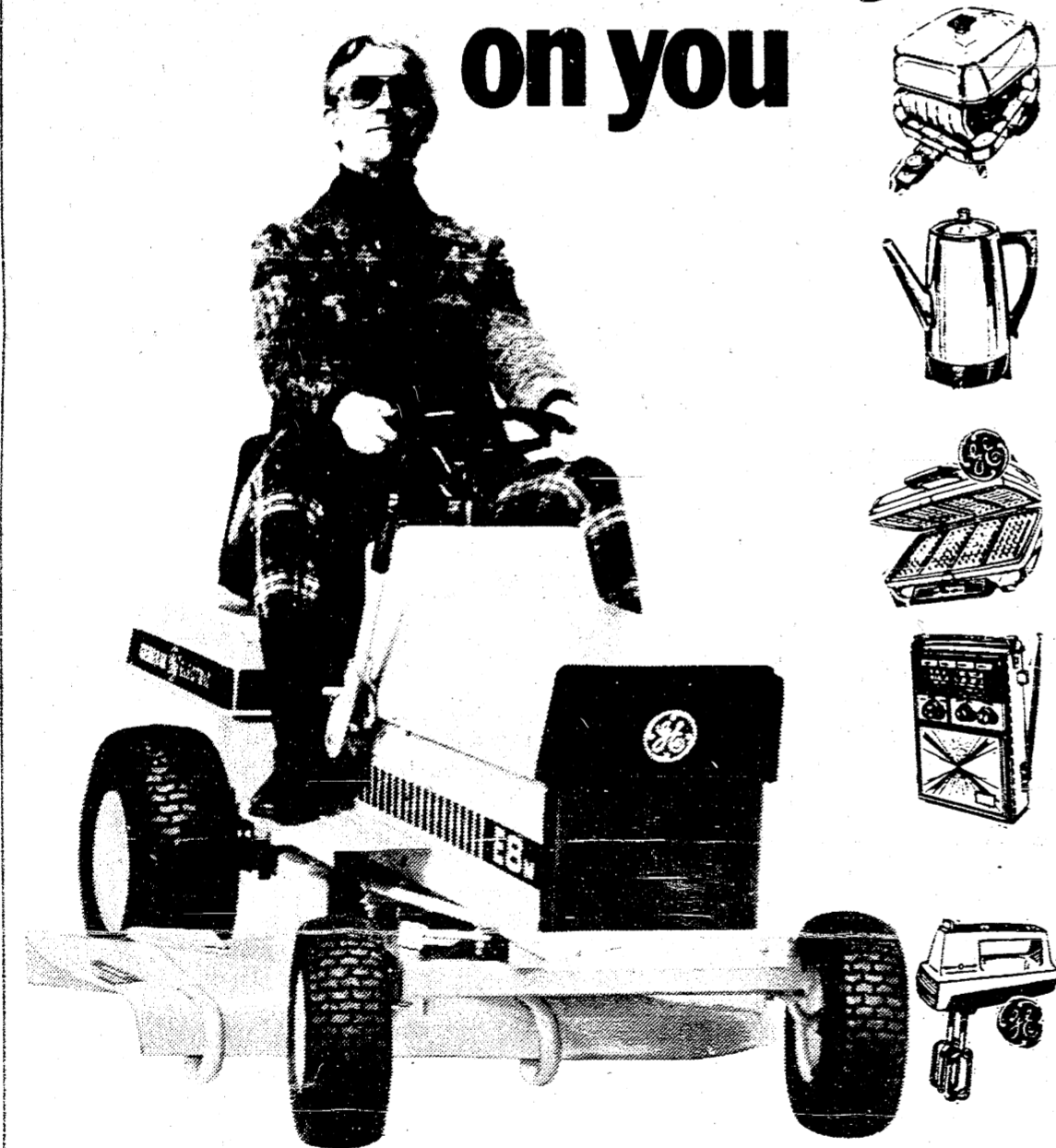


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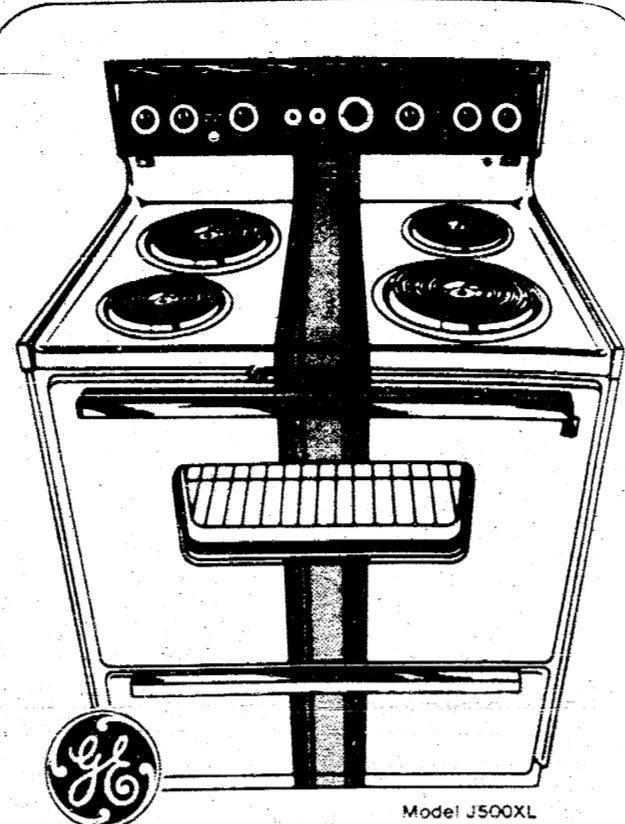
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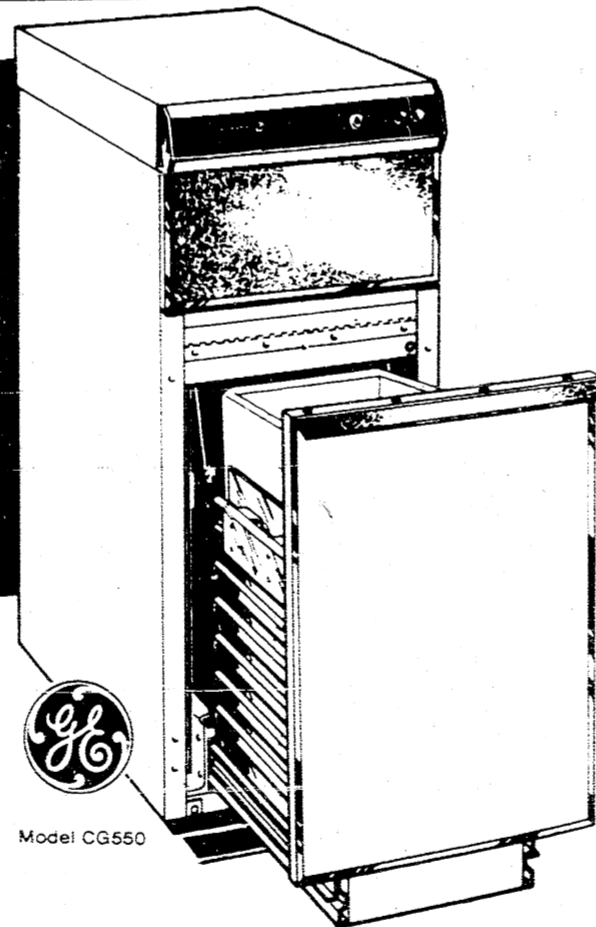

Michigan Livestock Exchange Open House Sunday, April 23

The newest facility of the Michigan Livestock Exchange will hold Open House on Sunday, April 23, from 2:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. Located on M-52, two miles north of Manchester, the general offices of the Exchange are also located in this facility.

Welcoming the public will be Mr. John (Jack) Pascoe, director of this facility, and long known to many in the area as a cattle salesman out of the Detroit Stockyard. Jack and his wife, Jean, parents of one son and two daughters, have purchased property in this area and will be building a home here. A graduate of Pennsylvania State University in 1939 with a degree in Animal Husbandry, he worked with Armour and Company in Chicago and spent several years in Utah, Wyoming and California before joining the Michigan Exchange 19 years ago.

Mrs. Jane Clark, who with husband Ken and three children, lives at Pleasant Lake will be in charge of the office as a full time employee.

Harold Rander of Tipton will be in charge of the Sheep Department and Mike Bigelow of Hogs. Mike is a native of Flushing, Michigan and received a B.S. degree in Animal Husbandry

from Michigan State University in 1967. Living in the Village of Manchester, Mike previously spent 4 years with the Mayer Meat Company.

