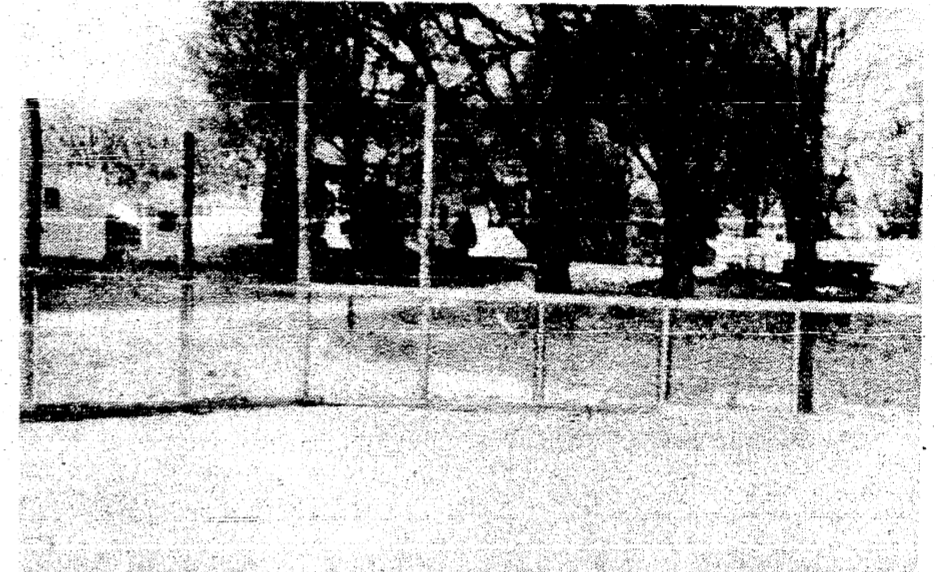

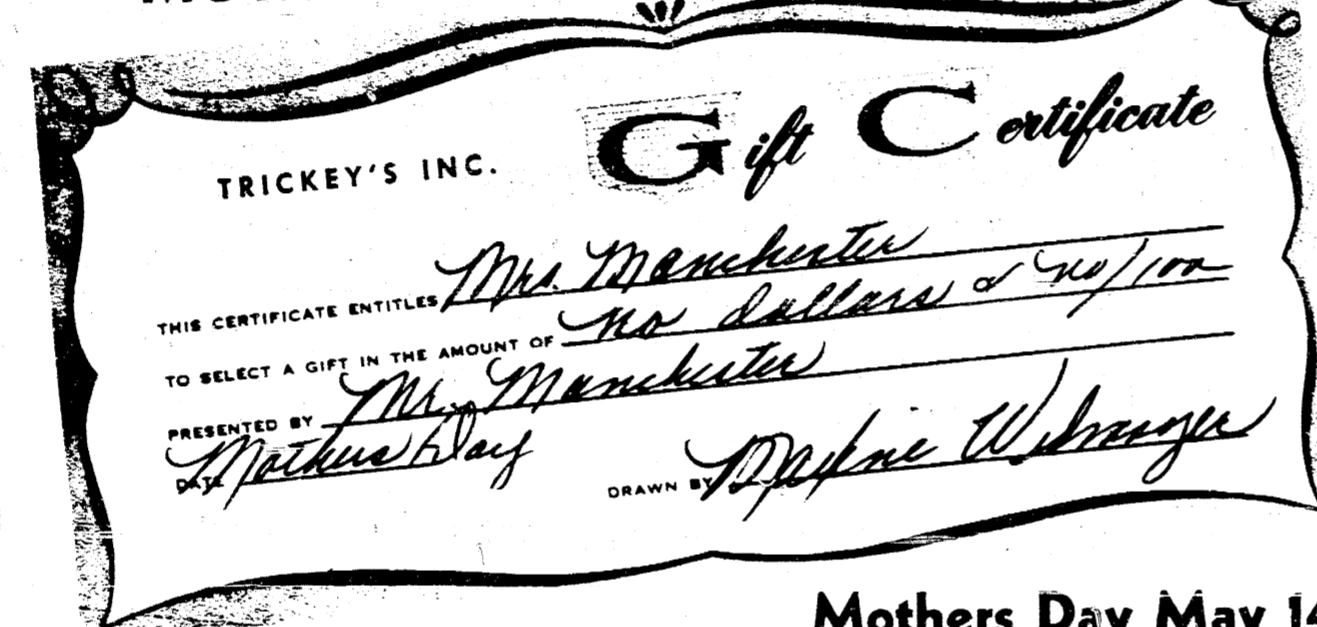

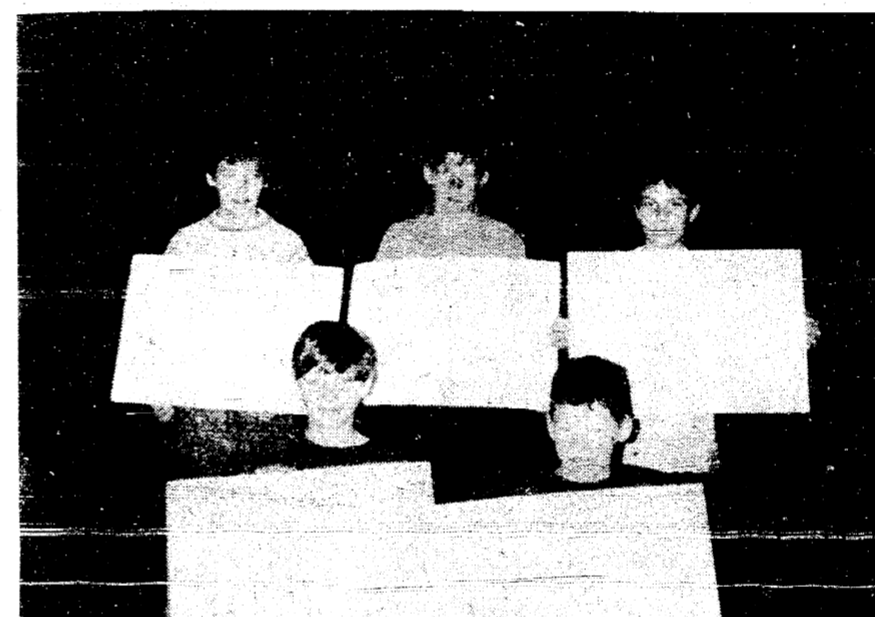

**RESOLUTION CREATING
TOWNSHIP PLANNING
COMMISSION**

WHEREAS, the Township Board of Sharon Township, Washtenaw County, Michigan, desires to proceed under the terms and provisions of Michigan Public Act 168 of 1959, as amended, and create thereunder a Planning Commission for said township.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

Section 1. The Sharon Township Board does hereby create a Township Planning Commission consisting of 7 qualified electors and property owners of the township under the authority of and subject to the powers, duties and limitations provided in Michigan Public Act 168 of 1959, as amended, and the terms and conditions of the within resolution and any amendments thereto which might hereafter be adopted.

Section 2. The Township Planning Commission shall consist of the following qualified electors and property owners of the township who are hereby appointed by the supervisor with the unanimous approval of the Township Board for the terms set after each members name and until a successor or successors have been appointed or such terms have been sooner terminated under the provisions of said Public Act 168. All terms shall commence on the effective date of this resolution.

Section 3. The members of the Township Planning Commission shall receive as compensation for their services, the sum of \$7.50 per meeting attended of such commission or of any sub-committee of such commission.

Section 4. All powers, duties and responsibilities provided by Michigan Public Act 184 of 1943, as amended, for zoning boards created thereunder, are hereby transferred to said Township Planning Commission, to become effective upon completion by the Township Zoning Board of any and all of its duties and obligations with regard to amendments and supplements to the township zoning ordinance presently in the process of development with the understanding, however, that such postponement of transfer shall, in no event, exceed a period of 1 year, nor be less than a period of 60 days following the publication of this resolution.

Section 5. Notwithstanding the foregoing transfer, the Sharon Township zoning ordinance presently in effect within the Township, shall remain in full force and effect until otherwise amended, altered or changed by the Township Zoning Board or the Township Planning Commission created hereunder.

Section 6. (1) The Planning Commission shall elect a chairman, vice-chairman and secretary from its members and create and fill such other offices or committees as it may deem advisable. The Planning Commission may appoint advisory committees outside of its membership. The terms of all officers shall be 1 year.

