

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



My husband and I have been trying to adopt a Vietna-mese orphan since last August. At first we were helped by an Army chaplain, but now the case is bogged down the Vietnamese bureaucracy. We have received little help from the government agencies we turned to. Can

GRIFFIN

In April, I introduced a bill in the Senate entitled the "Vietnamese Orphan Act" which would make it easier for American citizens to adopt Vietnamese children who have been orphaned as a result of the war in Southeast Asia. If passed by Congress, the bill would cut through a lot of the red tape and bureaucratic obstacles you have encountered. The bill is now pending before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, and you could help get action by writing to the Chairman, Senator J. William Fulbright, Washington, D.C.

My wife and I are camping enthusiasts. Can you provide us with information about some out-of-the-way, offthe-beaten-path areas that might be of interest?

A pamphlet entitled "Back Country Travel in the National Park System," published by the National Park Service, describes 41 remote, primitive areas of our National Parks (including Michigan's Isle Royale) as well as camping and other facilities available. You can get a copy by sending 35c (check or money order) to the Superintendent of Documents, U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402. Be sure to give the title of the

pamphlet and the catalog number (#2405-02-67).

When I brought my family to Washington a few years ago we enjoyed visiting the landmarks but we were dispinted that we had to pay a fee when we toured the U.S. Capitol building. My sister and her family plan to visit Washington next month. I just want you to know that I don't think Americans should have to pay to see their government. It's our government too!

It took an act of Congress in 1971 to do it-but you will be pleased to know that guided tours of the U.S. Capitol are available now without charge. The tours form in the Capitol Rotunda every 3-5 minutes from 9 a.m. until 3:45 p.m. I hope your sister and her family enjoy their trip to Washington. Please suggest that they visit my office in the Senate Office Building once they arrive.

One of the quickes ways to still arm income would be to recure agrienhural exports.

Experts represent a significant part of the total market for our marion's egricitural moduction. Today, almost one out of every four acres of cropland is producing something that is exported. The United States has doubled its agricultural exports in the past 15 years. Presently, the U.S. accounts for a fifth of world agricultural trace.

Yes, the loss of exports markets would have a major effect on our farmers' pocketbooks. Yet, Congress now has a bill before it that could cause just

The bill was not designed to destroy or reduce our agricultural experts. out rather, was introduced for the purrose of curbing the flow of industrial reducts into this country.

Some of our American industries are having trouble meeting world competition. Increased labor rates and general inflationary forces are to blame. So, in order to help the situation, the recocsal before Congress would reduce the level of imports coming into our country by billions of dollars. Foreign countries confronted by major cutbacks in their experts would have only one choice: they would have to reduce their mports from the United States. Otherwise, they could face a balance of payment crisis.

The result could well be that they rould stop buying our agricultural products. We could be sacrificing agricul-

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
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

90 Year Old Family Hardware Business Sold

Ninety years in business in the same family. A goodly share of our town's history is encompassed in that statement. Many memories and much hard work have gone into the forming of a local tradition such as the Widma. yer family has offered us.

In 1882, Dr. Kapp lived on Clinton Street and was a partner in building what was known as the Rehfuss and Kapp block. These are the buildings on the South side of Main Street which now house business offices and

Rymack Printing. It was in this same year that Norton and then Kingsley rented one half of this building and operated a Hardware store. Fred Widmayer, at first working here, then buying. It was then known as Widmayers Hardware. On the East it was neighbored by the Rehfuss Butcher Shop and on the West by the old Fred Dietle Saloon. This building (the saloon) later became a candy store and then later a Beer Parlor again. During all these years the Hardware was operated by Fred with the help of his family

Having married Emma Fausel whose father, Adolph, had come from the old country as a watchmaker and who had owned and operated a jewelry store on the exact corner where the Mobil Station now stands. They had three children, Roland F., Herbert A. and Russell Widmayer. The eldest son, Roland worked in the store until 1918 when he left for World War I. This was the time when Herbert was brought into the store to help after school and on weekends. In 1930 the store moved across the street to the building where the Furniture Store now stands. Ten years later, in 1940, back across the street again to the old Saloon Building. During the following year from 1940 to 1941 plans were made for expansion and the old building was torn down and the present building erected. Moving in during the month of February of 1941 they have remained there ever since.

The year of 1940 was a busy one, the old building being razed and Main Street entirly blocked off for a carnival. Everyone was in town either to "superintend" the demolition project or to attend the carnival (this was the year of the big crowds-do any of you old-timers remember Stella??).

The death of the elder Mr. Widmayer in 1950 and then of Roland in

1963, left Herbert working by himself, for Russell was also a business man in Manchester, having first operated the old Saloon on the corner, then later the tavern where the Black Sheep is

In 1935 Herb branched out into another Main Street business. Or, as he says, "during the depression it was hard to make a nickel." He opened the Manchester theatre in the building where the Laundromat now stands. Art lenter had moved his furniture store out and had also moved the undertaking business from the basement so the 216 seats were installed, two projectors, and the first picture, starring Jean Arthur and the cartoon feature 'The Ant and the Grasshopper" showed to a delighted town.

Reminiscing about his very early years, growing up in the Village and working in the store, Herbert recalls the hilarious Haloween's when 40 rolls of wire fencing were rolled all over Main Street and a hay baler was put Continued on Page 4
