Report of Annual Township Meeting Winners of Easter Egg Hunt

On April 1st, the traditional Annual Township meeting was held in the Village Hall. There were ten Electors present.
The Manchester Township Library was represented by Claire Reck and Lois Kuntz, who gave clear and concise reports on the workings of our library. Their 1971-72 budget figures were \$7,504.00 and their proposed budget for 1972-73 is \$8,037. They also submitted for election, as officers of the Manchester Township Library Board, the names of Harold Burch and Mrs. Pat Swartz, trustees, to fill vacancies until the November election. They were approved by the electors.

The Township budget and proposed budget were read by Supervisor Clarence Fielder. The amount of the 1971 budget was \$48,139.00 and the total of the proposed 1972 budget is \$48,960.00.

Items specifically discussed, which will be of interest to all residents, included \$2,000.00 for gravel on roads, which amount will be matched by the County Road Commission for a total of \$4,000.00 for improving roads in the coming year. There is also an item calling for \$4,000.00 for chloride for roads this summer. The Road Commission stated that all primary roads will be covered 100% with chloride, which will enable us to spend our \$4,000.00 on the secondary roads in Manchester Township.

Michael H. Wolfe's letter of resignation, dated March 6, 1972, was read and accepted.

Mr. Wolf was elected to the office of Manchester Township Treasurer in April of 1945. For 27 years he has handled the office of township treasurer in a very efficient and accurate manner.

We congratulate you, Mike, on the way you have handled your job.
Mrs. Dorothy Burch is acting as Deputy Treasurer.

A new Township Treasurer will be appointed by the Township Board within 45 days.

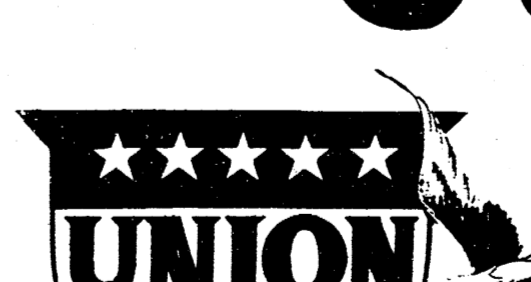
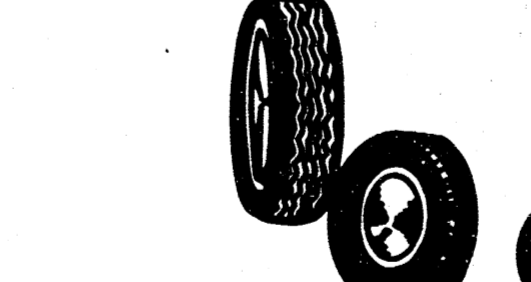

Do-it-Yourself

Michigan Bell has introduced the latest in "do-it-yourself" plans which could save you \$5 if you are moving. By arranging with Bell in advance, you can now take the telephone along with your furniture and receive a credit for your efforts.

The plan is called "Snip and Take" according to Nicholas J. Pratkan, local Michigan Bell manager. He designed, he said, not only to save the customer money at moving time but to help the company reduce costs as well.

To take advantage of "Snip and Take," a customer merely has to advise the nearest Michigan Bell office in advance of the day of the move and the day new service should be installed, he said.

"Then on moving day, the customer simply cuts the cord next to the small connecting box on the wall with a knife or pair of scissors and takes the phone with him," explained Pratkan.

He stressed that there is absolutely no danger of any electrical shock when cutting the cord.

"The set is given to the installer when he arrives to connect service at the customer's new residence. In return, the customer is given a receipt for the set, and his account is credited for \$5."

Should the move be out of the customer's local area--such as a move from Detroit to Traverse City--or out of Michigan Bell territory, the credit is still available, he said. In those cases, the customer can take the snipped sets to the nearest Bell public office for credit.

Though more than one set may be returned, the maximum credit is \$5 per move, he noted.

There are some sets which are not included such as standard dial and Touch-Tone wall phones. However, Trimline wall set receivers can be snipped next to the wall mounting and portable phones can be unplugged and moved.

