, kerosene or gasoline are especially dangerous. Keep electric trains or spirit-fueled toys from under the Christmas tree while in use.

Use non-combustible or flame-proofed material to decorate the home or tree.

It is safer to put your tree up shortly before Christmas and taking it down soon after. Before a

tree is brought indoors, saw off the trunk at an angle at least an inch above the original cut, place it in water and keep the water level above the cut the entire time the tree is up.

If an artificial tree is used, select the type marked as being made of slow-burning materials. Metal trees are not a fire hazard, but may be a shock hazard. Indirect lighting is recommended.

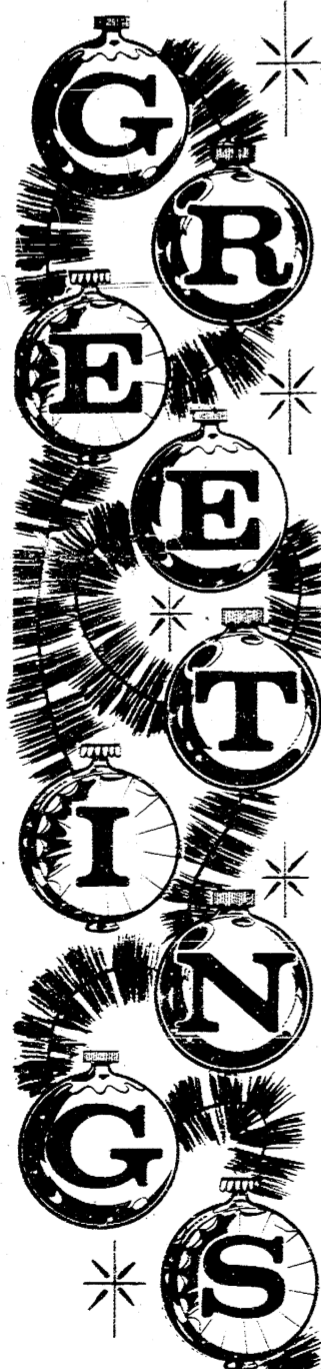

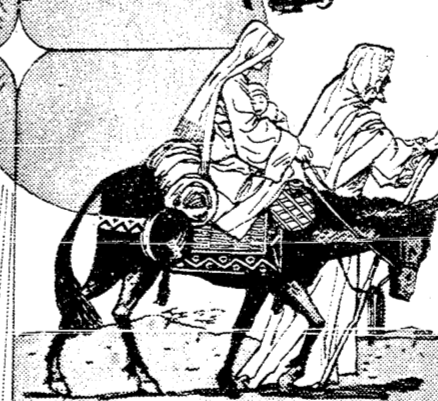

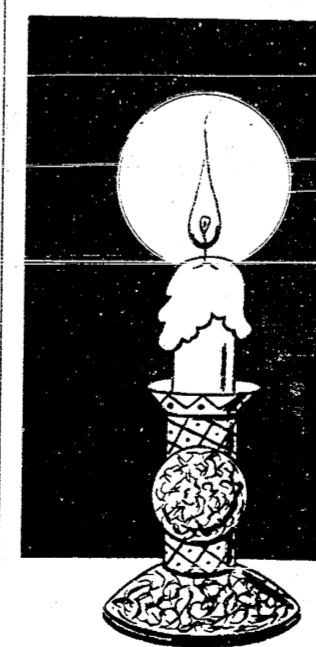

MANCHESTER TWP. MINUTES

The regular meeting of the Manchester Township Board convened at 8:00 p.m. on November 8, 1971. All members were present, Clarence Fielder, Chairman - Waldo Marx, Michael Wolfe, James Lyon, Lyle Widmayer and Dorothy Burch.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read, corrected and approved. Mr. Wolfe then read the Treasurer's report, which was accepted. He further stated that all Sales Tax money owing to the township each quarter, will in the future be returned to us directly from the State of Michigan, instead of Washtenaw County. The Dog Licenses are ready to go on sale December 1st.

Frank Skidmore, prospective purchaser of the Firelite Inn, entered the meeting. He was questioned by Mr. Fielder and the board members as to qualifications and his past Police record, which included Reckless Driving in 1964, Assault and Battery 1959 and Disorderly Conduct in 1956 for which he had served a 30 day sentence. A letter of recommendation from Attorney Roesch regarding the cleaning up of the premises of the Firelite Inn, dated August 2, 1971 was read for Mr. Skidmore. The Board then asked Mr. Skidmore about his plans for the future of the said premises should he be granted a license. His plans include a general up-grading, black-topping the parking lot, eventually carpeting the interior, serving light lunches, keeping open regular hours, and cleaning in general-all, this, only if it should become a paying proposition. However he cannot put a time limit in writing for us at this time.

The chairman declared a 5 minute adjournment for an executive session. The meeting re-convened at 8:32 p.m.

A motion was made by Lyons, to reject the application. It was seconded by Widmayer. Carried. Mr. Johnson, present owner of the Firelite Inn, asked to see a show of hands. The Roll was then called. It was unanimous that the application be disapproved. Carried.

Johnson and Skidmore left the meeting. The rejected application is to be immediately forwarded to the Liquor Control Commission.

Ordinances concerning the Uniform Traffic Code were read. Widmayer moved for adoption, Lyon seconded. A Roll-call was unanimous - carried. A copy of the code is read into the minutes as follows.

