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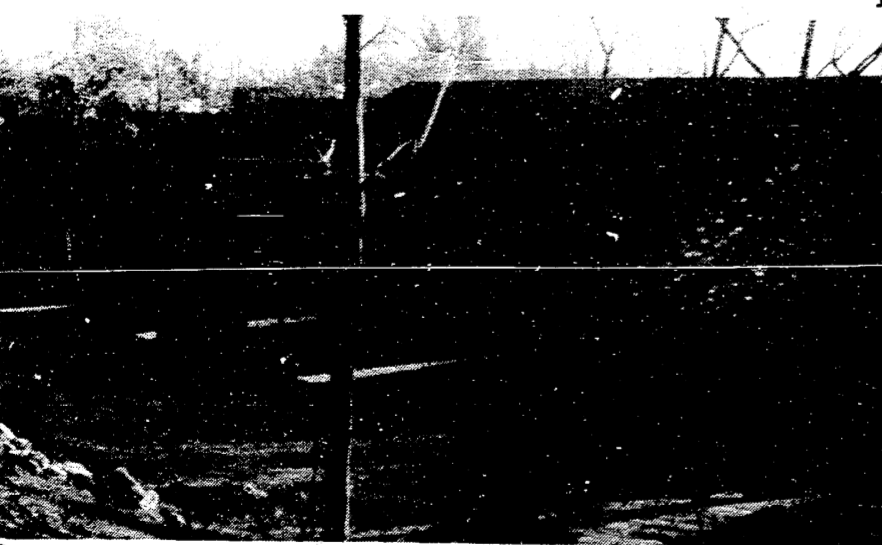

Question:

I am a teenager and I have committed a terrible sin with a married man. Will I go to hell? Will God forgive me if I don't really repent of my sin?

Answer:

One of the clearest things that the Bible teaches is the necessity of sincere, honest repentance if we are to receive forgiveness for our sins. There is no other way!

Adultery is a very serious sin and it is condemned throughout the Bible. If you will look at the law of Moses you will see that its punishment was death. "If a man commits adultery with the wife of his neighbor, both the adulterer and the adulteress shall be put to death." (Leviticus 20:10).

This is, of course, in addition to the Ten Commandments which forbid adultery.

However, as serious as this sin is, God can forgive you. Read the story in the New Testament (John 8:3-11) of the woman who was taken in adultery and brought before Jesus. The multitude wanted Him to pass judgment upon her so that they could stone her. His answer to them was, "He that is without sin among you, let him cast the first stone."

