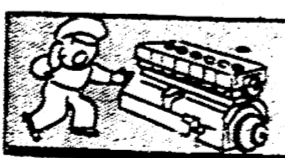

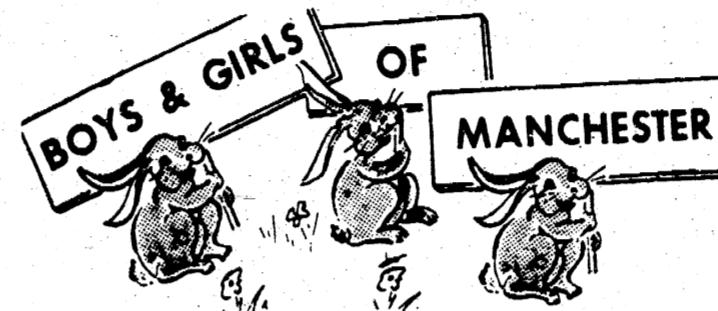

WAIT TEN WEEKS

Wondering why you haven't received your federal income tax refund? If you are entitled to one, wait ten weeks after filing before writing the Internal Revenue Service, Thomas A. Carlson, District Director of the IRS for Michigan, said today.

By then, you should have either a check or a letter explaining the delay. Because the Cincinnati Service Center, which serves Michigan taxpayers, handles millions of returns every filing season, it is practically impossible to locate a particular return to answer any question until processing cycles are complete.

If you do need to write, indicate in your letter when and where you filed your return, and give your name, address, and social security number, this information will help speed a reply, Mr. Carlson said.