(2) The Planning Commission shall hold at least 4 regular meetings each year. Additional meetings may be called by the chairman or by 2 members upon written request to the secretary, who shall send written notice to all members at least 1 week in advance. All meetings shall be open to the public.

(3) The Planning Commission shall adopt rules for the transaction of business, and shall keep a public record of its resolutions, transaction, findings and determinations. It shall make an annual written report to the Township Board concerning its operations and the status of planning activities, including recommendations regarding actions by the Township Board related to planning and development.

Section 7. The Planning Commission shall make and adopt a basic plan as a guide for the development of unincorporated portions of the Township. This is the plan referred to in Act 184 of the Public Acts of 1943, as amended, being sections 125.271 to 125.301 of the Compiled Laws of 1948, being the basis on which the zoning plan is developed. As a basis for the plan, the Planning Commission is hereby empowered to (1) make inquiries, investigations and surveys of all the resources of the Township and (2) assemble and analyze data and formulate plans for the proper conservation and uses of all resources, including a determination of the extent of probable future need for the most advantageous designation of lands having various use potentials and for services, facilities and utilities required to equip such lands. The Planning Commission shall consult, in respect to its planning, with representatives of adjacent townships; with the county planning commission; with any representatives of incorporated municipalities within the Township; and with the county planning commission.

Section 8. Whenever the Planning Commission has adopted the basic plan of the township of 1 or more major sections or districts thereof, no street, square, park or other public way, ground or open space, or public building or structure, shall be constructed or authorized in the Township or in the planned section and district until the location, character and extent thereof shall have been submitted to and approved by the planning commission. The Planning Commission shall communicate its reasons for approval or disapproval to the Township Board, which shall have the power to overrule the Planning Commission by a recorded vote of not less than a majority of its entire membership. If the public way, ground, space, building, structure or utility is one, the authorization or financing of which does not, under the law governing same, fall within the province of the Township Board, then the submission to the Planning Commission shall be by the board, commission or body having jurisdiction, and the Planning Commission's disapproval may be overruled by resolution of the board, commission or body by a vote of not less than a majority of its membership. The failure of the Planning Commission to act within 60 days after the official submission to the Planning Commission shall be deemed approval. The Planning Commission shall promote public understanding of and interest in the plan and shall publish and distribute copies of the plan and of any report, and may employ such other means of publicity and education as it determines necessary.

Section 9. The Township Planning Commission may make recommendations to the Township Board, to public officials (including the Zoning Board of Appeals) and to citizens regarding all matters relating to the planning and development of the Township.

Section 10. The Township Board shall refer plans or other matters relating to land development to the Planning Commission before final action thereon by the Township Board and may request the Planning Commission to recommend regulations governing the subdivision of land. The recommendations may provide for the subdivision design, the standards of design and the physical improvements that may be required.

Section 11. All regulations and zoning activities of the Township Planning Commission shall be subject to the approval of the Township Board of Sharon Township, which approval shall be required before the same becomes effective.

Section 12. This resolution may be amended or repealed at any time by a majority vote of the entire membership of the Sharon Township Board.

