Golden Sesame Buns

6 1/2 to 7 1/2 cups enriched flour
1 package dry yeast
2 cups water
1/2 cup oil
1/2 cup sugar
1 tablespoon salt
2 eggs
Sesame seeds

Stir together 3 cups flour and yeast. Heat water, oil, sugar and salt over low heat until warm, stirring to blend. Add liquid ingredients to flour-yeast mixture, and beat until smooth, about 2 minutes on medium speed of electric mixer or 300 strokes by hand. Blend in 1 egg. Add 1 cup flour and beat on medium speed 1 minute or 150 strokes by hand. Stir in more flour to make a moderately stiff dough. Turn onto lightly floured surface and knead until smooth and satiny, about 8 to 10 minutes. Shape into ball and place in lightly greased bowl, turning to grease all sides. Cover and let rise in warm place (80 to 85°) until doubled, about 1 1/2 hours. Punch down. Divide dough into 24 equal pieces; shape each into smooth ball. Place on greased baking sheets. Let stand uncovered at room temperature until doubled, about 2 hours. Beat remaining egg and brush over buns. Sprinkle generously with sesame seeds. Bake in preheated 400° oven 20 to 30 minutes, or until done.
*Spoon flour into dry measuring cup; level. Do not scoop.
NOTE: If self-rising flour is used, omit salt.

VILLAGE PLANNING COMMISSION

The regular meeting of the Manchester Village Planning Commission was held at the Village Hall, with members present Edward Curley, Laurin Lee-son, L. V. Kirk, David Little, and Harry Krauss.

The meeting was called to order at 7:45 by Chairman Curley. Also present were Mr. Sang Nam of the Washtenaw County Metropolitan Planning Commission, and Mr. Bruce Daniels, Supt. of Public Works.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read, and on the motion by Little, supported by Kirk, were declared approved.

Discussion of the Central Business District (CBD) Study: A new map of the CBD was displayed, including detailed characteristics. Also overlays of the principal areas showing how they fit together, and the traffic patterns associated with parking lots and spaces. These indicate various conflicts in continuity of the business section and in the flow of traffic, especially between through and local traffic, and access to parking lots.

Other overlays were proposals for ideal long term solutions, and for shorter term ways of correcting some of the problems on a more practical basis at this time. Provision for pedestrian traffic would include walkways along the river.

Other charts show graphically the comparison between floor areas of stores and desirable auto parking spaces, both existing and proposed. (Based on a standard ratio of two square feet for parking to one square foot of business floor area.) These charts are then translated into maps of where and how the parking needs may be provided for, broken down into four stages of development, and a textual analysis of how the changes may be financed. A 23 page report and summary of the foregoing pictorial presentations were explained.

There was a general discussion of present parking problems, and possible immediate steps to be recommended for alleviation of the conditions. Further consideration was given to the subject of how the work is to be implemented, leading to the appointment of a "Parking Lot Committee", with Curley, Krauss, Kirk and Little to work on a definitive program and perhaps meet with the Chamber of Commerce and/or the merchants most directly concerned. The Planners will work out some supplementary materials for presentation by this Committee.

There ensued a review and discussion of the "Development Plan Report" which was presented at the December meeting, with several questions or misunderstandings answered.

Copies of the "Central Business District Study", and a report on "Implementation of the (Development) Plan", were distributed for individual study and the offering of comments and feedback during the next meeting.

On the motion by Little, seconded by Krauss, the meeting was declared adjourned at 10:20 p.m.

He was born in Knox Co., Ohio in 1889, near where she lived as a girl. She met him on different occasions, and heard some of the fine messages he gave.