Most interesting to the visitor will be the Arena within the main barn where the stock is actually auctioned. Standing in the gallery looking down at the floor of the Arena, the entire floor becomes a scale, with the delicate mechanism registering as little as 5 lbs. and as much as 30,000 lbs. The weight is instantaneously recorded in lights above the auctioneers booth to be seen by the entire audience.

The ticket for each sale is automatically stamped by the scale in pounds and immediately sent by express tube to the office. A telephone sits in the Arena so that the Exchange representative is available at all times even during a sale.

Outside the booth, but still within the Main barn is a large black old-fashioned dinner bell, reminiscent of the farm.

When the Auctioneer pulls the rope, the buyers are signalled the sale is about to start. The first auction will take place at 10:00 a.m. May 1st.

Auctioneers of Boyd Tate of Coro, Michigan and Bill Yoder of Goshen, Indiana, according to Jack Pascoe, two of the best in the country will be at work.

A short program at 3:00 p.m. with Dr. Larry Boger of M.S.U. and Dale Ball, Director of Michigan Department of Agriculture as speakers. Light refreshments will be served by the Manchester Jaycee Auxiliary.

Everybody is welcome at 2:00 p.m. Sunday, April 23rd.

Robert Armentrout Receives Scoutings Highest Award



Mr. Robert Armentrout of 815 Vernon, Manchester, Michigan was awarded Scouting's highest honor, the Silver Beaver Award at the Annual Appreciation Dinner of the Iroquois District on April 12, 1972. The dinner hosted by Troop 446 of Saline accommodated 200 guests.

Guest speaker, the Honorable Ross Campbell spoke of the History of Scouting and of the founder Lord Baden-Powell.

Judge S. J. Elden then presented to our own Robert Armentrout, the Silver Beaver Award, Scouting's highest award that a Boy Scout Council can award to a volunteer leader for his services to his council and his community. The presentation was as follows.

"Robert Armentrout's record of service covers much of the Scouting spectrum. Starting in 1958 as a Cub Pack committeeman, he progressively occupied such positions as Assistant Scoutmaster, Scoutmaster, Explorer Advisor, Neighborhood Commissioner, Roundtable Commissioner, Assistant District Commissioner, and District Commissioner. At the same time he assisted at Iroquois training courses, advised the district Order of the Arrow and supervised troop O.A. elections, worked on many Brin Lake Camp projects, served on the District Committee and Council Camping Committee, provided leadership at the last National Jamboree and organized several new units. Bob's contributions to Scouting have already been recognized by his Scoutmaster's Key, Wood Badge beads, Vigil Order of the Arrow Honor, and choice as one of the first three recipients of Iroquois' Distinguished Service Award."

"On the distaff side, he was recognized by the Huron Valley Girl Scout Council for his prominent role in re-establishing Girl Scouting in Manchester. As a member of the choir and church board, church secretary, and

Posters in store windows proclaim the annual Battle of the Bands is coming up soon.

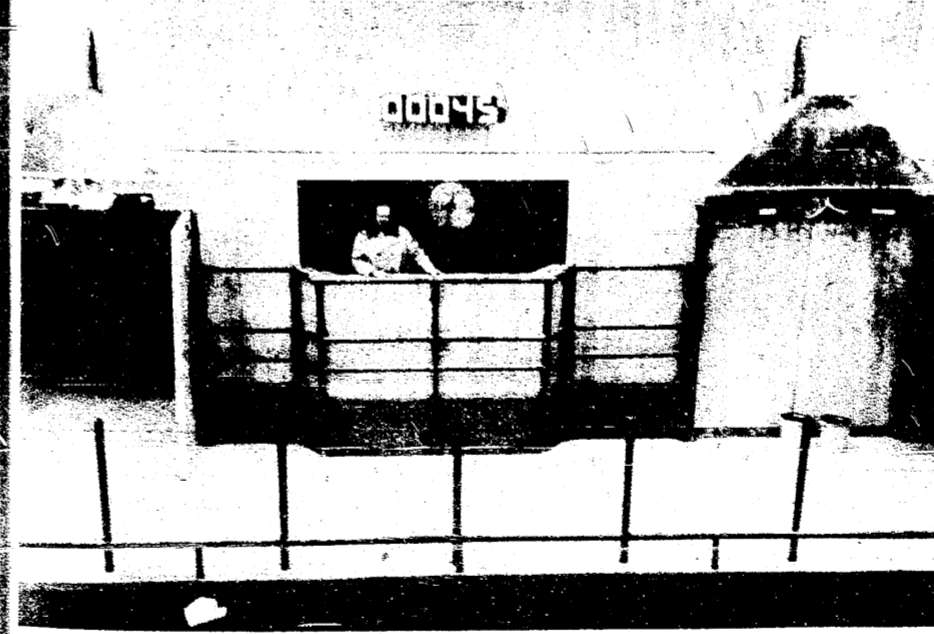
Mr. Herm Kuebler of 315 Duncan Street describes his trip to Spain as though he found the most beautiful spot in the world (next to Manchester).

