United Fund Exceeds Goal

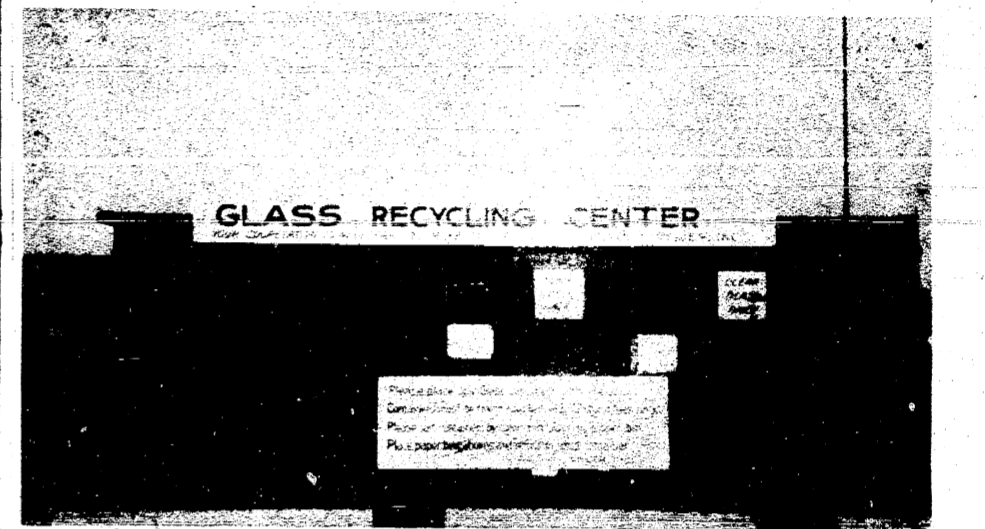
Final reports of the Manchester Area Community Fund and Red Cross Drive were reviewed by Mrs. Irvin Gill, General Campaign Chairman, at the meeting of the Chest Board on November 29, 1972.
Total drive receipts in cash and pledges amounted to \$17,315. The goal for 1973 was \$16,382. This was the twelfth consecutive year for Manchester residents to reach the budget goal.
Mrs. Gill gave recognition to all areas. The Rural Area headed by Jean Little was 16% over its goal. The Business Division, led by Mary Fielder was next in line with 11-1/2% over its goal. The Industrial Division, handled by Clarence Fielder was a close third with 10% over goal. Village House-to-House, chaired by Ica Schaffer was 9% over. The School, very ably handled by Kathy Groves, came in at a 5% over goal figure and Special Gifts, led by Claire Reck was 2% over.
Suggestions and comments from solicitors were discussed by Division Chairman and filed for 1973 reference.
The Board of Directors wish to thank all Chairmen, Captains, Solicitors, and members of the Jaycees for their help during the campaign. A special thank you to the Michigan Livestock Exchange for sponsoring the Kick-Off dinner and to the Manchester Enterprise for the excellent publicity coverage.
The residents of the entire Manchester area are to be congratulated for supporting the Community Chest and its agencies. Thank you.
The Michigan United Fund Campaign Achievement Celebration was held at Kellogg Center in Lansing on December 5 at 12 noon. The Board urged Mrs. Gill and Division Chairman to attend.
Payment of all outside designations will be made to outlying chests for payroll deductions in December and budget allocations for the 1973 budget will be partially paid.
A request from the Ecology Club was presented to the Board and this was tabled until the January meeting so that more information could be provided by the Club.
The next Board meeting will be held on January 4 at 7:30 p.m. at the Library in Manchester High School.
President Baker thanked Mrs. Gill for her excellent leadership and all Division Chairmen and volunteer solicitors for their part in the drive.

