## Trickey's Purchase Schaible Clothing Store

Charles Trickey Jr. and his wife Betty, will on February 1st assume ownership of the former Schaible Clothing store of Manchester.

The building at 105 East Main Street has housed a clothing store continuously for fifty-five years. Owned by Wuertner Brothers, it was many years ago purchased by Walt Schaible. Following his death, Mrs. Vera Schaible felt that the tradition of a clothing store and its benefits to the town should remain.

In twenty two years "on the road" as a salesman in the clothing business, Mr. Trickey had Schaible's and Marx and Marx as customers. As-

suming part ownership of Mannings Clothing store in Belleville, he later opened a larger store in Tecumseh and is further expanding with the acquisition of the Manchester Branch.

Present plans call for some remodeling of the interior of the building to accommodate not only the men's wear which will remain but also the full line of women's clothes.

Good news for our ladies lies in the fact that once again good products will be available locally. In house dresses, Shaker Square and Bill Sims, and in better dresses, Don Kenney classics will be offered. Blouses with labels by Ship 'n' Shore, Bobbie Brooks, and White Stag with Junior lines as well. Ladies canvas shoes will combine with mens shoes and hopefully a children's line at a later date.

Charles and Betty, who work together, have been residents of Tecumseh for twelve years, and have been extremely active in community affairs. Charles, who has a strong interest in politics was Lenawee County Chairman of the Republican party, State Commander of Am. Vets., a member of American Legion, V.F.W., Rotary Club, and the Chamber of Commerce. He was also, for a time, a member of the Michigan Veterans Trust Fund Board.

His lovely and intelligent wife, Betty, who works so closely with him holds a PhD and a Masters Degree from Stenna Heights College and taught remedial reading and English for six years in the Tecumseh School System. They have three children, Charles III, is married and completing his final year in Law School; a daughter, April, is a student at Eastern Michigan University; and son, Kevin, is in High School in Tecumseh.

## Summary of Snowmobile Ordinance

Summary of the Village of Manchester Snowmobile Ordinance No. 89: "It is unlawful for any person to operate a snowmobile on the private property of another without the express permission to do so by the owner or occupant of said property."

"On public school grounds, park property, playgrounds, recreational areas without express provision or permission to do so by the proper public authority."

"In a manner so as to create loud, unnecessary or unusual noise so as to disturb or interfere with the peace and quiet of other persons."

"In a careless, reckless or negligent manner so as to endanger the safety of any person or the property of any other person."

"Within the right-of-way of any public street within the Village unless the operator shall have a valid driver's license issued pursuant to Act 300 Public Acts of Michigan for 1949 as amended, or is accompanied by a licensed driver, who is actually occupying a seat in the vehicle."

"On Main Street between the intersections of Riverside Street and Main Street and Washington Street and Main Street, between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m."

"The Village Council may, by resolution, prohibit the operation of snowmobiles within the right-of-way of the public roads or streets or other village property within the village when in their opinion the public safety and welfare so requires."

The above summary of the Village of Manchester Ordinance for operation and regulation of Snowmobiles is being published for the information of the owners and operators of snowmobiles in the Village of Manchester due to many complaints received by Police and the Village Council as to the operation and trespassing upon the properties of others.

It is also felt that if due care in the operation of snowmobiles within the Village cannot be done, the village council will review this ordinance and refer to the last quoted section of the ordinance.

NORTH SHARON BIBLE SCHEDULES HOMECOMING DAY

The North Sharon Bible Church will hold its annual Homecoming Day this Sunday, January 23. Former pas-tors and members are especially invited to attend. Those who cannot attend are urged to send a letter of greeting to be read or displayed.

Pictures dating back to 1933 will be on display, along with a near 100 year old communion set and other artifacts of the church's long and var-ied history.

Today Rev. William D. Enslin serves 68 members and an average of 100 Sunday School pupils. He is the first fulltime pastor in the Church's history.

Village Planning Commission

December 9, 1971

The regular meeting of the Vil-lage Planning Commission was held at the Village Hall, with members present Edward Curley, Laurin Leeson, David Little, Harry Krauss, and John Althouse.