Cancer tag day and the Jolly Farmerettes are on the corners smiling and charming donations out of passersby.

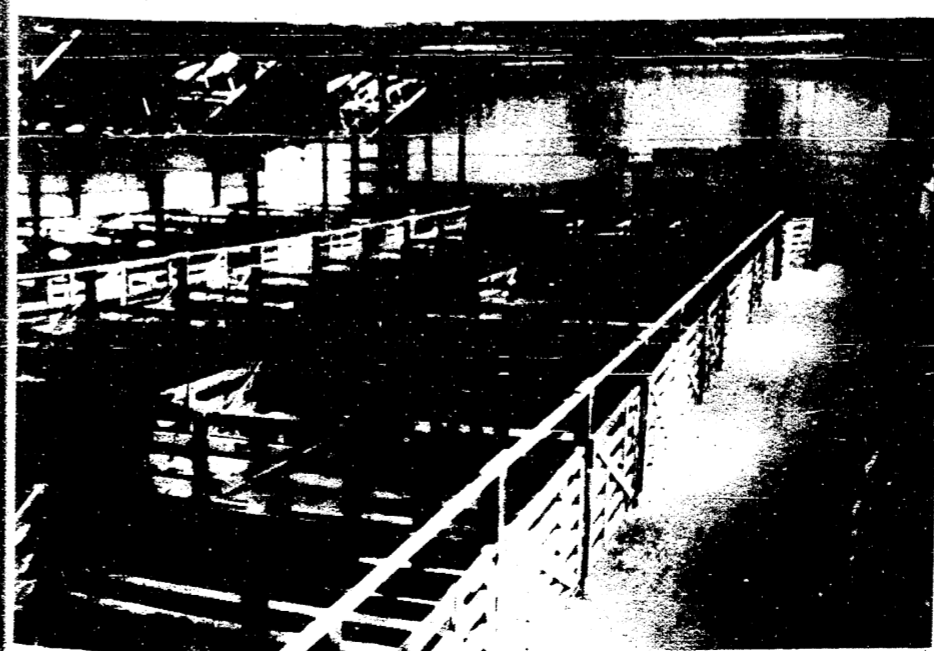
Willard and Dorothy Mann should be in California by now. They are driving across country.

LIBRARY EXPANSION PROGRAM

The libraries of Klager School and Middle School have had 397 new books added through the use of \$546 in Title II (federal fund) money and approximately \$538 in local district funds. The various classifications of new books include science, folklore, animals, nature (land and water), countries, mechanics, biographies, sports, and ethnic groups.

We chose more folklore books for Klager and a high total of animal books for them because of their interest in these kinds. There is also a fair increase of information on countries and ethnic groups.

In Middle School the great increases were in biographies and sports with some increase in information about countries and animals. Both schools received reasonable numbers of books in the science and fiction classifications.

For next year we are planning on adding more information on ecology, pollution, conservation, and drug use and abuse. There should also be an increase in high interest-low vocabulary books.

