## Rev. Joseph W. Wise New Pastor At Emanuel Church



Rev. Joseph W. Wise will begin his duties at Emanuel Church, Manchester, on August 1. He is the second son of Mr. and Mrs. W.C. Wise, Jr., of Landis, North Carolina. Born October 31, 1940, he received his public education from the Landis School System and was graduated from the Landis High School in 1958. Mr. Wise entered Catawba College in the Fall of 1958 and received an A.B. degree in Religion and History in June of 1962.

In the fall of 1962 Mr. Wise entered the Lancaster Theological Seminary in Lancaster, Pennsylvania, and he received the degree of Bachelor of Divinity in the spring of 1965. He accepted a call to become assistant pastor of Trinity United Church of Christ in Conover, N.C.

In October of 1966 Rev. Wise was called to the position of senior pastor of Emanuel United Church of Christ, Hanover Pennsylvania, a position he has held until he begins his ministry in Manchester. During his ministry in Hanover, Mr. Wise served as President of the Hanover Ministerial Association, President of the Hanover Council of Churches, Secretary of the Gettysburg Association, Chairman of the Budget Committee of Penn Central Conference, and Chairman of the Education of Penn Central Conference.

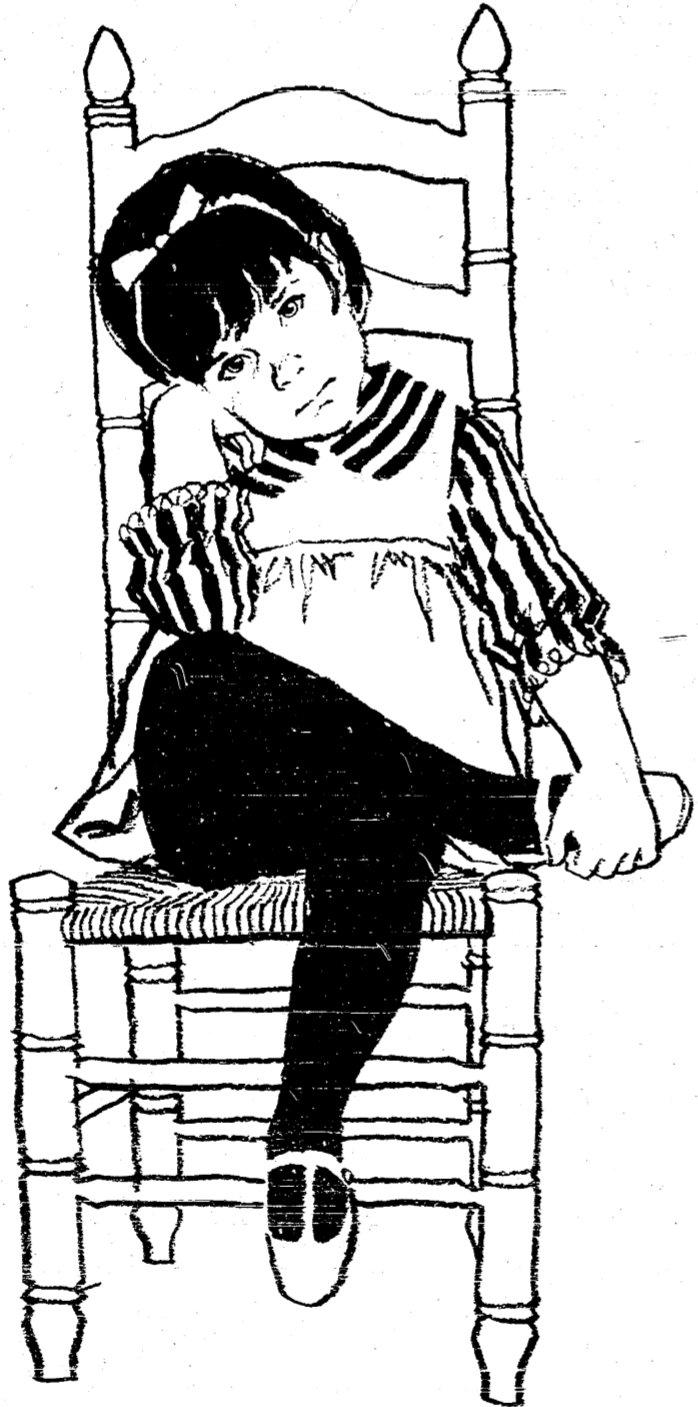

### YOUNG BANKERS AID COMMUNITY

by William G. Herber, Senior Vice President & Director of Urban Affairs First National City Bank

How does business stay on top of the rapidly changing social problems that afflict big cities and small towns alike?