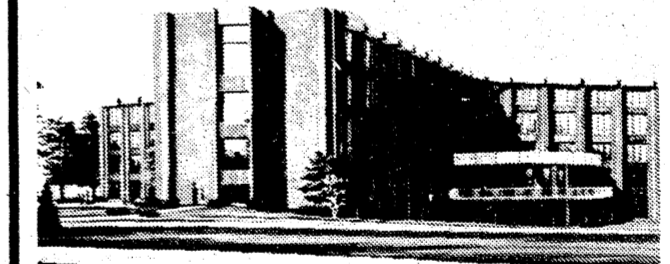

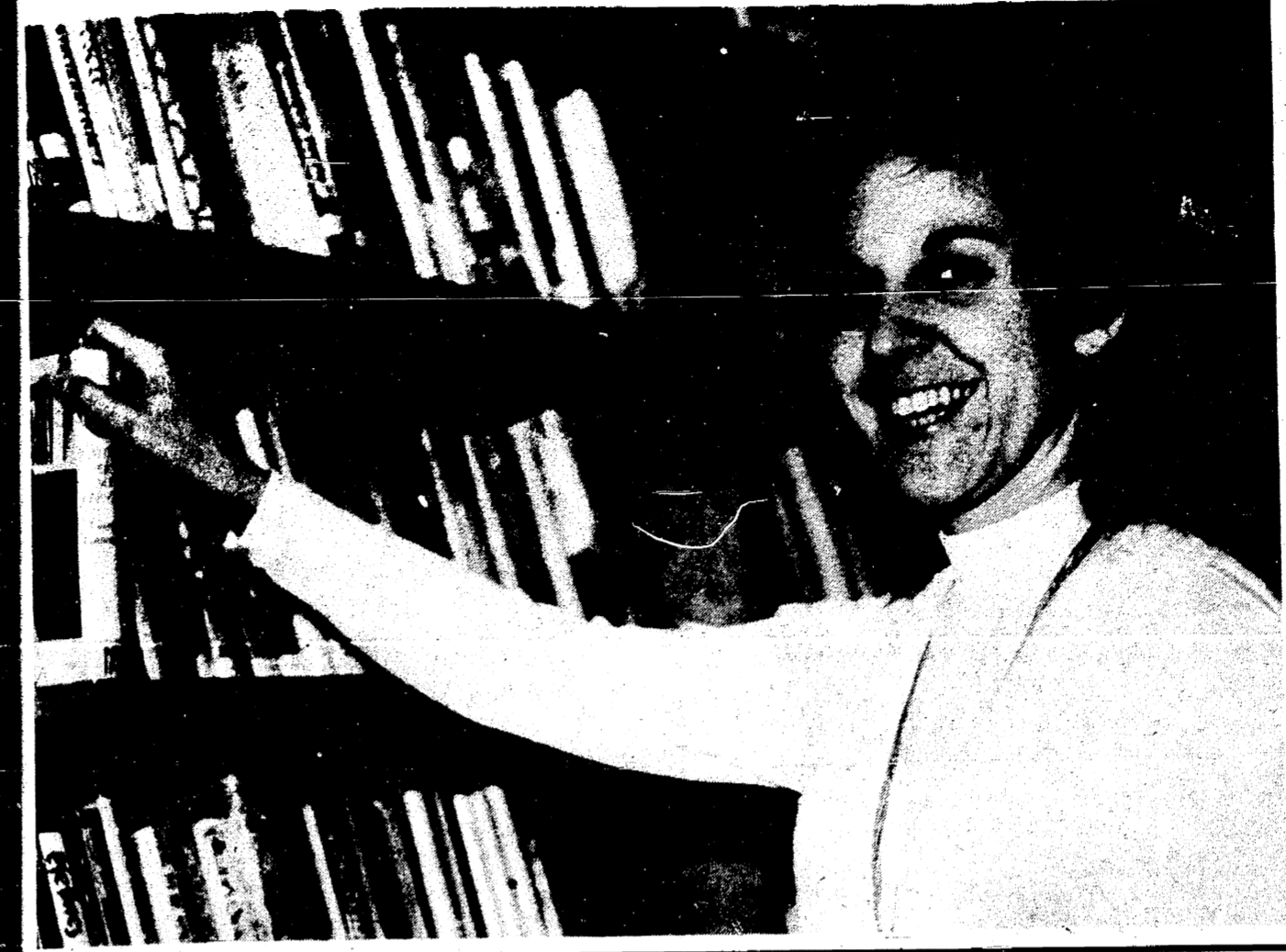

Jerry Pierce has been selected Jaycee of the Month for February. He was selected for the work he did on the Tip Up Festival at Wampers Lake.

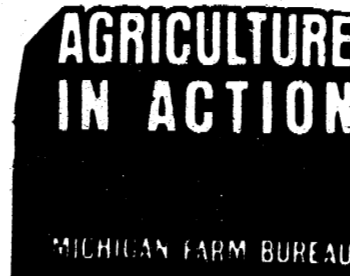

We must take a positive look at how our land is being used now and how it will and should be used in the future.

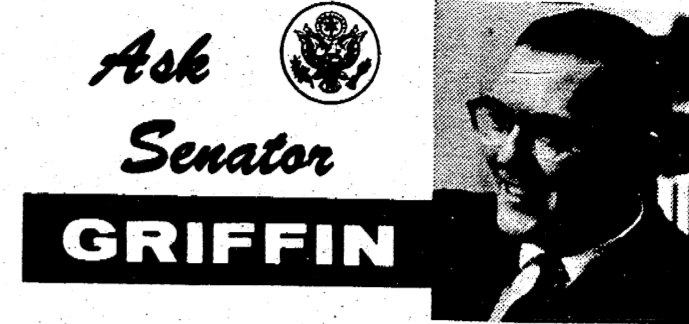
At the present time, the production of food and fiber on our farm land con-

tributes nearly one billion dollars annually to the economy of Michigan. Although only one out of ten Michigan citizens operates a farm, 27 percent derive some part of their income from agriculture.

Urban sprawl is moving steadily across much of our most productive farmland. Each year over 50,000 acres of farmland is converted to urban use.

We need to develop and implement broad land use guidelines, coordinated statewide, that include such areas as agricultural land, urban development, recreational land, unique areas, forest lands and utility and transportation corridors.

Local units of government, assisted by the state, must face up to the responsibility of land use, map out a strict plan for the future and then enforce it.

The notary public or other officer administering the oath shall sign his name on the list for the signature of the registration officer and designate his title.