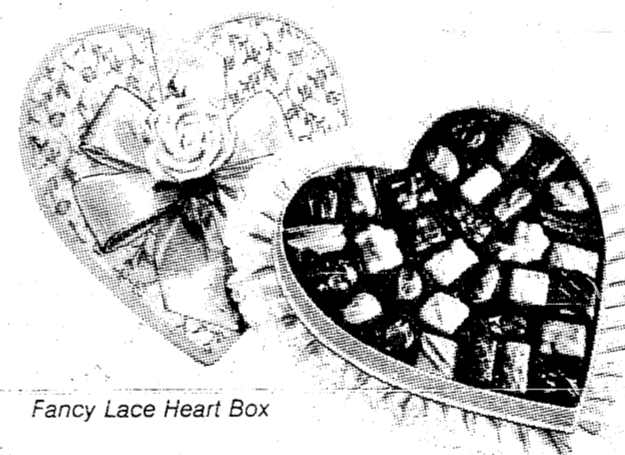

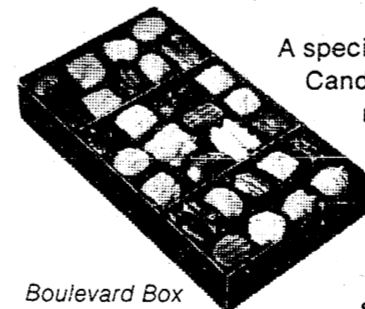

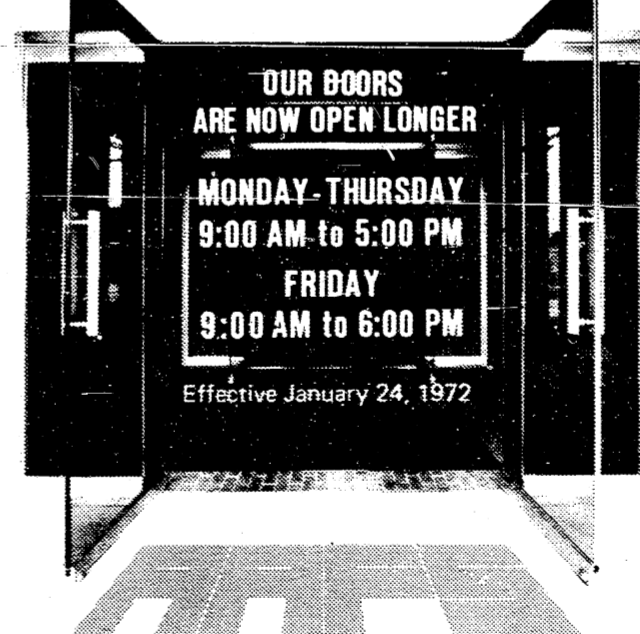

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

January 17, 1972

Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by Pres. Little at 7:10 p.m. Trustees present were Benedict, Fitzgerald, Mahony, Reinhardt, Scully and Walton. Minutes from the January 3, 1972 meeting were read. Moved by Fitzgerald, supported by Scully to approve the minutes. All yeas, carried.

Ecology Club members Mark Spencer, Nancy Simmons, Meg Munson and sponsor, Mrs. Wild Fyfe, with Laura Sumner as spokesman, were present to explain their goals and achievements. They hope to make the club a community undertaking rather than just the high school. The group would like to increase the awareness of the community to their glass pick-up program which has expanded from 800 lbs. to 5000 lbs. monthly as well as ask for any financial assistance possible in financing a bin for drop off of glass. Suggestions were made on various bin suppliers and the group agreed to look into local possibilities as well as those recommended by other glass centers.

In addition to the above, the auxiliary police accepted approximately 1500 hours to the Village of Manchester during this time period. Scully reported that with our auxiliary's recommendations a meeting was set up with the part-time and full-time police on January 11. Resolved by Scully, supported by Fitzgerald that the Village Council does not recognize the Manchester Police Association until so advised by the Village attorney that they do fulfill all statutory requirements. All yeas, carried. Police Chief Beckel recommended that Officer Frank Paga be removed from his duties. Moved by Mahony, supported by Fitzgerald that the Council accept the recommendation of Chief Beckel to terminate the employment of probationary police officer, Frank A. Paga because of the lack of performance of duties, with the understanding to be carried out at the Chief's earliest convenience. All yeas, carried.

Numerous complaints have been received concerning automobiles on private property without permission at 2 and 3 a.m. The Health & Safety Committee agreed to publish a reminder on the chief police contained in the Snowmobile Ordinance.

Walton discussed the minutes of the Village Planning Commission. Pres. Ted Oulley advised Council that the ordinance site of 17a was being discussed for a relatively slow controlled growth community. The chief concern of the group at this point is to serve the central business district way and in the future. The development of a parking lot on the north side of Main Street would add the community and is under consideration by the group. Two vacancies exist on the Planning Commission as the result of expired terms. Moved by Reinhardt, supported by Fitzgerald that Lorenz Leason and L.V. Min be reappointed for three year terms. All yeas, carried. Fitzgerald discussed Public Works activities:

1. Mr. Dunham was given a contract drawn up by the Village Attorney. He will review it and make any changes he deems necessary which would then be subject to Village Council approval.
2. Working further has transferred to: Hester lease.
3. Michael Simmons and Bruce Daniels will be attending an Applied Mathematics for Water and Wastewater Personnel with certification to be awarded by the Michigan section.
4. Michael Simmons and Lorenz Leason are studying sewage plant operation in a free course offered at the Tannock Plant.
5. The water bills are in.
6. Cost of the Public Works Office and Police Dept. material was \$1,475.

Education Take A Giant Step-Backwards?

PIONEER DAY

Pine benches, waterbucket, and a 'dunce' stool in the corner. With these simple devices and a great deal of imagination, the fifth grades of Manchester Middle School have re-created a one room school-house of the pioneer days of our country.

From a germ of an idea in a magazine, Miss Eberle (Mrs. Godby) who teaches Social Studies and English and whose class was studying the era of the westward movement, began discussing the "olden days" with her class and with immediate enthusiasm the children began to talk of how schools have changed. Soon the remaining 3 sections of the 5th grade had caught the excitement of the idea. Assign-



ments in reading, writing, and arithmetic were given and a day set for old fashioned teaching and learning.

With teachers using their 'maiden' names, (Miss Gilbert was, of course Mrs. Buss) for until the era after WWII women teachers were unmarried, and the girls dressed in their granny gowns the children, smiling and polite, "yes ma'am and no ma'am", the individual classrooms each held an air of excited interest. Fully entering into this day of experiential learning, each class had lessons suitable to the day. The Science class in Miss Mann's (Mrs. Groves) room studied the planting of fields and in Geography learned from an old book about waves and currents in the ocean.

Miss White (Mrs. Ziegler) and her class had arithmetic problems worked on the blackboard.