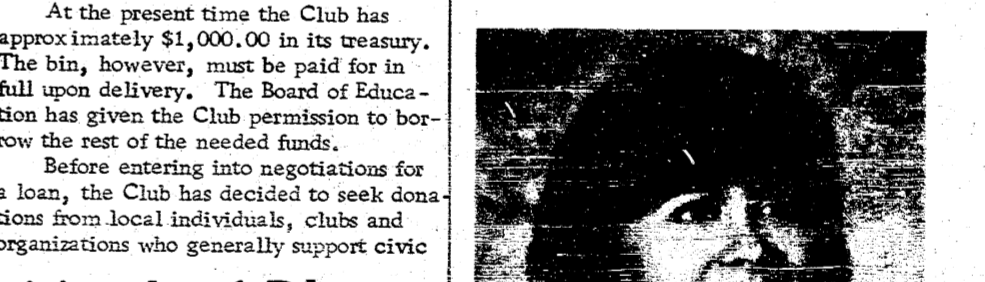
Club Orders Glass Bin



M.H.S. Ecology Club has ordered a glass storage bin such as shown above.

During the past two years a small group of volunteers from the Manchester High School Ecology Club has been conducting a glass recycling project. Glass has been collected by a door to door pick-up throughout the Manchester area. This service has been extended to all who have requested it and the list of patrons has grown steadily.
In twenty-four months approximately 90 tons of glass have been collected and transported to the recycling plant in Charlotte, Michigan. Although several local business and industrial establishments have been generous with their help, the Club can no longer handle such large amounts of glass using make-shift equipment and borrowed vehicles. The time has come to go commercial.
With the aid of interested adults, arrangements have been made for the purchase of a large glass storage bin (as pictured) at a cost of \$1,775.50, far below the market price. Delivery is expected within the next few weeks.
At the present time the Club has approximately \$1,000.00 in its treasury. The bin, however, must be paid for in full upon delivery. The Board of Education has given the Club permission to borrow the rest of the needed funds.
Before entering into negotiations for a loan, the Club has decided to seek donations from local individuals, clubs and organizations who generally support civic projects.

Last week the Washtenaw County Chapter of The National Foundation-March of Dimes announced the posting of its 1973 pre-campaign literature.

It also provides a simple, direct way for people to contribute by mail. As in years past, the picture-story inserts included in the "mailer" envelopes were printed free of charge by Mr. Walt Leonard of Chelsea and the Kulenkamp family, formerly of Manchester, who now reside at Hillside Terrace in Ann Arbor prepared the "mailers" for delivery in Manchester.

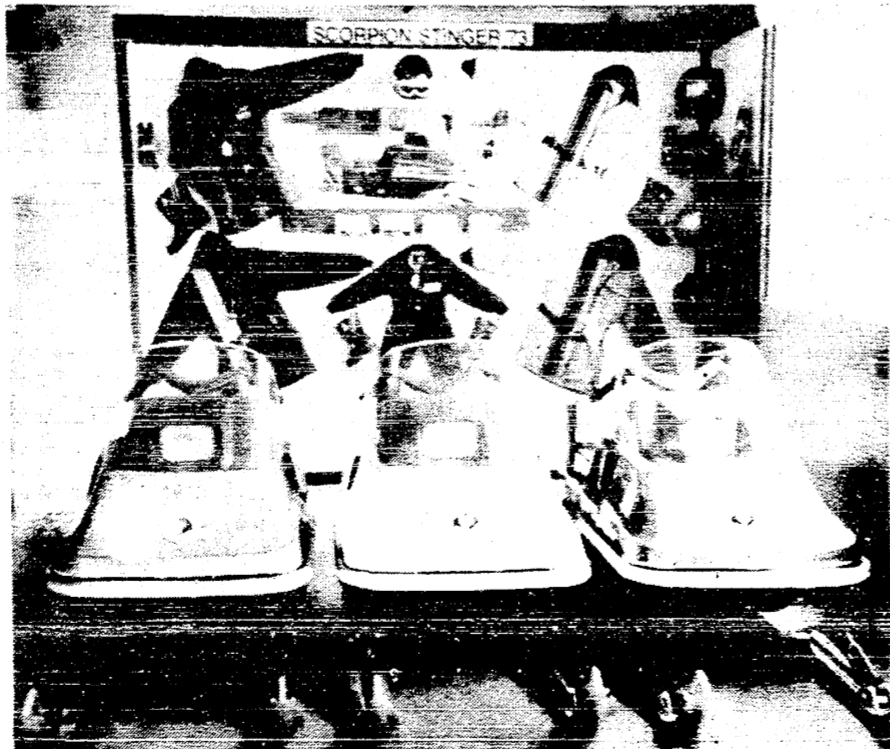

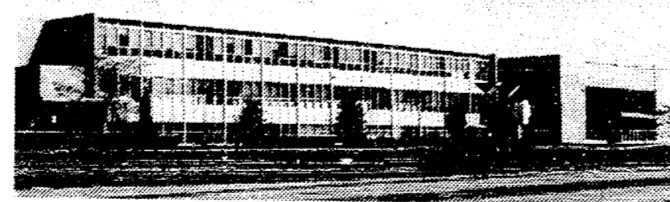

AGRICULTURE IN ACTION MICHIGAN FARM BUREAU

WHO, WHERE, HOW MUCH?