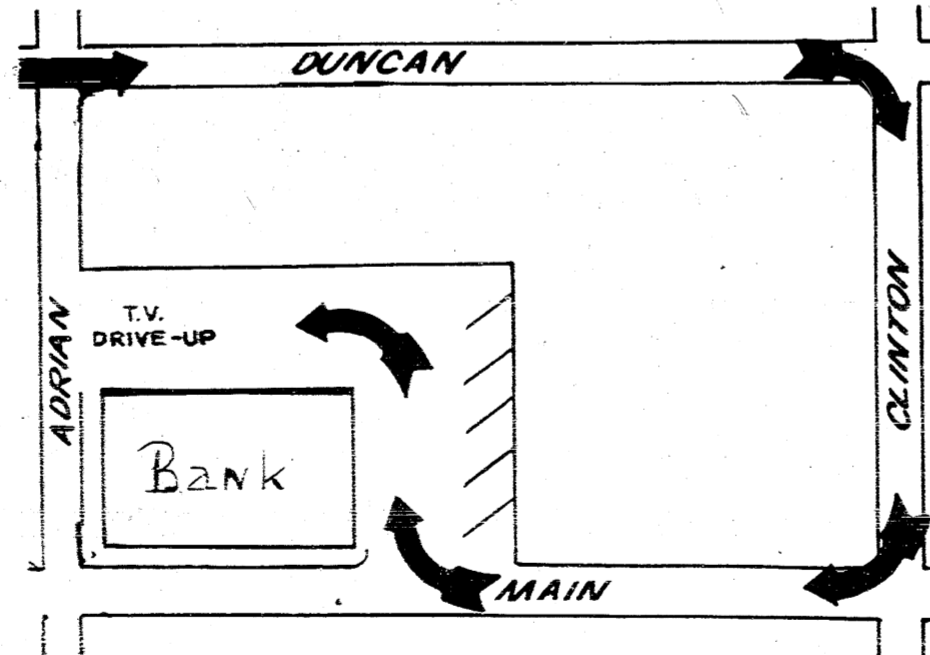

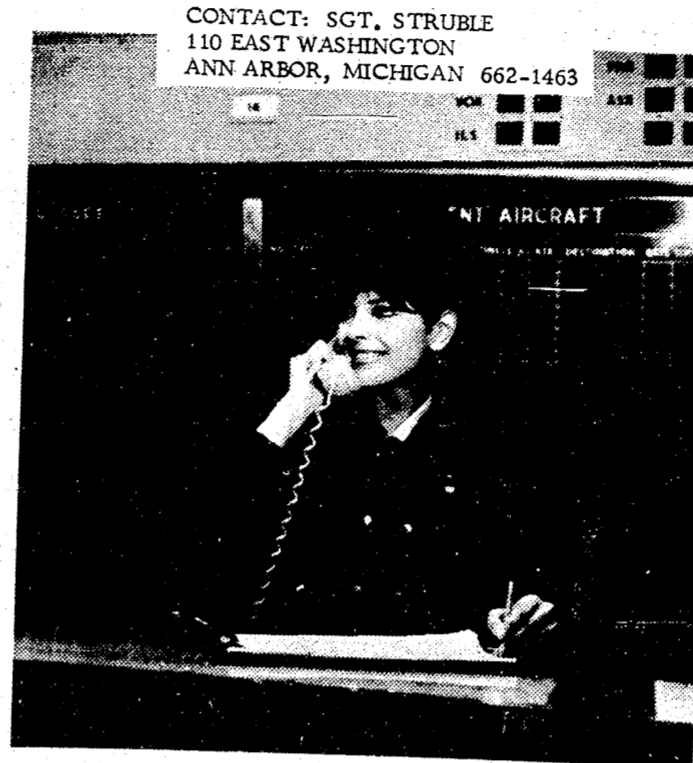

AGRICULTURE IN ACTION MICHIGAN FARM BUREAU

There are rumblings and a great deal of misinformation about the need for price controls on raw farm products as the result of some increases in retail prices, especially for meat.

This being an election year, consumer protectionism may become a major plank in the platform of many political candidates. It is to be expected that an appeal will be made to the 96 percent of the American public that is non-farm in order to gain votes.

Most wage earners are accustomed to continued periodic increases in their wages and few have had to face cuts or wages that go up and down from year to year. Also, these workers, especially those who belong to labor unions, are not aware that farm prices in our economy go up and down in response to supply and demand factors.

Present food prices also reflect high consumer demand sparked by the desire for higher protein diets, special packaging and pre-cooked frozen packaging.

USDA figures show that farmers last year got only 35 percent of each

dollar consumers spent on food which is down one cent from 1970.

Shoppers at the supermarkets also should realize that disposable income will go up more than food prices in 1972 and that the percentage of disposable income spent for food is expected to drop to 15.5 percent from 16 percent in 1971. What's more, only in the U.S. do food buyers spend such a low percentage of their take-home pay for food.

It is equally certain that if farmers had not achieved a phenomenal record of productivity and efficiency far surpassing any other U.S. industry, consumers would be astounded by the prices they would have to pay for food.