UNREGISTERED PERSONS NOT ENTITLED TO VOTE

SEC. 491. The inspectors of election at any election or primary election in this State, or in any District, County, Township, City or Village thereof, shall not receive the vote of any person whose name is not registered in the registration book of the Township, Ward or Precinct in which he offers to vote. (As provided under Act 116, P. A. 1954.)

TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION, APPLICATION, TIME

SEC. 506. The applicant for transfer, after having signed an application to vote as provided in Section 503 of this act, shall then be permitted to vote in such precinct for that primary or election only. The application for transfer shall be filed with the Township, City or Village Clerk who shall transfer such voter's registration in accordance with the application. When the name of any street in a Township, City or Village has been changed, it shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clerk to make the change to show the proper name of street in the registration records, and it shall not be necessary for the elector to change his registration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote.

Maust, an egg producer and corn grower, has made outstanding contributions to MSU research efforts in the Departments of Poultry Science and Crop and Soil Sciences.

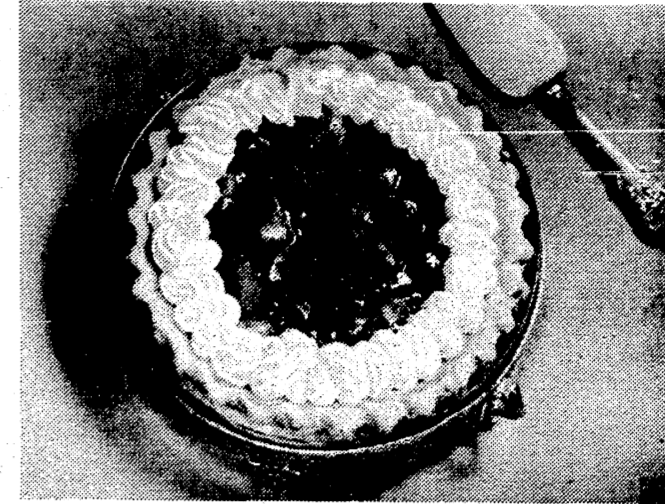
Weisner, assistant state veterinarian with the Michigan Department of Agriculture, was cited for outstanding veterinary services contributed to the poultry industry.

Berries Glow Under Ruby Glaze

The Anglo-Saxons called them "strewberries" because they strewed their leaves along the ground. From there, it was not far to the name by which we know and love these luscious heralds of spring.

The red ripe goodness of fresh strawberries is a treasure to be guarded in all dessert cookery. For this reason, the best of strawberry pies is a glazed pie which leaves most of the berries uncooked and coats them with a clear, rosy strawberry glaze.

Glazed Strawberry Pie

- 1 (9-inch) baked pastry shell 1/4 cups sugar
- 3 pints strawberries, washed and hulled 3/2 tablespoons corn starch
- 1/2 cup water

Few drops red food coloring

Mash 1 pint berries. Mix sugar and corn starch in saucepan. Add water and mashed berries. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until mixture comes to boil and boils 2 minutes. Remove from heat. Stir in food coloring. Cool. Fold remaining 2 pints berries into cooled mixture. Pile into pie shell. Chill. Serve with whipped cream, if desired. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

Note: For Glazed Peach Pie: Follow recipe for Strawberry Pie, substituting 3 pounds peaches (peeled and sliced) for strawberries and omitting food coloring.

# Ask Senator GRIFFIN



To cut through red tape members of Congress can often lend a hand to those with problems involving the federal government. After reading about Debra Kanter, Michigan's first girl page, I am interested in becoming a Senate page. Would you tell me how I can qualify?

Speaking before students at Manchester High School, Congressman Marvin L. Esch (R-Mich.) said that Wednesday's passage of the Equal Rights Amendment in the Senate was a significant victory for women. Esch asserted that, on the whole, "sex discrimination is still much more the rule than the exception, with much of this discrimination directly attributable to governmental action. The amendment will eliminate," Esch said, "a broad spectrum of archaic state and federal laws and regulations which, though in some cases ostensibly protect women, actually lock them into a subordinate role and limit their legal and economic rights."

