Just A Quiet Day

Saturday, March 11, 1972
A quiet day in a quiet town. The first day the sun seemed to soften everything, and give promise of spring, not here but just nearby. In the square white building on the town common, where the Library for three hours opens its doors. The birds are noisy in the sky covering the stone chimney. The scaffolds have been busy through the ground beside the front steps and a soft murmuring is heard in the children's room. A few adults have wandered in, Janice Little is choosing a book to read and when the front door opened the musical double note of the chime announced new arrival.

The young man standing at the desk introduced himself with a smile and a quiet looking young man and wondered if he might be able to help him. He was a family who lived in Manchester in 1900, we offered to assist him in finding old copies of the Manchester Enterprise. That is a time consuming job and we decided to question him further. "What family do you look for?" "Not a family, just a man." "Old Brownell is his name -- he is my father and for several years I have been attempting to locate him." "Raised by his mother and adopted to another name, curious to meet her he had lost contact with, he had only two bits of information. The knowledge that his father was in the Armed Forces in the 1940's and a copy of his father's birth certificate stating that his parents were residents of Manchester in 1900 when he (the father) was born.

Well now, if the Brownell family lived in our town and the child was named here then obviously we need the help of someone who is old enough, has a sharp and retentive memory and willingness to help -- We called Clayton Parr.

"Of course I remember Harold Brownell, he was a son of the lady who married Ora Logan, as her second husband, and lived in the Logan House on Adrian Street where Delbert Logan and his sister were born (this latter being the Al Gaige and then the Korhse) when Harold was in high school was a fine ballplayer and a good friend of my brother Lowell Parr. He graduated from High School in Manchester in 1918 and soon after that left and I lost touch. You should call brother Lowell."

We did.

"Oh yes, I remember Harold Brownell well and he was a good friend of mine. I believe he's in California. I don't leave the house soon but send the letter and I'll talk to him now."

Claire Reck came in the door and listened to the story and promptly said "You can talk to Majorie Haessler, who was a school teacher here and I had had your father as a student that time."

"Yes, you're very kind, of course I like to talk with her."

But we never did have the chance. Time to see Mr. Parr.

We sent the young Harold on his way to Lowell Parr's house with a small note showing the way. Mr. Parr, after a generous interview sent him straight to town to visit with Ella Kemmer. He says, "Come right in, your father here in 1968 for a full week for an anniversary. We have snapshots and a letter with his address which I received this past December."