Prior to the plan's state-wide introduction, he said, it was tried successfully in several northeastern Detroit suburbs.

He emphasized that customers should call a Bell office if they have questions before any phones are snipped.

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

March 20, 1972

Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by Pres. Little at 7:25 p.m. Trustees present were Benedict, Fitzgerald, Mahony, Reinhart, Scully and Walton; absent was Clerk, Mary Wheeler.

Swearing in of elected trustees was done by Mayor Little. Trustees Mahony, Benedict, and Stautz and treasurer Kirk and Assessor Widmayer were all sworn in. Clerk Mary Wheeler was sworn in by Trustee Scully previous to the meeting. She then administered the oath of office to President Little in preparation for the regular meeting.

Roll call was taken again with Stautz replacing Reinhart on the council. Minutes from the March 6, 1972 meeting were read and approved with a motion from Mahony and a support from Scully. All years, carried.

Max Shinabery from Farm Bureau Insurance Group was present to go over the bid for village insurance with the council and bring Farm Bureau's bid up to date for a total of \$4,569.04. Discussions on the coverages was carried on. Motion by Mahony to accept the bid of Farm Bureau Insurance Group for \$4,569.04 as submitted for bid, supported by Benedict. All years, carried.

Max discussed a possible need of further insurance coverage not in the bid for products that the village creates at a cost of \$45.00 per year and an umbrella policy at \$250.00 per year to cover any possible items not covered by normal liability policy. Discussion ensued on these items. Motion by Walton that we table these two mentioned policies until further discussion could be held; supported by Fitzgerald. All years, carried.

As president of the Manchester Jaycees Max Shinabery then suggested the possibility of a 50-50 program, again with the Village, on purchasing new Christmas decorations for the downtown area. There was some discussion on the proposal, as the Village has done it in the past in cooperation with the Jaycees. Moved by Fitzgerald, supported by Stautz that the Village provide \$500.00 toward Christmas decorations with an additional \$500.00 to be pledged and provided by the Manchester Jaycees. All years, carried.

Gerald Hibbs was introduced by Reinhart as the new building inspector of Manchester, to replace Clare Arnold, who resigned.

Mayor Little went over his committee appointments with the council for the village departments. Moved by Mahony, supported by Benedict to accept the appointments as presented. All years, carried. Public Works Ch.: Fitzgerald, Finance Ch.: Mahony, Health & Safety Ch.: Scully, Planning Ch.: Walton, Ordinance Ch.: Stautz, Recreation Ch.: Benedict.

Fitzgerald reviewed the DPW work of the previous two weeks. The painting of the Village Hall, in progress, was discussed as well as added painting which should be done. Moved by Scully that we pay 50% of the cost of painting the Village Hall with the other 50% to be paid by the Manchester Township government, supported by Walton. All years, carried.

Discussion was held on Bruce Daniels attending a meeting on phosphate removal. He advised Council that the village of Manchester has been cited by the Department of Natural Resources for not removing phosphates from the Sewage treatment plant. Moved by Scully, supported by Benedict that Bruce undertake a feasibility study of phosphate removal at the treatment plant. All years, carried.

The water shed problem on Riverside Drive and M52 in the area of Duncan Street was discussed. Moved by Fitzgerald, supported by Scully that we pressure the State Highway Department regarding the water problem on M52 west side, north of Duncan Street. All years, carried.

A letter from Meale Cummings was read to the council and discussed. Mahony gave a report on audits for the Sewer and Water Fund for years ending 1969 and 1970.

Moved by Mahony, supported by Benedict that we pay the students that presented plans for parking and parks to the Planning Commission for out of pocket money spent on the project per their statement. All years, carried.

Benedict reported on the fence cost for Kirk park. He advised Council that the fence could be purchased and installed for approximately \$1,500.00.

Walton reported on the Planning Commission meeting of March 16, 1972. He advised Council that things are beginning to move. A letter to the Water Resources Commission was read and discussed by Walton.