In January, one of the big debates of our time will begin in Washington.

The question appears to be a simple one. How much of your money and mine is the federal government going to spend? Actually, it's much more complicated, as the debate will resolve how much of our money the federal government is going to spend, for what purposes and where they will get the necessary funds.

When the President recently asked Congress for a ceiling on federal spending, he indicated that a curb on spending is essential if a tax increase is to be avoided.

So far, Congress has not granted the President's request for a ceiling because they do not wish to relinquish this Constitutional power, since a ceiling would permit the Executive Branch to determine not only how much to cut spending, but also where to make the cuts.

When the new Congress convenes in January, they will have to decide just how much money the federal government will spend during the next budget period and for what purposes. Many proposals will be offered. Some proposals will call for less spending on defense, others may call for spending cuts on urban programs, reduction of welfare costs, paring down direct payments to farmers or even try to save money on foreign aid.

The solution will have to be a compromise after the collective advice from lawmakers and pressure groups has been heard. Most government agencies feel they need as much or more money to operate than they are now receiving. Most groups will suggest that if spending cuts must be made, they should be in other than their areas.

One thing is sure. Congress will be faced with strong pressures against a tax increase.

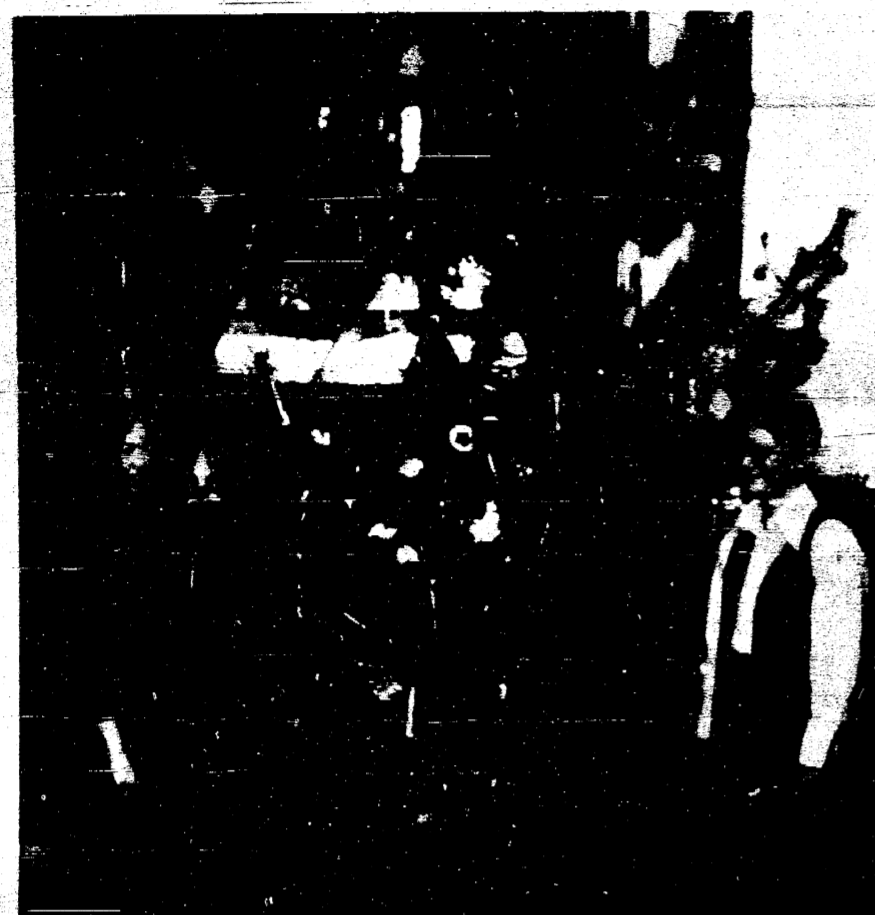

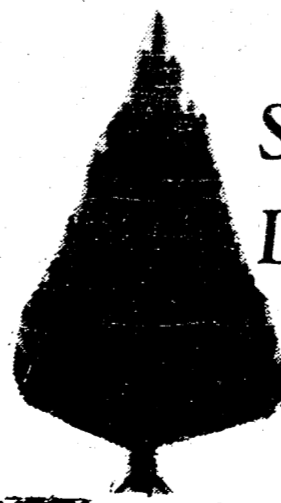

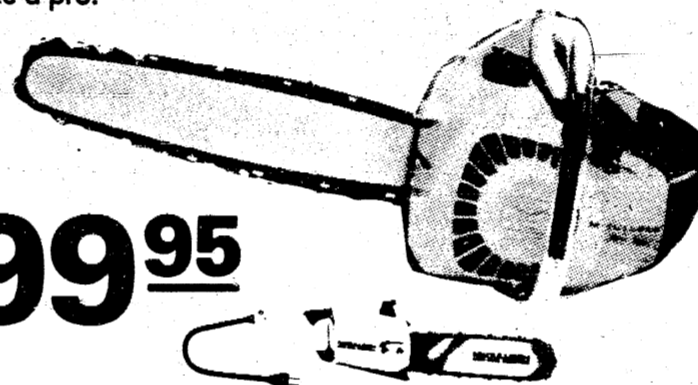

13 Million Trees, Shrubs Planted In State

Michigan State Conservationist for USDA, Soil Conservation Service, Arthur H. Cratty, has just released the tree and shrub planting totals for 1972. There were 13,392,000 trees and shrubs planted. Along with rural environmental improvement which will result from these plantings, there is also erosion control, forestry and wildlife benefits.

The planting program is a result of joint work by many local Soil Conservation Districts, the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, and the Soil Conservation Service. Since 1936, Mr. Cratty reports over 400,000,000 trees and shrubs have been planted. He estimates that this means about 500,000 acres of land have been improved by these plantings.

Washtenaw County Soil Conservation District furnished leadership for planting 256,000 trees and 36,700 shrubs during 1972. This represents about 200 acres of

protection. Stephen Bristle, Chairman of the Washtenaw County Soil Conservation District, states that 2,547 acres of trees and shrubs have been planted in Washtenaw County since the Soil Conservation District's formation in 1948.