Section 13. 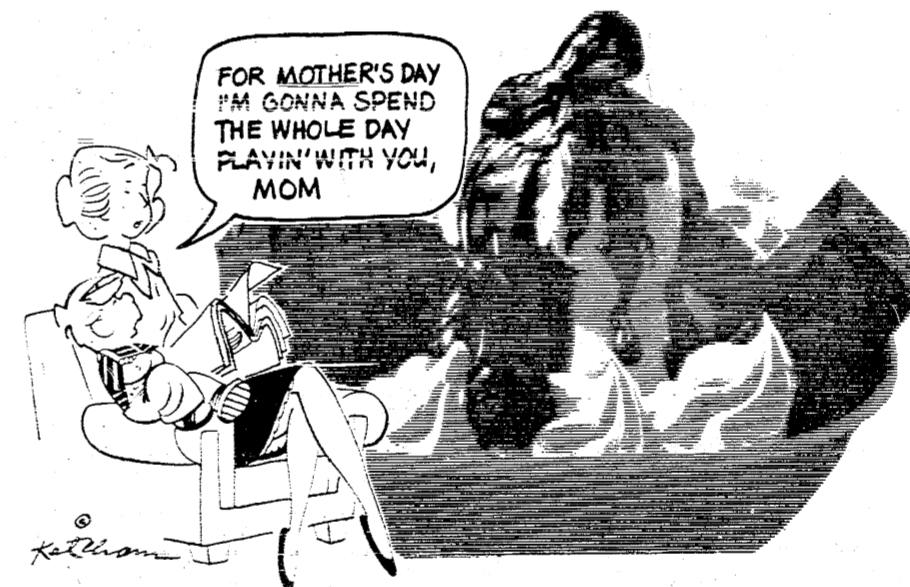

NEED TO CHANGE

With the age of majority being lowered to eighteen, we need to ask ourselves are we ready for it? Do we need to gear our education system to provide a better understanding of the rights and responsibilities the eighteen year old will be facing?

Lowering the age of majority, in many ways, simplified and made matters more consistent relating to contractual agreements. Persons eighteen years of age are now legally able to enter into all types of contractual agreements. While this represents a much greater latitude than was legally possible before, it also places a greater responsibility upon the 18 to 21 year olds to understand what is involved.

Heretofore, a person under 21 yrs. of age could not purchase a home or obtain a mortgage. These restrictions also applied to the purchase of lots and mobile homes. Now, the law allows persons 18 years of age and older to enter into all types of contracts affecting real property.

Since 1957, Michigan law has provided that any person between the ages of 16 and 21 may make a contract for life and disability insurance. Presently the young people may obtain other types of insurance such as auto, fire, theft and health.

Most 18 year olds formerly looked at voting as something they would be able to do in the future. Now, they have the opportunity and right to carry out that citizenship responsibility. They must also understand that the voting privilege carries with

it the obligation of understanding the issues and the positions of candidates. Also, that we are a nation of self-governed people where the majority vote rules.

Our nation also has an obligation to these young adults to change and gear its systems to meet their needs and to help them open all avenues to understand their new responsibilities.

DISPOSAL OF BROKEN GLASS REQUIRES PRECAUTIONS

If you break a mirror it's supposed to bring seven years of bad luck, and the ill fortune usually starts when you start picking up the broken glass.

About 15% of the 50,000 compensable work injuries in Michigan each year are the result of cuts, and the Michigan Department of Labor points out that a painful number of these come from attempts to pick up broken glass.

There are several basic precautions that should be taken in handling broken glass, the department says. First of all, if you get cut, obtain first aid immediately. When disposing of broken glass, use only special receptacles and label the containers as "Broken Glass."

Broken glass may be collected, the department advises, by using a broom and dust pan or a piece of cardboard. If you should have to pick up glass by hand, wear heavy gloves. Small particles can be picked up with several thicknesses of wet paper towels.

An important point to remember is that broken glass should be disposed of promptly but only after precautions are taken to avoid injury.

STORAGE SPACE

Most apartment dwellers face a common woe—too little storage space. Shallow storage boxes that fit under the bed and multiple hangers are a must for clothes, suggests Helen Fairman. A small chest of drawers makes up for lack of a linen closet or dining room buffet. Peg-board is a lifesaver for items from sports equipment to kitchen utensils.

ORIENTAL STIR-FRYING

Oriental stir-frying is a zesty change from the boil-and-butter method of preparing broccoli, green beans, asparagus, cauliflower or sliced celery, says Helen Fairman. Place the vegetable in a skillet with a hot mixture of salad oil and water, cover and shake over a high heat for two minutes. Add seasoning and soy sauce, if desired, and shake for two minutes more. In four minutes, you have a crisp and tasty vegetable dish.

