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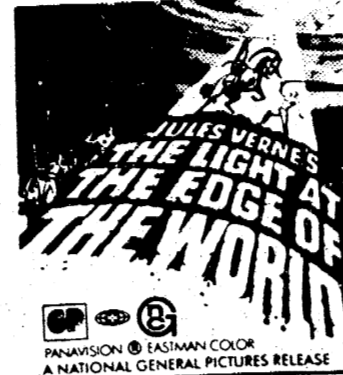

## The Gilbert Luckhardt Family Visits Australia



Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert Luckhardt of Pleasant Lake with son, Mark, recently returned from a month long trip to Australia.

For Betty it was a return to her homeland and for son, Mark, who celebrated his 12th birthday on their first day in Sydney, it was a wonderful opportunity to travel around the world to the place his mother was born.

Betty's grandparents had traveled from England in sailing ships and settled and raised their family in the new country. A resident of Sydney, a huge seaport on the Southeast Coast, Betty met Gilbert as a girl of 15, when he was in and out of the port while serving his six year span of service in the U.S. Navy. The Second World War came and went and Betty was invited to visit the States. The visit proved to be an extended one, for she was married at Bethel Church and remained to raise her family here.

Once before Betty took a trip home with her baby, but this time husband Gilbert and son Mark made a family journey together, leaving at home daughters Karen and Linda.

Leaving Detroit on December 3, they stopped in Hawaii for 2 days, only to find that the beach at Waikiki, which during the war had been an open beach with only the Royal Hawaiian Hotel in evidence, was now solidly built up and very crowded.

On to Sydney on Quantas Airline (Australian). A reunion with her twin brother, and Betty felt to Canberra again. A special side trip to Canberra, the capitol was a highlight. Similar to our own Capitol, Washington D. C., the area is specially set aside for the purpose of government. ## Marching Mothers



The Mother's March for the March of Dimes will begin in the village of Manchester on Wednesday, January 26th and continue through Saturday, the 29th. During those four days approximately 35 women will attempt to raise as much money as possible to help carry on the struggle against the second greatest destroyer of human life - birth defects.

The original Mother's March was organized with only one purpose - defeat of the dreaded crippler, Infantile Paralysis. The purpose was accomplished and Polio is no longer a threat but the defeat of that one disease took seventeen years, millions of dollars and much hard work on the part

of many dedicated people in and out of the medical profession. Most of the money used in that long battle was raised by the Mother's March for the March of Dimes.

Mrs. Wm. Bunney, chairman of Manchester's Mother's March, points out that in recent years many major causes of birth defects have been eradicated entirely, as with Polio, via a vaccine, such as Rubella or German Measles and the RH problem. However, birth defects can never be completely eliminated as long as human beings are born, not hatched in incubators or baby factories.

There are many promising advances being implemented every day that lessen the incidence of abnormal births and furnish corrective solutions for those who are born with defects. Many of the serious, disabling diseases and ailments of middle years and old age are now being diagnosed in infancy as birth defects, and as such, can be corrected or treated with much less cost, both monetary and that of human suffering.

Mrs. Bunney says that one of the questions most often asked of her volunteers is, "Who has the March of Dimes helped in Manchester?" It is a question, both difficult and easy to answer. Files on direct patient aid given to families by the National Foundation March of Dimes are confidential and no names are generally released to the public but it can be said without fear of contradiction that every child in this area fits directly from the facilities for diagnosis and treatment made available in part by The March of Dimes.

**Churches Aid Blood Program**

All of the area churches are assisting the campaign for more blood donors at the Bloodmobile which is to be held at St. Mary's church in Manchester Valentine's Day, February 14, from 12 to 6 p. m.

Church bulletins have carried the announcements and pledge cards are available from the church recruiting chairmen who are conducting telephone campaigns among their members. If donors representing 20 per cent of the number of families counted in the church membership give blood during the year, all of the church members, their parents, grandparents and their children over 18 who are physically unable to give are assured of free blood no matter where they live in the United States and many parts of Canada. This same coverage for the individual family, known as the Family Plan, is obtained when one or more members donate blood at a Red Cross clinic. To insure this additional coverage, many more donors are needed.