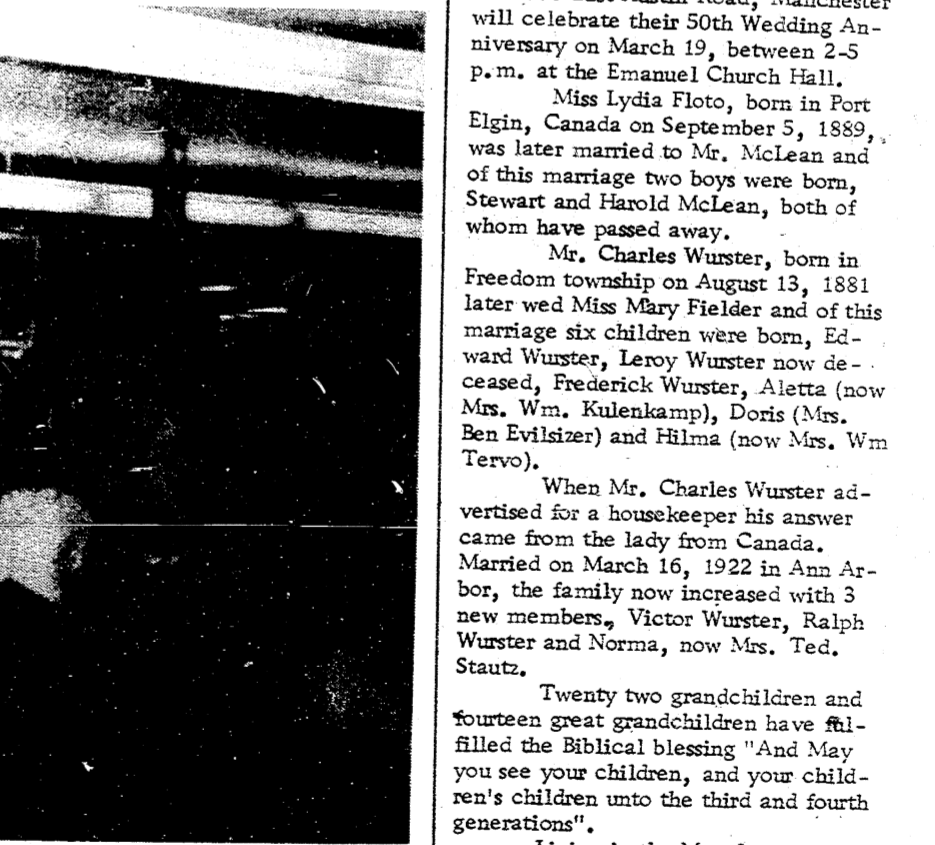

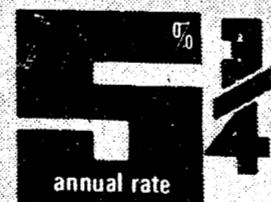
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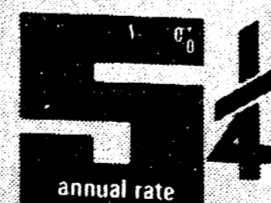
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GIRL SCOUTS CELEBRATE 60TH BIRTHDAY

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Township Report

The regular monthly meeting of the Manchester Township Board was called to order by Chairman Fielder at 8:00 p. m., on February 14, 1972. Present were Chairman Fielder, Clerk Waldo Marx, Treas. Mike Wolfe, Trustee Lyle Widmayer and Dorothy Burch, Dep. treasurer.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Mr. Wolfe gave the treasurer's report as follows:
Law Enforcement and General Fund combined, a total of \$1161.59
Trust and Agency..... 300.00
Cemetery..... 226.48
Equipment..... 1020.00
Certificate of Deposit..... 5000.00
Current Tax Collected to date..... 320,402.00
Still owing..... 244,000.00

In our mill tax account we have a total of 8,808.00 which may be used by the Township if needed.

The chairman asked the treasurer to make up a report on the current figures of the 1971-72 budget, to make a close estimate of money spent to date. When this is done we will hold a special meeting to draw up the proposed 1972-73 budget.

Widmayer made a motion to transfer to the General fund \$3,000.00 from the tax account. Seconded by Marx. Carried.

Don Brown, a local high school senior, and Boy Scout, is working on his Eagle Scout Award. This project involved close scrutiny of all township roads and crossroads. He has studied the corners where stop signs are needed, and places on these roads which constitute special hazards. He presented a mapped chart marked with special pins at intersections which he considers dangerous. He has volunteered to place appropriate signs in these places. Mr. Fielder, in contacting the County Road Commission, has been informed that only authorized persons can place the road signs, however, someone from the Road Commission is presently going to study Manchester Township on this same subject, and will welcome help and suggestions from Don Brown, so that he may receive his award. Widmayer made the motion that the Township Board furnish Don Brown with a letter, commending him on his diligence and interest in the Township. Seconded by Burch. Carried.

The Sand Lake fire contract was read. Kensler, fire chief, would like it amended to read that he must be called within the first hour so he can decide whether Manchester equipment will be needed, also if they find the possibility that any fire would extend more than one hour, they must contact our Chief. The above, to be written into the contract and returned to them with a letter stating that it is a fine contract, but per our discussion at the January meeting, the above paragraph must be inserted where noted on the contract.

