## Norway Sardines Dress Up Potato Salad

This is the time of year when we start thumbing through recipe books for quick and easy party ideas. The prerequisites are always tasty, eye-appealing treats that can be fixed ahead of time.

One new touch for that old buffet mainstay — potato salad — is a topping of Norway sardines. Smoky sardines offer a savory mellow flavor that complements the creamy smoothness of the potato salad. And they add gourmet glamour for pennies.

Sardines are definitely a party-going fish. They're almost an instant hors d'oeuvre all by themselves when they're put on crackers, breads, and other snack items. Plus they store right on your food shelves, always ready for action.

## NORDIC POTATO SALAD

(Makes 1 1/2 quarts)

- 3 pounds potatoes
  - 1/3 cup salad oil
  - 2 tablespoons lemon juice
  - 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
  - 1/2 teaspoon dill weed
  - 1/4 teaspoon pepper
  - 1/2 cup sliced green onion
  - 2 tablespoons drained capers
  - Crisp lettuce
  - 2 cans (3 1/2 oz. each) Norway sardines
  - 2 hard-cooked eggs
  - 1 tablespoon chopped parsley
- Scrub potatoes, and cook in boiling water just until tender, about 20 minutes. Drain, cool sufficiently to handle, peel and slice to make 1 1/2 quarts. Combine oil, lemon juice, salt, dill weed and pepper in a small jar. Cover and shake to blend well. Pour over warm potatoes, and mix gently; chill. Add onion and capers, and mix lightly. Spoon potatoes on bed of crisp lettuce. Drain sardines and arrange over potatoes. Garnish with sliced hard cooked eggs and sprinkle with parsley.

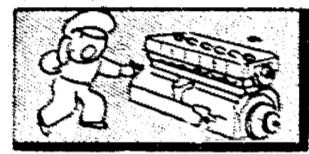

As provided by Section 496, Act No. 116, Public Acts of 1954 As Amended.

From 8 o'clock a.m. until 8 o'clock p.m. on each said day for the purpose of REVIEWING the REGISTRATION and REGISTERING each of the qualified electors in said TOWNSHIP, CITY or VILLAGE as SHALL PROPERLY apply therefor.

The names of no person but an ACTUAL RESIDENT of the precinct at the time of registration, and entitled under the Constitution, if remaining such resident, to vote at the next election, shall be entered in the registration book.

### ELECTOR UNABLE TO MAKE PERSONAL APPLICATION, PROCEDURE

SEC. 504. Any elector who is unable to make personal application for registration because of physical disability or absence from the Township, City or Village in which his legal residence is located, may be registered prior to the close of registration before any election or primary election by securing from the Clerk of the Township, City or Village or which is located by legal residence, duplicate registration cards and executing in duplicate the registration affidavit before a notary public or other officer legally authorized to administer oaths and returning such registration cards to the Clerk of the Township, City or Village before the close of office hours on the last day of registration prior to any election or primary election. The notary public or other officer administering the oaths shall sign his name on the file for the signatures of the registration officer and designate his title.

### UNREGISTERED PERSONS NOT ENTITLED TO VOTE

SEC. 491. The names of electors at any election or primary election in this State, or in any District, County, Township, City or Village thereof, shall not receive the vote of any person whose name is not registered in the registration book of the Township, Ward or Precinct in which he offers to vote. (As provided under Act 116, P. A. 1954.)

### TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION, APPLICATION, TIME

SEC. 506. Any registered elector may upon change of residence within the Township, City or Village cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by filing with the Clerk of the Township, City or Village a statement, signed by the elector, giving the date of removal, the date of registration, and the address from which he was last registered, or by applying in person for a transfer. The Clerk shall update through the last address, ward and precinct number and record the new address, ward and precinct number on each registration card, and shall place the original registration card in proper precinct file. Such transfer shall not be made after the 15th Friday next preceding any election or primary election. (Unless such file is closed on a legal holiday in which event registration shall be accepted during the next full working day.)

### TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION ON ELECTION DAY

SEC. 507. Any registered elector who has removed from one election precinct to a Township, City or Village to another precinct in the same Township, City or Village and has not received such removal with the local Clerk shall submit a number of registration papers. Giving his true residence address through the date of removal, with the date of election in the precinct in which he is registered at the next ensuing primary or election. The names of electors in change of the registration records shall compare the registration returns with the register upon the application's registration card and, if the appropriate comparison, then the register shall correct such list by affixing his initials upon so-called register. The application for transfer, after having signed an application to vote as provided in Section 502 of the act, shall be permitted to vote in such precinct for that primary or election year. The application for transfer shall be filed with the Township, City or Village Clerk who shall transfer such voter's registration in accordance with the application. When the names of any voter in a Township, City or Village has been changed, it shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clerk to make the change to show the proper name of elector in the registration record, and it shall be necessary for the elector to change his registration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote.

### Township Report

The regular December meeting of the Manchester Township Board was called to order at 8:10 p.m. on December 20, 1971. All members were present. Mr. Clarence Fielder, Chairman; Waldo Marx, Michael Wolfe, Lyle Widmayer and James Lyons, and Dorothy Burch. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

Mike Wolfe gave the treasurer's report. At present, we have in the General Fund \$5,056.98. We have collected \$74,657 in property taxes to date. He reports that the Township finances are in good shape.

The chairman then asked for a reading of the bills to be paid. They are recorded as follows: The bill for the Chloride must be paid after January 1st. Fire Department bills totaling \$117.30 were presented.

Lyle Moore's expense report of \$66.73 for attending the Constable's Association meeting, and his bill for mileage on Halloween for the sum of \$13.70 were also presented. Widmayer made a motion that the above items be paid. Lyons seconded. Carried.

Mr. William Rhoades, a guest at the meeting, found a Road Sign, English and Henzie" near his property. He wanted to know who is responsible for replacing the sign and to whom he should report that he had found it. The County Road Commission erects and replaces all road signs. He also reports that a neighbor found three deer heads in his yard. Widmayer suggests that he notify the Conservation officer to see if they were slaughtered illegally. Fielder will also alert the constables. Mr. Rhoades will follow through.

Mr. Wolfe reports that Mrs. Eberts on Sharon Hollow Road says that she will not pay her taxes until the road is repaired. The County is responsible for all road repairs.

Mr. Oakley and Mr. Szabo from Twin Lakes also have a road problem. They want the hill on the road leading into their property cut down and the chuck holes filled in. They are protesting to the Township board before they go to the County Road Commission.

Mrs. Gladys McDowell of Horton presented an application from the Liquor Control Commission for a Class "C" license and transfer of license from Mr. Johnson of the Firelite Inn. She listed her planned improvements to the property if she should be granted a license, as follows:

1. To place insulation between the ceiling beams
2. To repair the restroom floors and install fans
3. To put water in the restrooms
4. To blacktop the lot and carpet the inside in the spring
5. To remodel the kitchen
6. To cement block the back windows which are now boarded up.
7. Light the outside of the building and install lighted glass blocks around the doorway of the front door.
8. Place ventilating fans in walls on each end of building
9. Change all the furniture and refrigerators
10. Replace all the present wooden doors with steel doors.

She told us that she owned the Glass Slipper in Jackson from 1968 until it burned down last November. Mr. Fielder asked if she was prepared to put all the above improvements in writing, that we would only ask a reasonable time limit for the accomplishment of all the above listed repairs. We will be agreeable to her application on contingent until we receive her written word. Lyons made a motion that we approve the application. Widmayer seconded. Carried.

Bridgewater and Freedom Townships have returned signed Fire Contracts. Sharon Township Board meets after January 1st. They will sign theirs then. There will be no problem. Widmayer made the motion that the supervisor and clerk sign the contracts with Bridgewater and Freedom Townships. Lyons seconded the motion. Carried.

Lyons said that Norvell Township is circulating a petition among the residents who have Manchester telephones, for fire protection from Manchester Fire Department. They owe us \$300.00 from a previous fire. If they will pay that amount, we will protect them under the same contract agreement as the other townships.

We will definitely have a barking dog ordinance before the next meeting, for the board to pass on.

In case of fires in other townships which we cover, James Kensler makes a report, The Clerk makes a report, and sends a copy to the township involved.

James Lyons will submit his resignation about January first 1972 to be effective January 10th.

Widmayer made the motion that we adjourn. Lyons seconded. Carried. Meeting adjourned at 9:25 p.m.

