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





Success in the effort to control inflation is basic to virtually every other problem facing our nation. Too much time and effort has been placed on trying to correct the problem through "make-do" controls rather than directly attacking the real cause.

William J. Kuhfuss, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation, said, "We have repeatedly informed the Administration that the root cause of inflation and high prices is excess government spending and that sound fiscal policies would make unnecessary the temporary and politically expedient measures now being promoted in an effort to deal with the symptoms of inflation rather than its cuase."

Every American should be concerned about our country's fiscal policy It is predicted that government spending will jump to a new peak of \$250 billion in fiscal 1973, which ends next June 30. Spending climbed to \$233 billion last year, from \$211 billion the year before. There is doubt among some fiscal observers that the budget can be held within the \$250 billion mark since the Administration estimates of spending were based on a five percent increase in Social Security benefits. Congress passed an increase of twenty percent in

ESTIMATED INCOME TAX DUE

Detroit, Michigan -- Individuals filing 1972 declarations of estimated federal income tax must pay the third installment of tax by Friday, Septembe

Taxpayers who first met the requirements for filing an estimate after June 1, 1972, but before September 2, 1972 are required to file on Form 1040 ES and pay at least half of the tax by September 15, 1972. These persons should use declaration-voucher No. 3.

Thomas A. Cardoza, District Director of Internal Revenue for Michigan, said today that taxpayers whose anticipated income during 1972 has changed may be required to amend their declarations.

Space to compute an amended estimate is provided in the estimated tax package received by taxpayers. Publication 505, "Tax Withhold-

ing and Declaration of Estimated Tax, which furnishes detailed information or this subject, can be obtained free from your IRS district office.



By cutting through red tape, members of Congress can often lend a hand to those with problems involving the federal government. Through the columns of this newspaper, Senator Griffin answers questions of general interest. He will respond personally to all communications addressed to: Senator Robert P. Griffin, Senate Office Building, Washington, D.C. 20510.

While in the Army, my son spent two years in Japan. He currently is attending college under the G.I. Bill, but wants to return to Japan for a year to pursue his major in Asian studies. Is there any financial aid available for veterans who wish to study overseas?

Indeed there is. Your son should be able to continue to receive monthly payments under the G.I. Bill while attending college in Japan. If necessary, he may also be eligible for a student loan under a program administered by the U.S. Office of Education which makes loan funds available for foreign study. Enclosed are additional information and the necessary forms which should make it possible for your son to be on his way.

My brother lost a leg in Vietnam. Fortunately, the injury doesn't keep him down. He has a good job, but he can't drive a car without a lot of expensive equipment. Isn't there a special benefit so he can buy a car?

Yes, if he applies for it, the Veterans Administration will pay up to \$2800 toward the price of an automobile for a veteran who suffered service-connected permanent loss of one or both hands or feet. The V.A. will also provide, free of charge, special equipment necessary to adapt the car to the individual's handicap. The \$2800 benefit is obtainable only once, but the V.A. will provide adaptive equipment for any present or future car bought by a disabled veteran.

Raymond Girbach, Chairman of the Washtenaw County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee announces that the basic provisions for proven wheat yields are continued under the Agriculture Act of 1970. A producer may elect to establish a vield for his farm based on actual production rather than use a yield established by the County Committee on a judgement hasis only. The base period for establishing 1973 farm yields is 1969, 1970 and 1971. To prove a yield, a producer must have produced wheat on the farm in each of these three years and be shie to provide reliable proof of production. In order to assure consideration a written request must be filed by September 22, 1972.







#### **Dutchmen Play** Addison Friday


MANCHESTER VS. ADDISON September 22, Away


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