One way is to encourage young employees to go out into the community on a volunteer basis, track down problems and find ways to help solve them.

At Citibank, we've done just that through our Urban Affairs Advisory Group, whose 15 members have tackled the job with enthusiasm.

They've gone out into the community to probe problems affecting housing, the schools, drugs, jobs, the environment—nearly the entire spectrum of the modern scene.

They've talked with elected officials, community leaders, agency heads, teachers, students and many others, gathering fact and opinion.

Working with the people of the community is important. "We design our solutions in and with the community."



Herman Diaz, the group's chairman, said.

The group meets regularly to review its findings and then sits down with the senior management team that directs our urban involvement, providing them with insights and recommendations.

The group is only a little over a year old but it already has made an impact in one field—the environment. It was responsible for our changing over to recycled paper for some of our publications, brought about more efficient use of stationery, publicized neighborhood recycling centers and sponsored an ecology suggestion contest which drew over 500 replies.

It also helped develop a slide program for the volunteer speakers bureau of the Environmental Action Coalition.

The young men and women on this task force are now considering several drug prevention and rehabilitation programs as well as projects in education and minority employment. And one of their goals this year is to make more of their fellow employees aware of their projects.

For if a year of grappling with urban problems has taught them one thing it's the need for concerted effort by many people. They've also learned that the size and complexity of the problems require time to resolve them.

### ELECTOR UNABLE TO MAKE PERSONAL APPLICATION, PROCEDURE

SEC. 504. Any elector who is unable to make personal application for registration because of physical disability or absence from the township, City or Village in which his legal residence is located, may be registered prior to the close of registration before any election or primary election by sending to the Clerk of the Township, City or Village in which is located his legal residence, duplicate registration cards and executing in duplicate the registration affidavit before a notary public or other officer legally authorized to administer oaths and returning such registration cards to the Clerk of the Township, City or Village before the close of office hours on the last day of registration prior to any election or primary election. The notary public or other officer administering the oath shall sign his name on the line for the signature of the registration officer and designate his title.

### UNREGISTERED PERSONS NOT ENTITLED TO VOTE

SEC. 491. The inspectors of election at any election or primary election in this State, in any District, County, Township, City or Village thereof, shall not receive the vote of any person whose name is not registered in the registration book of the Township, Ward or Precinct in which he offers to vote. (As provided under Act 116, P. A., 1964.)

### TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION, APPLICATION, TIME

SEC. 506. Any registered elector may upon change of residence within the Township, City or Village cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by sending to the Clerk a signed request, noting his present address, the date he moved there, and the address from which he was last registered, or by applying in person for a transfer. The Clerk shall make a transfer of registration request, listing the new residence address thereon over his signature, with election board in the precinct in which he is registered at the next ensuing primary or election. The inspector of election in charge of the registration records shall compare the signature thereon with the applicant's signature, with the original and duplicate registration cards, and shall place the original registration card in proper precinct file. Such transfer shall not be made after the Fifth Friday next preceding any election or primary election, unless such Fifth Friday shall fall on a legal holiday in which event registration transfers shall be accepted during the following day.

SEC. 507. 1. Measure packaged corn flake crumbs and margarine into 9-inch pie pan. Mix until thoroughly combined. Reserve 2 measuring tablespoons of crumbs mixture for topping; press remainder firmly and evenly around sides and in bottom of pie pan to form crust. Chill.
  2. In small saucepan combine bottled lemon juice and gelatin. Place over low heat and stir constantly until gelatin is dissolved; cool.