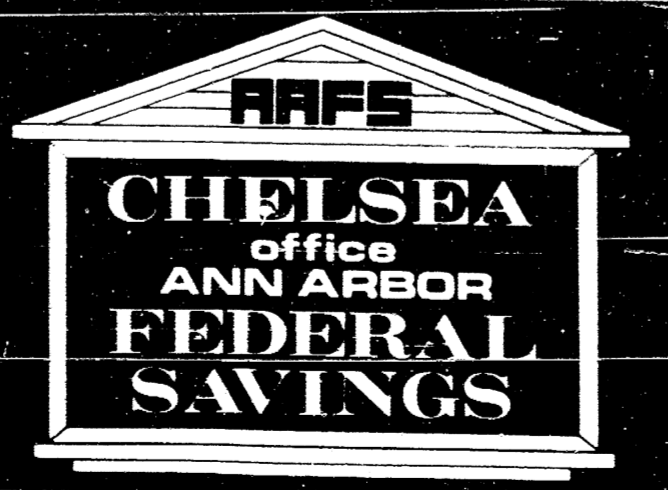
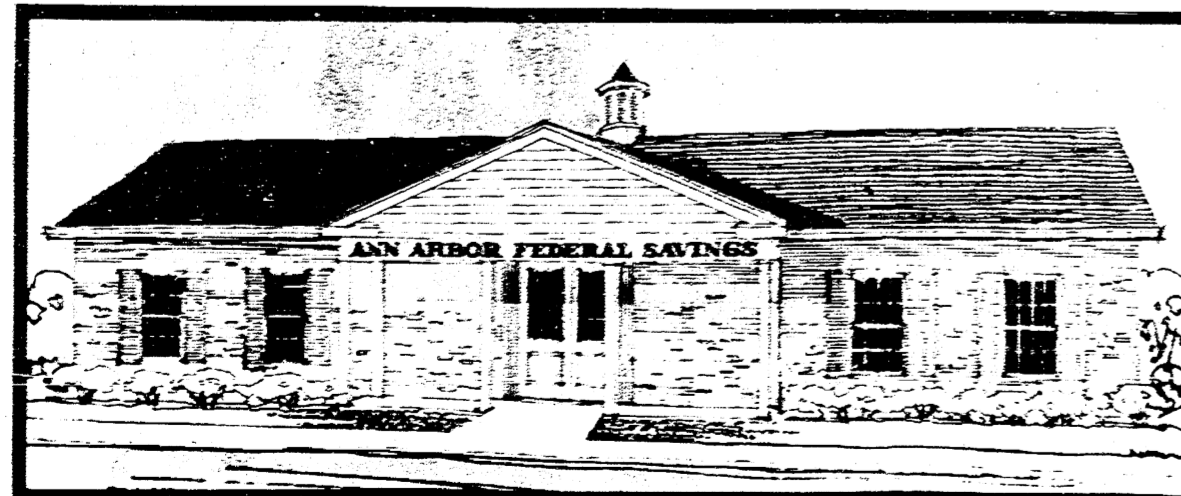

## AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE KEEPING AND CONTROL OF CERTAIN ANIMALS WITHIN THE TOWNSHIP OF MANCHESTER

THE TOWNSHIP OF MANCHESTER ORDAINS:

### Section 1.01 - Title

This ordinance shall be known and may be cited as "The Animal Control Ordinance of Manchester Township."

### Section 2.01 - Definitions

For the purpose of this ordinance:

- A. Animal means live stock, poultry, dogs, cats and reptiles.
- B. Live stock means horses, stallions, colts, geldings, mares, sheep, rams, lambs, bulls, bullocks, steers, heifers, cows, calves, mules, jacks, jennets, burros, goats, kids and swine, and fur-bearing animals being raised in captivity.
- C. Poultry means all domestic fowl, ornamental birds and game birds.
- D. Owner when applied to the proprietorship of an animal means every person having a right of property in the animal, and every person who keeps or harbors the animal or has it in his care, and every person who permits the animal to remain on or about any premises occupied or controlled by him.
- E. Reasonable Control means a dog shall be deemed to be under reasonable control when such dog is on the premises of its owner or when such dog, not being on the premises of its owner, is with and under the control of its owner, his agent or some member of the owner's family.

### Section 3.01 - Requiring that Dogs be Licensed and Vaccinated

A. It shall be unlawful for any person to own, keep or possess any dog over the age of six (6) months, within the Township of Manchester that does not at all times wear a collar with a license and vaccination tag attached thereto as provided for by the laws of the State of Michigan.

B. It shall be unlawful for any person except the owner or the authorized agent of such owner to remove any license or vaccination tag from a dog.