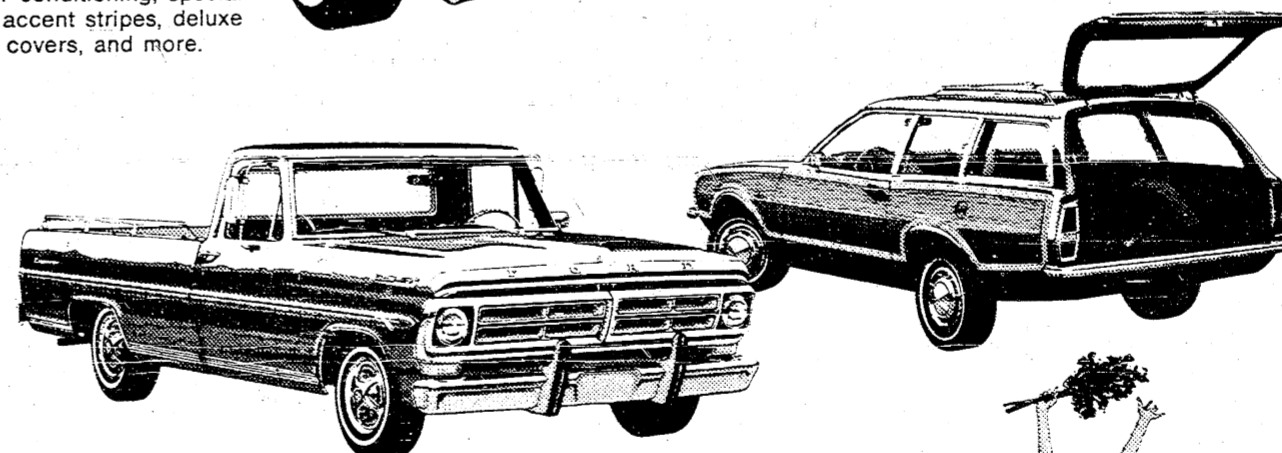

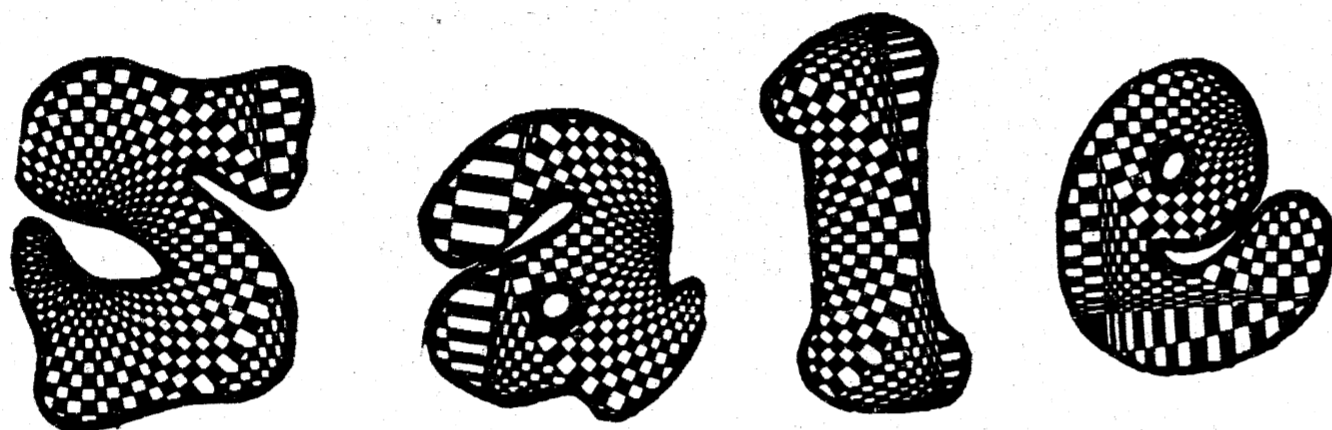

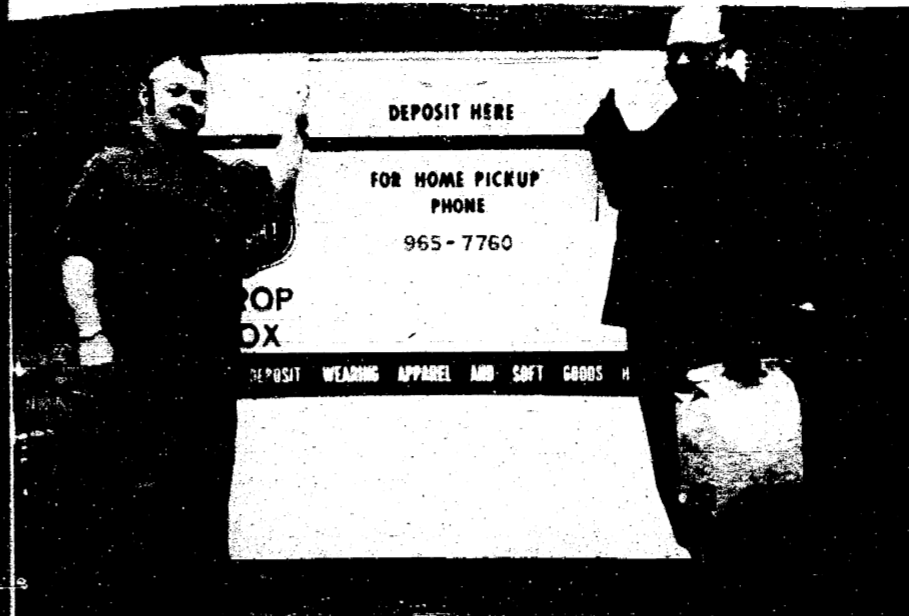

TRACKMEN SHOW IMPROVEMENT IN DEFEAT

Last year at this time Manchester trackmen were beginning what proved to be a winless season. Only 10 members were on the team that was not large enough to compete successfully on a dual meet basis.

This last Thursday, the trackmen opened their season with 14 different individuals scoring points, in Manchester narrow (65 1/2 to 57 1/2) defeat by an experienced Whitmore Lake team. Almost before you knew it Manchester had a point as John Savage, Dan Beach and Kurt Kensler had swept the high jump with Savage taking first with a relatively low 5'2" jump.

Manchester took two more field events first with Senior co-captain Scott Limpert putting the shot 42'2" and sophomore Scott Gormley riding a 10'6" pole vault to top honors. Dan Beach also placed in the pole vault with a tie for 3rd at 9'. Manchester failed to place anyone in the other field event, the long jump.

As the running events began it looked as if Manchester could top Whitmore Lake but losses in the 880 and mile relays proved too much to overcome.

First placers for Manchester in the running events went to Mark Tassie 180 low hurdles, Jeff Bruestle 2 mile, Kurt Kensler 220, and the 440 relay team of Tassie, Mark Spencer, Kensler and Limpert, in a school record 48.3 for the first time run event.

Second place finisher for the trackmen went to Jose Arana 880, Dave Korth mile and Tom Popkey 220 yard dash.

Third placers went to Manuel Arana 880 and 440, Bruce Gray 120 high hurdles, John Roberts mile, Limpert 100 yd. dash, and Gray 180 low hurdles.

For his efforts, 9 1/4 points, on one first, one second and a good leadoff leg to the 440 relay Mark Tassie was named Trackman of the Week, John Savage was named Fieldman of the Week because of his continued improvement in the high jump, good for a first place.

The trackmen hope to even their record at 1-1 this Thursday against Clinton at Grass Lake.