A thank you note was received from Claire Reck.

Moved by Benedict, supported by Scully to adjourn. Meeting adjourned at 10:40 p.m.

EXTENDED SERVICE FOR LATE FILERS

Taxpayers in the Ann Arbor area are being offered a special eleventh hour service by Internal Revenue this week-end and next. For the first time in many years the IRS office here will be open on Saturdays and also Monday evenings to provide service to late filing taxpayers, according to Thomas A. Cardoza, IRS District Director.

The IRS office at 3430 Washtenaw Street in Ann Arbor and 13 other locations around the State will be open Saturday, April 8, from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. and Monday, April 10, till 8:00 p.m. Mr. Cardoza said taxpayer service will be offered again during the same hours next Saturday and Monday, April 15 and 17. The deadline for filing Federal Tax returns this year is April 17.

Telephone assistance continues to be offered five days a week, Monday through Friday, from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. at major IRS offices around the state. In addition IRS telephone lines will be open during the extended Saturday and Monday evening hours of service, according to Cardoza.

Mr. Cardoza said that this extended Taxpayer Service program is in accord with Internal Revenue's belief that most taxpayers can prepare their own Federal tax return without having to pay for professional help. He also stated that the additional hours of service are intended to help persons who have been unable to use IRS services because their daily work hours coincide with normal IRS office hours.

Taxpayers visiting IRS offices are requested to bring with them the tax forms package sent to them by mail. However, forms are also available at IRS offices.

MUSICIANS ELIGIBLE

Musicians are now eligible to enlist into the United States Marine Corp with a guaranteed assignment in the Musician Assignment Program.

The program is designed to assure field band, drum and bugle corps, or field music assignments to qualified instrumentalists upon enlistment in the Marine Corps.

Applicants may enlist for three or four years and will have a modification to their enlistment contract denoting the program they are enlisting under prior to their oath of enlistment.

All applicants will receive recruit and combat training prior to their assignment in the music occupational field.

Prior to their enlistment, applicants will have tape recorded pertinent musical requirements for review by a Marine Corps band officer. Also, they will have to complete a Musicians Background Questionnaire and obtain two letters of recommendations from musically competent individuals.

Marine Corps recruiting personnel point out that this program is different than the program allowing personnel to enlist only for "The President's Own," the Marine Band in Washington, D.C.

Applicants must be able to play either treble clef, woodwind, percussion, xylophone, marimba, vibraphone, piano or accordion instruments.

ANOTHER CHANCE

The citizens of Michigan still have a chance for meaningful tax reform.

With the recent decision of the Michigan Supreme Court on capital outlay projects, such as county and township buildings, etc., the "sky is the limit" on the amount of property tax that can be levied to pay off indebtedness. The Supreme Court even went one step further and indicated that this can be done without a vote of the people.

As a result of the court decision, the two tax reform petition drives that were being conducted by Governor Milliken and the Democratic Party were abandoned, in as much as a section of the

Constitution ruled on by the court was also a part of each petition.

The Michigan Education Association, supported by a coalition of groups, is now sponsoring two new petitions in order to place meaningful and lasting tax reform through a basic Constitutional change on the November 1972 ballot.

It will take two petitions to get the job done. One will limit property tax to 26 mills. The breakdown limits counties to not more than eight mills, townships to not more than one and one-half mills and vocational education, special education, compensatory education and intermediate districts to not more than four and one-half mills. In addition, school enrichment tax, with voter approval, to not more than six mills, counties and townships extra voted millage to not more than six mills.

The other petition will place on the ballot the removal of the present Constitutional provision that prohibits a graduated income tax. Provision is made to solve, as nearly as possible, the problem created by the Supreme Court decision.

THE ARMED CRIMINAL

"Instead of taking the guns away from law-abiding citizens, we have a better suggestion to insure safety in the streets. Let Congress pass a law making it mandatory for every citizen to own and carry arms, wherever he goes. The armed criminal is bravest when he knows his victims are not armed; he is very cautious when he knows his victim will shoot back... or very likely shoot first."