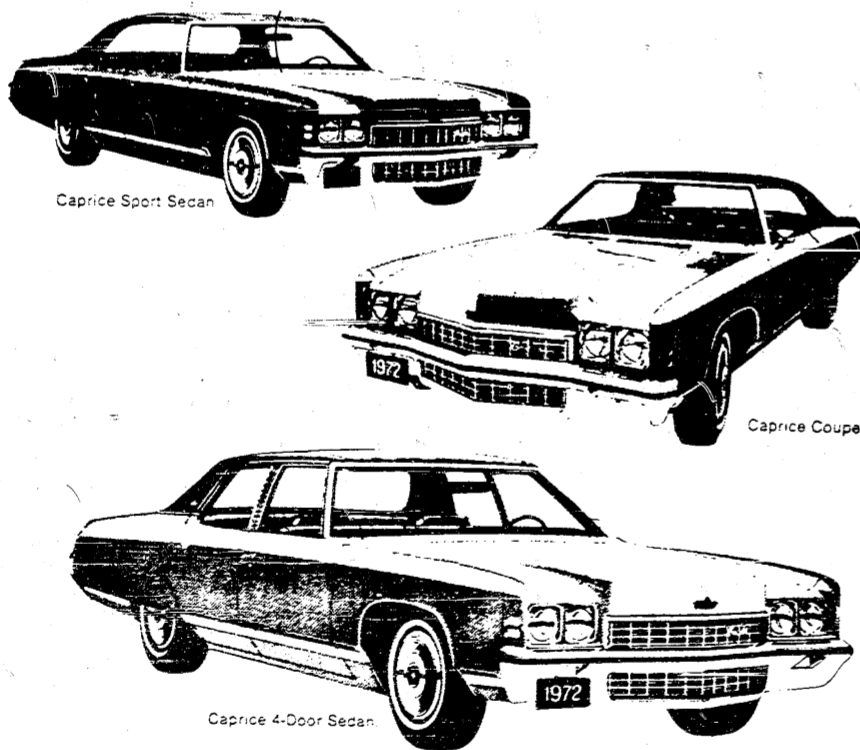

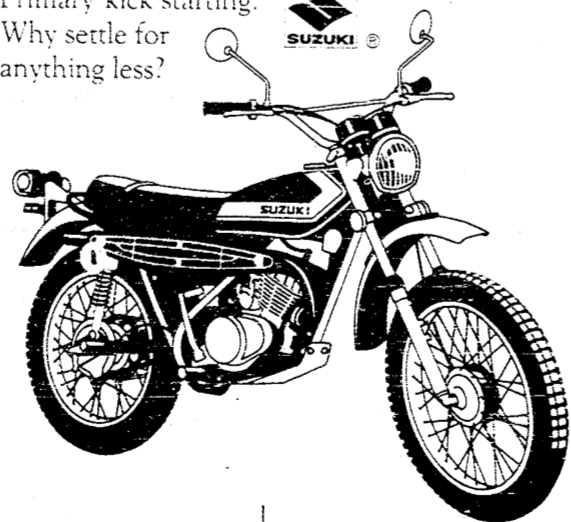

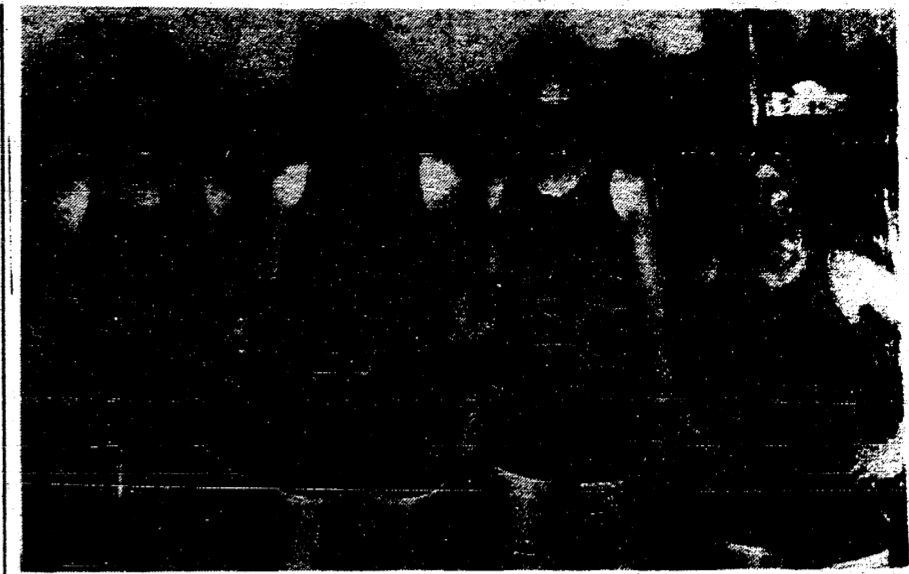

All the talk about food prices is getting me down. I'm a farmer and I know one thing for sure—my income is going down, not up. The only way for me to keep costs down is to mechanize, but machinery is too expensive. How about help to purchase needed machinery?
—H. M., Lapeer County

Congress provided some help last year by approving an investment tax credit which applies to farm machinery and equipment acquired after August 15, 1971. The credit also applies to farm equipment acquired during the period April 1 to August 15, 1971, if it was ordered after March 31, 1971. Enclosed is Internal Revenue Service form 3468, which describes eligibility standards and filing instructions. If you need additional information, contact your local IRS office.

