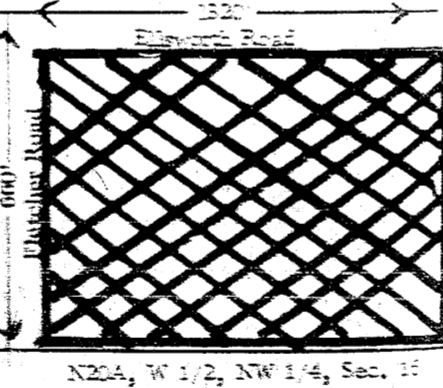

AMENDMENT TO FREEDOM TOWNSHIP ZONING ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AND EXTEND THE PROVISIONS OF THE TOWNSHIP ZONING ORDINANCE OF FREEDOM TOWNSHIP WHICH WAS EFFECTIVE JULY 15, 1957 TO CHANGE THE ZONING MAP

The Township of Freedom Ordinance Section 4.02-1 District Maps:
The north twenty (20) acres of the west half of the northwest quarter of Section Sixteen (16), Town Three (3) South, Range Four (4) East presently zoned District A-1 General Farming and Residence District is changed to Industrial District I-1. The said zoning may be changed as follows:



Effective date August 15, 1972.

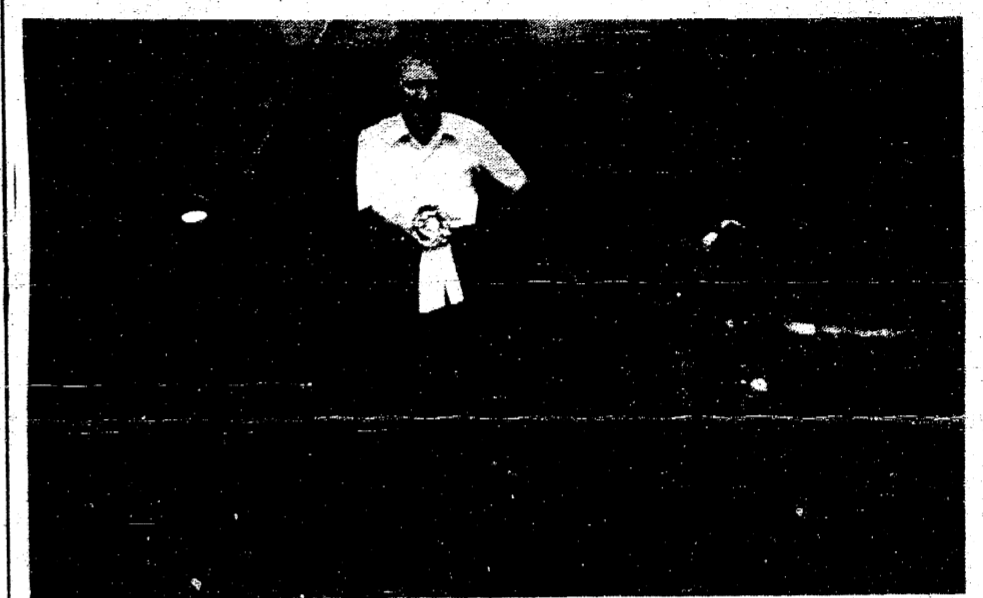

WASHTENAW COUNTY LIBRARY NEWS

"What kinds of books do you like to read? Recent history and public affairs? How about Wheels, or perhaps The Story Bible by Pearl Buck?"

These are the kinds of questions one might expect to hear in any public library where reader services are provided. What may not be realized is that such questions may even be asked of the blind, persons with failing eyesight, or with severe physical impairments. Unless a person has had the opportunity of escorting one with such limitations to the library, or lives with someone who is visited regularly by a librarian serving the homebound, he may not even be aware of this growing specialized service.

The Washtenaw County Library will soon join with a growing number of other libraries over the United States which provide special services for those with visual handicaps or those whose physical impairments prevent their management of reading materials. Persons who have lost the use of their arms or hands through accidents, strokes, cerebral palsy, multiple sclerosis, or other crippling diseases are not forgotten in today's libraries.

The Michigan State Library was a pioneer in service to the blind and handicapped when it began providing this service in 1928. It was not until 1931 that Congress passed the Pratt-Smoot Act which authorized the Library of Congress to establish such a service, and to set up regional centers in each of the then 48 states. Until 1966, the emphasis was on the blind, but in that year the law was amended to include anyone unable to read ordinary printed materials because of physical or visual limitations. This latest action also authorized the establishment of sub-regionals to place these materials plus the machines on which to play them within easy reach of the persons desiring to use them.

Approximately 172 blind and physically handicapped persons in Washtenaw and Livingston counties are receiving reading materials from the Michigan State Library. It is not presently known just how many eligible persons in the two-county area would make use of the service were it more convenient, but at least 25 new patrons have been added within the past few weeks. The subregional hopes to double the present number of users by next year.

