Today's living is far removed from the life of the Pilgrims who set aside a special day in 1623 to celebrate a bountiful harvest.

For nearly two years the Pilgrims had worked together as a unit for the "...common cause and condition" under the terms of the Mayflower Compact with very little success. Life in the new land became increasingly difficult, everyone seemed to be working hard so all could be provided for equally, but the crits and bins were not filled.

In 1623 Governor Bradford proclaimed a new rule allowing every man to till, plant, harvest and store that which he desired. Under the new system, more corn was planted than ever before in hopes that a family would have more than their own requirements and some could be used for trading for other goods and services.

From that beginning, a nation has been built and a Thanksgiving Day was added to our calendar.

Saline Hospital to Build Medical Complex

The Board of Directors of Saline Community Hospital today announced plans to build a \$3.1 million hospital facility. Construction is scheduled to begin January, 1973, and be completed in approximately twelve months.

Three basic elements comprise the new hospital complex:

- (1) The present hospital building will be converted to a medical sciences center housing a doctors' clinic.
- (2) A new central core building will house greatly enlarged facilities for emergency care, radiology, surgery, laboratory and administrative functions.
- (3) A four-wing hospital section will increase inpatient capacity from 26 to 82 beds.

"Most importantly," Ernest Girbach, Chairman of the Hospital's Board of Directors stated, "the new hospital will provide the area with greatly needed additional inpatient and emergency facilities. Our growing community requires this expansion to alleviate present overcrowding and to adequately provide for future population growth in the area."

A 152-bed extended care facility will be built adjacent to the complex by the Detroit Evangelical Home, an affiliate of the United Church of Christ.

"Although this extended care facility will be funded independently, its presence within the new hospital complex greatly improves the scope of medical services we can provide area patients," Stanton G. Roesch, Chairman of the Hospital's planning and building committee went on to state: "Obviously, by having extended care in such close proximity, patient transfer problems are minimized and emergency care opportunities are greatly improved."

The project developer is Hospital Building & Equipment Company, Inc. of St. Louis, Mo., nationally known specialists in hospital design and construction.

The new complex, totaling 64,000 sq. feet, will be built on the Hospital's present 15-acre site in Saline. The existing facility was built in 1959 and covers approximately 12,000 sq. feet.

Total project costs including actual construction, complete furnishings and equipment, site development, and contingencies will approximate 3.1 million dollars.

"We expect to secure somewhat more than one-half of this sum through a long-term loan underwritten by the

American Indian Sunday Observed

The Emanuel Adult Fellowship held their annual family Thanksgiving dinner Sunday evening in the Fellowship Hall. Following the dinner a business meeting was held headed by Mr. Art Williams. A program was presented following the business meeting on the American Indians. The Order of the Arrow Dance Team with Keith Whitaker on the drums entertained the group with several Indian dances.

Special guest speaker was Moose Pamp who is the Native American Advocate at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor. Moose commented on the problems, past and present, of the American Indians thousands of miles from their homes to boarding schools the purpose being to assimilate them into the white culture. He felt this led to the high drop out rate and high suicide rate among the Indian children. Another aspect of much concern is the continual dwindling of their reservation land. Moose said that few people realize even today the Federal Government keeps taking away reservation lands for parks, dams, etc.

The question was brought up concerning the recent take-over of the Bureau of Indian Affairs Building in Washington. Moose was there and in charge of Outside Security and explained the reason for the take-over. He said it was the result of much frustration after aides from both political parties refused to meet with them as they had promised and after the army had stopped them from holding religious ceremonies for the American Indians buried in Arlington National Cemetery. Moose said he did not condone what happened as far as the damage to the building was concerned, however, after every avenue of communication had been rejected some of the younger Indians released their anger at the building. Moose questioned the \$2,000,000 figure released as the amount of damage done to the building. In answer to a question of what they had gained, Moose said it would take perhaps one or two years before they would know if the results were positive or negative. He said after over 300 treaties being broken by the white man, sometimes you have to hit them in the head to make them listen. He summed up by saying that the Indians wanted the freedom to be self-supporting, practice their own religion, make their own decision for their people and be able to put industries on the reservations to keep their people together on the reservation. He stated that the needed changes are not possible until the Bureau of Indian Affairs is stopped from having a life and death hold over the Indians' lives.