Also in attendance were Mr. Sang Nam, professional planner with the Washtenaw County Metropolitan Planning Commission, and Mr. Bruce Daniels, Superintendent of Public Works.

(Note: Mr. Edward (Ted) Cur-ley has been appointed by the Council to replace Mr. Gale Koebbe, resigned.)

The meeting was called to or-der at 7:55 p.m. by Chairman Curley. Minutes of the last meeting were read, and on the motion by Little seconded by Althouse, were approved.

With reference to a previous question as to the possibility of contin-uity of street and road names between the Village and Township (for instance: Main St., Austin Rd., Macomb St., Schleweis Rd.), Mr. Nam has investi-

gated and reports that there is no stand-ard provision for such changes.

In reference to the previous dis-cussion about the possibility of includ-ing suitable allowances and limitations for a mobile home area in our plans, Mr. Nam showed six "model layouts" and explained some of the desirable characteristics and legal requirements of such "parks", and stated that per-manent planning will be further stud-ied and included in our finalized zon-ing map and ordinance.

Mr. Nam distributed a 42 page tentative "Development Plan", this be-ing the fourth element of the total plan-ning. The Development Plan consists of three parts: land use, circulation, and community facilities. It is written as a guide to be used as a policy state-ment for future growth, and is not to be confused with the "Official Zoning Dis-trict Map" and Ordinance. Various por-tions were discussed, and copies were left for all members to study and bring back questions or suggested modifica-tions.

Adjournment was moved by Lit-tle, and seconded by Krauss.

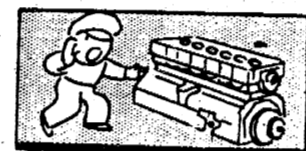

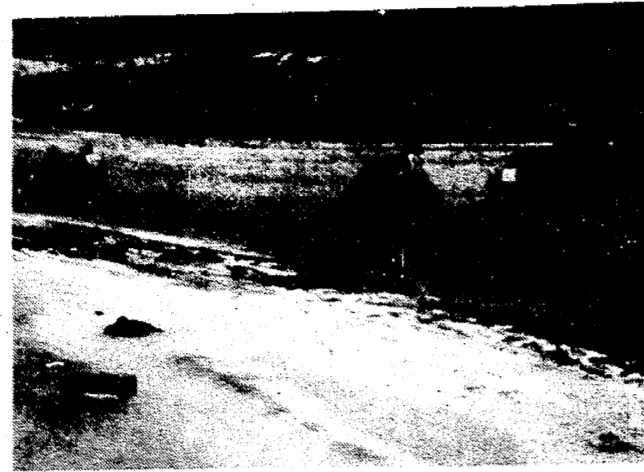

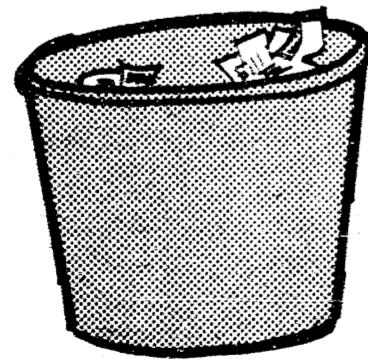

**UNREGISTERED PERSONS NOT ENTITLED TO VOTE**

SEC. 491. The inspectors of election or any election or primary election in this State, or in any District, County, Township, City or Village thereof, shall not receive the vote of any person whose name is not registered in the registration book of the Township, Ward or Precinct in which he offers to vote. (As provided under Act 116, P. A. 1954.)

**TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION, APPLICATION, TIME**

SEC. 506. Any registered elector may upon change of residence within the Township, City or Village cause his registration to be transferred by sending to the Clerk a signed request stating his present address, the date he moved there, and the address from which he was last registered, or by applying in person for a transfer. **TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION ON ELECTION DAY**

SEC. 507. Any registered elector who has removed from one election precinct of a Township, City or Village to another election precinct of the same Township, City or Village and has not recorded such removal with the local Clerk shall execute a transfer of registration request, listing the new residence address thereon over his signature, with the election board in the precinct in which he is registered at the next ensuing primary or election. The inspector of election in charge of the registration records shall compare the signature thereon with the signature upon the applicant's registration request and, if the signatures correspond, then the inspector shall certify such fact by affixing his initials upon said request. The applicant for transfer, after having signed an application to vote as provided in Section 503 of this act, shall then be permitted to vote in such precinct for that primary or election only. The application for transfer shall be filed with the Township, City or Village Clerk who shall transfer each voter's registration in accordance with the application. When the name of any street in a Township, City or Village has been changed, it shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clerk to make the change to show the proper name of street in the registration records, and it shall not be necessary for the elector to change his registration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote.

