19th Chicken Broil Thursday, July 20th

Chicken Broil time is coming up Thursday, July 20. Serving starts at 4 p.m. until 8 p.m. on the Manchester Athletic Field. About 400 men and boys take over the project to raise money for youth projects. Sound familiar? It should to those who have lived here a long time and those not so long.

To the Manchester Enterprise this is not a new story but it is a news story. Nineteen years ago this paper told about that first broil and carried the lead story as it has every year since. Publisher Simon Steele has, in various capacities helped print the tickets which always sold adults \$1.75.

With the price of everything soaring this year, there has to be a slight change. Tickets bought in advance from any of the workers are \$1.75 same as usual BUT cost \$2.00 at the

gate the day of the broil. A word of advice--get tickets early. No standing in line for tickets.

The Broil committee headed by Luther C. Klager and Rolland Grossman are prepared to serve 11,000. They chaired that first broil when 350 were served. After that broil the workers set down with blistered hands and sore feet and talked over the days work.

Now some of the workers keep the broil in the back of their minds throughout the year thinking of ways of doing things--such as the new double grids that hold the chicken halves. But the menu is the same. But there is a lot more of it.

Visitors from most of the States have signed the guest books while stopping here. It is quite a sight to see hundreds of chicken halves slow broiled over charcoal. Country fresh Continued on Page 6

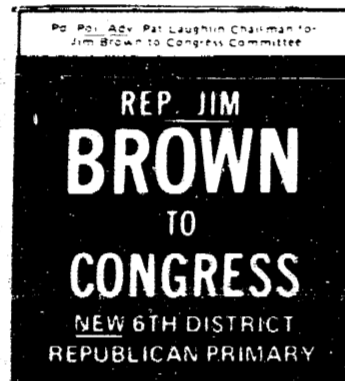
The latest project is converting a village dump into Kirk Park--ecology in action. The list of accom-

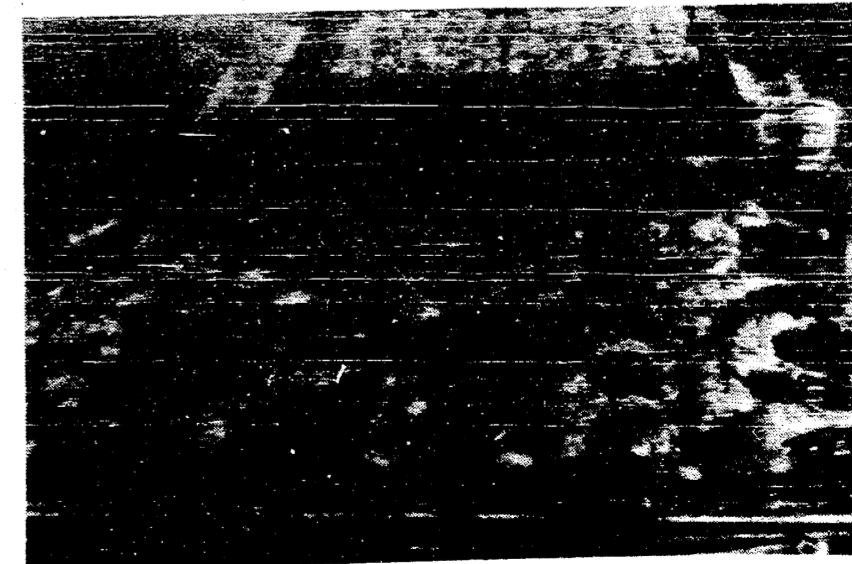

Ask Senator GRIFFIN



By cutting through red tape, members of Congress can often lend a hand to those with problems involving the federal government. Through the columns of this newspaper, Senator Griffin answers questions of general interest. He will respond personally to all communications addressed to: Senator Robert P. Griffin, Senate Office Building, Washington, D.C. 20510.

My husband says that if I divorce him—which I intend to do—my Social Security benefits will be cut off. Is that correct?

—S. S., Detroit

Maybe. If you are 62 or older and if you've been married to your husband 20 years or longer, your benefits would not be cut off. Just to be sure, I suggest that you visit your Social Security office before you go to court.

My father, a veteran of World War I, recently passed away. He had requested a military funeral, but because of some confusion, he did not receive this last request. Is there anything that the Federal government will do now to recognize his military service?

—P. V., Battle Creek

Yes there is. A headstone or grave marker is authorized for any member of the armed services who died while on active duty or who was honorably discharged. Most funeral homes as well as all Veterans Administration offices have the proper form (DD 1330) to request such a marker. The request should be sent to the Commanding Officer, U.S. Army Memorial Affairs Agency, Washington, D.C. 20315. Such a headstone or marker will be appropriately engraved to bear the veteran's name, State, rank, unit, war period of service (for example, World War I, Korean War, etc.) and date of birth and death. In addition, the Federal government will pay \$250 toward funeral expenses of a veteran. An application for this benefit may be obtained at any VA office.