The designation of the Washtenaw County Library as the subregional agency for the Michigan State Library will become official on August 24, when an Open House will be held from 1:00 to 4:00 P.M. with a program at 3:00. In preparation for the beginning of the special service, Mrs. Ruthe Marshall, Community Services Librarian, has been busy for several weeks. Efforts have been made to contact social workers, school officials, church groups, service organizations, hospital volunteers and others who have been urged to put eligible persons in direct contact with the library. A special section of the library has been set aside for those who visit the library. Over 900 titles of talking books and about 500 titles in the large print collection have been assembled.

A talking book is simply a recording which has been made to be played on a simply designed machine which can be easily manipulated. The machines and records are available free of charge. Even the mailing is free so there is no expense to the reader. A catalog of available titles is used to assist the reader in making his selections and with the new subregional library, needed help is as close as the telephone.

Though application for the service is necessary, Lawrence B. Davenport, library director, points out that this is not as obstructive as it may seem on the surface. The visiting librarian, a member of the family, a member of the medical profession or a teacher can assist the patron and certify their need for the service.

All patrons and interested persons are invited and urged to attend the Open House on August 24, at the Washtenaw County Library located at 4133 Washtenaw Avenue.

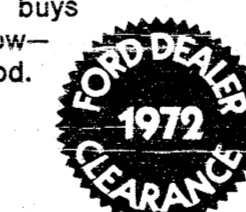

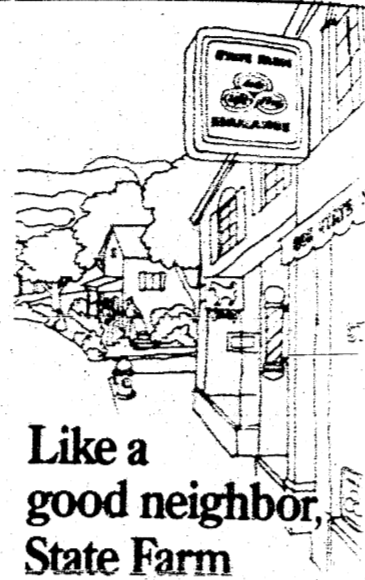

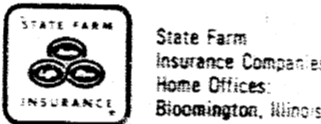

Manchester Schools To Open September 5th

The Manchester Public Schools will open Tuesday, September 5, 1972 for the 1972-73 school year. Students will attend school a full day on that date. Bus routes will continue on last year's schedule for the first week, and any changes that are necessary will be made for the second week.

Anyone in the school district having a kindergarten student who has not been registered should do this immediately. Parents may register their children at either the Klager Elementary School or at the Superintendent's Office between the hours of 8:00 A.M. and 3:30 P.M.

New residents in the school district may register their children at any time during the above stated hours.

School officials are looking for an increase in enrollment based on the reported number of new families moving into the school district.

An unprecedented increase occurred during the 1971-72 school year when 36 additional students were enrolled during that time. The total enrollment as of May 28, 1972 stood at 1340 with 1304 in attendance on the fourth Friday in September of 1971.

It is evident from the number of new homes being built in the district that the Manchester School System can expect considerable growth in the next few years.

MIDDLE SCHOOL NEWS

On Tuesday, September 5, the opening day of school, all seventh and eighth graders should report to the gym in the Intermediate Building for registration procedure and other general information. Each fifth and sixth grader should report to the Nellie Ackerson Building, locate his or her name on a class list outside the classroom and report to that room. All registration matters will be taken care of at that time.

Locks will be available for hallway lockers for a \$2.00 deposit. If the same lock is returned in June, the \$2.00 will be refunded. If a lock is used, only school owned locks will be permitted. No others will be allowed. Students are not required to have locks on their hallway lockers, but are encouraged to do so.

Stewart Sandwiches will be sold the first week of school for those who wish to buy a hot sandwich instead of bringing a sack lunch. As before though, those who live within previously defined boundaries in the village are expected to go home for lunch.

Parents are urged to become familiar with the various school regulations, etc. that we expect students to obey. These are fully described in the 1972-1973 Student Guide that each middle school student receives the first day of school. Ask your child to bring home his Guide for you to read. In as much as the educational process is a partnership endeavor between parents, students, and teachers, it helps communications if all three understand certain basic rules.

Mrs. Mary Jean Hoffman will teach again this year. There will be 3-10 week sessions with each class being 1/2 hr. The cost will be \$15.00 per ten week session. A Women's Exercise Class will also be offered, this being only a 6 weeks course. This will be an hour class; the cost for the exercise classes will be \$18.00 for the 6 week session. All classes will be held on Tuesdays. The classes will begin on September 19. Payment for the lessons is due at the time of registration so as to insure the number of students.

The Manchester Co-op Nursery Salas Potluck Supper will be held September 11th at 7:00 p.m. at the Emmanuel Church.