A letter, dated July 1970, from Glyn Trolz was read which asked for fire protection for his property in Norwell Township. He is willing to pay the going rates for such service. He had a fire on February 4, 1972. We shall send him a bill for a total of \$289.00 which is \$25.00, plus 16 man hours at \$4.00 per hour, \$64.00 all together, \$289.00.

Veryl Schill's request for another Conditional Use permit for motorcycles, etc., for the Speedway has been denied.

Schill still owes the township \$513.00 on the Chloride bill from 1971. Of that amount, the township still owes the County \$137.00. Schill's Board meeting will be held soon after the first of March. He will be able to pay soon after that date.

The Clerk was requested to have published in both the Manchester and Clinton newspapers, the "Board of Review", to the taxpayers of Manchester Township. It must be published twice in each paper before the date of review.

Jay Lantis was given, at his own request, a copy of a Fire Contract for Norwell Township. A representative from Norwell was expected to appear at this meeting. No one attended.

Settlement Day is March 21st this year, and the Annual Meeting is on April 1st.

As soon as the treasurer has prepared the current figures for the 1971 budget, we will hold a meeting on the proposed budget.

Lyle Moore reported that a man from Norwell Township has apparently received a permit to dynamite stumps and debris in the Raisin River, all the way down. He will keep us posted.

Widmayer moved we adjourn, Wolfe seconded, Carried. Meeting was adjourned at 9:15 p. m.

What's happening with that Jobs-for-Veterans program you and Senator Hart kicked off with so much fanfare last summer? Are you getting any results?

—N. S., Grosse Pointe

Yes, thanks to the dedicated efforts of some talented and concerned people who make up the Southeast Michigan Jobs for Veterans Task Force. Latest figures indicate that 18,587 jobs for veterans have been pledged, and 11,436 Vietnam vets have been placed so far. These are new jobs—not jobs that the men held prior to military service. When you compare these figures with the fact that only 1600 veterans were placed by state agencies during the preceding year (1970), you can see we're making progress. Any returning veteran who is interested in assistance should see the Veterans Employment Representative at the nearest branch office of the Michigan Employment Security Commission.

All I want is one simple favor. I want you to either transfer my boyfriend to an Army base closer to home or give me enough money to live near the base he is stationed at in Texas. I am old enough to vote, and I won't vote for you unless you get us close enough so we can see each other once in awhile.

—P. P., Genesee County

As a Senator, I have no authority to transfer your boyfriend or anyone else in the military service. Sometimes our office can be helpful to a serviceman by providing information. However, in the case of your boyfriend, he understands Army procedures and he doesn't want to apply for a transfer.

What's the matter with the U.S. mails! We have repeatedly requested that our mail be forwarded to our winter home in Florida, but the post office holds it up as long as 10 days before sending it on in an official U.S. envelope. First class mail should not be held up. Can you help?

—R. E., Oakland County

At our request, postal authorities investigated and found that a postal clerk thought he was helping by sending several letters at a time in the envelopes which you provided. He thought he was following your instructions. Ordinarily, such mail should be forwarded daily; in the future yours will be.

