

Congressman Marvin L. Esch (R-Michigan) Said today that he was increasingly optimistic about the chances for approval of a two-year Monitoring Program of the River Raisin. The program would be undertaken by Environmental Research Associated, Inc. on a five mile length of the River from the western city limits of Monroe to Lake

Erie. "The proposal will include a continuous automated monitoring program, 24 hours a day, for three selective week Weekly samples will also be taken at six sampling points along the River,

"In addition," continued Esch, "two critical sampling areas will be included in the project. The Municipal Sewage Treatment Plant will be one of these areas so that sampling above and below that plant will be most important. The second critical area of sampling will study the effect of major water usage by the Fossil Fuel Power Plant which is to go on stream initially for

25% production." Congressman Esch who has pushed on a number of environmental projects in Monroe County said he was hopeful that the Environmental Protection Agency would approve this proposal. "This is a program," said Esch, "that will clearly be of great environmental value for the Monroe area. Further, it is a program which will be administered by a group that has the necessary expertise to carry it to a successful completion. I am hopeful that EPA will recognize these important factors and give it expeditious approval to the proposal. Esch said the proposal has already been regional office and is in Washington.

AGRICULTURE IN ACTION

MICHIGAN FARM BUREAU

So far, Michigan consumers have been protected from having the quality of the meat they buy lowered. For some time, Michigan has

had a law which contains stricter ingredient standards for comminuted meats than the federal law provides.

Recently, the U.S. House Agri-

Recently, the U.S. House Agricultural Committee considered an amendment to a bill which would, in effect, force Michigan to lower its high standards of quality in packaging various meat products such as hot dogs, sausage, bologna, etc. to conform to lower federal standards.

After a strong protest from farmers meat industry officials, Farm Bureau representatives, state officials and consumers the House committee rejected the proposed amendment. But, the battle is not won.

Strong opposition to our state's position is expected when the bill comes to the House floor. Opponents contend that our higher standards impose a problem for the meat industry in trying to meet varying regulations. Many meat packers want uniform standards. Why shouldn't Congress consider the higher Michigan standards when studying a basis for national meat inspection uniformity?

Michigan consumers are disturbed about this attempt by the federal government to dictate standards for states. They are also upset over having their meat quality diluted. After all, they are the ones who eat the meat.

The question is a variance of the "age-old" one of federal supremacy and states rights.

Congress must realize that Michigan consumers, or those of any other state for that matter, have a right to stricter meat standards if they desire them. In recent months this right has been upheld in court twice.

THE MANCHESTER ENTERPRISE



SHOOTING STARS

The Perseids - a shower of meteors iat appears annually - will flash across the evening skies of August, notes Iniversity of Michigan astronomer Hazel

She says these bright "shooting tars" will reach a peak of about 70 per nour around Aug. 11. The iron or stone neteors, which burn up when they enter the earth's atmosphere at high speeds, grow more numerous with the approach-

The U-M astronomer says the eteors are believed to be debris spread out along the orbit of a comet and they appear to radiate from a point in the onstellation Perseus in the northeast. although the shooting stars' paths may seem divergent, Prof. Losh notes, they ctually move along parallel lines. The neteors can glow as brightly as the North Star upon hitting our atmosphere, she adds, but they are probably no larger han the head of a pin.

August constellations include Aquil the eagle, in the eastern portion of the Milky Way, Prof. Losh notes. Aquila contains the conspicuous star Altair, easily identified by two attendant stars. With Altair in the middle, the three stars orm a striking line, Prof. Losh says.

Near the zenith is the constellation Cygnus, the swan. Also known as the Northern Cross, Cygnus seems to be flying

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

As you know, our state has strict meat inspection requirements that assure Michigan consumers the purest hot dogs and sausage in the country. Since the Federal government pays part of the cost of administering state meat inspection laws some Congressmen were pressing for absolute uniformity among all the states on meat inspection standards, However, as now modified, the legislation would require states to meet minimum federal standards, but it would not penalize a state like Michides that mainteins a higher standard.

Recently, I read about a Congresswamen who was of Representatives. Con't you wear a hat in the Capital of the United States?

Wearing a hat while on the floor is against the rules of the House of Representatives-and is under unwritten rules observed by Senators. Until 1837, Members of the House sometimes were hats while attending sessions of Congress. Like so many others, this practice was inherited from the English Parliament. However, in 1837, the House adopted a rule which prohibits members from covering their heads until after they leave the House chamber. Of course, anyone can wear a hat in areas of the Capitol other than in the legislative

Heat oven to hot (400°F.). Empty contents of corn muffin mix package into bowl; add egg, milk, honey and bacon. Blend only until dry ingredients are thoroughly moistened, but not smooth. Pour batter into greased medium-sized muffin cups, filling half full. Bake in preheated oven (400°F.) about 12 minutes. Serve warm with honey butter made by beating together honey and butter