State Flag Deserves Proper Display

They come in all sizes, shapes and colors. There are big ones, small ones, square ones, triangular ones, rectangular ones, blue ones, red ones, and green ones.
Some are colorful, wearing reds, greens, whites, and blues. Some are drab, consisting of only one color. Some are striped while others have symbols and emblems on them.
Some say "E Pluribus Unum," while others proclaim "Go U. Beat State."
They are flown from staffs and poles, hung on walls and over balconies. They are seen in churches and in parades. They fly over the nearest football stadium and the Nation's Capitol in Washington, D.C.
They are flags.
Flags do come in all sizes, shapes and colors. They are used for almost every occasion imaginable. They represent clubs, organizations, schools, teams, units of government and countries.
However, there is only one flag that represents the United States. And there is only one flag that symbolizes the Great State of Michigan.

Millions fly the flag of the United States daily. However, few fly the flag of the State of Michigan.
More persons should know about the state flag... its history. And above all, we should have more public display of Michigan's flag... our flag.
Following is a simple list of rules on the proper method of displaying the Michigan flag:
ON A STAFF: The Michigan Flag should float BELOW the U.S. Flag.
ON A WALL IN A ROOM: The State Flag should be on the left... the flag's own left.
ON A PLATFORM: It should be flown from a staff placed on the speaker's left as he faces the audience. The Stars and Stripes should be on the speaker's right.
IN THE BODY OF THE CHURCH: It should be on a staff at the congregation's left as they face the clergyman. The U.S. Flag is at the right.
IN A PARADE OR PROCESSION WITH OTHER FLAGS: The State Flag should be carried a little back of the Stars and Stripes.

WITH U.S. EMBLEM FROM CROSSED STAFFS: When displayed against a wall with the U.S. Flag, the Michigan Flag should be on its own left, and its staff back of the staff of the Stars and Stripes.
The State Flag should never be placed above or to the right of the U.S. Flag.
When the Flag is in a condition that it is no longer a fitting emblem for display, it should not be cast aside or used in any way that might be viewed as disrespectful. It should be destroyed, privately, and preferably by burning, or by some other method in conformity with the reverence and respect we owe this emblem of our state.
Individuals or groups planning to display the State Flag should be familiar with certain legal curbs on its use. Designed primarily to prevent use of the Flag for advertising purposes, Chapter XL of the Compiled Laws of Michigan, 1948, should be used for reference.

Board of Education Request Increase In Millage

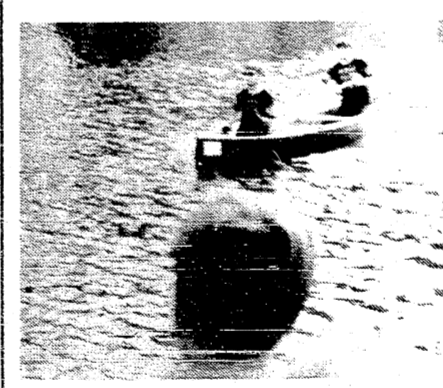
At the annual school election to be held on June 12, 1972, the Manchester Board of Education will be requesting the renewal of the 11 1/2 mills of voted operational millage. The renewal of this millage is absolutely essential to the school district's operation. This amount constitutes approximately one-third of all funds received by the school district.
The Board will also request a one (1) mill levy for building improvements and educational equipment and materials. The two issues will appear on separate ballots. At the same time the Board will also reduce the debt retirement levy by one-quarter (1/4) of a mill so that the total overall increase over the 1971-72 school year would be (if approved) only 3/4 of a mill.
The extra mill that is being requested is needed for a roof replacement on the old section of the high school plus materials and equipment for classroom use. These items include business machines for the commercial classes, sewing machine replacements for the Homemaking classroom and miscellaneous materials for other curricular areas.