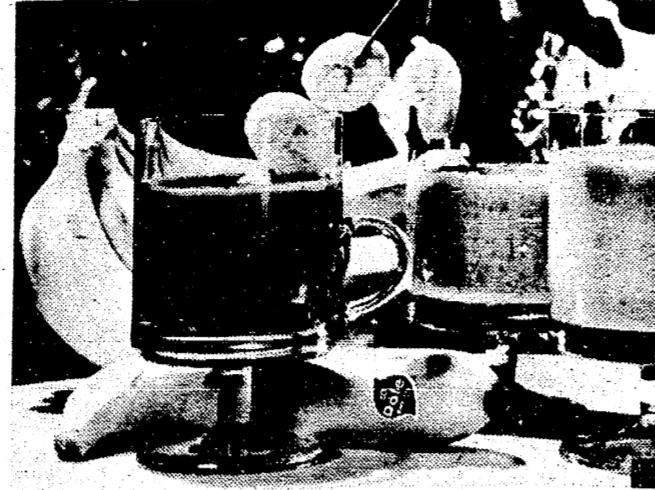

**AGRICULTURE IN ACTION**

**FARMING TODAY**

One of the tragedies of an age in which fewer and fewer people produce what we eat is the lack of understanding of what is involved in food production.

Our modern food production system has experienced many changes in recent years, and is made up of all kinds of farms and farmers. Some farmers work at the occupation full time and have no other source of income. Others are part-time or even weekend hobby farmers, but they all help supply our food needs.

Most farmers are still the traditional proprietor, using mainly family labor and buying and selling in the market. At the other extreme, we have some huge farm operations which require wage laborers and even sales and bookkeeping personnel.

Many people still think of the farmer as mainly putting seeds into the ground, or feed into animals' mouths to turn out food and fiber for consumers, who will reward him according to its worth or their means.

Food production is much more complex than that today. Profit and loss is the governor over the modern farm. What pays is produced; what does not, is not.

Farmers today are a part of a big and complicated market mechanism that does more than sack potatoes and package bacon. They must compete for markets and prices for their products. They are influenced by merchandising practices. Whole sectors of farming are at the mercy of nutritionists' debates on the dangers of fats.

Farmers are also affected by a maze of laws and regulations. Their future is subject to local tax assessments; to rules on feeding steers diethylstilbestrol; to a number of price classes for raw milk; to the exchange rate between dollars and yen in selling farm products to Japan and to the success of the Secretary of Agriculture in negotiating foreign trade agreements.

Yes, today's farming is part of a big and complicated private and public bureaucracy whether we like it or not.

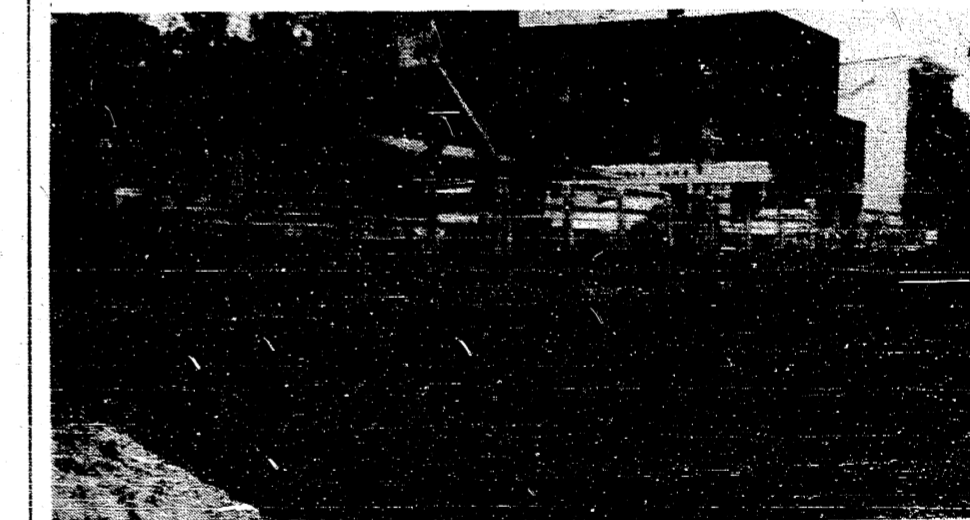