AGRICULTURE IN ACTION

INDIANIAN FARM BUREAU

The great idea program initiated by the U.S. Department of Agriculture may be used to fund farm projects by Michigan farmers of this year's bumper crop. Money according to Arthur Rowley, Chairman of the Michigan State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

Any producer who participated in the 1971 Feed Grain Program is eligible for Community Credit Corporation loans on feed and grain programs. Program participation is not required for loans on equipment.

Rowley pointed out that producers can borrow on their 1972 crop based on the loans on approved wheat, corn and soybean crops. The maximum amount is \$100,000 per acre. With 1971 crop a 1972 crop may now be advanced in excess of 100 million bushels, storage for this year's crop may now be a minimum in some areas.

Rowley stated that the reauthorized loan program recently authorized by Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Carroll O. Brantner will help some producers obtain necessary loans to reorganize storage short crops. This money has been made available to find solutions to the storage problem for the crop that needs it.

For this program, a grower who participated in the Farm Income Stabilization Plan can have some storage space and cannot now find approved warehouse storage may obtain a loan based on his 1971 crop. Loan rates, even though the loan is covered by CCC to a terminal destination for storage.

He explained that under this program, the producer would retain equity in the loan and the farmer will have a cash settlement with CCC based on a local market price to a date selected by the producer during the loan period which he feels is the best time to sell his crop.

Rowley pointed out that the reauthorized loan program will not be available in any area unless the area has been approved by the State AIC Committee as a storage shortage area based on the crop being produced by the local County Committee.

Procedures and applications have been forwarded to all Michigan AIC County Committees.

Highway Funds To Be Distributed

Notice

— **ANNOUNCE** — Third quarter Motor Vehicle Highway Fund allocations are now being distributed to Michigan counties, cities and villages, the State Committee reports.

John P. Woodhead, deputy director of the Department of State Highways, said that members of the Highway Fund Allocation Unit, except the September of 1971 amounted to \$85,894, 25¢, an increase of \$4,501, 84¢ or 5.1 per cent compared to the same period of 1971.

Woodhead County's share was \$11, 157, while Manchester received \$4, 155.

All State gasoline and diesel fuel taxes and license plate fees go to the Motor Vehicle Highway Fund.

After deduction of collection costs by the Department of State, and the share of 1.7 per cent for the State Waterways Commission, the funds are distributed under the formula of 45 per cent to the Highway Department, 34 per cent to the 65 counties and 21 per cent to the 51 incorporated cities and villages.

Under this formula, the Highway Department received \$35, 552, 751 in the share of the third quarter allocations. Counties received \$25, 254, 645 and the cities and villages, \$57, 194, 850.

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
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

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

November 6, 1972

Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by Pres. Little at 7:02 pm. Trustees present were Benedict, Fitzgerald, Mahony, Scully, Stautz and Walton. Minutes from the Oct. 16, 1972 regular meeting were read and approved with a motion from Mahony and a second by Fitzgerald.

Emory Garlick was present to discuss the development of his property located just west of the Village Limits.

At 8:00 pm. it was moved by Fitzgerald, supported by Scully that Council recess and convene as Zoning Board of Appeals. Moved by Fitzgerald supported by Stautz to grant a variance to James Schook allowing the construction of a building one foot from the side yard lot line rather than the required 8 feet. All yeas, carried. Moved by Mahony, supported by Benedict to grant a variance to Duane Roller allowing the construction of a one family residence with combined side yards totaling 16'6" rather than the required 20'. All yeas, carried. Moved by Mahony, supported by Walton to adjourn as Zoning Board of Appeals and reconvene as the Village Council.

Irv Roberts questioned the revoking of special parking permits. Moved by Benedict, supported by Mahony that special permits could be issued, but in a case of snow and ice removal the area in the immediate area occupied by the permitted vehicle must be cleaned by the permit holder. All yeas, carried.

Harry Macomber discussed the JayCees proposed ice rink with Council and asked for the reasons behind the lack of support for the project in previous years. If the project is well-supervised Council felt money from the budget could be contributed after the project is underway. Moved by Benedict, supported by Walton to give the plan a vote of confidence.
