MICHIGAN FARM BUREAU

One of the major problems when our environment is discussed today is correct information and balanced understanding about the issue.

For hundreds of years a great deal of the population was not interested in conserving our environment. Our past mistakes have accumulated and many now feel we must correct them all in one grand sweep. This is an impossible task but should not stop us from making major headway.

Agriculturists learned many years ago that good conservation was a necessity by the very disciplines of good production that meant proper and efficient use of land.

If farmers over-use or mis-use pesticides, insecticides or fertilizer, they pay the consequences in a lower net return.

We need to understand that manures and animal wastes are the finest natural fertilizers available and are a part of the natural re-cycling process. Only through animals can unusable high cellulose foods be transported into one of the most richly fertilized foods in the world -- meat.

In this age of space exploration, scientists of the soil have confirmed that proper fertilization of farm crops to increase production also increases the use of carbon dioxide from the air and increases the release of significant amounts of oxygen to the atmosphere.

These are but a few incidents in the vital story of our land and its ecology that we who are concerned about our environment must understand and relate to the millions of people around us.

Correct information, scientific solutions and understanding must be used in place of emotions, political schemes and half-truths if we are to cure the many environmental ills.

BOTTLES AND JARS BRING \$174,000 TO MICHIGAN GROUPS

More than 34-million bottles and jars collected by various Michigan groups were recycled here at Owens-Illinois Inc., glass manufacturing plant during 1971.

The company paid \$174,210 for 8,710 tons of the used glass containers in the calendar year. The payments averaged approximately \$20 per ton or about one-half cent per bottle.

"Owens-Illinois is delighted by the growing public interest for glass bottle recycling," according to Wayne Gibson, plant manager.

"The bottle reclamation program is a very important first step towards the long range goal of total recycling of all usable materials found in refuse but it is just the first step. "We envision the day when all solid waste will be sorted mechanically and all its usable components will be salvaged for recycling. This is the only practical long term solution to the nation's refuse problem from an ecology point of view," Gibson said.

Kent L. Wold, midwest public affairs manager of the Glass Container Manufacturers Institute, says that bottle reclamation centers have been established by nearly 100 manufacturing plants operated by GCM companies in 25 states.

The bottles are sorted according to color and then crushed into cullet, which is added to the sand, limestone and other raw materials that are melted down in furnaces to produce glass for new containers.

The Charlotte plant is Michigan's only glass reclamation facility.

Saga of a Sumptuous Dessert

According to legend, there once was a hostess who served a sumptuous dessert called Rote Grütze. It caused raves among her friends and everyone asked for the recipe, but she merely smiled and said it was a family secret. Although her secret was never discovered, here's an easy version of this traditional German dessert that can be made with vanilla tapioca pudding, the ingredient that makes it as simple to prepare as it is to serve. Try it soon and create a few raves among your friends.

Rote Grütze (Raspberry Pudding)
1 package (3 1/4 oz.) Jell-O 1/2 cup claret or Burgundy wine
Vanilla Tapioca Pudding 1 package (10 oz.) frozen red raspberries in quick thaw pouch
3/4 cup water
Combine tapioca pudding, water, and wine in saucepan; add frozen raspberries. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture comes to a full boil and is slightly thickened. (Mixture will continue to thicken as it cools.) Cool 15 to 20 minutes. Stir once or twice. Pour into individual dessert glasses or serving bowl. Chill 3 hours or overnight. Garnish with fresh mint and serve with prepared whipped topping, or a custard sauce, if desired. Makes 2 1/2 cups or 4 servings.

Ask Senator GRIFFIN

To cut through red tape members of Congress can often lend a hand to those with problems involving the federal government. Through the columns of this newspaper, Senator Griffin answers questions of general interest. He will respond personally to all communications addressed to: Senator Robert P. Griffin, Senate Office Building, Washington D.C. 20510.

Even though Federal funding for lamprey control has been increased, we still seem to be losing the fight to save our Great Lakes fishery. If the lamprey population is allowed to double another year, we can look for a kill of at least 15 million pounds of trout. I firmly believe our multi-million dollar fisheries resource is worth saving. Do you?
—B. M., Grand Traverse County

Indeed I do. And I have worked for years to assure adequate funding for the Great Lakes Fishery Commission so it can pursue the job of eradicating the lamprey from Great Lakes waters. Last fall Senator Hart and I succeeded in adding a \$200,000 appropriation to the GLFC budget. And in the coming fiscal year the GLFC budget request has been upped another \$40,000 to over \$1.8 million. And with the Canadian share the Commission would have a budget of more than \$2.6 million. Be assured that I will continue to see that the Federal battle against the lamprey will get the priority attention it deserves.

A temporary extension of the draft and substantial increases in military pay at the lower levels are generally regarded as essential elements to an all-volunteer armed force. I share your view that we should move as rapidly as practicable toward zero draft calls and am hopeful that this may occur by the end of the current extension in 1973.

For cheese sauce, melt butter in a small saucepan. Stir in flour until smooth. Gradually add milk. Bring to a boil and simmer 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Stir in shredded cheese until melted. Keep warm until ready to serve.

For burgers, combine ground beef, omelette, tomato sauce, minced onion, salt and pepper. Shape to form 4 patties. Dip patties in beaten eggs; then coat with dry bread crumbs. Dip in eggs and bread crumbs a second time. Fry in hot fat (375°F.) about 6 minutes for medium doneness. Drain on paper towels. Serve with warm cheese sauce.

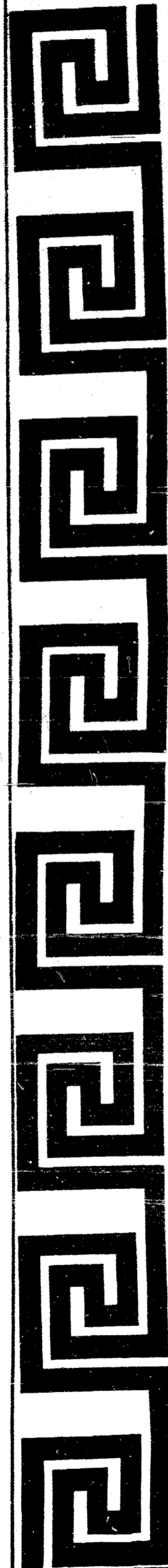