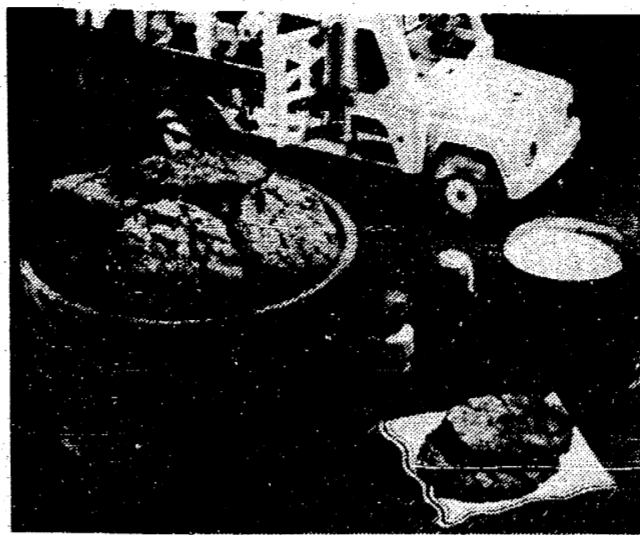

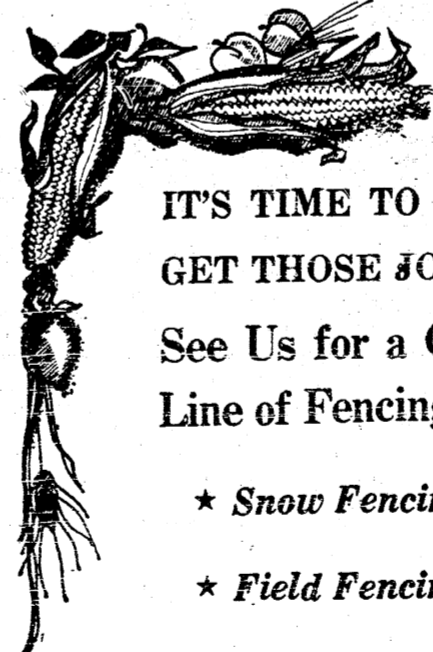

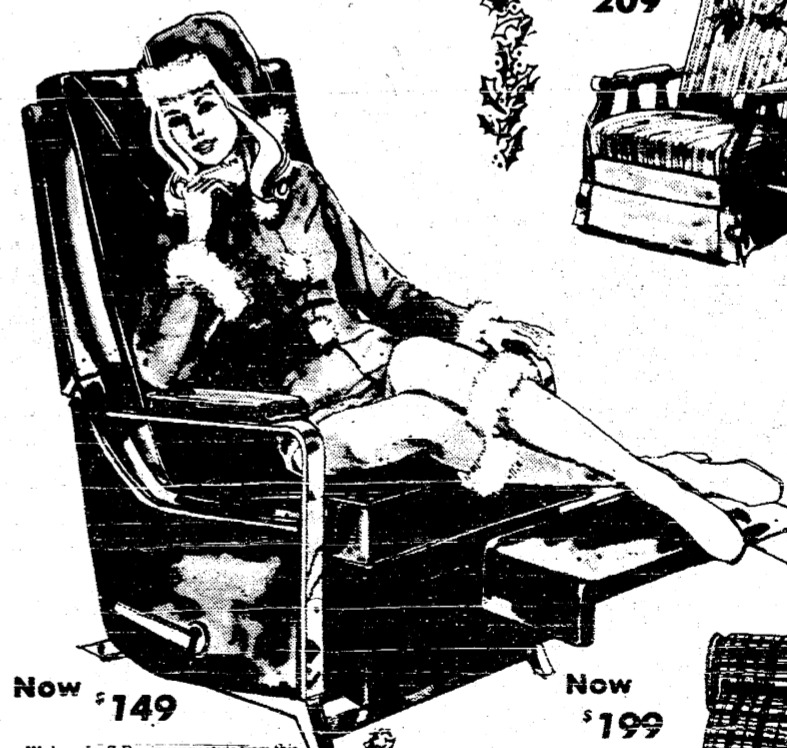

PICKING A CUT CHRISTMAS TREE

If you cut your own Christmas tree, you know it's fresh.

To be sure the cut tree you buy will stay fresh and green through the holidays, Michigan State University foresters suggest a four-step test: bend the needles, bump the tree on the ground, check the firmness of the branches, and feel the bottom of the stump.

The needles on a fresh tree bend easily and don't fall when you bump the tree. Disregard the brown needles that fall; they are part of the tree's normal shedding process.

Be sure the branches are firm. Sagging limbs will let ornaments slip off and give the tree a droopy, dispirited appearance.

The bottom of the stump should feel sappy moist and the tree should be fragrant.

To keep your tree fresh longer, cut an inch or so off the bottom of the trunk before you set the base in water, and add water every day. A fresh tree will drink more than a quart a day.

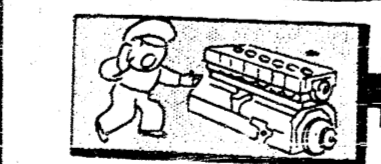

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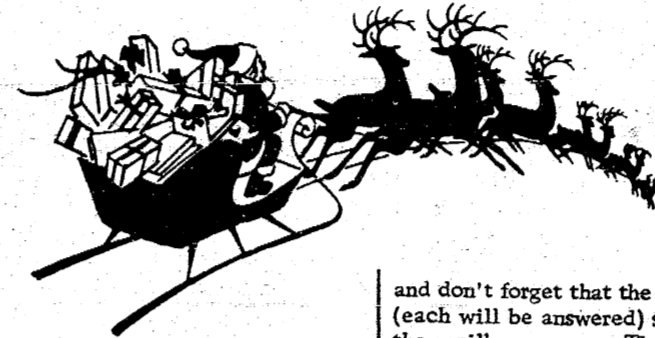
