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ATTENTION MANCHESTER SNOWMOBILERS:

DEFINITIONS YOU NEED TO KNOW:

"HIGHWAY OR STREET" Means the entire width between the boundary lines of every way publicly maintained when any part thereof is open to the use of the public for purposes of vehicular travel.

"ROADWAY" means that portion of a highway improved, designated, or ordinarily used for vehicular travel. If a highway includes 2 or more separate roadways the term roadway refers to any such roadway separately, but not to all such roadways collectively.

"RIGHT OF WAY" means that portion of a highway less the roadway and any shoulder.

"SHOULDER" means that portion of a highway on either side of the roadway which is normally snowplowed for the safety and convenience of vehicular traffic.

SECTIONS OF THE MANCHESTER VILLAGE ORDINANCE REGULATING SNOWMOBILES WHICH HAVE BEEN SUPERCEDED BY MICHIGAN STATE LAW IS AS FOLLOWS:

Section 12. A person shall not operate a snowmobile upon a public highway, land used as an airport or street or on a public or private parking lot not specifically designated for the use of snowmobiles except under the following conditions and circumstances:

In zone 3 when it is impracticable to gain immediate access to an area adjacent to a public highway, the snowmobile may be operated on the right of way adjacent and parallel to the roadway for the sole purpose of gaining access to and from the area of operation by the most direct route. Loading or unloading of the snowmobile shall be accomplished with due regard to safety at the nearest possible point to the area of operation.

A snowmobile may be operated across a public highway other than a limited access highway, at right angles to the highway for the purpose of getting from one area to another when the operation can be done in safety and another vehicle is not crossing the highway at the same time in the same general area. An operator shall bring his snowmobile to a complete stop before proceeding across any public highway and shall yield the right of way to all oncoming traffic.

Snowmobiles may be operated on a highway in a county road system, which is not normally snowplowed for vehicular traffic and on any snowplowed highway in

the county road system, outside the corporate limits of a city or village, which is designated and marked for snowmobile use by the county road commission having jurisdiction.

Section 15. Within 100 feet of a dwelling between 12 midnight and 6 a.m., at a speed greater than minimum required to maintain forward movement of the snowmobile.

SECTIONS OF THE MANCHESTER VILLAGE ORDINANCE STILL IN EFFECT:

Section 2. REGULATIONS. It shall be unlawful for any person to operate a snowmobile under the following circumstances:

A. On private property of another without the express permission to do so by the owner or occupant of said property.

B. On public school grounds, park property, playgrounds, recreational areas and golf courses without express provision or permission to do so by the proper public authority, and then only pursuant to such rules and regulations as the Village Council shall hereafter by resolution proscribe.

C. In a manner so as to create loud, unnecessary or unusual noise so as to disturb or interfere with the peace and quiet of other persons.

D. In a careless, reckless or negligent manner so as to endanger the safety of any person or the property of any other person.

H. Between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m.

Due to the changes in the Michigan State Law, Manchester has had to upgrade its ordinance to comply with the minimum requirements of the State Law.

These Laws will be enforced as required.

When the new 93rd Congress convenes in Washington on January 3, its members will be faced with some knotty problems in the field of agriculture legislation. And, if they do their job as well as their predecessors, they will have a record of which they can be proud.

Any analysis of the work of the adjourned Congress must give the lawmakers in 1971 and 1972 a good mark for achievement. The 92nd Congress passed a landmark Rural Development Act, a completely revised Farm Credit Act and new pesticide legislation.

All three measures were highly controversial, but were enacted in final form that will be helpful to farmers and rural people generally.

The new Federal Environmental Pesticide Control Act of 1972 will require pesticides to be classified for general use

or restricted use by trained applicators, prohibit the use of any pesticide in a manner inconsistent with labeling instructions and require pesticide chemicals used in interstate commerce to be registered with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

The act also authorizes EPA to establish pesticide packaging standards, set disposal of pesticides and containers, issue experimental use permits, conduct research and monitor use, and requires registration of producers.

The new Congress has an opportunity to make a record as good as, or even better than, the 92nd. They will probably write a new government farm program law. They may also deal with two other major agriculture issues, a marketing and bargaining bill and a law governing agriculture labor relations.

If such laws are enacted with frame-

work within which farmers can operate efficiently and profitably, the new Congress, by such action, will benefit the entire nation.