MANCHESTER TOWNSHIP, WASHTENAW COUNTY, MICHIGAN NOTICE OF ADOPTION OF UNIFORM TRAFFIC CODE

Notice is hereby given that pursuant to the provisions of Act 62 of the Public Acts of 1956, State of Michigan, the Uniform Traffic Code for cities, Townships and Villages was adopted by reference by the Township Board of Manchester Township, on the 8th day of November 1971.

The purpose of such Code is to regulate the operation of vehicles, to provide for the regulation and use of streets, highways and alleys and other public and semi-public places within the Township of Manchester, and to provide penalties for the violation of said Code.

Complete copies of the Uniform Traffic Code are available at the office of the Township Clerk for inspection and distribution to the public at all times.

No further or additional publication of the Uniform Traffic Code will be required or contemplated. Dated: November 8th, 1971

ORDINANCE NO. 4 MANCHESTER TOWNSHIP TRAFFIC CODE AN ORDINANCE TO ADOPT BY REFERENCE THE UNIFORM TRAFFIC CODE FOR MICHIGAN CITIES, TOWNSHIPS AND VILLAGES

The Township of Manchester ordains: Section 1. CODE ADOPTED

The Uniform Traffic Code of cities, townships and villages promulgated by the Commissioner of State Police on February 14, 1958 and published in Supplement no. 13, and as amended both on February 14, 1961 and published in Supplement No. 25 and on February 26, 1968 and published in Supplement No. 54, to the 1954 Michigan Administrative Code, in accordance with Public Act 62 of 1956, State of Michigan, is hereby adopted by reference as in this ordinance modified.

Section 2. REFERENCES IN CODE

References in the Uniform Traffic Code for Michigan Cities, Townships, and Villages to "Governmental Unit" shall mean the Township of Manchester, Washtenaw County, Michigan.

Section 3. NOTICE TO BE PUBLISHED

The Manchester Township Clerk shall publish this ordinance in the manner required by law and shall at the same time publish a supplementary notice setting forth the purpose of the said Uniform Traffic Code and of the fact that complete copies of the Code are available at the office of the Clerk for inspection by and distribution to the public at all times.

Section 4. WHEN EFFECTIVE

The Uniform Traffic Code will be in effect in this governmental unit thirty days (30) after lawful publication thereof and shall be published as above provided in the Manchester Enterprise, a newspaper having general circulation within Manchester Township, Washtenaw County, Michigan within ten (10) days after passage of this adopting ordinance.

Lyon made the motion that we adjourn to the Planning Commission Meeting. It was seconded by Mr. Wolfe, adjourned.

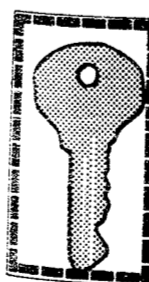

FIRST A FRIEND, THEN A HOST

Blood-alcohol calculators for holiday drivers now are being distributed free to all motorists by Automobile Club of Michigan, which is launching its sixth annual "First a Friend, Then a Host" (FAFTH) program this week. Through its FAFTH campaign each Christmas and New Year's, Auto Club points out that eight of every 10 motorist will drink and drive. Motorists and party hosts are asked to set safe alcohol consumption limits this holiday to help cut traffic deaths. To help them, Auto Club General Manager Fred Rehm is shown with an enlarged blood-alcohol calculator, which emphasizes the sensible use of alcohol by both drivers and hosts. The actual size calculator—which allows a person to determine how much driving ability has been affected based on body weight plus the amount of alcohol drunk and how long a person has been drinking—is one of three educational items available to all Michigan motorists this holiday.

Bottle sleeves, which can be slipped over liquor bottles stress the responsibility party hosts have for guests who will drive after drinking. Another new item this holiday is a pamphlet titled "ONE DRINK (CAN BE) TOO MANY". It emphasizes the dangers of driving after drinking two ounces of alcohol, even though a person looks and feels sober. Auto Club urges that this pamphlet be made available as an educational aid, especially for every motorist from 18 through 20 who will take his or her first legal drink this New Year's and then drive.

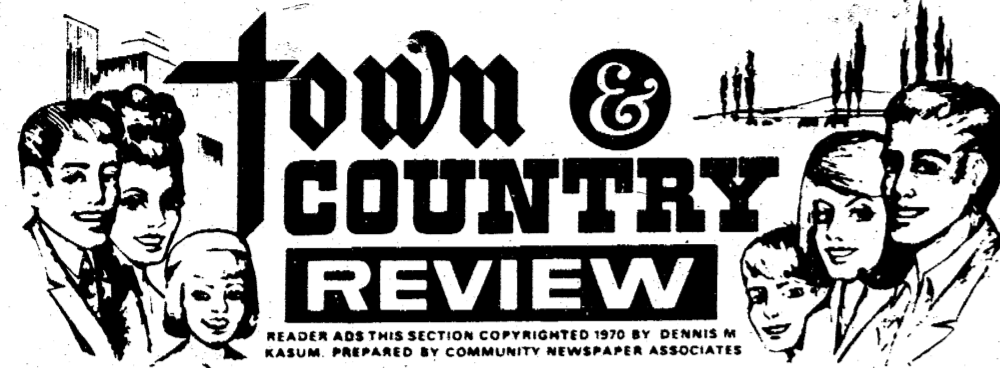