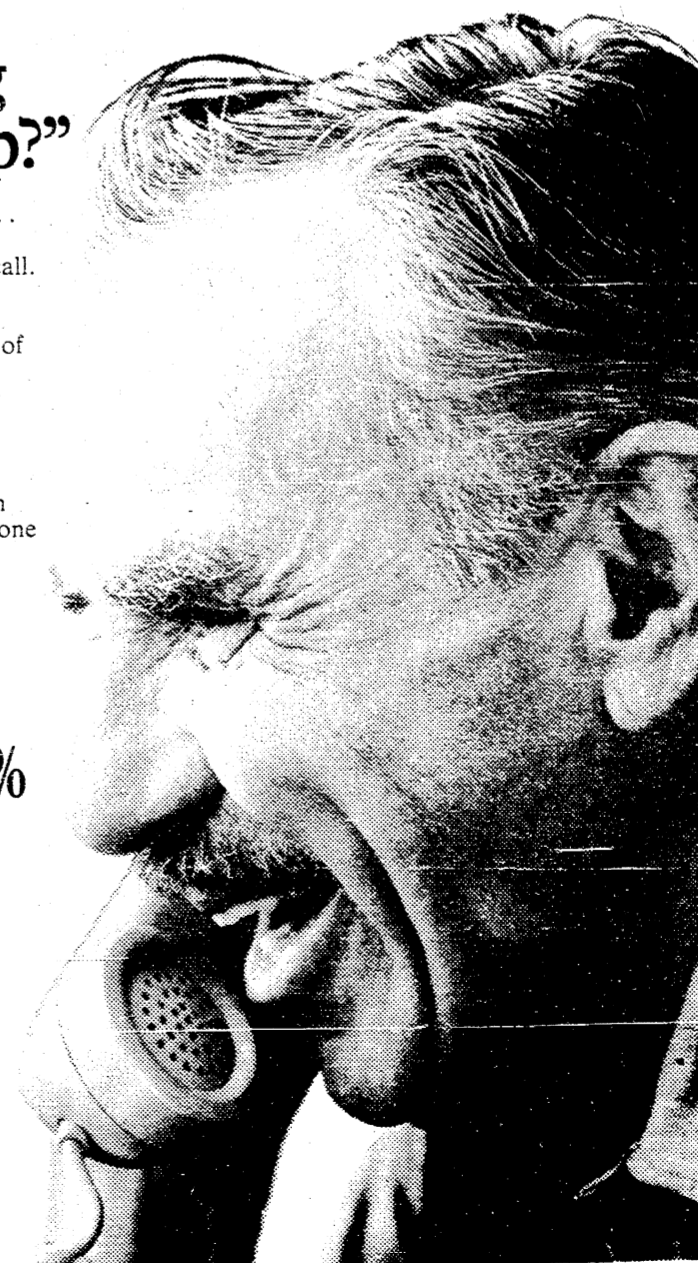

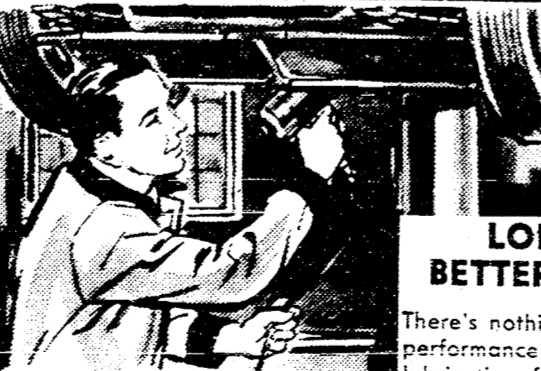

Area Mail Processing To Change May 1st

The Manchester Post Office will become part of Area Mail Processing, one of the newest innovations of the U.S. Postal Service on May 1st, it was announced today by Postmaster Marvin Kirk.

"The program is intended to speed the ultimate delivery of the mail and to gain maximum efficiency through full utilization of Central Mail Processing Centers", Marvin Kirk said.

The Ann Arbor Post Office, Mr. Kirk pointed out, is a facility serving 16 associate post offices in Michigan.

Area Mail Processing is a plan where by all mail originating at the 16 offices will be consolidated at Ann Arbor for complete preparation and processing for outgoing dispatch.

All mail deposited in street letter boxes designated for the deposit of mail for local delivery only, and all mail deposited in a receptacle in the local post office which is designated for the deposit of mail for Local Delivery Only, will be postmarked with the postmark of the local post office. The mail for local delivery will be processed in that office.

All mail deposited into Manchester street letter boxes, which have not been designated for local deposit, or into the "Out-Of-Town" letter drops will be transferred to Ann Arbor for processing, and will bear the postmark designated for the South West portion of the Detroit Metropolitan Area.

Michigan Livestock To Have First Auction May 1

The new Michigan Livestock Exchange market at Manchester will hold its first sale next Monday, May 1, at 10:00 a. m.

Slightly over 5,000 persons toured the facilities last Sunday at an Open House for the general public and listened to remarks from Dale Ball, Director of the Michigan Department of Agriculture and Dr. Larry Boger, Dean of the College of Agriculture at Michigan State University.

This modern, efficient facility is owned by livestock producers of Michigan and is located seven miles south of I-94 on M-52, two miles north of Manchester.

Opening of this new market is another step in the plans of the Michigan Livestock Exchange to implement new and modern marketing concepts to meet the needs of livestock producers.

Enthusiastic buyers who were present for a special showing of the branch last week expressed the opinion that they would be on hand for the upcoming sales - they will be held Mondays and Thursdays at Manchester - in large numbers.

In addition to the new Manchester facility, the Michigan Livestock Exchange maintains branches at St. Louis, Cass City, Portland, Battle Creek and Cassopolis.