In discussing the needs for such an amendment Esch cited as examples laws which required women to register specially to be eligible to serve on juries, statutes calling for harsher penalties for women than for men for identical crimes, laws limiting women's rights to handle property and start businesses, and discriminatory practices by state colleges both in admissions and hiring and promotion procedures.

Esch, who supported the amendment as it passed the House last year, also discussed some of the more interesting implications of the Equal Rights Amendment. "The Amendment will," said Esch, "require Congress to treat men and women equally with respect to the draft. Women who meet the physical and other requirements, and who are not exempt or deferred by law, will be subject to conscription."

"Divorce procedures will also be significantly altered," noted Esch. "The E.R.A. would abolish state laws that give women less favorable treatment than men in the handling of their children's property, and more favorable treatment in cases of child support, child custody and alimony."

If ratified within seven years by three-quarters of the state legislatures, the proposal will become the 27th Amendment to the Constitution. It would then go into effect two years after ratification.

## "Increase In Army Pay"

The pay of a buck private hit the 100-a-week mark on January 1, announced Sergeant Dallas Landrem, the local Army recruiter in Ann Arbor.

The figure reflects the military's third salary increase in 12 months, and represents an across-the-board 5.5 percent hike to cover increases in the cost of living.

Seven weeks ago - the day the wage freeze ended - Congress boosted the pay of servicemen. Those boosts, weighted in favor of the lower ranking officers and enlisted men, were designed to attract enough volunteers so that it would not be necessary to renew the President's draft authority when it expires on June 30, 1973.

"The pay raise is the 10th in eight years," said Sergeant Landrem. "And it has really changed the complexion of the military." For example: "30 months ago the basic pay of the new recruit was \$120.00 a month. On January 1 it became \$288.00.

The basic pay does not really give a true picture of the military salary expounded the sergeant. Servicemen also receive additional housing and subsistence allowances which are nontaxable. This means that an average new recruit now receives \$5,140.00 a year, \$2,000.00 more than received two months and two pay raises ago.

For the highest ranking sergeant, a sergeant major, average pay now stands at \$15,184 a year, up more than \$1,700 over the two months.

"Of course these are just average pay scales," said the sergeant. "The actual pay varies with the number of years in service as well as rank."

Sergeant Landrem concluded by stating, that in addition to the pay scales mentioned, there are 128 other benefits and allowances for which servicemen may be eligible. ## Report of Annual Township Meeting Winners of Easter Egg Hunt

On April 1st, the traditional Annual Township meeting was held in the Village Hall. There were ten Electors present.  
The Manchester Township Library was represented by Claire Reck and Lois Kuntz, who gave clear and concise reports on the workings of our library. Their 1971-72 budget figures were \$7,504.00 and their proposed budget for 1972-73 is \$8,037.

They also submitted for election, as officers of the Manchester Township Library Board, the names of Harold Burch and Mrs. Pat Swartz, trustees, to fill vacancies until the November election. They were approved by the electors.

The Township budget and proposed budget were read by Supervisor Clarence Fielder. The amount of the 1971 budget was \$48,139.00 and the total of the proposed 1972 budget is \$48,960.00.

Items specifically discussed, which will be of interest to all residents, included \$2,000.00 for gravel on roads, which amount will be matched by the County Road Commission for a total of \$4,000.00 for improving roads in the coming year. There is also an item calling for \$4,000.00 for chloride for roads this summer. The Road Commission stated that all primary roads will be covered 100% with chloride, which will enable us to spend our \$4,000.00 on the secondary roads in Manchester Township.

Michael H. Wolfe's letter of resignation, dated March 6, 1972, was read and accepted.

Mr. Wolf was elected to the office of Manchester Township Treasurer in April of 1945. For 27 years he has handled the office of township treasurer in a very efficient and accurate manner.

We congratulate you, Mike, on the way you have handled your job.

Mrs. Dorothy Burch is acting as Deputy Treasurer.

A new Township Treasurer will be appointed by the Township Board within 45 days.