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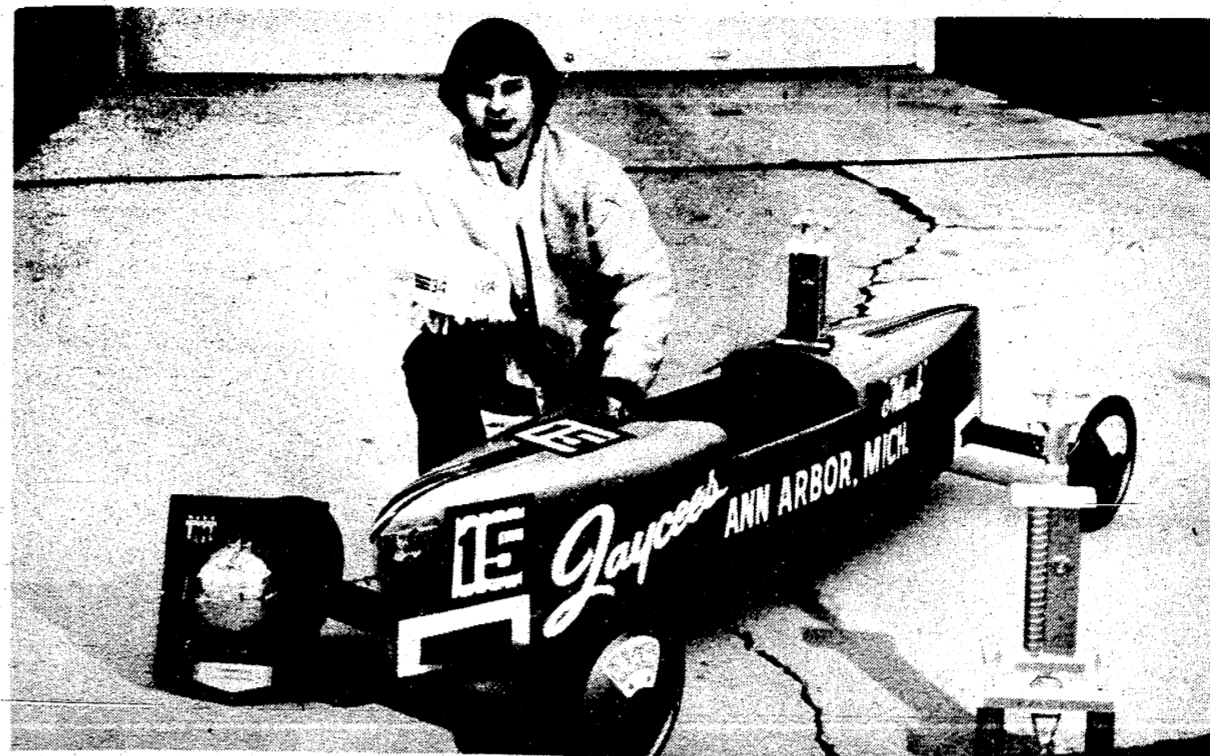

PLANS UNDER WAY FOR 1972 SOAP BOX DERBY

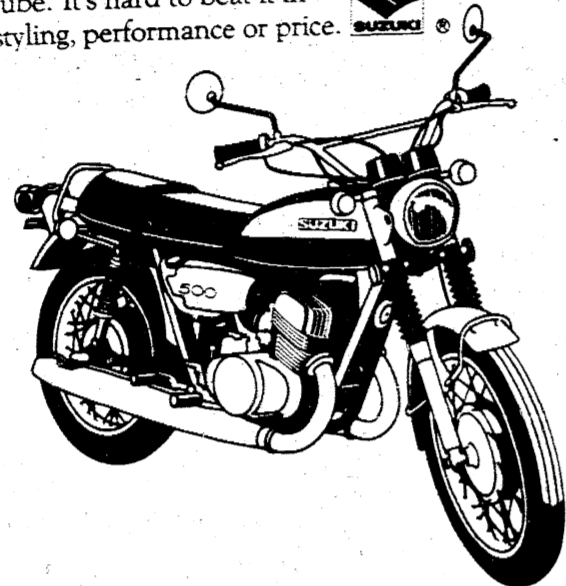

THE CRUCIFIXION

As the crowd led Jesus away to his death, Simon of Cyrene, who was just coming into Jerusalem from the country, was forced to follow, carrying Jesus' cross. Great crowds trailed along behind, and many grief-stricken women. Two others, criminals, were led out to be executed with him at a place called "The Skull." There all three were crucified... And the soldiers gambled for his clothing, throwing dice for each piece. The crowd watched. And they laughed and scoffed. And they called to him, "If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!" A signboard was nailed to the cross above him with these words: "This is the King of the Jews." One of the

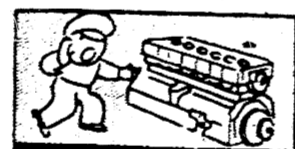