Ask Senator GRIFFIN



By cutting through red tape, members of Congress can often lend a hand to those with problems involving the federal government. Through the columns of this newspaper, Senator Griffin answers questions of general interest. He will respond personally to all communications addressed to: Senator Robert P. Griffin, Senate Office Building, Washington, D.C. 20510.

I'm interested in buying some land out west as an investment, and I know the government owns quite a lot of it. Does the Federal government sell any of the land it owns; and, if so, how can I find out what's available? —E. V., Mt. Pleasant

The Bureau of Land Management's quarterly magazine, "Our Public Lands," contains a listing of upcoming sales of Federally-owned lands, along with information on how to bid on tracts. The recent Fall issue, which I'm enclosing, lists land that is available for sale in Colorado, Idaho, Oregon, New Mexico and Arizona. Copies may be obtained by writing to the Bureau of Land Management, Department of the Interior, Washington, D.C. 20240.

I understand that people who buy things from door-to-door salesmen now have a chance to think it over and, if they decide they don't want what they bought, they can return it. Is this true? —T. E., Cadillac

Yes. Michigan passed a law last year that allows consumers a three business day "cooling-off period" to determine whether they wish to keep purchases made from door-to-door salesmen. The law applies to sales of \$35 or more. The salesman must inform the buyer of his or her right to cancel. Cancellation may be made by regular mail, and there can be no penalty for cancelling an order.

Bake a Perfect Butterscotch Pie

A proper butterscotch pie should boast a rich "scotchby" (caramel) flavor, be thickened just enough to hold its shape when cut into serving wedges and be covered with a delicately browned meringue.

Butterscotch Meringue Pie
1 baked 9-inch pastry shell
1 cup firmly packed brown sugar
1/2 cup corn starch
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup water
1 cup milk
3 eggs, separated
1/2 cup margarine
1 teaspoon vanilla
6 tablespoons sugar

Mix together brown sugar, corn starch and salt in 2-quart saucepan. Gradually stir in water, then milk. Bring to a boil over medium heat, stirring constantly and boil for one minute.

Beat egg yolks slightly and stir a little hot mixture into yolks. Then stir all into remaining hot mixture. Return to boil, stirring constantly and boil 1 minute.

Remove from heat and stir in margarine and vanilla. Cool to room temperature and turn filling into pie shell.

Make a meringue from egg whites and the 6 tablespoons sugar. Spread some meringue around edge touching crust all around. Then fill in center. Bake in a 350 F. (moderate) oven 15 to 20 minutes until meringue is lightly browned. Cool away from drafts.

HOLIDAY REMINDERS

Christmas trees, lighted candles, arrangements of evergreen sprigs—all are traditional touches which spread the holiday atmosphere throughout the home — can also spread the horror of fire unless great care is taken. Everyone is urged to keep a fire as a safety high on the list of things to remember this time of year.

Following are safety suggestions when planning Christmas trees, lighting, decorations, wrappings and gifts.

TREE: Select a firm, fresh one and put it at once in a cool place with its base in water. Before setting it up, cut about an inch off the base to help the tree absorb water, then place the tree in a stand containing water. Locate the tree away from heat and where it won't block exits. Take it down as soon as possible after Christmas — the more it dries out, the more of a hazard it becomes.

LIGHTING: Never use lighted candles on a tree or near any evergreen decorations. Check sets of electric lights for worn insulation, broken plugs or loose splicing.

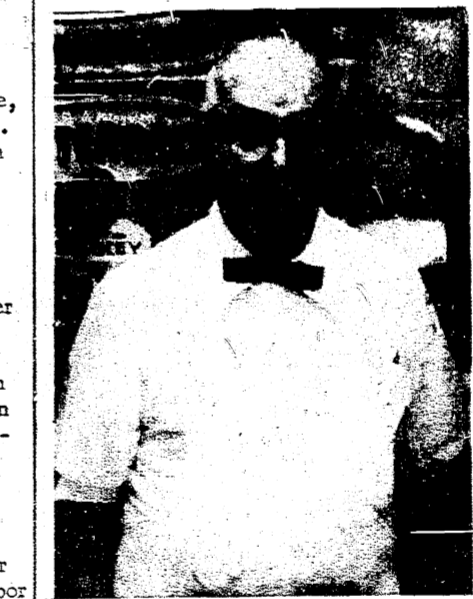
Adult Education Courses Offered