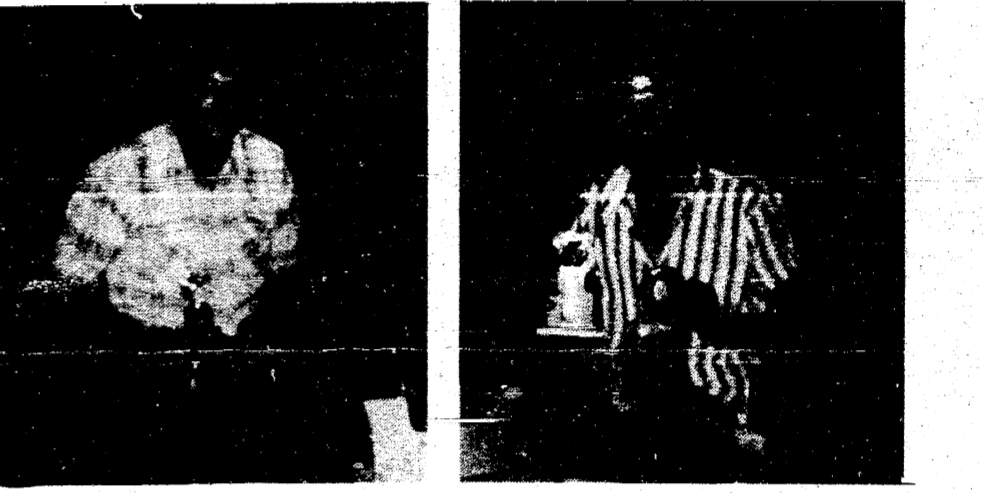

Tractor Pull Contest Winners

The 3rd annual compact tractor pull got under way with 17 tractors entered from Saline, Grass Lake, Tecumseh, Chelsea, Dexter, Ann Arbor, and Manchester. Since there were only 4 entered in the lightweight class, they did not pull until the evening contest.

The mediumweight entrants numbered 8. Starting with a weight of 1180 pounds, the drivers worked their way up to 1890 pounds. At this point remaining in the contest were Willard Girbach, Saline, Gerold Eaton, Tecumseh, Brian Leisinger, Grass Lake, and Gary Traster, Saline. These 4 would go on to the evening trials. Earning a 5th place ribbon was Gerold Roberts of Chelsea.

There were 5 entrants in the heavy-weight division, which meant a short morning contest, with only 1 to eliminate. Unfortunately, the first to fall out was a local man, Alan Schwab, who, none-the-less, took home a 5th place ribbon. Those remaining for the evening pull were Brian Farger, Chelsea, Ed Buku, Chelsea, Dick Busha, Ann Arbor, and Ron Diable, Ann Arbor.

Come 6:30 p.m., everyone was rearin' to go, to try for the very fine trophies sponsored by Haab Brothers Hardware, Pleasant Lake, Braun Implantment, Bridgewater, and Diable Feeds, Ann Arbor. Our officials, headed by Mike Rossettie and Jerry Jacob, were Pete Hughs on the left boundary, Lee Dennis hooking chains, and Jim Mann pulling the bolt back. The ever present book work was done by Alice Rossettie, while our 2 young sweepers were Mickey and Tom Rossettie. Our thanks go to these hard workers.

The lightweights turned out to be a real contest between 2 young men, Ken Diable, Saline, and Dan Eaton, Tecumseh. Each seemed to be determined to be top man, and they pulled all the way up to 1730 pounds, before Dan Eaton found his limit. They were pulling close to twice their own weight. Taking 3rd was Gary Schwab of Manchester, and 4th was Jon Schenk of Grass Lake. Jon, weighing only 500 pounds, was called out because of jerking the chain, but he said he'd add some weights, and see us next year. This is typical of the sporting attitude of all these men, who are really a pleasure to work with.

The mediumweight class also turned into a 2 man duel, after Gerold Eaton went out at 1830 pounds for 4th place, and Gary Traster was stopped at 1880 pounds. Willard Girbach and Brian Leisinger went on pulling pretty evenly until at 2330 pounds, when Leisinger had the misfortune of breaking his gearbox. These men were both pulling over twice their weight.

The heavyweight contestants all weighed between 2000 pounds of each other, ranging from 1290 to 1300 pounds. All went evenly for the first 9 pulls, and we started adding 100 pounds at a time.

Finally at 2680 pounds signs of strain began to show. At 2890 pounds Dick Busha's best pull was 34", giving him 4th place, and Ron Diable's best pull was 48 1/2", giving him 3rd place. This time we added 50 pounds, as we had been doing, as the tractors were really working. Brian Farger came up for his try at 2930 pounds. Brian's best pull was 53". Now it was up to Ed Buku; he had to better Brian's 53". Ed pulled with all he had, with the crowd screaming and cheering him on. At the end of his 2 tries his best pull was 47"; he had to take second.

It was a really thrilling climax for our 1972 compact tractor pull, and our thanks go out to all of the entrants for making this a great competition. We hope to see them all again next year.