With each child having made a horn book, lessons written on them were recited out loud. Aesop's Fables were read and discussed with special

emphasis placed on understanding the moral precept in each tale.

Mottos were memorized and recited... "Do not begrudge others what you cannot enjoy yourself", and the spell-downs, with girls in one row, boys in another, while at the back of the room a special group, which in a one room school would have been another age group, was committing to memory the poem "Where there's a Way", by Eliza Cook. Penmanship was practiced and suddenly two boys were called upon to "please fetch wood for the stove". Going out of the room, the boys pantomimed bringing in wood and filling the pot bellied stove made of construction paper and pasted to the wall.

Well behaved, with sparkling eyes, smiles and complete absorption, the children entered into the spirit of the day.

This reporter found a good deal of teaching and learning in progress, with the clear joy of the children participating, a tremendous pleasure to observe.

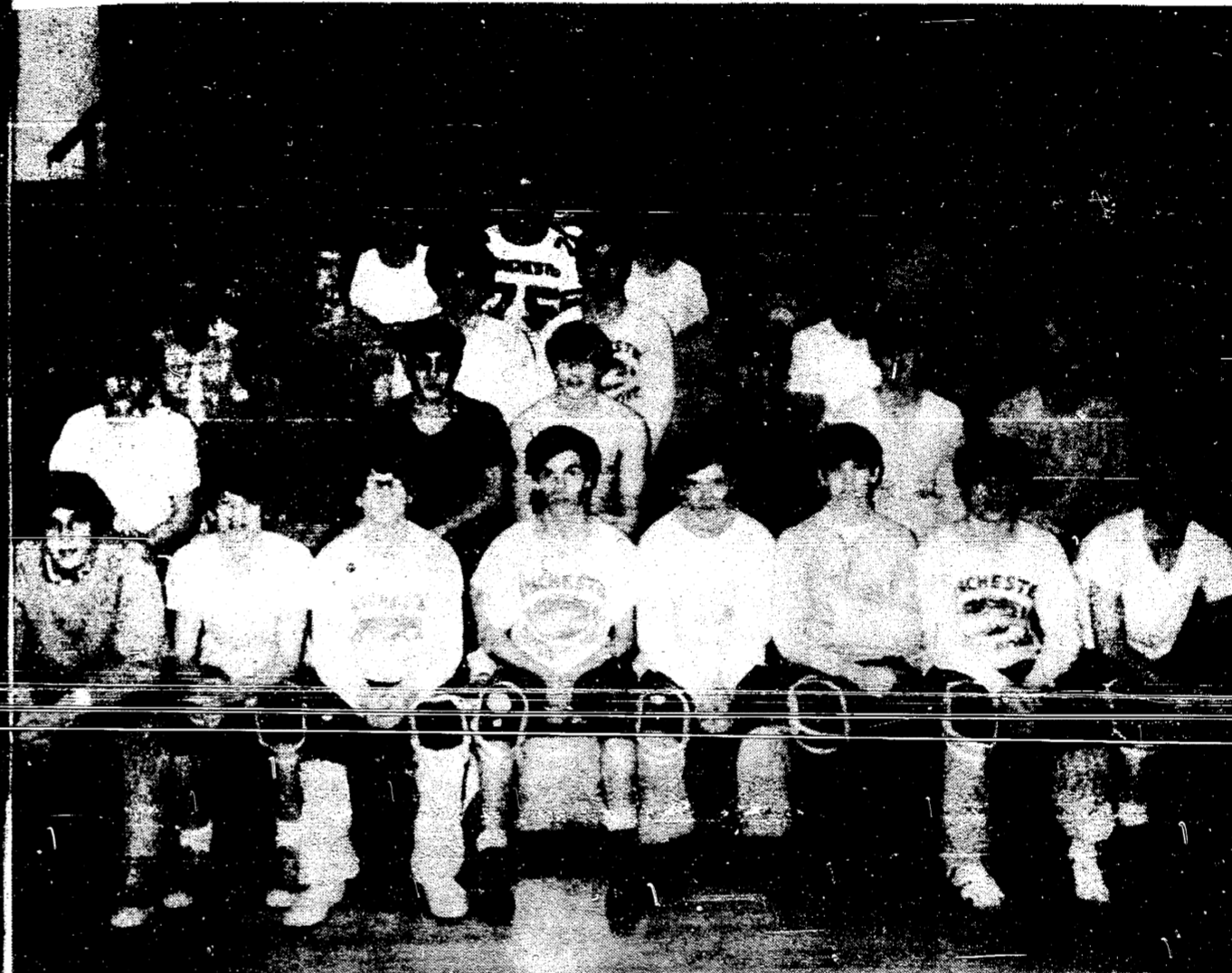