### Section 3.02 - Prohibiting Dogs from Running at Large

It shall be unlawful for the owner of any dog in the Township of Manchester to allow such dog to stray beyond the premises of such owner unless under reasonable control, or for the owner of any female dog to permit said female to go beyond the premises of such owner when she is in heat unless such dog is held properly in leash; Further, it shall be unlawful for the owner of any dog not to have such dog under reasonable control at all times.

### Section 3.03 - Barking Dogs and Ferocious Dogs and Cats

A. It shall be unlawful for the owner of any dog in the Township of Manchester to allow such dog to howl, bark, whine or otherwise create noise disturbing or annoying other persons in their reasonable use and enjoyment of premises other than the premises of such owner.

B. It shall be unlawful for the owner of any dog or cat that is vicious, ferocious, or which without provocation, has bitten or otherwise injured any person to own or allow such dog or cat to be kept or maintained in the Township of Manchester, unless so confined as to prevent injury or threat of injury of any person by such dog or cat.

### Section 4.01 - Prohibiting Offensive Keeping of Animals

It shall be unlawful for the owner of any animal in the Township of Manchester to allow such animal to be kept or maintained on premises in any manner causing noxious or offensive odors to be emitted from such premises.

### Section 5.01 - Prohibiting Animal Running at Large

It shall be unlawful for the owner of any animal in the Township of Manchester to allow such animal to go at large upon the streets or other public ways of the Township, or upon lands of other persons without the consent of the owner or lessee of such lands.

### Section 5.02 - Prohibiting Livestock and Poultry Entering Private Lands

It shall be unlawful for the owner of any live stock or poultry in the Township of Manchester to allow such live stock or poultry, while under the control of such owner, to enter upon lands of other persons without the consent of the owner or lessee of such lands.

### Section 5.03 - Requiring Enclosure of Livestock and Poultry

It shall be unlawful for the owner of any livestock and poultry in the Township of Manchester to allow such livestock and poultry to be kept or maintained on any premises without such livestock and poultry being enclosed within pens, shelter or fences in a manner to prevent such livestock and poultry from straying beyond such premises.

### Section 6.01 - Violations and Penalties

Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall upon conviction thereof be subject to a fine of not more than One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars, and the costs of prosecution thereof, by imprisonment in the County jail for a period not to exceed ninety (90) days, or both.

### Section 7.01 - Repealing Clause

All ordinances, resolutions or orders, or parts thereof in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are to the extent of such conflict hereby repealed, provided that the provisions of this Ordinance shall not be construed to amend or repeal any provision of the Zoning Ordinance of Manchester Township.

### Section 7.02 - Severing Clause

If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall be held invalid, the invalidity of such section, paragraph, clause or provision shall not effect any of the other provisions of this Ordinance.

### Section 7.03 - Effective Date

A true copy of this Ordinance shall be published in accordance with the law within ten days after the date hereof, in the Manchester Enterprise, a newspaper having general circulation in said Township, and such ordinance shall be effective thirty days after such publication.

## Summary of Snowmobile Ordinance

Summary of the Village of Manchester Snowmobile Ordinance No. 89: "It is unlawful for any person to operate a snowmobile on the private property of another without the express permission to do so by the owner or occupant of said property."

"On public school grounds, park property, playgrounds, recreational areas without express provision or permission to do so by the proper public authority."

"In a manner so as to create loud, unnecessary or unusual noise so as to disturb or interfere with the peace and quiet of other persons."

"In a careless, reckless or negligent manner so as to endanger the safety of any person or the property of any other person."

"Within the right-of-way of any public street within the Village unless the operator shall have a valid driver's license issued pursuant to Act 300 Public Acts of Michigan for 1949 as amended, or is accompanied by a licensed driver, who is actually occupying a seat in the vehicle."

"On Main Street between the intersections of Riverside Street and Main Street and Washington Street and Main Street, between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m."

"The Village Council may, by resolution, prohibit the operation of snowmobiles within the right-of-way of the pub-

lic roads or streets or other village property within the village when in their opinion the public safety and welfare so requires."

The above summary of the Village of Manchester Ordinance for operation and regulation of Snowmobiles is being published for the information of the owners and operators of snowmobiles in the Village of Manchester due to many complaints received by Police and the Village Council as to the operation and trespassing upon the properties of others. It is also felt that if due care in the operation of snowmobiles within the Village cannot be done, the village council will review this ordinance and refer to the last quoted section of the ordinance.