USE CHECKS, MONEY ORDERS TO PAY TAXES

Use a check or money order to pay your 1971 Federal income tax, Thomas A. Cardoza, District Director of Internal Revenue for Michigan said today.

Unlike a cash payment, a check or money order gives you a record of payment in case of loss or misdelivery.

Mr. Cardoza pointed out that payment can be stopped on a misplaced check or money order and a new payment made.

Checks or money orders should be made payable to the Internal Revenue Service. Write your social security number on the check or money order and state the exact purpose of the payment to help assure your payment is properly credited.

"Increase In Army Pay"

The pay of a buck private hit the 100-a-week mark on January 1, announced Sergeant Dallas Landrem, the local Army recruiter in Ann Arbor.

The figure reflects the military's third salary increase in 12 months, and represents an across-the-board 5.5 percent hike to cover increases in the cost of living.

Seven weeks ago - the day the wage freeze ended - Congress boosted the pay of servicemen. Those boosts, weighted in favor of the lower ranking officers and enlisted men, were designed to attract enough volunteers so that it would not be necessary to renew the President's draft authority when it expires on June 30, 1973.

"The pay raise is the 10th in eight years," said Sergeant Landrem. And it has really changed the complexion of the military." For example: "30 months ago the basic pay of the new recruit was \$120.00 a month. On January 1 it became \$288.00.

The basic pay does not really give a true picture of the military salary expounded the sergeant. Servicemen also receive additional housing and subsistence allowances which are nontaxable. This means that an average new recruit now receives \$5,140.00 a year, \$2,000.00 more than received two months and two pay raises ago.

For the highest ranking sergeant, a sergeant major, average pay now stands at \$15,184 a year, up more than \$1,700 over the two months.

"Of course these are just average pay scales," said the sergeant. "The actual pay varies with the number of years in service as well as rank."

Sergeant Landrem concluded by stating, that in addition to the pay scales mentioned, there are 128 other benefits and allowances for which servicemen may be eligible. 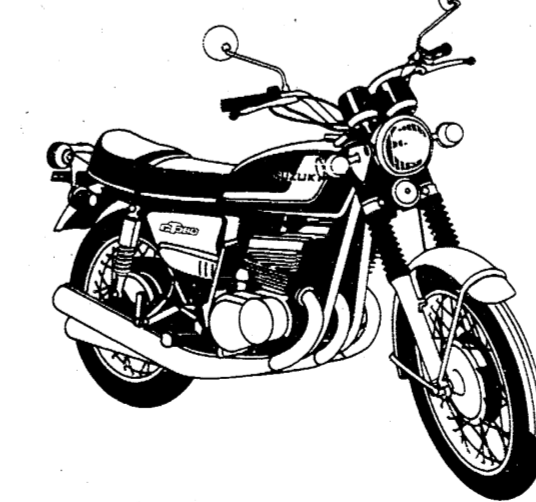

The notary public or other officer administering the oath shall sign his name on the line for the signature of the registration officer and designate his title.

UNREGISTERED PERSONS NOT ENTITLED TO VOTE

SEC. 491. The inspector of election at any election or primary election in this State, or in any District, County, Township, City or Village thereof, shall not receive the vote of any person whose name is not registered in the registration book of the Township, Ward or Precinct in which he offers to vote. (As provided under Act 116, P. A. 1954.)

TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION, APPLICATION, TIME

SEC. 506. Any registered elector may upon change of residence within the Township, City or Village cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by sending to the Clerk a signed request, stating his present address, the date he moved thereto, and the address from which he was last registered, or by applying in person for a transfer. The Clerk shall strike through the old address, mail and precinct number and record the new address, ward and precinct number on the original and duplicate registration cards, and shall place the original registration card in proper precinct file. Such transfers shall not be made after the Fifth Friday next preceding any election or primary election, unless such Fifth Friday shall fall on a legal holiday in which event registration transfers shall be accepted during the following day.

TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION ON ELECTION DAY

SEC. 507. Any registered elector who has removed from one election precinct of a Township, City or Village to another election precinct of the same Township, City or Village and has not recorded such removal with the local Clerk shall execute a transfer of registration request, listing the new residence address thereon over his signature, with the election board in the precinct in which he is registered at the next ensuing primary or election. The inspector of election in charge of the registration records shall compare the signature thereon with the signature upon the applicant's registration record and, if the signatures correspond, then the inspector shall certify each card by affixing his initials upon said request. The applicant for transfer, after having signed an application to vote as provided in Section 523 of this act, shall then be permitted to vote in such precinct for that primary or election only. The application for transfer shall be filed with the Township, City or Village Clerk who shall transfer such voter's registration in accordance with the application. Where the name of any street in a Township, City or Village has been changed, it shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clerk to make the change to show the proper name of street in the registration records, and it shall not be necessary for the elector to change his registration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote.



I am keenly interested in the case of Dr. Samuel Mudd, who set the broken leg of John Wilkes Booth after Booth killed Lincoln. Mudd was tried and convicted of involvement in a plot to assassinate the President. Actually, his trial was a shambles of justice occurring when the Nation was hungry for revenge. I've made a careful study of this matter because my grandfather was the Lieutenant Baker who commanded the force which captured Booth. The shameful blot on Dr. Mudd's name should be removed because he was merely rendering a professional service.

After reviewing the case, I came to the same conclusion and I have requested President Nixon to consider executive action which would clear the name of Dr. Samuel Mudd. The matter is now being investigated at the White House. A resolution in Congress to achieve the same result is being held in abeyance pending a decision by the President. As you may know, Dr. Mudd's grandson, Richard, is a physician in Saginaw, and I have been in contact with him.

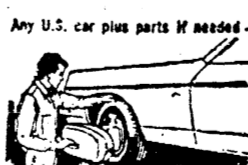

Power Mower Maintenance

For The Guy Who Doesn't Know Or Want To

If you're the kind of guy who takes his power mower to a servicing dealer to have the height adjustment levers moved from 1 1/4" to 2", then you're beyond hope.



If you're one step above that, this article is for you. If you're an ex-GI you're in even better shape. First, just apply the first rule of "police call": For those that don't know what "police call" is, it is cleaning up any given ground area by hand. Translated into mower maintenance, do the same with the area you're about to mow. You'd be surprised at how many damaged rotary blades, broken crankshafts and jammed reels this can eliminate. The result? Less costly maintenance.

The second rule of "police call" is "if it moves, pick it up". If you can't pick it up... paint it. In mower maintenance, this translates into "if it moves, lubricate it".

That's right. Get yourself a can of household oil and starting at the mower control levers, give a squirt to every metal part that moves against every other metal part. This includes every screw, nut and bolt on the mower... every place where the control wires attach to the engine... where the grass bag hooks onto the mower deck... where the wheels rotate on the axle and where the axle attaches to the deck.

Get a cloth and wipe off all excess oil because that excess catches dirt and grass clippings. It's the oil you can't see after you put it on that's working for you. And that oil will keep those parts operating smoothly against each other and lessen the chance of serious troubles occurring because of jamming. Lubricating the screws, nuts and bolts protects them against rusting and jamming, when and if they have to be removed or tightened. They're certain to lower the tab at your servicing dealer because of the time he saves in dismantling the mower, when and if it is called for.

If you know how to use a screw driver, you'll be wise to start every season by tightening every screw on the mower you can reach. With a wrench do the same to bolts and nuts. This will keep your mower in line and limit the stress on it. It will also eliminate excessive vibration from loose parts. Vibration means more than noise. It means screw and bolt-

ners are being widened by bouncing against the loose screws and bolts. This can lead to serious trouble and major service charges.

The engine maintenance should be left to a qualified servicing dealer. In fact, a good idea is to have your mower looked over by a servicing dealer either just before or just after the end of the mowing season.