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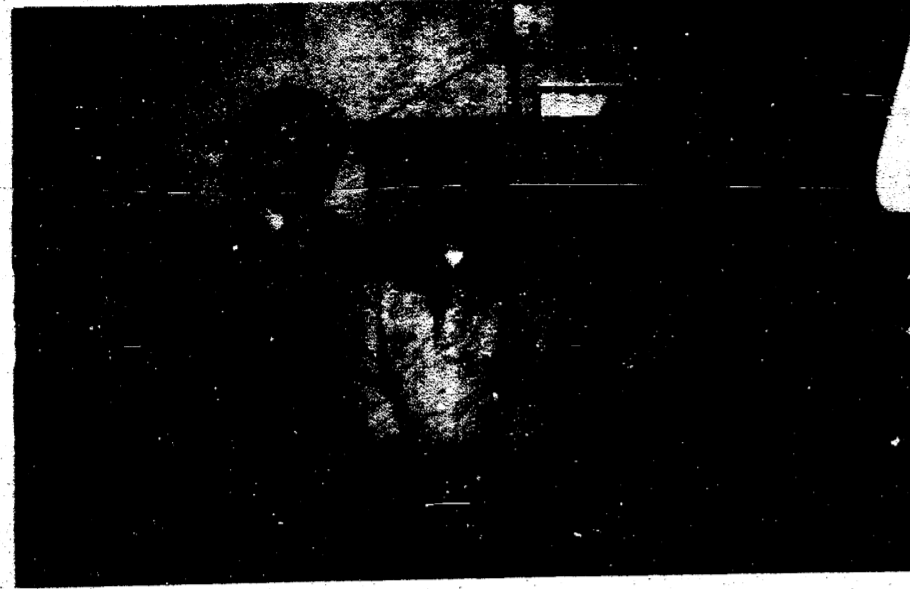

The weather is, of course, opposite to ours "down under", for the three months of December, January, and February have temperatures of 95 or above, while the remaining nine months have 60 to 70 temperatures.

A surprising twist in language required Betty to translate, for many of the people speak a cockney dialect. # Question:

I have heard a preacher say that everyone is a sinner. I don't believe it. There are so many good people in the world, how could anyone call them sinners.

# Answer:

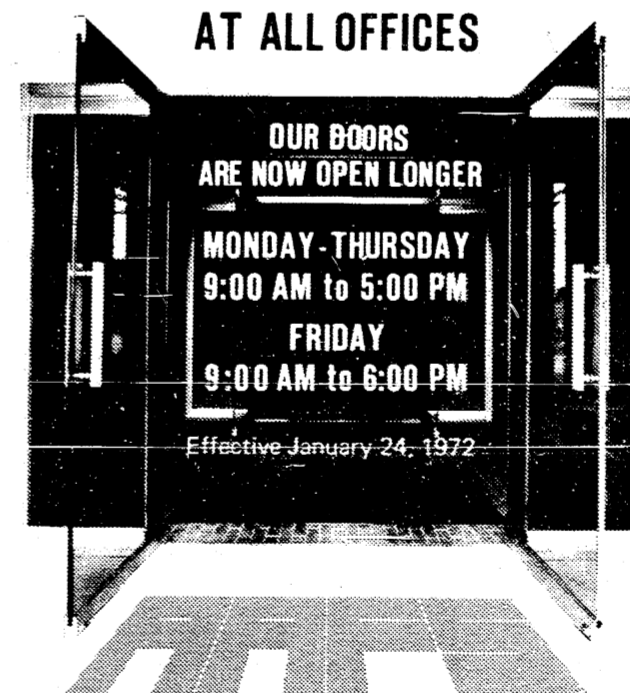

## Gallon Club Has 76 Members

Seventy six men and women recorded from this area have given a gallon (8 units) of blood or more to the Manchester Red Cross Blood Club in the past twenty years. Ten of this number have given two, and four have given three gallons!

The community owes these people, as well as all who have given their blood that their neighbors may be safe in time of need, a debt of gratitude. But better yet, if you are capable of being a blood donor, isn't it time that you did your share? One never expects to need blood, but over 150 pints were used by our area in 1971 without any exceptionally outstanding cases.

True, not everyone can give blood and the Red Cross is especially careful about the donor as well as the recipient. If one is deferred at a clinic, the Red Cross will tell him why and his prospects of giving at another time. This care is reflected in the esteem with which hospitals and the American Medical Society view volunteer blood.