The economic cost of heart disease in the United States has been estimated to be more than \$10 billion a year, says the Michigan Heart Association, a Michigan United Fund Agency.

## AGRICULTURE IN ACTION

MICHIGAN FARM BUREAU

Many people have been forecasting the economic outlook for the 1972 year. Agriculture has not been exempt from the forecasts.

After the loud objections to and the conformation of the new Secretary of Agriculture, Dr. Butz made his own forecast concerning agriculture's future in 1972.

Secretary Butz has forecast that gross farm income for 1972 will rise a-bout \$2 billion over the 1971 level to about \$60 billion. He also predicted that net farm income for the year would increase by about \$1 billion to \$16.7 billion. If this happens, it will be an all time high record for both gross farm income and net farm income.

Secretary Butz also forecasted that farm exports, which slumped to roughly \$7 billion in 1971 from \$7.8 billion in 1970, may rise to more than \$8 billion this year, assuming there will be no dock strikes, which played a role in reducing last year's exports.

For some time farmers have been faced with increased costs of items needed to produce food and fiber and very little change in the price received for their produce. This has resulted in the farmer being caught in a price-cost squeeze which has driven his net income down. Some forecasters are predicting a brighter spot on the outlook of farm input costs. It has been estimated that the farmers' cost of production items in 1972, such as machinery and fertilizer, will only increase something in the neighborhood of 2 1/2 percent, but not as much as the customary 5 to 7 percent in the past. This is in line with the wage-price guidelines suggested price increase of 2 1/2 percent.

Some forecasters have predicted an increase of up to 5.3 percent per hour for the average factory worker but only a 4 percent increase in farm cash income.

Farm prices have been long over due for an increase to just meet the increased costs of production. Forecasters can forecast better farm income in 1972, but only an increase in the final tally at the end of the year can help farmers.

## The Gilbert Luckhardt Family Visits Australia

A resident of Sydney, a huge seaport on the Southeast Coast, Betty met Gilbert as a girl of 15, when he was in and out of the port while serving his six year span of service in the U.S. Navy. ## Marching Mothers



The Mother's March for the March of Dimes will begin in the village of Manchester on Wednesday, January 26th and continue through Saturday, the 29th. During those four days approximately 35 women will attempt to raise as much money as possible to help carry on the struggle against the second greatest destroyer of human life - birth defects.

The original Mother's March was organized with only one purpose - defeat of the dreaded crippling, Infantile Paralysis. The purpose was accomplished and Polio is no longer a threat but the defeat of that one disease took seventeen years, millions of dollars and much hard work on the part

of many dedicated people in and out of the medical profession. Most of the money used in that long battle was raised by the Mother's March for the March of Dimes.

Mrs. Wm. Bunney, chairman of Manchester's Mother's March, points out that in recent years many major causes of birth defects have been eradicated entirely, as with Polio, via a vaccine, such as Rubella or German Measles and the RH problem. However, birth defects can never be completely eliminated as long as human beings are born, not hatched in incubators or baby factories.

There are many promising advances being implemented every day that lessen the incidence of abnormal births and furnish corrective solutions for those who are born with defects. Many of the serious, disabling diseases and ailments of middle years and old age are now being diagnosed in infancy as birth defects, and as such, can be corrected or treated with much less cost, both monetary and that of human suffering.

Mrs. Bunney says that one of the questions most often asked of her volunteers is, "Who has the March of Dimes helped in Manchester?" It is a question, both difficult and easy to answer. Files on direct patient aid given to families by the National Foundation March of Dimes are confidential and no names are generally released to the public but it can be said without fear of contradiction that every child in this area fits directly from the facilities for diagnosis and treatment made available in part by The March of Dimes.
